The year of 1891 will prove a wonderful one in the development of irrigation enterprises in the territory of New Mexico. Reports from Espanola the past week are to the effect that the Rio is a prospect for the highest water in years. All spring work is well advanced and the orchards are looking remarkably well. Storage reservoirs are needed to prevent the waste of water that always occurs this time of year.

In addition to this, chapter 113 of the laws of 1889 which has not been repealed in section 3, provides that such election shall be held in other respects (except in regard to registration) as other elections are held. Sections 1 and 2 were amended by chapter 18 of the laws of 1891, and this chapter itself was amended or modified by the school law, chapter 25, which went into effect the 12th of February, 1891. In regard to the expenses connected with such election, it is my opinion that the school fund should be charged with them all, as it gets the entire benefit of such election which is distinct from ordinary county purposes. I have already advised that the poll books and other printing necessary should be paid out of this fund, and I see no reason why the other expenses connected with the election should not be borne by it also.
