

THERE ARE TWO types of summer vacation trips. There's the "R & R" type and the "Tourista"

On the R & R vacation, you sit on the lake with a fishing line dangling in the water. You visit with friends or relatives and play 42 a lot. You come home rested and relaxed.

On the Tourista vacation, you go to tour a different part of the world, see the sights, learn about new people, new cultures and new places which you have never seen before. You come sunburned, tired and broke.

Every four or five years, the Ellis family feels compelled to go on a Tourista vacation. We just back from New Orleans...sunburned, tired and

It really seemed as though we were heading into a different part of the world during the last 100 or so miles of the trip when I-10 turned into a causeway over swamps and bayous with cypress trees and snowy egrets standing around in the brackish water. I wonder just how much that stretch of four-lane interstate highway must have cost to build up on concrete pillars for that long distance.

Nearly every large city in the U.S. has an "old town" or a pioneer section which is set aside to preserve the history of the area. In New Orleans, the "French Quarter" is most uniquely colorful and historical. Some of the buildings and artifacts date back to the late 1700s.

New Orleans was such an important port of commerce in those days (and still is), being located at the junction of the Gulf of Mexico and the mouth of the Mississippi River, France, Spain and America fought over the priviledge of calling Louisiana their own.

The cobblestones which paved the French Quarter came from ballast taken from ships which had been sunk off the harbor. Because the area was marshy, cotton bales were sunk into the ground before buildings were put up...sort of an early-day landfill. So the foundations of the buildings in the French Quarter are resting on cotton bales which are nearly 200 years old.

We tried to learn the difference between the Creole and Cajun people. The French and Spanish who intermarried with natives of the Caribbean Islands were among the first settlers and considered themselves the established gentry. Descendants of these early pioneers became known as Creoles.


They did not look kindly upon the French Accadians from Nova Scotia who came down into Louisiana a few yearrs later. "Cajun" became the localized name for the Accadians who were shunned, much as the poor immigrant Irish were shunned when they arrived in New York City around the turn of the century.

So the Cajuns chose not to settle in the city, but took to the swamps where they made their livelihood catching fish, hunting alligators and trapping muskrats. Because they were rather isolated, many of these folks still speak French and retain some of their early traditions.

By the way, the true Cajun food is spicy in flavor, but not hot. The blackened fish which has become known as "Cajun" in Texas restaurants, is a very recent invention. About the only difference in Cajun and "soul food" is the addition of the spices. We tried some alligator meat which tasted a bit like barbecued chicken.

Many of the lovely sugar plantation homes along the river from Baton Rouge to New Orleans were spared the ravages of the Civil War. Several of these have been restored and are open to the







S.S. Payees **Sometimes Appointed**

Representative payees are appointed to handle the funds of Social Security beneficiaries who are unable to handle their own funds. To carry out this responsibility, the representative payee must keep informed of the person's current and future needs.

The representative payee's first responsibility is to make certain that the person's day-to-day needs for food, clothing, shelter, and personal expenses are met. Beneficiaries who can handle small amounts of spending money should have this made available to them. Social Security benefits may then be used for any special needs, such as school expenses, rehabilitation or medical expenses, insurance premiums, or payments on a house in which the person has

Any money that remains after basic and special needs are met must be saved or invested. Money should not be kept at home where it can be lost or stolen, and should not be mixed with the representative payee's own funds. Preferred investments are United States savings bonds. These should be registered in the name of the beneficiary and with his or her Social Security number. The representative payee is listed in his or her capacity.

Surplus funds should be kept in an interest-bearing account that shows the beneficiary as owner.

Additional information about benefits and the role of the representative payee may be obtained from any Social Security office.





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Hay Growers Want Crop In Program

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The Texas Farm Bureau and five of its members have filed suit against Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng and the USDA, seeking inclusion of hay as a Instrument Report Ending June Immigration Reform and Control Bonnie Warren, County Clerk Act of 1986.

President, S.M. True of Plainview, explained that hay is "perishable, labor intensive, and has critical unpredictable labor demands." True said hay's inclusion as a perishable crop will alleviate serious labor problems Lunney. experienced by hay producers.

Parmer County Farm Bureau President, Carroll Cook, said, "making hay a perishable crop will make it eligible for the Special Agricultural Worker (SAW) program. This is a chance to help livestock producers who have been shut out of this important source of labor."

A similar suit was filed in Lubbock last year seeking inclusion of cotton in the Act. That suit resulted in cotton being classified as a fruit, making it eligible for the SAW program. The five plaintiffs joining Texas Farm Bureau in the suit are Sulphur Springs dairyman Don Smith, Trinity cattleman Russ Arnold, rancher James Wood of Gilmer, and Warren and Anna Madson, ranchers from McLennan County.
