Fillies Annex Own Tournament Title

WITH THE START of the new year, we are making somewhat of a change in the production of the Bovina Blade.

The Blade, along with its sister publication, the Friona Star, was a pioneer in the offset printing industry, and was already printing by that method when many old-time printers were still looking at the "new" type of printing with a jaundiced eye.

The Blade was among the first newspapers to join the offset movement when then-publisher W.H. (Hop) Graham established Plains Publishers at Friona in 1960. It was the first offset central printing plant in Northwest Texas.

Since the closing of Plains Publishers in 1965, the Bovina Blade has been printed in Hereford, by Southwest Offset and its successor, North Plains Printing.

After collecting our news and pictures each week, the typesetting, ad makeup, page makeup, etc., are done in Friona, then the completed pages are taken to the central printing plant.

Eight businessmen, all publishers except one, have formed a corporation known as Palo Duro Offset Printing, Inc., which is located in Canyon. To begin with, ten newspapers will be printed at the new printing plant.

The Bovina Blade will be co-produced along with the Canyon News, Castro County News, Friona Star, Groom News, McLean News, Claude News, Panhandle Herald, White Deer News and the Sanford-Fritch Lakeview Journal, all of which are owned by the new press plant's shareholders.

Canyon was chosen as home for the plant because of its central location to all of the partners and its proximity to the Amarillo metropolitan market. We hope to be doing presswork for other newspapers, large business circulars, directors, etc., which require newspaper-size presses.

Probably, readers of the Bovina Blade will notice no change in their paper, and we will anticipate no deadline changes due to our new plant location.

We just wanted to make you aware of a new era in the publishing of your local newspaper, as we enter into a new year.

Dear Billy:

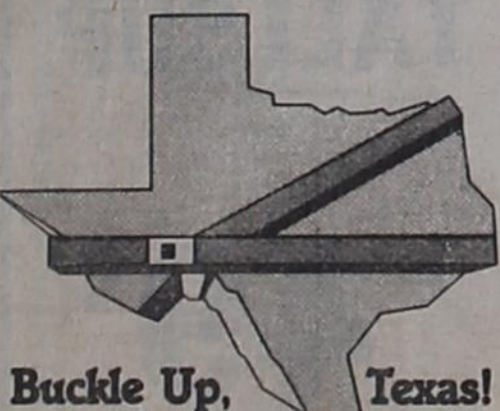
I was sitting here in the paint store resting so comfortable, and the postman comes in and hands me the mail: three duns, one check, the National Inquirer and the Bovina Blade.

Buckle Up, Texas!

The Bovina Fillies, who have had to play their last six or seven games without senior standout and high-pointer Marie Pesch, have been adjusting well to this setback.

The Fillies have compiled a 5-1 record in games played since December 17, and roared to the championship of their own tournament last weekend.

Miss Pesch has been sidelined with a chipped ankle bone. Coach Marks Lanham said he hoped to have his all-star performer back in action within a week.

"But in the meantime, the team has re-grouped, and learned that they can still win," Lanham said.

In charging through three opponents (Melrose, Grady and

Texico) in their tournament, the Fillies had two players, Peggy Shepherd and Mindy Neal, to average over 20 points per game. Miss Shepherd scored 78 points in the tourney, and Miss Neal had 65.

In addition, play-maker Robbie Stowers added 36 points, to average in the double-figures.

"Terisa Shepherd did a super job, getting the ball to the point-makers. Robbie is starting to shoot better. Sharlet Johnson did a great job on defense. Peggy and Mindy each made over 50 per cent of their shots from the field in the tournament," Lanham said.

The only game the Fillies have lost in the past couple of weeks was a 47-45 overtime thriller at Sudan

December 31.

Play-making guard Terisa Shepherd fouled out of this game, and that was a factor in the team's depth problem. Bovina had a squad of just eight girls for the game.

Ponies Take Third Place

The Bovina Mustangs placed third in their own invitational tournament here this past weekend.

The Mustangs scored wins over Melrose, 68-47, and Farwell, 77-72 in an overtime thriller. The Ponies' only loss was to Grady in the semi-finals, 75-66.

"We have been scoring a lot of points lately. Matlock Howell and Scott Scaff had great scoring games for us in the tournament, and Scott was unbelievable,

averaging 18 rebounds per game," said Coach Marks Lanham.

In the Farwell game, Terry Moore got a rebound and scored the go-ahead basket for the Mustangs, and before the overtime had ended, hit three out of four free throws to seal the win for the Ponies.

Howell scored 27 points in the third-place game, and Scott Scaff scored 25. The win avenged an earlier one-point high-scoring overtime loss to the Steers.

For the tournament, Scaff scored 64 points, and Howell had 66.

The Mustangs' only "off" game came in the semi-finals against Grady, when the New Mexico team came up with 27 fourth-quarter points to overcome a 53-37 Bovina lead at the end of three quarters.

In other single games recently, the Mustangs dropped an 86-85 (Continued on Page 3)

They both grew up on farms near Ralls and Lorenzo.

Jay, a native of Paris, Texas, moved to a farm near Ralls, where he attended school. He put in several years in a CCC Camp during the late thirties and served in the United States Armed Forces during World War II.

Dee, whose maiden name was Livingston, attended Lorenzo High School.

Even though this couple enjoyed doing farm work, which they did in the Oklahoma Lane-Bovina-Hub area more than twenty years, retirement was necessary due to ill health. Both of them are diabetic and have other more serious health problems.

About a year ago they moved into their present home at 1009 Avenue D. At that time, the house had been vacant for quite some

time and the front and back yards had both been sadly neglected.

Jay's number one goal for the place was to clean it up, get grass growing in the front yard and a garden started in the back yard.

Passersby could soon see a great improvement and before the summer was over, Jay had grown a seventy-two pound watermelon, a sixteen pound cantaloupe and several tomatoes which weighed more than two pounds each.

The couple's five children have all grown up and are married. Edward, the oldest son, and his wife, Jo Donna, and two sons, Edward and Wayne, live near Clay's Corner. The youngest son, Eugene, and his wife, Cathy, live in Plainview. They have two children, Camber and Trey.

Ann, the oldest daughter, and her husband, Joe White and three daughters, Shonda, Denise and Robin, live in Hereford. Connie, the middle daughter, and her husband, Gator Strong, and their son, Gerad, live in Rapid City, South Dakota. The youngest

daughter, Georgia, and her husband, Glen Goggans, and two sons, Heath and Gary, live near Paris, Texas.

Dee's mother, Bertha McGrew, lives here.

Dee's hobbies include crocheting, cooking, sewing and growing flowers. During a recent stay in the hospital, she met another lady, who crochets, and copied a large stuffed Miss Piggy, which she made as a gift for a granddaughter. She also enjoys crocheting Cabbage Patch doll clothes.

When Jay's health permitted, he did a lot of coyote hunting and fishing. However, at the present time, he confines himself to building dog houses and bird houses.

Both of them enjoy television and are ardent Dallas Cowboy fans.

Although Dee enjoys cooking alot, she rarely uses a recipe.

She said, "Maybe I inherited the ability from one of my grandmothers. She was an excellent cook and generally used a pinch of this, a dab of that and a handful of something else."

Some of her favorite foods, which she generally makes from scratch, are cornbread dressing, tortillas, burritos and sopapillas.

Jay reported, "She makes a wonderful chocolate pie, which she has a recipe for."

Chocolate Pie

3 eggs 1 cup sugar
4 tbsp. cornstarch 3 tbsp. cocoa
Dash of salt 1½ cups milk
Vanilla Butter

Beat egg yolks in saucepan. Add sugar, cornstarch, cocoa, milk and salt. Combine thoroughly and cook until thickened. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and butter. Pour into baked pie shell. Top with meringue, made by beating egg whites thoroughly, adding 1 teaspoon cream of tartar and 3 tablespoons sugar. Bake until lightly browned.

"Since we aren't able to do alot, our Christmas season is pretty quiet," Dee reported.

"However," she added, "We do put up a Christmas tree and have a fun time with children and grandchildren as they come by."

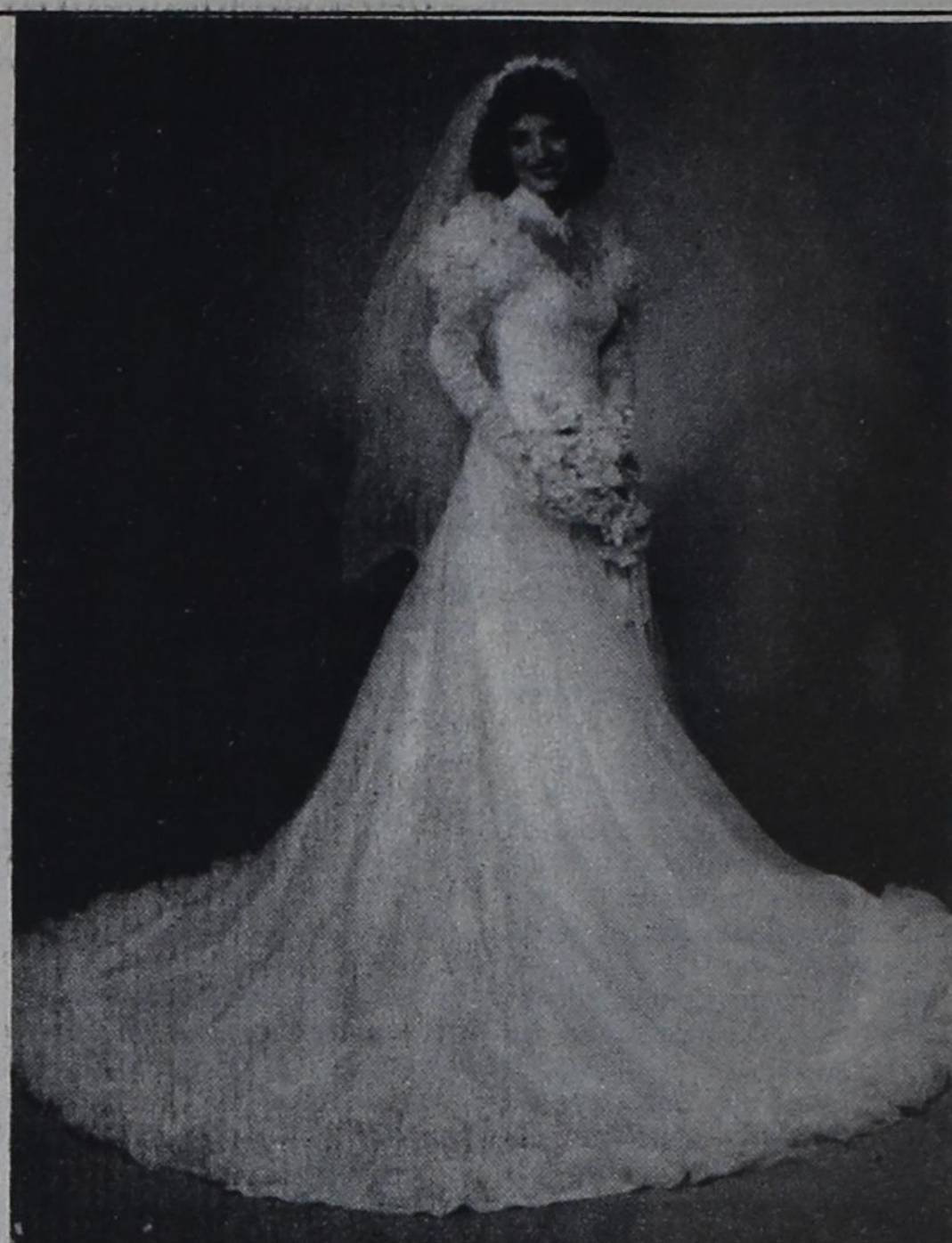

Okla. Lane Christmas Tree History Is Given

December 24, 1985 marked the sixty-ninth year that the Oklahoma Lane community has celebrated its annual Christmas Eve "Christmas Tree" celebration. It is an event that the children as well as the grown-ups look forward to. Visitors coming to spend the holidays with friends and relatives like to attend the Christmas Tree to see old friends as well as Santa.

In 1916, some early settlers in Oklahoma Lane, the Ben Bates, John Scribner, and McGuire families, gathered at the Ed and Cora McGuire home for the first Christmas Tree to exchange what few presents were available. John Scribner was Santa which delighted the children. Cora McGuire and Lillie Scribner made a "tree" from a box covered with bright material and a board tacked across the corner to hang the gifts. Christmas Day being warm and bountiful allowed the four men to work on a new home for one of the families. The Fowler family, also newcomers to the community from Oklahoma, observed Christmas entertaining relatives and spent the afternoon setting out peach and plum trees.

In 1917, the Christmas Tree was held in the old Knox School, located west of the A.L. Tandy farm. Old settlers recalled that a dead peach tree was wrapped in green crepe paper and decorated with strips of cranberries and popcorn.

A program was planned for the Christmas Tree of 1918, but the flu epidemic and heavy snows cancelled the plans. World War I was coming to a close and new families were filtering into the community. Chester Fowler and Mable Ayres were to present a program acting as a doctor and nurse. Vashti Fowler recalls this was the year that her brother, Chess, got his first pair of long pants.

The weather was favorable for the "Tree" in 1919. By this time the families of Foster, Christian, Magness, Rhodes, Hammonds, and Perkins had moved into the community and joined in the celebration. The sacks of treats that Santa handed out to everyone that night were hand made by Cora McGuire, Ina West, Mrs. Frank Ayres, and Mattie Lee Richards out of bright colored mosquito netting and were filled with treats that were "store bought" with the proceeds of the first box supper that had been held a few weeks previously. For the program, someone made a talk and the little school house was filled.

In 1920, the "Christmas Tree" was held in the old Sunnyside School, which was located on the corner of the present Earl Routon farm. Another peach tree wrapped in green paper was used. About twelve or fourteen families attended this year.

1921 was a year of progress. A real cedar tree was brought in from the breaks in New Mexico by Tom Foster, John Christian, Carl

Fowler and the newly married Clyde Perkins. The celebration was held at the present location of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church, as the two little schools of Knox and Sunnyside had been consolidated, with P.A. Long being superintendent. This year of 1921 was also important as the year that the date of the first Friday night in December was officially set as the date for the annual box supper to raise funds for the purchase of Santa's sacks. This date remained the same down through the years despite basketball games, death in the community, snow or shine, until the Oklahoma Lane School became the present United Methodist Church years later.

In 1922, another big snow storm racked the High Plains. No trip to the breaks. Same old peach tree covered with green paper.

The little school was fast becoming overcrowded, so in 1923, a great year for the community, a "giant" new school building was built. There was another big snow storm but the Christmas Tree had already been brought in. Christmas shopping trips were made with wagons and teams, but the Christmas Tree celebration went on as scheduled in spite of bad weather.

In 1924, a traveling Christmas tree salesman came through Farwell with a giant Christmas tree with plans to cut it up and make several small trees. Carl Fowler, brother of Vashti Fowler, made a bid for it. The man sold it to Carl and he triumphantly brought home the biggest tree ever. Vashti has served on more Christmas tree decorating committees than anyone else in the community.

Another snow storm came in 1925 preventing a trip to the breaks for a cedar tree so the committee resorted to the over faithful peach tree wrapped in crepe paper. People came to the Christmas Tree in wagons. Mrs. Ed McGuire recalled that the R.G. (Dick) Hammonds family came by their farm in a wagon. They piled on a load of blankets and heated bricks to keep their feet warm and all proceeded on to the school house. The Fowler family and the Ed Meeks family traveled together in a wagon, as did the Hendrickson and Ayres families.

The year 1926 brought in a surge of new settlers to Oklahoma Lane, but the depression of the 30's saw many families become discouraged and move on, but the Christmas Tree remained on Christmas Eve, being held in the auditorium of the school building until 1935 when the gymnasium and classrooms were built. Then the "Christmas Tree" was held in the gymnasium. The tradition of box supper, with beauty queen and ugliest man contest at 1¢ per vote added to the fun and funds.

In 1948, the Oklahoma Lane School consolidated with Farwell and Bovina and some going to Lazbuddie. The gymnasium

continued to be used for community functions including the Christmas Tree until the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church purchased the school buildings. The old building which was used for the high school was torn down and the gymnasium and grade school classrooms were converted into a beautiful church sanctuary with fellowship hall and kitchen, and the classrooms being used for Sunday School classrooms.... "The Oklahoma Lane United Methodist Church" which still operates today.

For a number of years, the Christmas Tree was held in the Methodist Church one year and the next year it would be in the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church across the street. The crowds and enthusiasm for the box supper began to dwindle and finally quit. One year it was decided to change the Christmas Tree to a date other than Christmas Eve but that was not successful.

In 1960, the Oklahoma Lane residents and land owners raised funds to construct a Community Center four miles east of the crossroads. Mrs. Zula Rundell donated land and Charlie Hromas, with local volunteer help, constructed the building. Then the annual Christmas Tree with Santa and his treats for everyone was moved to the Community Center.

This December 24, 1985, the Christmas Tree was held as always, commemorating the birth and same sweet story of Jesus, involving as many people as possible, especially the children.

Enthusiasm was evident about a combined celebration on December 24, 1986, of Jesus's birth, the Oklahoma Lane Christmas Tree's 70th birthday, and the Sesquicentennial of our great state of Texas.

Fela said, "When the children be in school here, we be very busy. They play basketball and do all kinds of things."

"Now," she continues, "It not be so busy, but we do have big Christmas party and lots of fun."
