Proceedings Commissioners' Court.

Proceedings of the Honorable board of County Commissioners of Lincoln county, New Mexico at a regular session thereof begun and held at the court house in the town of Lincoln, the county seat of said county, on Monday, October 6th, 1902.

Present: Hon. S. C. Weiner, chairman, Ed. C. Pfinjsten, member, Scipio Salazar, member, Alfredo Ganzaes, sheriff, B. J. Baca, interpreter, I. L. Analla, Clerk.

The minutes of the regular July term and the adjourned regular term in August 1902, were read and approved.

The petition from residents of Precinct No. 2. praying for a road from San Patricio over the hills to Las Chosas was presented. W. O. Norman and Martin Sedillo appeared on behalf of said petitioners and it appearing that a road has been constructed by the citizens of said precinct at a cost of \$453.25 it is ordered that a warrant issue for the sum of \$168.50 in payment of a portion of said work.

On motion of Ed. C. Pfinjsten seconded by Sipio Salazar it is ordered that the sum of \$800.00 be appropriated out of the Road & Bridge fund (on condition that the residents of Precinct No. 11. shall contribute the sum of \$286.00) for the construction of a bridge across the Nogal Aroyo near Walnut. The bid of Murray and Sanger of \$586.00 being in case the residents of said Precinct No. 11. contribute the required amount.

Board adjourned until October 7th, 1902 at 9 o'clock a.m.

FALL AND RAILROAD TAXATIONS.

A. B. Fall, a life-long democrat, holding several important positions in the democratic party has now fallen victim of railroad corporation Cunning and is nominated by the republicans for the Territorial Council, where if elected he will be expected to accomplish some important legislation for the railroads; and the interests of the taxpayers may be d—d. The legislation he is expected to accomplish together with W.A. Hawkins, another railroad candidate, is to extend the exemption for railroad taxation to a period of 12 years instead of six years as it now stands. It appears to the EAGLE that six years is long enough and that rail roads should be made, after that period of exemption, to help the people bear the burdens of taxation.

Fall is the man who with McDonald was elected to the Legislative Assembly, as a democrat,

in 1890, and assisted Mr. McDonald in amending the Paulin school bill so as to relieve large amounts of property from school taxes in the interest of certain stock interests, so that when they were ready to submit the bill for passage its author did not recognize it. Now Mr. Fall is a candidate for the council, as a republican while the other is supporting a part of the republican ticket, How things do change.

This is a question for the immediate consideration of voters. If you believe that rail roads should share in the burden of taxation vote Fall down, putting on your ticket G.A. Richardson, who is a faithful friend of the people, and who will oppose the extension of rail road exemption to 12 years instead of six as it now is.

VALENCIA COUNTY SCHOOLS.

It seems the pride of the New Mexican to talk about Valencia county's enlightened patriotism, her tremendous republican majorities, her public schools, etc. Valencia county has no public schools in a literal sense of the term.

When we say there are no public schools in Valencia county, we mean to say they have no strictly American public schools as other counties have. We are informed that the public moneys are paid to teachers in the parochial schools, instead of having independent public schools as the law contemplates. We have not been there, but think our information credible, as we have it from several different sources. Do not want to be unjust; but simply say that a parochial school is not a public school. A county with no public school or a newspaper ought to give a majority for the republican ticket. This is something to boast of certainly.

Chaves county has always been under democratic control and is the banner county of the territory. Its people are up-to-date in everything and pay over 95 per cent of the taxes assessed. Valencia county, controlled by the republicans, pays about thirty per cent of its taxes, has no newspapers or public schools, and is a hundred years behind the times.

THE DIFFERENCE.

The southern counties of New Mexico are mainly democratic and are in better shape than the counties controlled by the republicans. The counties that roll up the big republican majorities are the one that are financially poor. Is not this an object lesson for voters?

Vote for the democratic candidates and you will be acting in the interest of the masses of the people, and against ring-rule and bossism.

The democratic party is the party that stands for the rights of the great mass of the people. The republican party has for twenty years been enacting laws in favor of the rich classes of our citizens and against the poorer classes. It is absolutely under the control of the great combinations of capitalists, the corporations and trusts and will not even attempt to control them in the interest of the common people, the laboring and middle classes. If the trusts are never made to obey the laws of the county, it will be done by the democratic party.

The panic of 1873, and again in 1893, the worst panic this country ever had, both occurred when republican tariff laws were in force and when the republican party had been in power for a number of years. Yet, the republican speakers and news papers continue to charge these panics to the democratic party. Who pays republican news papers for lying? Surely some one pays them or they would not do so.

Vote for Weiner and Murray for commissioner and the interests of the county will be looked after. The present board has proven that the members are the right men in the right place—and there is always some risk in making a change. Better make sure that the interests of the county will be protected and vote for Weiner and Murray.

Granville A. Richardson is all right. If you vote for him you will know you are making no mistake. He has been tried and found to be all right. He has made a faithful representative and will be, as he had always been, the representative of the whole people, and not of one only.

If you vote for Fergusson you will vote for a man who made the best delegate New Mexico ever had in congress. Is not that sufficient to enable us to decide how to vote?

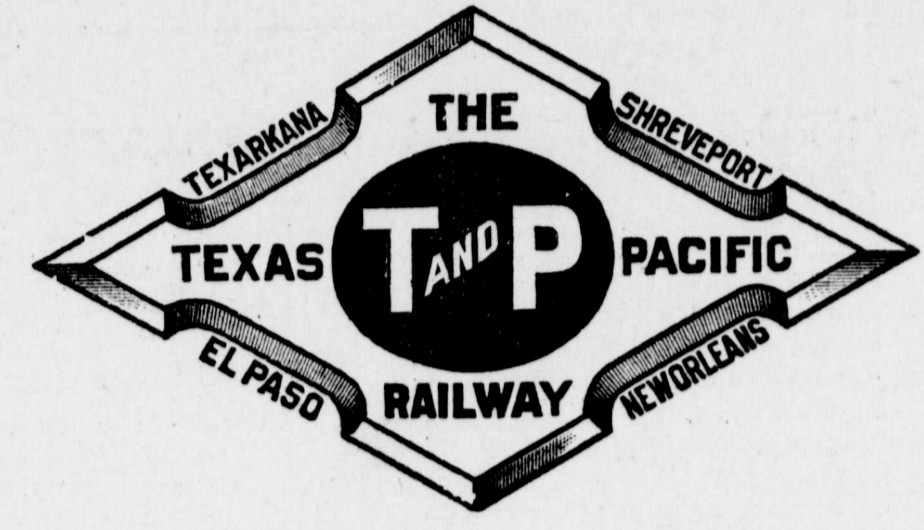
