



(Editor's note: The following is a guest editorial, written by Lawrence D. Pratt, president of the "English First" organization.)

Making English the official language of the U.S. is an idea whose time has come.

It is something that generations of immigrants have taken for granted--when coming to the United States, one learns English. In fact, those immigrants were proud to have learned English. If an American were to move to France, Germany or Spain he or she would expect to learn French, German or Spanish. The American taking up residence in a foreign country would expect to learn that language, but would not expect to have street signs and public services made available to him in English.

It seems unfair for foreign speaking groups to come to the U.S. and demand a right from their new country to not only have their language put on street signs and used in the delivery of government services, but also to

Chamber Met Oct. 3

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce held its regularly scheduled meeting here Friday, October 3.

OVER LAZBUDDIE, 38-0 Mustangs Crack Losing Streak--Big

After almost three years without a win, the Bovina High School Mustangs broke their losing streak in style here last Friday, when they downed the Lazbuddie Longhorns, 38-0.

"We played a near-perfect game," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley. "Even after viewing the films, I felt like the players played about as well as they possibly could have."

The Mustang offense clicked on all cylinders, rolling up 335 yards rushing. Then, the team's defense combined with its best performance of the season in holding the talented Longhorns scoreless.

The Mustangs' defensive line put a lot of pressure on Lazbuddie quarterback Tim Lust, and intercepted Lust six times. "That's probably as many interceptions as Lust has ever thrown," Talley remarked.

In all, Bovina scored eight turnovers against Lazbuddie, defensive fumbles. That performance made it tough on Lazbuddie. Talley said a lot of credit needs to go to the "Scout team" that ran Lazbuddie plays all week long, and did a great job of getting the Mustangs ready to face the Longhorns. The Mustangs' offensive line blocked well, enabling the rushers to tally their 335 yards. Todd Ware gained 132 yards. Homer Renteria totalled 120 yards, and Bud Venable 70. Venable scored 15 points, conceivable virtually every manner. He kicked a 37-yard field goal, ran one two-point

have their children taught in their own languages, rather than in English.

The sons and daughters of the previous decades of immigrants have objected to the demands of the current crop of newcomers who have the audacity to insist that their own languages be used as public languages in their new land. Those objectives have been met by a surly gathering of twenty-four Hispanic and Asian groups who - recently denounced their hosts for wanting to have English as the official language of the land.

Those who want to have a common language so that communication can be facilitated, national harmony promoted and economic prosperity maximized are denounced by the Hispanic-Asian coalition as anti-immigrant and xenophobic. They claim that these xenephobes object to people who are bilingual.

Well, let's take a look at the charges. I am bilingual, having learned Spanish during the 23 years I have been married to my wife who was born in Panama and whose first language was Spanish. My wife is a naturalized American who passed her citizenship examination using the English which she has mastered quite well. In this respect, my wife is no different from the millions of immigrants who came to America and learned English as a matter of course.

Let's face it. The drive to make English the official language of the country cannot be characterized fairly as an effort to stamp out other languages and cultures. It is an effort to have a common language, even to have bilingual people, but to have one plane of communication on which all can meet. Countries such as France, Germany and Spain which have an official language certainly have no lack of bilingual people.

Secretary of Education William Bennett has put this matter well: "There ought to be no confusion or embarrassment over our goal. The rise in ethnic consciousness, the resurgence of cultural pride in

Growth Is Program Aim

Industrial

Spurring economic growth from within this area is the goal of an extensive new program being developed by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

Within the next two weeks, many industries throughout the SPS service area will be receiving a survey designed to provide a base of information about the needs and the services of these firms. Chambers of commerces and development foundations are involved in the program. Rural electric cooperatives who purchase wholesale power from SPS will be seeking participation from their customers.

"The idea is to help cross-match firms in this area with other firms in this area with whom they can do business or otherwise cooperate," said Gary Gibson, vice president of marketing at SPS. "We want to keep dollars and jobs from going outside this region when they don't have to. Working together we can help existing industry spark the internal growth that our area needs, especially now."

Nationally, 85 per cent of new jobs are created by existing businesses that expand locally, Gibson said.

"The more firms that participate in this survey, the greater good it can do--for those firms and for their employees and communities," he said.

SPS provides electric service in a 52,000-square-mile area comprising the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, much of eastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwest corner of Kansas.

Our region has a lot of firms-big and small--who may discover with the help of this survey that the markets or services they need are in their own back yards, or not far from it, Gibson said.

The survey asks for information about products, services, employment, transportation and other vital factors, Gibson said. The information about specific firms will be kept in strictest confidence, he said. Great care will be taken that potential competitors do not become aware of details that another firm does not want to be known. "We're not trying to get into the details of everybody's business," Gibson said. "If we find an opportunity for growth or cooperation, we'll let both parties know that it exists and then step back, letting them carry forward as they wish." This program is one of many in which SPS is involved that encourage economic growth. The company also works with local chambers of commerce and other organizations to attract outside industry to the region.
