1844 POLL TAX PAYERS

That Number of McCulloch County Citizens
Have Qualified as Voters—
78 Exemptions.

The time limit for the payment of taxes expired at 12 o'clock Monday night, after which time the ten per cent penalty becomes effective and poll tax payers forfeit the right of suffrage for the year. The payments in McCulloch county, according to Sheriff and Tax Collector T. L. Sanson, exceed those of any former year by something like 300. He also states that the number of exemptions issued this year would have been at least 100 more had the ruling of the attorney general's office in regard to this matter been made a month or so earlier. Heretofore young men who attained their majority after January 1st and before an election were entitled to vote without payment of the tax or obtaining a certificate of exemption, but a ruling was made a few days ago in which it was held that such citizens must obtain certificates of exemptions in order to be a qualified voter in any election.

This opinion came so late that the fact did not become generally known in time for action on the part of a number of people, and as a result quite a number of young men will be disqualified.

Charged With Theft of Cattle.

Deputy Sheriff Oscar Latta came in Tuesday morning from a trip to the southern part of the state, having in custody Alex Ferguson, who was arrested at Fredericksburg Sunday morning, charged with the theft of some cattle from the ranch of Lewis Brook, near Camp San Saba, in the southern part of McCulloch county. Mr. Latta followed the man to San Antonio, but arrived just after his man had departed for parts unknown. Later he found that the man had headed back north and he wired officers at Fredericksburg to be on the lookout for Ferguson, and his capture was effected by Sheriff John Clenner Sunday morning. Ferguson was lodged in the city jail here to await the action of the grand jury.

Regarding the extension of the Lometa-Brady line from this city on to San Angelo, Col. Frank Pettibone, general manager of the Santa Fe, gave the following statement to a reporter for the Brownwood Bulletin last week:

You ask me as to whether or not the Santa Fe will extend its cut-off from Lometa to Brady to San Angelo. On that point I am not prepared to say to any definite degree; I am of the opinion that it will take another course, but that is not a certainty as yet. W. R. Allcorn, a former McCulloch county resident now living in Kimble county, was here the first of the week shaking hands with old friends and acquaintances.

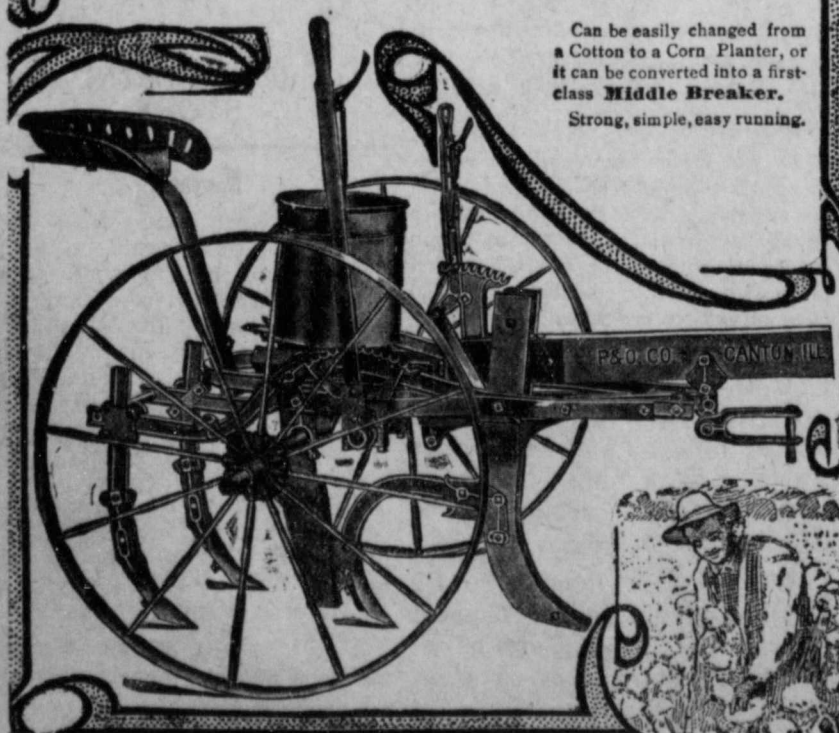

A Novel Clock.
The following clipping is from The Lone Star Scenic Novelty and concerns Walter Lee McKee, watch maker and jeweler, at the Jones Drug Store:

One of our boys, Walter McKee, has made a clock that is the work of a genius. He made the dial, face, hands and framework. When the minute hand approaches the hour, the hands make a connection and an electric light flashes out in front of the face, and a moment later the alarm rings, and then the hour strikes. As the hand moves away the second time it again makes connection and the light flashes out again, so that if a deaf man is sleeping a little soundly and fails to rouse at the

first alarm, he is given one more chance. It is also connected up with the door and windows and both the light and the bell are at work as soon as either door or window are opened. This is the burglar alarm. A set alarm is also attached to use for awaking the deaf or the hearing at any desired hour. It is a pretty piece of workmanship and reflects credit on its maker.

His work has always been satisfactory; in fact the details of the clerical work has been in his hands all this time under all the various clerks, and the fact that he has been continued in the work so long speaks volumes for his ability. Mr. Ballou was also postmaster for a number of years under Cleveland's administrations, and it would therefore seem that his record for clerical work could hardly be improved upon. Being a poor man and dependent upon his present employment for a livelihood, Mr. Ballou states that he will be unable to make a house to house canvass of the county, but he respectfully solicits the careful consideration of every voter, secure in the knowledge that all the old-timers know him and respect his abilities, and that those who are not so acquainted may by inquiry learn. He will appreciate your support.

Chance to Get Mattress Factors.

G. W. Crowder, of Cleburne, is in the city for the purpose of interesting Brady in a mattress factory. His son, Wm. Crowder, is a mattress maker and has the necessary plant for a factory now located at Cleburne but wishes to locate in this section. Wichita Falls has offered him a lot with a suitable building thereon as a bonus to locate the factory there, but he prefers this section of the state and will locate in Brady if this city will give him a suitable plot of ground on which to build his factory.

Mr. Crowder says his son's plant will have a capacity of 36 mattedress daily and will work a force of six men. He has samples of the product with him which show up to be first-class in every respect, and these samples he will be glad to show to anyone who may be interested.

Brady ought to have a commercial club to look after such propositions as this, but in the absence of any organized body it will be necessary for some progressive citizen to take the matter up with Mr. Crowder. The Standard hopes this will be done, as it is in the securing of such small industries as this that the town's future welfare lies.

The tenants of the property recently acquired by the Brady National Bank on the southeast corner of the square are this week moving to new quarters and work of removing the old buildings will probably be begun at an early date preparatory to the erection of a modern bank building on this corner in the near future.

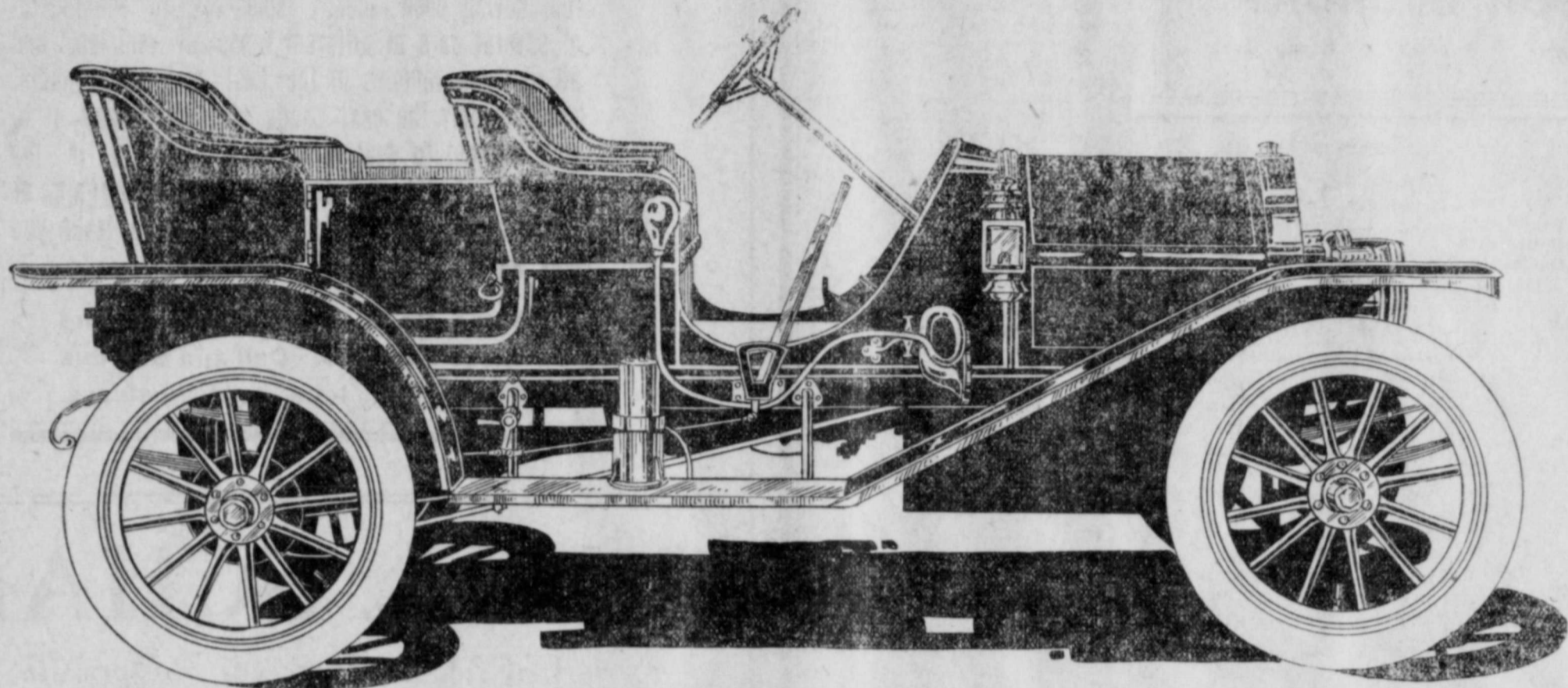

THE JEWISH SABBATH.

Its influence on the Habits of the Hebrew Children.

The Hebrew Sabbath, including its complicated preparations, is rich and impressive material for a child's imagination. On Thursday evening the mother already prepares dough, goes to market, cleans the fish, etc., says the American Hebrew.

In the morning comes the baking of "chales" (bread). How bewitching for a child to watch the mother making different shapes of dough, smearing it with egg and decorating it with braids of different shapes and forms. A Jewish child gets the first lesson in modeling by making make believe "chales."

In the evening the mother prepares to meet the Sabbath. The child partakes in the household occupations and therefore gets habits of industry, order and regard for the rights and ideas of others and the fundamental habit of subordinating his activities to the general interest of the household.

This is especially true in regard to Jewish households where everything seems to be prescribed by law. Before darkness sets in on Friday the housewife lights in the dining room extra candles or a special lamp in honor of Sabbath and reads the blessing.

Quite often a child not yet able to talk will cover its face with its little palms, imitating the gestures of the devoted mother. The returning from the synagogue, the appreciative greeting "Good Sabbath," the Kiddush, the blessing over wine, the special menu and the holiday spirit of all who participate have undoubtedly a soothing, beneficent influence upon the child. After supper the time is spent in resting.

FIRST SHAPE OF EELS.

Strait of Messina Revealed Mystery of the Snake-like Fish.

In the strait of Messina are channels of immense depth, through which a wild tide surges, and owing probably to irregularities at the bottom there are whirling eddies which have the effect of bringing up from the depths below many marine creatures which are rarely seen except in the deep sea trawls.

It was here that the larval form of a fresh water eel was first discovered, an incident which threw a blaze of light on the life history of a very mysterious fish.

All kinds of theories had been given forth with regard to the propagation of the eel. Some naturalists declared they bred in fresh water, others that they visited the estuaries for spawning purposes, but thanks to the discovery of Messina and later captures of the eel in its larval form it is practically certain that after mature eels drop down our rivers in autumn they hie them to exceedingly deep water in the sea and there deposit their eggs.

From the egg comes a little ribbon shaped creature, the larval form. In due course this changes into an eel of still smaller size, strange to say, and these small eels or evers afterward ascend our rivers and there remain until they reach maturity, when they in their turn descend to the sea and history is repeated.—London Telegraph.
