ARE REBUILDING PLANT

Brady Water & Light Company Now Making Extensive Improvements at a Very Heavy Cost.

The Brady water works people are very much gratified to announce that their new 14-inch well is finished, and that an ample supply of water was secured. The well is 180 feet in depth and while a thorough test has not yet been made and can't be made until the new pump arrives, preliminary tests show an estimated capacity of 180 to 200 gallons per minute, or about three times the capacity of the

One point of particular interest to the public is the fact that the water is good. In boring the well the drill passed through no less than six thick stratas of hard limestone rock before striking a flow, which is absolute proof against any suggestion of surface seepage into the city's water supply with the natural consequent contamination. Brady city water hereafter will be good water, absolutely no surface water being pumped into the mains. The old "shallow" well will be abandoned, and this will do much to restore confidence in the city's water supply, for it has always been from this old shallow well that the cry of "Brady's bad water" arose. The news must now go out that Brady has good water and plenty



Highways In Europe.

Road Laws In United States Until Recently Were the Same as England's Unique System.

The present road situation in the United States may be briefly summed up as follows:

In mileage we have the most tremendous system of rords which any country has ever possessed since the world Abilene Central railroad. It began, According to a careful road which the annual expenditure for the census, the length of all of our roads year 1905 to 1906 amounted to \$78,amounts to 2.155,000 miles. The most liberal estimate of our annual expenditure on these roads, both in money and labor, was a fraction over \$79,000,000 of the fact that most of the principal methods of maintaining dirt roadsin 1904, or about \$1.05 per capita. At the same rate this would be an expenditure of about \$90,000,000 a year at the present time.

According to our road census, we have less than 40,000 miles of stone surfaced road, or about 2 per cent of the total mileage. ORIGIN OF THE SPLIT LOG.

Novel Manner In Which Farmer Devised Scheme For Dragging Roads. A few years ago a Missouri farmer

named King became disgusted, as many a farmer has been before and since that time, with the condition of the highway between his farm and the neighboring village. He studied the situation and one day devised a rude contrivance to smooth the rough places and round up the surface from the fitch to the center so as to drain off the water. It was a simple affair, made of a log

DIMINUTIVE FARMS.

The Way Real Estate Is Divided Up In

The Portuguese are an extremely conservative people. Every man follows rigidly the methods employed by his father and forefathers. In very many parts of the country the old wooden plows are still used.

When a man dies, instead of one of the heirs taking the whole property and paying the remaining heirs, for their parts the whole property is divided into as many parts as there are heirs. More than this, each separate part of the property is thus divided.

Thus, if the property consists of ten acres of pasture land, eighty of vineyard and ten of grain land and there are ten heirs, each heir will receive one acre each of grain and pasture land and eight acres of vineyard. This process has been going on for a very long time, so that now in the most fertile part of Portugal the land is divided into incredibly small portions.

The immediate result of this, according to the United States consular reports, is that the product of the land is barely sufficient at best to sustain its owners. South of the river Tagus. on the other hand, there are enormous tracts of excellent land lying unused. but it has been found impossible to induce the farmers of the north to move into this region and take up large holdings.-Philadelphia Inquirer.

WHITEWASHING COAL.

Not Done For the Sake of Neatness, but to Prevent Thefts.

Persons who have been somewhat stonished by having whitewashed oal delivered to them will be interested to know that the whitewashing is not done to improve the appearance or to increase the burning qualities. The treatment neither improves nor

harms the fuel. It is a detective scheme on the part of the railroads to locate and to prevent theft of the coal as it is hauled from the mines to the consumer. These depredations amount to thousands of tons annually, and the railroads are the sufferers, as it is up to them to deliver as many tons at their destination, often a thousand miles away, as were weighed in when the car was turned over for transportation.
