The Prohibition Mix-Up.

The prohibition speaking at the court house Sunday afternoon was not without either its interesting or sensational features. The lecturer, Mr. Tom Smith, delivered a good temperance lecture to an audience that comfortably filled the district court room. While his speech was good, and met the hearty approval of all his hearers, the speaker failed to state by whom he was sent out, and the impression seemed to prevail that he was representing either the prohibition wing of the democratic party or the state anti-saloon league.

However, he failed to make himself clear on this point, and when at the conclusion of his speech he called for contributions of money and passed around a number of pledge envelopes, several good prohibition democrats present were not satisfied, and Mr. J. F. Montgomery, than whom there is not a more ardent prohibitionist in Brady, respectfully asked the speaker to first state frankly and clearly whether or not he was representing the state prohibition party or the anti-saloon league. The speaker finally admitted that he was sent out by the first named organization, whereupon Thos. Bell, another good democrat prohibitionist, made a few remarks and the meeting adjourned in some confusion.

Messrs. Montgomery and Bell are both good democrats and prohibitionists, and it is due them that their attitude be explained. They believe the only chance for a prohibition victory lies in and through the democratic party, and are equally as sure that the state prohibition party can have no chance to win statewide prohibition for Texas. Furthermore, they know that the state prohibition party as represented by P. F. Paige is fighting the democratic party and the efforts of the prohibition democrats in the present campaign, as well as fighting the anti-saloon league. Sunday's daily papers carried an announcement from Mr. Paige to the effect that his party would put out a candidate for governor, and advising all prohibitionists to stay out of the democratic primaries in July. In view of these facts both Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Bell thought it not right that Paige should send out a speaker who would attempt to collect money from prohibition democrats with which to fight those same democrats in their work, and in this contention they very evidently had the full sympathy of the audience present Sunday afternoon. Mr. Paige or Mr. Smith is not denied by them the right to stump the state for their party or to take up collections for their work, but they do hold that the speakers should let the public know whom they are representing and not attempt to sail under false colors.

After the audience had dispersed about twenty or thirty remained, and in the discussion which followed Mr. Smith claimed that he had stated in his talk his true position, but of all those present when asked to hold up their hands if they had understood, only four responded, and two of these said they had been informed the day previous.

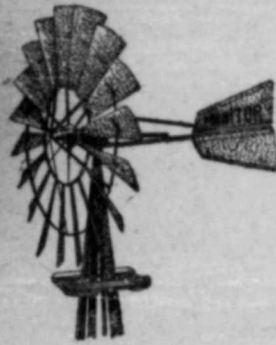

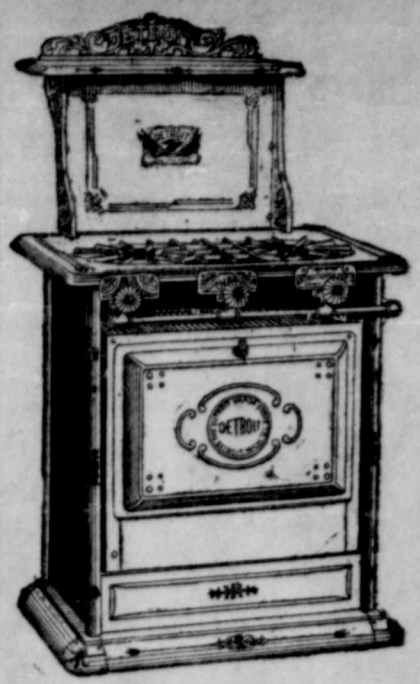

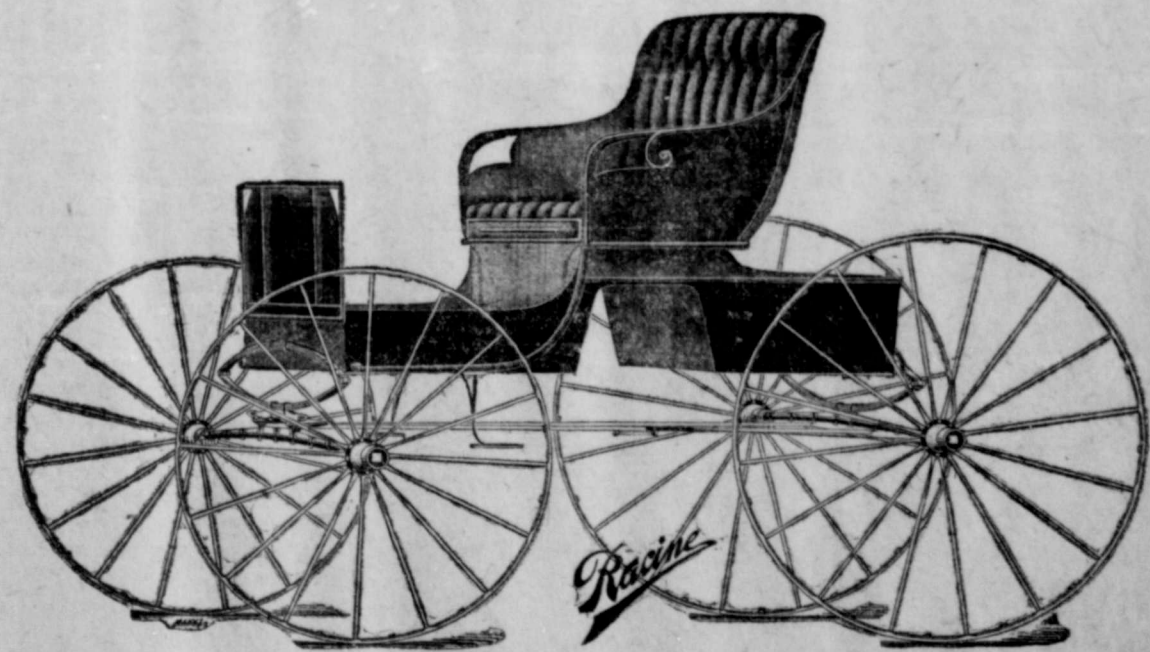

LET US HAVE GOOD ROADS.

OUR Commercial Club has very wisely undertaken the work of improving our public roads and if they succeed in only a moderate degree in their undertaking, they will have accomplished a wonderful and lasting service to the town and country. Good roads are only the front yards to the towns, and as surely as an untidy and unkept front yard indicates an uncultured and unrefined household, that surely does the poor road indicate poor towns and a non-progressive citizenship. Let the thinking and up-to-date man see the roads leading to the town and he can weigh its commercial gravity and determine the public spirit of the people before he enters the suburbs. It is like looking at the hands of the clock to determine if the time piece is in motion or standing for the want of repair—there is no use to look at the machinery used to give power and motion when it is at a stand still—and so the town which cannot reflect its progressiveness beyond its corporate limits is hardly worth looking into, and a country too poor and sorry to build good roads can hardly be enticing to the prospector. Certainly we have a country worthy of good roads. Nature exerted her utmost energies in creating this a most admirable country, and providence bestows upon us many smiles and caresses. But we cannot keep pace with the progressive world without effort and this is an opportune time for action on our part, such as the club has undertaken and hopes to materialize.

WHAT is Brady going to do about the Coleman North & South road? Seems to us it is about time for something to happen.

THE building of that fine bank home for the Brady National will turn a big bunch of money loose this summer. The good feature of the matter is that local men secured the contracts.

BONDS FOR A BRIDGE.

The commissioners' court has ordered an election for bridge bonds in the sum of \$8,000 for the purpose of constructing a modern steel bridge over Brady creek on Bridge street in the city of Brady.

The Standard has consistently advocated better roads and bridges for McCulloch county. We were in favor of and did what we could to promote the issuing of bonds for bridges at Stacy, Waldrip and Voca, and the election carried in each instance. We now believe that the people of the county should vote for the bonds for the bridge at Brady. That it is badly needed cannot be denied; in fact, the present structure is dangerous and an absolute menace to public safety. It is safe to say that this bridge is used by more people in one month than all other bridges in the county put to-

gether would be used in a year. The bridge would be a great convenience to the people of the northern portion of the county, as all have to cross Brady creek to get to town. Building this bridge by bond issue is not only the only way it can ever be had, but is the fairest way for all concerned. The people who use it the most will pay the greater portion of the tax, and the individual pro rata share of each taxpayer will be small.

The election is ordered for July 2nd, and The Standard sincerely trusts that the people will vote these bonds by a handsome majority.

WHY TEAR OUR SHIRTS?

Considering the great amount of confusion and discussion of political matters in our state at present, the uninitiated would naturally conclude that a political revolution and the down-fall of the people's sovereignty might be imminent. We are a restless, impatient, and in some respects an intolerant people, and as there are no great issues to divide us and absorb our attention, we naturally do much quibbling over minor affairs, and are not content to allow things to go on as they may, though no great damage would result should the balance fall on the one side or the other. Should we pause long enough to overcome our intoxication we might become more conservative, more tolerant, and better contented. What great good or irreparable damage will result from the forthcoming election, no matter who succeeds, that cannot be gained or lost later? True, one administration may suit our particular or peculiar ideas better than another, but are not all the candidates democrats? And are not all of them honorable, patriotic men? There is no great fundamental principle underlying this confusion. At most there is nothing but issues dividing us and after the election we will have the same country, the same home, and certainly most of our cherished liberties. In a larger sense we are only making our choice between men who believe as we believe, in a true democracy. And though we may fail in our choice of men, we can rest assured of our birthright as American citizens remaining secure, and our right in the pursuit of true happiness remaining untrammelled, though we may be forced to acknowledge as our governor either Johnson, Davidson, Poindexter, or Colquitt for two or four years.

SURE, Brady needs that new bridge; let's have a bond issue and build it. The town has long ago outgrown the present structure.

Take the honey-suckle, the heliotrope, the tube rose, all the fairest flowers that bloom in the garden of the Gods, and distill their perfume into a single essence, and not for one moment would any man alive accept it in place of that entrancing exhalation that breathes from the heart and soul and body of God's climacteric achievement—woman. Man has been drunk with the love of her for six-thousand years, and will continue so to the end of time, until this old world is a charred and blackened ruin, drifting into the darkness of space. If the claims so widely advertised, should thus be justified by results, an asset of immeasurable value will have been added to the agricultural interests of West Texas. I am glad to see the awakening—already notable—and believe it promises much for the advancement and prosperity of this country. Although botany has always been a part of the college curriculum, the selection of particular plants—those upon which the nations of the earth depend for food and clothing—for special study has become important only in very recent years; but now farming is fast becoming an exact science and is no longer regarded as an occupation fit only for dullards, but entirely worthy of the best thought of the best minds of every country. The influence of the A. & M. College at Bryan, is felt throughout the length and breadth of Texas; our young men are no longer rushing to the cities, but prefer the independence and freedom of farm life, to becoming fifteen dollar counter jumpers and "bending the supple hinges of the knee" to exacting, and often grouchy bosses. Upon the young men rests the hope of the advocates of advanced farming; their minds are open and re-

ceptive to suggestion; they are not "set in their ways" like the old timers, and we may expect in the not distant future, some very marked—not to say radical—changes in farm management and cultivation.

Our good friend W. J. Sansom is still "all there" on his farm near Mercury; "Uncle Billy," as his neighbors lovingly call him, is one of the finest men this writer ever knew; and his life is really idyllic in its beauty of happiness and content. I don't believe there is a thing in the wide world that would add one jot or tittle to the completeness of his happiness and friendship with life. Let anyone who prates about marriage being a failure, visit this home, and if he don't come away a wiser and better man, entirely disillusioned, he will be entitled to a crown as the prince of fools. Although the parents of four married daughters and a son, Lonnie—good old Lonnie—Uncle Billy is just as gallant and affectionate, and Mrs. Sansom just as loving and devoted, as if they had been married but yesterday. Uncle Billy sits close to her at table, and when the lamps are lighted in the sitting room, she takes her seat close by him, and then if nobody is looking, Uncle Billy steals him a kiss. 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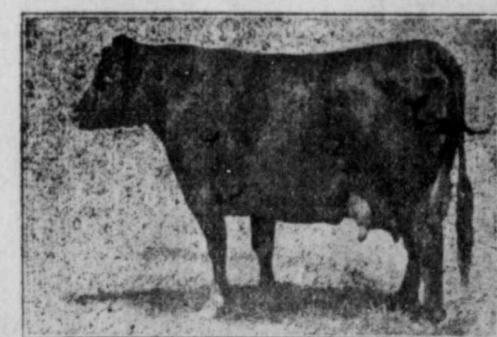



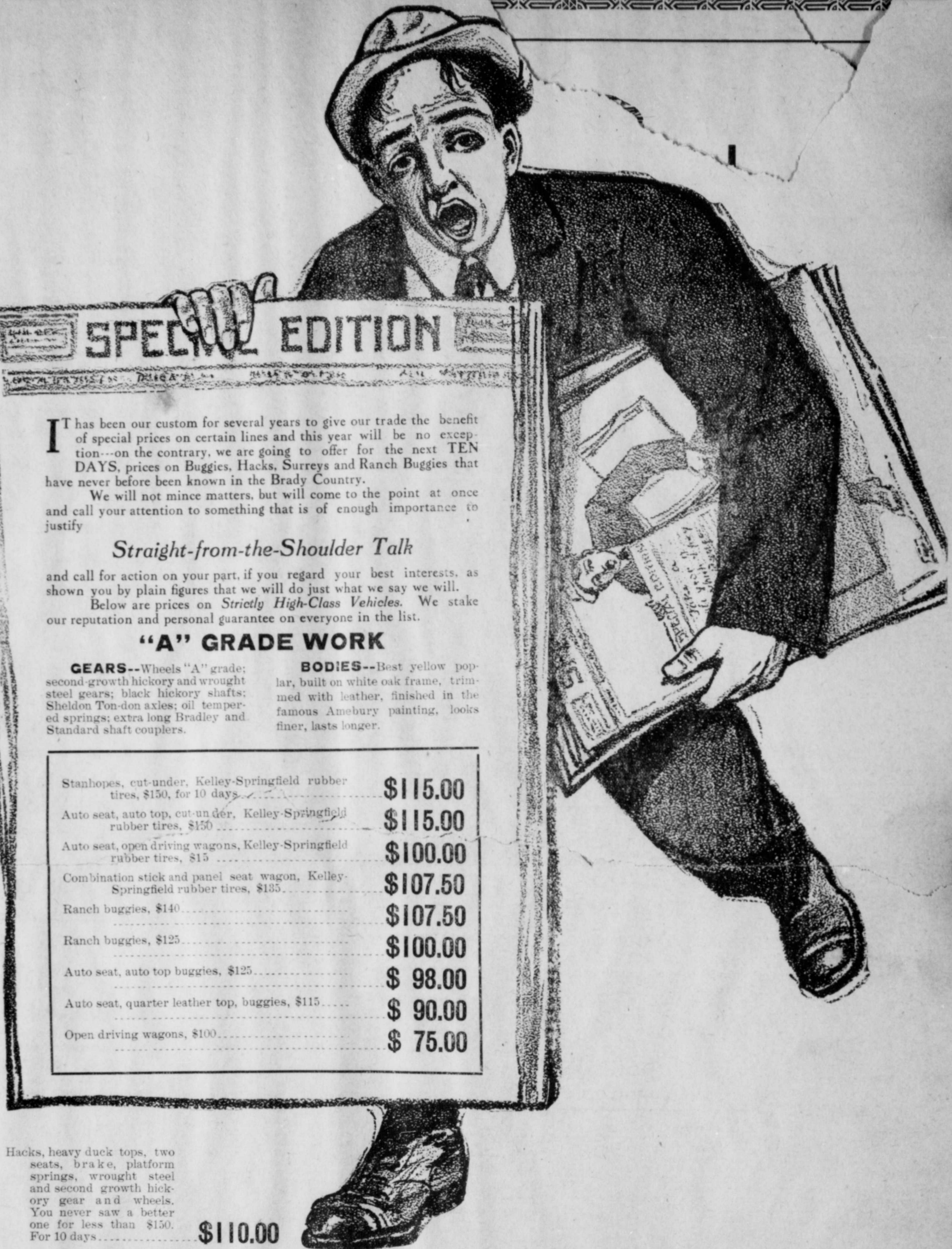
