If you're a Democrat, it's about time you were making your choice for the presidential nomination.

We need somebody who is not only capable of leading his party and country, but who can win over R.M. Nixon come November.

Up to now, there's not a clear-cut leader among the open candidates. Seems from here that Gov. Wallace and Senators Humphrey and McGovern are more or less equal in their bids for the nomination.

Of the three, we must prefer Humphrey as an individual. However, he had a chance at beating Nixon four years ago and came close to getting it done. Whether he could run a better race four years later is anybody's guess.

Humphrey is a good man and would, no doubt, make a good president. However, he lacks appeal as far as Mr. Average Citizen is concerned. Humphrey's loquaciousness has a tendency to turn some people off instead of on. This is too bad, because it isn't all that important. Still, votes have been changed on more insignificant things.

We've been amazed at the success both McGovern and Wallace have enjoyed at the polls in the various primaries they've entered. McGovern came from an also-ran position four years ago into prominence as a serious candidate. His success up to now is much more than he expected, maybe.

Gov. Wallace, prior to being crippled by a would-be assassin's bullets, was making a tremendous showing in the primaries and continues to do so.

We wonder how many of the votes cast for Wallace were really for him or were they against the other candidates, including Nixon?

Voters in America have been known to cast protest votes against the present system. Wallace's support could be coming in the form of protest. We're not saying that's right; we're saying it could be.

Voters seem to not mind crossing party lines, especially when they're voting for a president. Wallace seems to have already been forgiven for running as an independent or as the nominee of the American Party four years ago.

Evidently, he's been welcomed back into the Demo fold for the presidential nomination this year. This will surely be a handicap for him in getting the nomination, but it is not necessarily one which can't be overcome.

The three aforementioned candidates have shoved Ed Muskie, the frontrunner in the beginning, to the sidelines. After the others got finished banging Muskie around, he said he'd still like to have the nomination but that he didn't have enough encouragement to continue to work at it.

Muskie was a good candidate; it's a shame he was knocked out of the running.

Anyway, the Democratic presidential nominee, as we see it, could well be someone other than the candidates mentioned above. Time will tell, of course, but with so many candidates and none now in a prominently-leading position, the nomination could be grabbed off by a dark horse which we haven't thought much about up to now.

Richard Carson is home after a 14-month tour of duty with the Peace Corps. Most of that time was spent in working with an agricultural project in Africa.

Richard is evidently highly interested in directly serving his country. He cut his Peace Corps Army.

He says he's scheduled to be inducted July 1. Richard learned something about "stickability" as a miller ---and a pretty good one--- in high school athletics here. He's getting to put that to use now in life, it seems.

# Unique Radio Station Here

An unusual radio station is operating in Bovina.

It's so unusual, says its developer, E. W. (Edwin) Woody, that it is the only such system ever developed.

Woody, who has been working on the idea here for about two years, says the system is unusual because it uses "carrier current" transmission. This means the signal goes out on power lines, for instance, instead of the traditional method of other radio stations. Also, the signal is carried by ground wave, points out Woody, who says he's been doing experimental work on this sort of radio system for years.

The system is described as high-fidelity AM.

The demonstrator unit used by Woody for broadcasting operates on about five watts. The signal has been heard within a radius of a few miles of Bovina, he says, but there's no limit to the distance the system can cover. That depends on the amount of power used.

The radio station of Woody's does not come under the regulations of the Federal Communications Commission, he says, for two reasons.

First, stations of not more than five watts are not restricted and second, the carrier current transmission is so new and

different that it doesn't come under FCC restrictions.

Woody says he has been conducting informal and unannounced broadcasts in an experimental way here for a little over a year. Some people have heard

# Two Boys, Cycle Hit Tractor

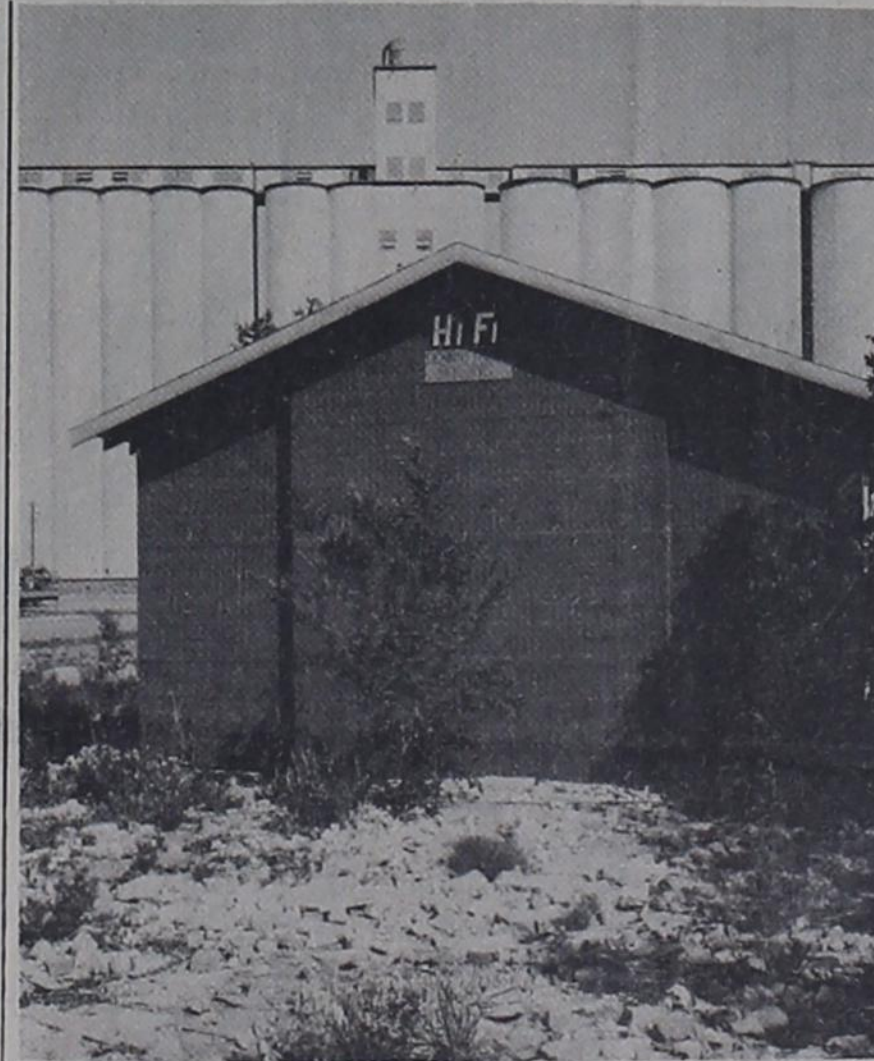
Two Bovina boys suffered injuries in a motorcycle-tractor collision southeast of town Tuesday afternoon of last week.

He says he's been broadcasting six or eight hours per day recently.  
The station is located in temporary quarters at Avenue A and Fifth Street. The property is owned by Woody. It is two blocks west of First State Bank.  
Woody returned to this area some two years ago after living in Albuquerque for about 30 years. He was reared northwest of Bovina in the Hollene, N.M., Community.  
He came to Bovina to experiment with his radio station idea because he was acquainted with the area and some of the people.

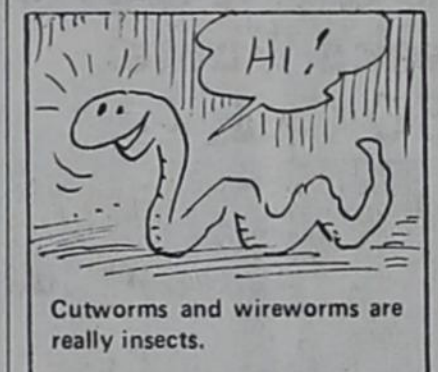
The spring commencement exercises at South Plains were held Friday morning with 313 receiving degrees.

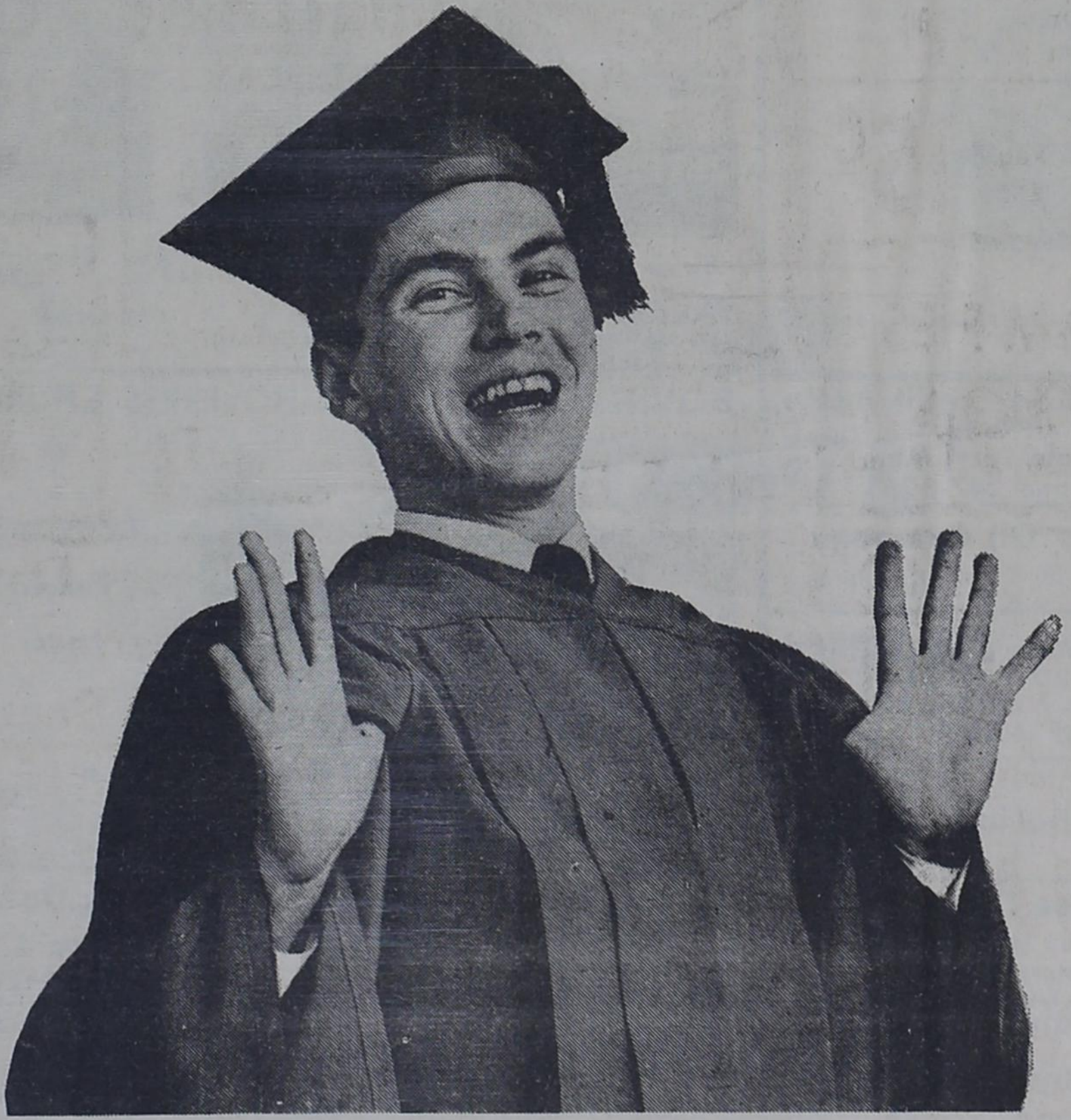

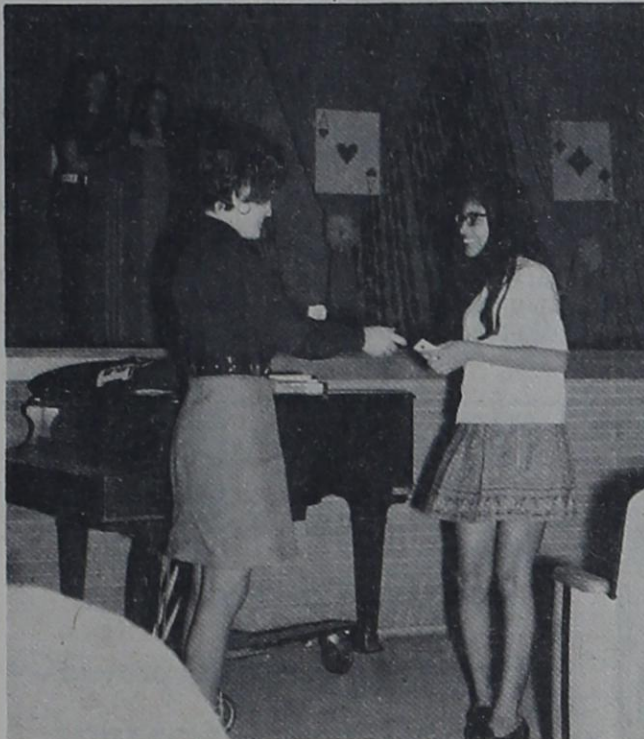

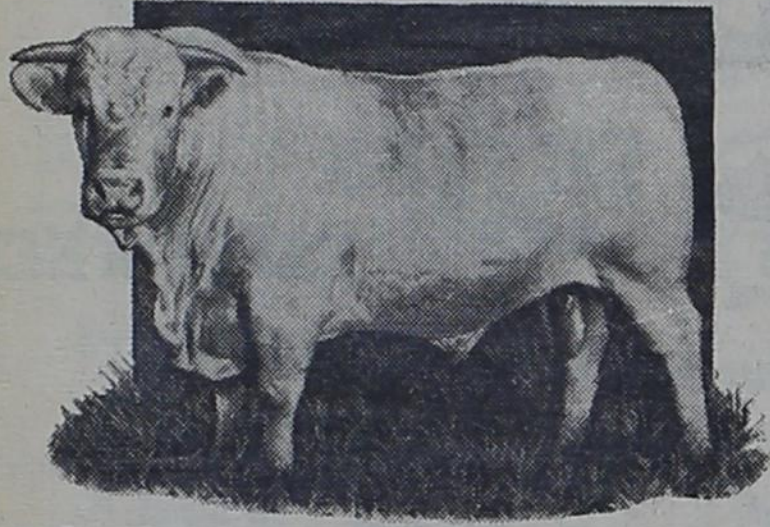

**At Home In

Have you ever noticed your child not responding to your requests?

Try listening to yourself and to your child.

Parents who stop now and then to listen to themselves understand why some ways don't work.

If you find yourself saying "If I've told you once, I've told you a dozen times," then this method isn't working. It may be wise to try something else.

Listening gives you an opportunity to check yourself and your actions. Paying attention to what children say gives clues about what they've been learning. Adults are often surprised to discover that children learn something different from what parents think they teach.

Try keeping a record for one day of the things you say to your child when it's time for bed or when you want him to do a good job. And write down what you say when you want him to turn off TV or to change his behavior.

How many times a day do you say the words "no," "don't," "stop," or "quit"? You might be surprised. Write down the number of times you say these words.

If you find that you use such words often, why not try stating your requests in a more positive manner.

**HOW ABOUT BUILDING WASHABILITY AND ADJUSTABILITY INTO CHILD'S ROOM?**

Easy care and growing quality make good sense. Children seem to pop out of everything, from their first crawlers and soft shoes to blue jeans and sneakers -- even their bedrooms. Growing happens and clothing must be replaced. But a room is something else. Carefully planned, it can grow with the child and involve few major changes.

One criterion for creative, easy care decorating should be washability. Then both mother and child can be more relaxed about activities that take place in the special hideaway. A youngster's bedroom is like a

home within a home. It's a place for more than sleeping. Playing, studying, day dreaming, listening to records, nibbling, and rapping with friends are all a part of the bedroom scene during the growing years.

A second criterion is adjustability. At all ages and stages, a child's room should be sized for his needs with furnishings at the right height to develop good habits of neatness, cleanliness, and grooming. Properly chosen accessories -- toy and book shelves, rods and pegs for clothing, a mirror for those initial efforts at grooming -- can be placed low to serve the toddler and be adjusted upward as he or she adds inches. Be sure to include a good-sized bulletin board for showing off artistic efforts -- and later given over to savables -- pictures and mementos dear to a teenager's heart.

Stackable furniture is a good choice. Pieces can be added as the child and inevitable collections grow. Brightly enamel-painted and top-coated with polyurethane, the furniture will be cheerful, scuff- and stain-resistant and suds washable. There are also furniture lines that feature tough, washable laminated plastic surfaces.

Easy washing, no-iron fabrics are best for window treatments, bed coverings, and pillows. Pattern themes are almost limitless and materials provide the most economical way to change the entire atmosphere of a room. Thus, while the major expense items such as furniture and flooring are simple and suitable for years, fabrics used can easily take on the decorative task of creating room personality. Simply use the look from the A,B,C's of nursery to ballerina or car racers or some popular motif in early school years. Then as youngsters get older, they want very much to do their own rooms.

Flooring should not be overlooked in planning. Because children of all ages spend much time on the floor, playing, studying, visiting, floor coverings should be easy to care for, safe, warm and attractive. The newer durable and scrubbable carpetings are worth considering. Vinyl in combination with washable scatter rugs is a good choice.

Whatever the final scheme is, some pre-thought with an eye to growth possibilities, easy upkeep, and the activities the room will serve is likely to result in greater satisfaction for all concerned.

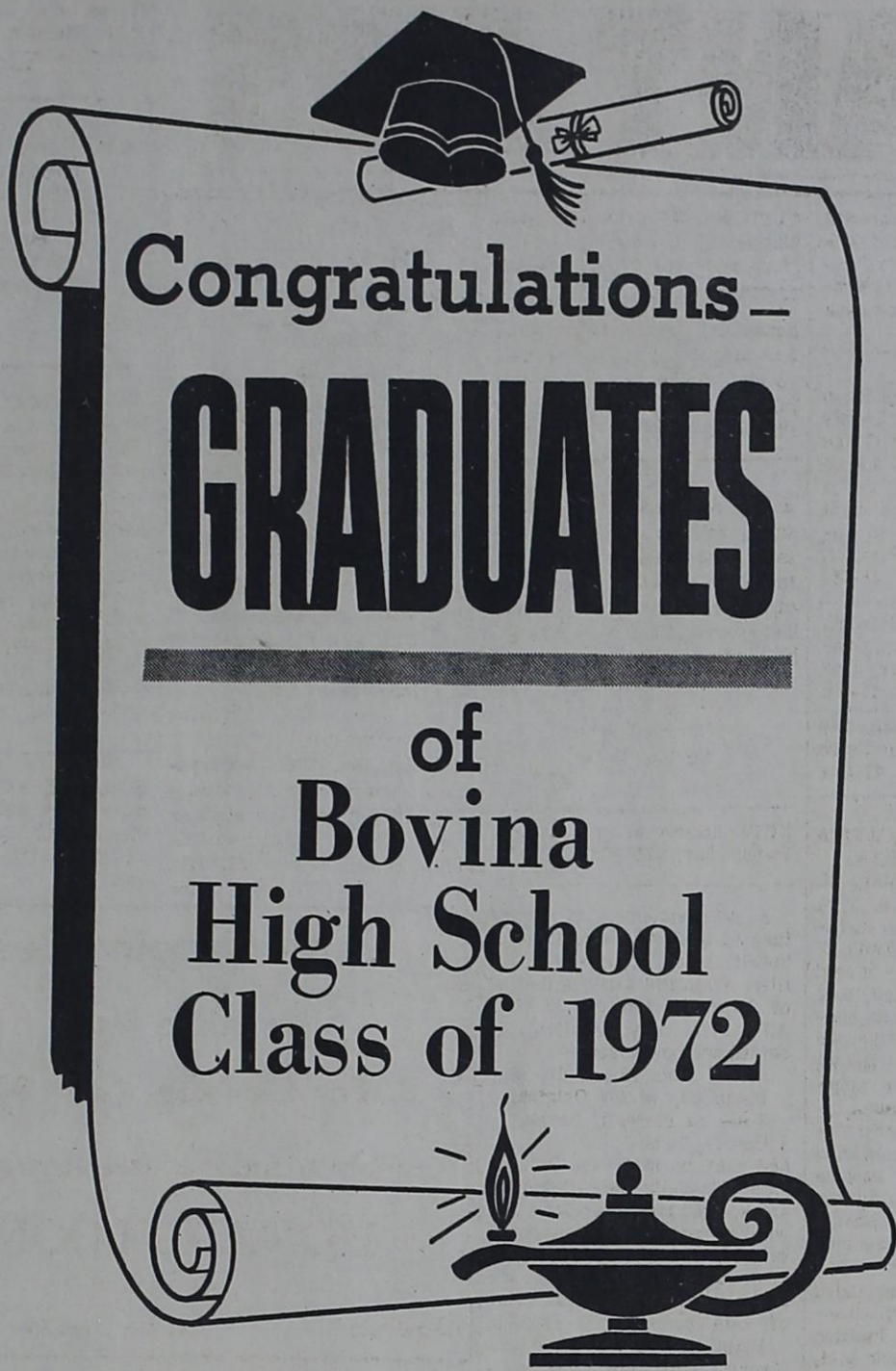

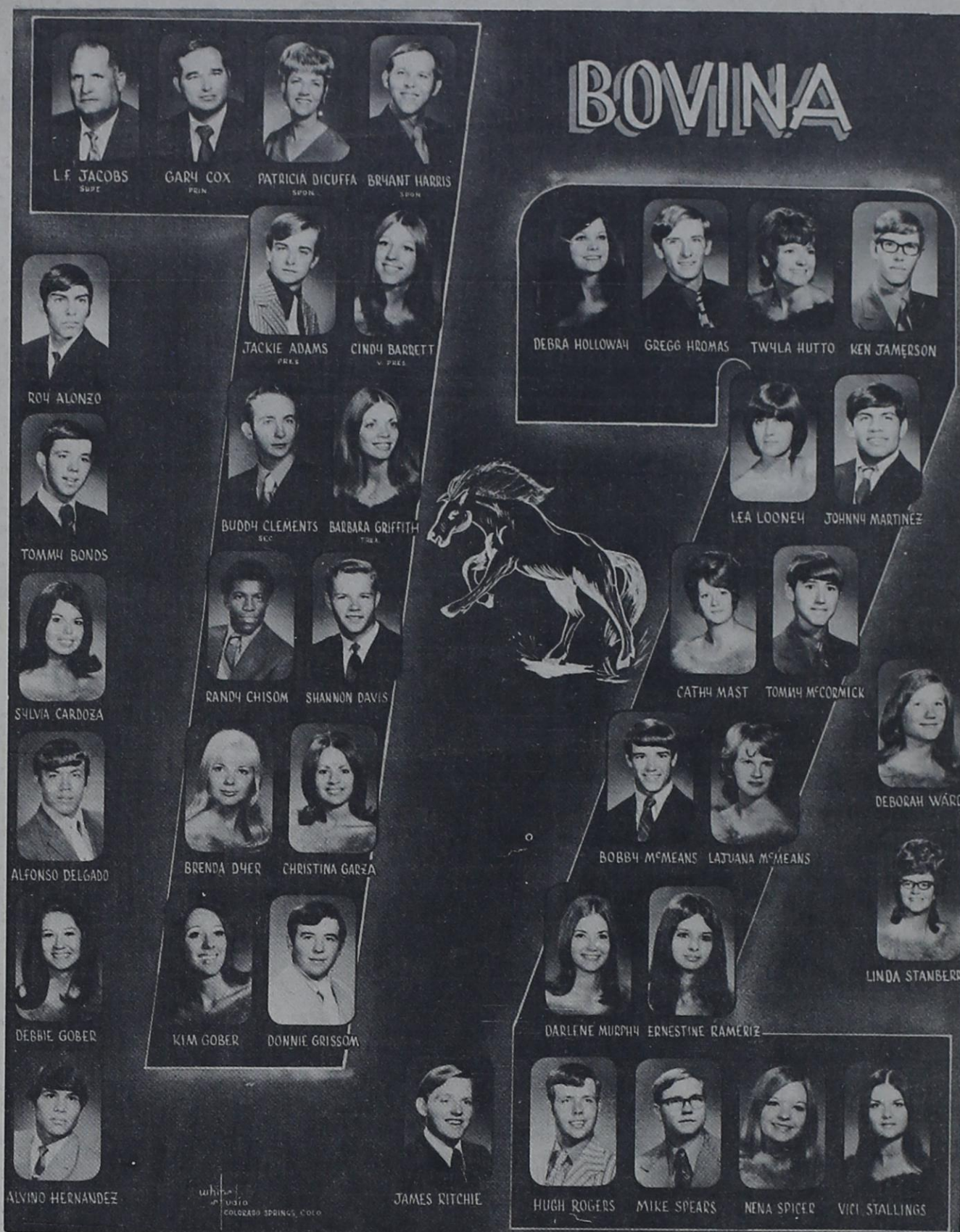
