

# 1st National Bank Opens Saturday

## Will Open Doors From 9 Until 6

The officers and directors of the First National Bank of Bovina announced this week that the charter for the bank has been issued by the Comptroller of the Currency.

Saturday, October 29, is the date set for the opening of the new bank. Opening time will be 9:00 a. m., and the bank will stay open until 6:00 in the afternoon on its opening day. The bank will be housed in its temporary quarters furnished jointly by the City of Bovina and Wilson-Brock Insurance Agency. Wilson and Brock moved their office next door to the City Hall.

This is the first national bank to be organized in Parmer County. Being a national bank, it will operate under a national charter and as a member of the Federal Reserve System. The bank will also have membership in the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. These agencies of bank supervision join to bring the ultimate in safeguarding the interest of the bank's depositors, Joe Temple, a member of the board of directors said.

"In presenting this new bank to the public, we have fulfilled one of our aims; that is, to bring to the people of Bovina and Parmer County the highest quality of banking efficiency and service." Temple said.

The officers and directors of the First National Bank extend a cordial invitation to each and everyone to come in on the opening day and become acquainted with the bank's officers and personnel. They trust that they may be of service in building a bigger and better community and county.

The bank's permanent building will be erected as soon as possible and will feature the latest in banking conveniences.

Warren Embree will serve the bank as the executive officer. Embree has had broad experience in banking, dating back to the early 1930's and is highly regarded in banking circles throughout the state. He has taken part and been active in civic affairs wherever he has lived.

J. P. Macon of Bovina will serve as chairman of the board of directors. Macon has been in the elevator business in Bovina since (Continued On Last Page)

Bonds said that his filling station which has formerly sold Phillips gasoline and all major brands of oil, will be changed to Gulf and the headquarters of the Gulf business would be housed in the station instead of the warehouse as it was in the past. Bonds' station will continue to sell all major brands of oil.

Bonds stressed that the telephone at the warehouse will be moved to the station and that the number would be the same as was used by the Gulf Oil Corporation at the warehouse. A wholesale pump will be installed at the station to fill barrels etc., Bonds said.

The station is located at the corner of North and Second Streets. Tommy was raised in Bovina and was a 1947 graduate of Bovina High School. He studied one year at West Texas State College at Canyon and was in the U. S. Army in 1952-53.

He was a partner with his father, N. E. Bonds, until the first of this year when he took over the station completely.

Tommy, his wife, Reba, and their two-year-old son, Tommy Keith, reside on Eighth Street in Bovina.

Hobdy said that his plans for the future were not complete but he did not plan to leave Bovina.

## Merchants Offer Many Free Prizes

Interested Bovina merchants decided Thursday to have "something extra" for Saturday, October 29, due to the opening of the First National Bank of Bovina.

The idea of the Special Day—called that for lack of a better name—is to attract people to town for the bank's opening and to try to encourage them to do more of their business in Bovina.

The meeting was held in the local Fire Hall with some 20 individuals attending. The group voted unanimously to have "something special" for the day, and elected to leave the details up to the program committee that was appointed by Mayor O. W. Rhinehart. Rhinehart presided at the meeting.

Dolph Moten was appointed chairman of the program committee. Other committee members are Edna Estes, secretary; Frank Truitt, treasurer; Marie Venable and Troy Fuller.

Rhinehart said, before the decision was officially made to have the "day," "Many people are never in a town that has a bank opening and it will probably be a long time before we have another one in Bovina." He went on to say that if a merchant fails to benefit by such a day that it will probably be the fault of the merchant himself.

Donations of \$2.50 were accepted by the committee to pay for the bonds that will be given away at the drawing that will be held Saturday afternoon. The \$2.50 will also cover the cost of having handbills printed and the postage for mailing the handbills.

To be eligible for the drawing, an individual has to register at the bank sometime during the day. The bank opens at 9:00 a. m.

There will be music by the Bovina High School band and the All Star Texans in the afternoon. Arlin Hartzog will be the master of ceremonies for the show.

Free coffee will be served to the public in the Fire Hall all day.

The Pepsi-Cola Company will furnish some 2,000 soft drinks for the public.

The list of prizes to be given away at the drawing—you have to be present to win—includes one \$50 savings bond, and two \$25 savings bonds. The bonds will be paid for by local businessmen and individuals. Also to be given away; a \$15 Parker pen by A. J. ## Bovina Teachers Teach Teachers

A group of Bovina elementary school teachers are holding classes to instruct new Bovina elementary teachers and a group of five Friona elementary teachers on "Steps to Mastery of Words."

The classes have been held on Monday afternoon, immediately following school, at the school building for the past five weeks. Now the meetings will be held every other week to continue as long as thought necessary.

Miss Grace Paul, Miss Lillian Fisher, Mrs. J. T. Hammonds, Mrs. Aubrey Rhodes, Mrs. Hodge Rigdon, Mrs. R. E. Everett, and Mrs. A. B. Wilkinson, substitute teacher, comprise the group of instructors.

All but Mrs. Everett, who attended school on the subject matter before last, took a course on mastery of words at Eastern New Mexico University last summer.

Among the new Bovina teachers attending the classes are Mrs. Pat Terry, Mrs. Ruth Thornton, Mrs. W. E. Williams, and Mrs. W. R. Beard.

The principal of the Friona elementary school and his wife attended the first meeting of the group, and gave his approval of the methods studied. The course is designed to enable the teachers to aid their students in reading and spelling.

Phonics is a part of the course. Phonics consists of learning to spell and pronounce basic sounds of which 85 percent of the words in the English language are composed. When mastered, phonics gives a person the skill to attach new words.

The text book used by the teachers while taking their course at ENMU was "Why Johnny Can't Read."

## Mustangs Trample Underdog Hart, 32-12, Friday Night

The Bovina Mustangs romped over the underdog Hart Longhorns Friday night before a smaller-than-usual crowd at Mustang Field, 33-12.

Playing without the services of star back, Neil Smith, the Mustangs racked up a 21-0 lead in the half and added two more touchdowns to that score in the second half before a substitute-filled lineup allowed the Longhorns to count for their two touchdowns.

Larry Ezell kicked off to Hart to begin the game and the Mustangs forced the Longhorns to punt from the 11 yard line. Darrell

Read gathered in the punt on the 34 and returned it to the 26. Five plays later, the locals scored their first TD, Ezell carrying thru the middle standing up from the one.

Read's placement—his fifth in a row—was good. (He kicked four consecutive points after touchdowns in the Plains game the week before.)

Hart took the ensuing kickoff and marched to the Bovina 49 before they again lost the ball on downs.

Read made one yard and then Larry Ezell, playing his most spectacular game of the season,

got loose down the left side line for his second touchdown in the first quarter. Read's sixth consecutive kick was good and the locals were ahead by a 14-0 count.

The Longhorns were again forced to punt on the second play of the second quarter. Read returned the kick from his own 38 to the 40.

But in three plays they had not managed for a first down so Read punted to the Hart eight and it was returned back to the 11. Forced to punt from that point, the attempted kick was partially blocked and it went out of bounds on the



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### Farm Bureau Has Annual Convention

By W. H. Graham Jr.

Gilbert Kaltwasser, farmer from the Oklahoma Lane community, was re-elected president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau at its annual convention in Bovina Thursday night.

New directors elected at the meeting included Sterling Donaldson, Henry Hamilton, and J. T. Jones. Les Bruns was re-elected a director.

Named as delegates to the state FB convention are Roy Miller, E. T. Ford, Bruce Parr, Raymond Schueler, Truman Kent, Harry Hamilton, Sterling Donaldson, and J. T. Jones. Of this group, seven will be voting delegates.

The convention, which opened with a concert by the Bovina High School band, was presided over by Kaltwasser, who this past year finished the unexpired term of Lubra Ellison.

Roy Miller gave the financial report of the county Bureau, and E. T. Ford followed up with a membership report. Raymond Euler, service representative, reported on the organization's insurance programs.

The biggest part of the evening was taken up in the discussion and adoption of resolutions which will govern Farm Bureau policy in the coming year.

Of 18 proposals offered the delegation, by the resolutions committee, 17 were adopted.

Here is the stand of the county Farm Bureau's membership on vital issues:

They oppose compulsory Social Security for farmers.

They favor retention of the tractor gas refund program.

They would keep for the state the privilege of taxing motor fuels—in preference to this power passing to the federal government.

They request a refund of two cents per gallon for the federal tax paid on farm gasoline which is not consumed on state-and federally-built highways.

In cases where downstream dams are built, they favor a tax on the users to pay for these structures.

They believe the people should elect representatives to a state water board.

They support the Texas "right to work" law.

They ask for a law that will require certification of the contents of manufactured feed.

They want to be able to use their pickups as passenger cars, not requiring additional licensing.

They would like to see the quality of feed grain influence the support prices on these commodities. This is especially true in the case of content of noxious weed seeds.

They unanimously support the adoption of the Farm Bureau "Land Fertility Bank."

(But if this program cannot be adopted, they favor:)

90 percent supports on non-basic commodities.

A revision of the parity formula on grain sorghums.

Flexible supports, provided acreages can be increased. (This resolution carried by a majority of 12-10.)

A resolution to make grain sorghums a basic commodity was defeated 11-19.

They favor encouraging foreign trade by accepting foreign currency.

They want more patrolmen on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

They want to keep the "trend" factor in cotton allotments.

A resolution was offered from the floor to make underground water resources tax deductible in a manner similar to the oil depletion allowance.

Three resolutions were adopted that pertain only to county matters:

1. They favor continuation of the weed committee's work.

2. They commended the county, the railroad, and the state highway department on cooperation in the weed control program.

3. They favor the circulation of a petition to determine if a weed control district should not be formed.

### Alan Abel Entertains In School Assembly

Alan Abel, National Champion Drummer, Author and Comedian, entertained in an assembly in the Bovina High School Auditorium Friday, October 21, at 10:30 a. m.

Abel has built his career around drums. His presentation of "The History of the Drum and Its Effect on Civilization Today" was the product of years of study, research, and practical experience.

Through study and research Abel has become an authority on rudimentary drums. He has lectured seriously on the subject at the New York Metropolitan Museum of Natural History, and has made an educational movie about it for students.

His greatest success, however, has come through his personal appearances as a drummer-entertainer. His program on Friday featured original drum solos, march-

ing rhythms, Latin-American rhythms, early messages sent by cave-men, how anyone can play the drums, and what drummers think about when they play.

The noted columnist, Earl Wilson, wrote, "Abel's reputation will probably rest on his 'History of the Snare Drum' which starts like this: 'I have an archaeologist, who, after a diligent search among the 2000-year-old ruins and pyramids of Egypt, tells me that the snare drum originally came from a music store in New York.'"

Calling generously on satire, wit and humor, Abel romped through the six thousand year history of drums with rare enthusiasm. He emphasized the fascinating story of drums, accenting their niche in the musical world of today—doing so with deftness, drollery, and hilarious double-talk.
