SOME OF THE larger cities in the Panhandle area were voting on some interesting and controversial issues this past Saturday during the community elections, and the results of these elections were also somewhat interesting.

One of the issues receiving considerable publicity was the collective bargaining which was sought by policemen and firemen in the city of Amarillo.

Although representatives from both the Amarillo Police Department and Fire Department had assured taxpayers that if the issue had been approved, the taxpayers would not have to worry about a strike, the voters decided not to take any chances.

Probably thinking about what would happen if a fire alarm were turned in while a drive for better pay was in progress, the voters in Amarillo turned down the collective bargaining by these two groups by more than two to one. Early returns were 8,288 against the proposal, and 3,644 in favor.

Voters in the City of Hereford had an interesting proposal, a wet-dry election with more involved than the usual right to open package stores.

Art Reinauer, who has achieved a measure of success with the farming of grapes just north of Parmer County on his Deaf Smith County farm, is wanting to build a winery in Deaf Smith County.

As expected, the "pros" and "cons" in the wet-dry issue had quite a campaign. An interesting sidelight during this campaign was the statement by Reinauer that if Deaf Smith County voters turned the proposal down he would offer to build his winery in Castro County, followed by a statement from the Castro County Chamber of Commerce that it would be more than happy to have this industry in their county.

This development may or may not have affected the final outcome of the election, but at any rate, a record number of voters gave their approval to make Deaf Smith County's Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 a "wet" precinct, by a final tally of 2,659 in favor and 2,441 against.

ANOTHER "DIFFERENT" angle for voters occurred at Borger, a community which has had considerable debate over the offering on that city's cable television system of the Playboy channel.

It became such a heated issue that the city officials placed a referendum on the city ballot, asking voters if they favored passing a city ordinance which would make it unlawful for the cable company to offer the Playboy channel to its customers.

Another near-record turnout of voters—more than 2,500—went to the polls in that Panhandle city, and overwhelmingly sided with the cable TV company.

The main issue in the Borger vote seemed to be a fear that the city could more or less serve as a censor, and not allow the citizens to make their own choices of what they want to see on TV, as well as allowing the company the freedom to choose what it makes available to its customers.

There were many who felt that the proposed city ordinance at Borger would have been unconstitutional, even if it had been passed.

The interesting thing was, there are only a few more than 400 subscribers to the Playboy channel. Yet, they were joined by several hundred other voters who felt they should be able to choose for themselves, rather than have a "Big Brother" committee.

## Fillies Qualify In Track Events

The Bovina Fillies qualified for the regional track and field meet in seven events in the district meet this past week at Springlake-Earth.

Marie Pesch won all three of her individual events. She took first place in the 100-meter low hurdles; the shot put and the high jump, and will enter each of these events at Regional.

Mindy Neal placed second in the long jump and triple jump, good for a regional berth in each event. Sonya Mayfield was second in the 200-meter dash, and also advances.

The Fillies' 800-meter relay team (Sonya Mayfield, Robbie Stowers, Marie Pesch and Mindy Neal), also qualified for regional, placing second in their race.

The sprint relay team (Mayfield, Donnell Grner, Pesch and Neal), placed third, and the 1600-meter relay team (Stowers, Neal, Corina Munoz and Vickie Tamez) placed sixth.

Other point-winners were Robbie

Stowers, fourth in the 400-meter dash; Donnell Garner, fifth in the discus and Cookie Shepherd, fifth in the shot put.

Coach Judy Steffens said the team could well have improved on its fourth place finish in the district meet (the team scored 88 points), had it not been for a knee injury to Terisa Shepherd, a vital member of the relay teams. In fact, Ms. Steffens thought the Fillies could have made a run for the district title if they had had a completely healthy squad.

## Caliche Is Hauled For FM 3333

The contractor is hauling caliche and preparing the roadway for the asphalt surfacing on FM 3333 from U.S. Highway 60, five miles northeast of Farwell, east to FM Highway 1731 south of Bovina, Rhea E. Bradley, Supervising Resident Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation of Littlefield, said.

It is anticipated that this project will be completed in June of 1984. The public is urged to obey laws, watch for haul trucks and warning signs, barricades and speed limits through construction.

# Feed Yard's Mill Now Operational

Parmer County Cattle Company is once again able to do their own milling. The business suffered extensive damage on December 21 when a fire destroyed the hydraulic and electrical system that operated the mill.

The company has been in the process of rebuilding the electrical system and the job is now completed. Since the fire, PCCC has been having feed mixed and milled by other feed yards and hauled in.

Parmer County Cattle has been in operation for 17 years and Cap Naegle has been general manager all of that time. The plant employs 31 people. Frank McSwan of Clovis is

assistant manager and Jeanette Walling is office manager and head bookkeeper. Also working in the office are Sharon Steelman, Trudy Hartzog of Bovina and Shelly Finley of Clovis.

Sonny Jones is head cowboy "boss," and Bill Brigham is mill superintendent.

The cattle company is now feeding 28,000 cattle but has the capacity to care for 38,000.

Parmer County Cattle Company custom feeds cattle to be sent to packers. It is also a tourist attraction and has been since it opened its 'gates' for business in 1967.

## Two Elected To Board By Voters

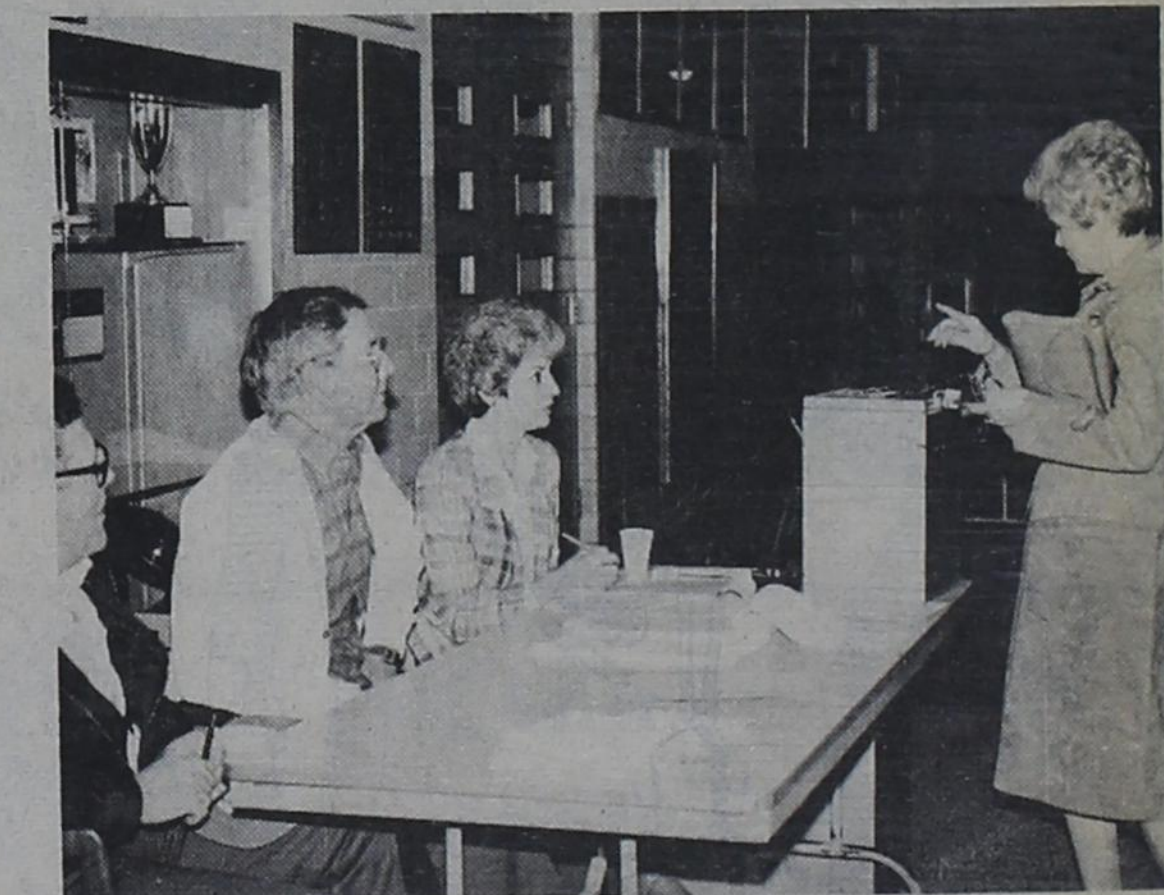
Roy Lee Stowers and T-Bone Treinen were elected to the Bovina City Council last Saturday and Sonny Roach was elected mayor.

Stowers received 124 votes and Treinen polled 127. Roach received 127 votes.

In the school board election, Norma Whitten and Gaylon Rhodes were the winning candidates. Mrs. Whitten received 174 votes and Rhodes had 146. Incumbent Herb Howell came in third with 135 votes, and Billy Lynn Marshall received 82 votes.

A total of 277 voted in the school election and 143 voted in the city election. The turnout was considered good.

The three candidates in the city election were elected unopposed.

## City's Sales Tax Shows Nice Gain

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$46.3 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one per cent city sales tax.

"These receipts are up more than 16 per cent over last year," Bullock said. "This is just exactly where I estimated they would be when I gave the Legislature its estimate of revenues last year. Texas is in the thick of the national economic recovery. Let's just hope we stay there."

Bovina's check was for \$1,245.81, an increase of 115 per cent over the payment of \$578.63 for the similar period in 1983. For the year, the city now has received \$6,952.94, up 2.8 per cent over the total of \$6,763.53 at the same point a year ago.

The county's total check (three cities) for the current period was \$8,591.54, up from \$6,495.75 in 1983, and the yearly total stands at \$44,703.74, compared to \$38,731.55, an increase of 15.4 per cent overall.

Houston received the biggest check—for \$8.6 million—which brings the city's 1984 total to \$45.8 million, up 9 per cent over what Houston had received by this time last year.

Dallas received \$5.6 million, boosting 1984 payments to more than 19 per cent over 1983.

San Antonio got \$2.7 million, bringing that city's 1984 total payments to date to \$14.9 million.

April checks reflect sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller in late March.

## 4-H Club Sponsoring Trophy Shoot

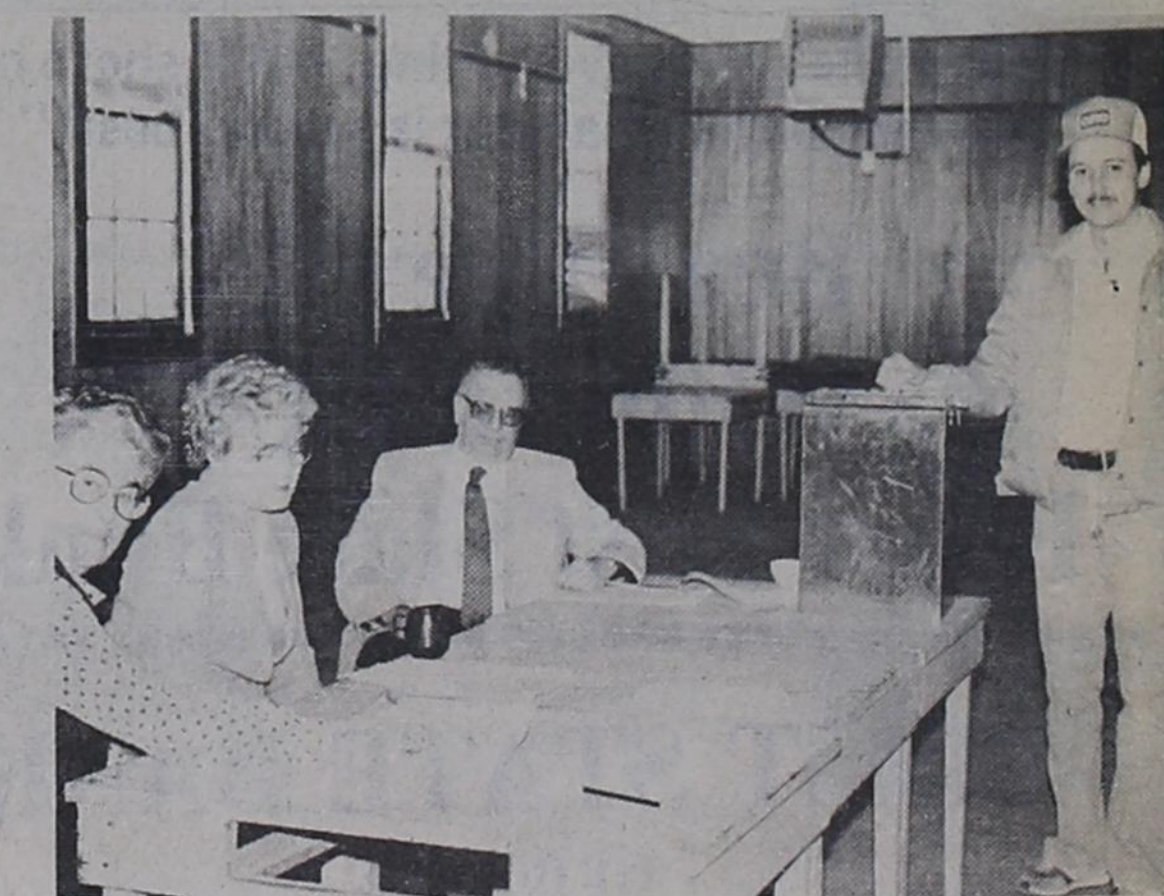
There will be a trophy shoot Sunday, April 15 at the Lions Club Trap Range, located 1/2 mile north of Farwell on the State Line Road.

## Thunderbirds Are Coming To Cannon

The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds are coming to Cannon Air Force Base on April 22.

Flying in the F-16 Fighting Falcon, the Thunderbirds will perform at 4 p.m. during Cannons' annual Community Appreciation Day.

Community Appreciation Day begins with opening ceremonies starting at 1 p.m.

The U.S. Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron, the Thunderbirds, perform precision aerial maneuvers, exhibiting to people throughout the free world the capabilities of Air Force aircraft and people.

A Tactical Air Command unit, as is Cannon, the Thunderbirds squadron is composed of eight pilots (including the six demonstration pilots), three support officers and 114 enlisted personnel in 32 career fields. The squadron demonstrates the precision of formation flying, the maximum performance capabilities of the F-16 and the readiness of a modern tactical flying unit.

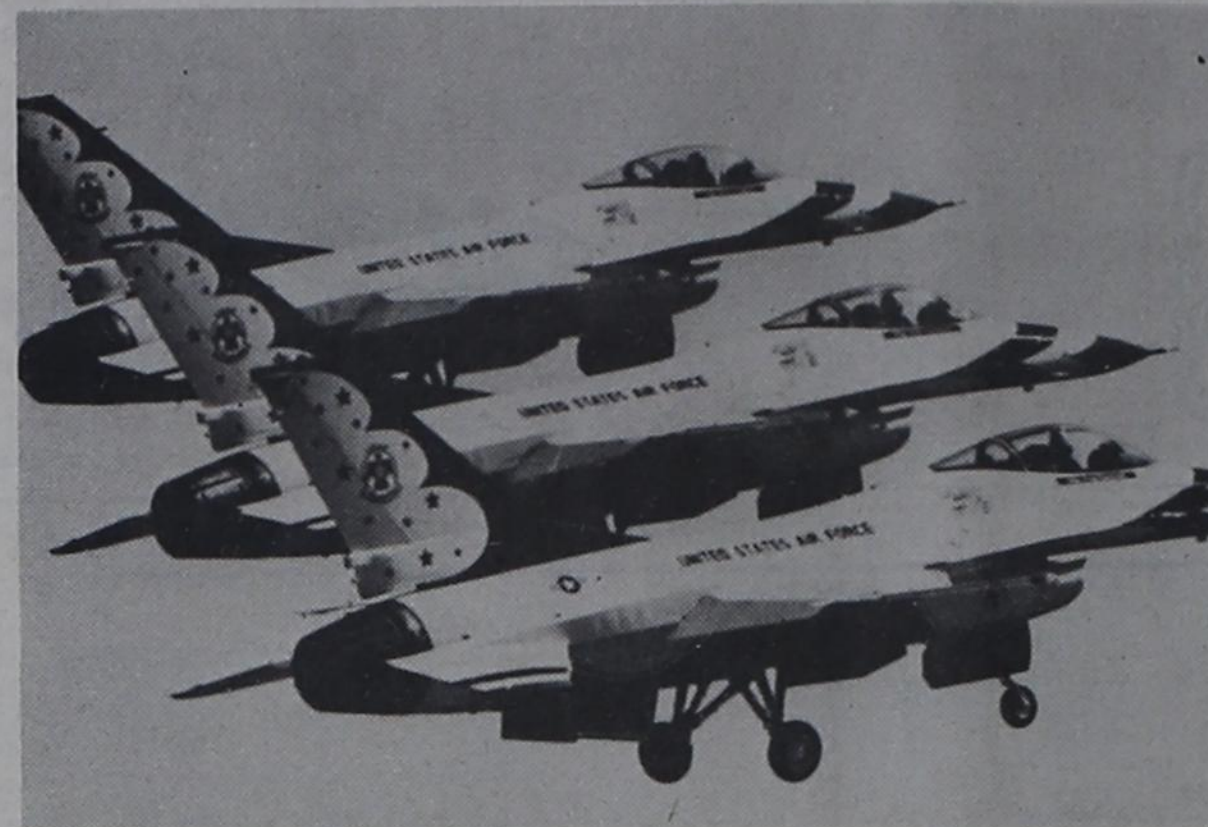
Early in 1983, the Thunderbirds began flying the General Dynamics F-16. This aircraft represents the full range capabilities possessed by our newest tactical fighters. This highly maneuverable multirole fighter has proven itself to be one of the world's best precision tactical bombers and air-to-air combat aircraft. It is a multi-national aircraft used by eight countries other than the U.S.

With the transition to the F-16 from the T-38 Talon, the team was able to retain manpower and fuel efficiency while demonstrating to Thunderbird spectators the very latest in fighter technology.

Other activities scheduled during the day are a military working dog show, a drill team performance, a security police rappelling exhibition and a demonstration of emergency escape procedures from an F-111D aircraft.

Community Appreciation Day provides an opportunity for local citizens to visit the base and learn more about its mission, equipment, facilities, people and the skills required to operate in the Air Force. Gates open at noon with activities tailored for the whole family's enjoyment lasting through 5:30 p.m.

Cannon's F-111D along with other Air Force aircraft will be on static display. Refreshments and parking will be available throughout the day.

## April Proclaimed "Buckle-Up" Month

Governor Mark White has declared April "Buckle-Up" Month and urged all Texans to buckle-up themselves and their children in cars. Citing an estimated 3,850 traffic deaths in Texas last year, White noted that traffic collisions are the leading cause of accidental death, especially for young people.

Texas leads the nation in traffic deaths of children between the ages of

0 and 4. At least 162 children in Texas in that age group died while riding as passengers in motor vehicles within the last two years, according to Department of Public Safety accident records.

According to national estimates of use, only about 15 per cent of drivers wear safety belts. About 27 per cent of children are properly protected in vehicles.

Everyone should "take a few extra seconds to protect themselves and their passengers by the use of safety belts and car seats," said White, who is an habitual safety belt user.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that safety belt use could reduce traffic deaths by as much as 50 per cent. Among infants and young children that estimate of lives saved goes as high as 90 per cent. Safety belts have also been cited as a major line of defense against the drunk driver, as the best protection now available in a collision.

## Jones Seeking Post In U.S. Legislature

According to Delwin Jones, "Legislative experience makes the difference." In a recent pre-election poll, legislative experience appears to be the reason the Lubbock Democrat led all others in the race for Congress from the 19th District of Texas. Jones established himself while in Austin with a record of performance which voters remember well.

During eight years in the legislature, Jones served as chairman of the House Congressional and Legislative Redistricting Committee and the House Agriculture Committee. He was chairman of the 13-state Agriculture Committee of the Southern Council of State Governments and an advisory member of the fifty state National Council of State Governments. Among other achievements, he authorized or co-authored legislation creating Texas Tech's Medical School, the Lubbock County Hospital Authority and Tech's Western Information TV Teaching Network.

He was appropriations committee

sponsor for the Tech Textile Research Center, the Tech Law School and the Lubbock State School for the Retarded.

In 1971 Jones was chosen by the Progressive Farmer Board of Editors as Texas Agriculture's Man of the Year. He has been cited by the Texas Water Rights Commission for "interest and dedication in improving the Texas Law of Water Rights."

He is a self-made farmer-businessman, a native of Lubbock and a graduate of Lubbock High School and Texas Tech. He is a charter member of the High Plains Agriculture Research Foundation and Plains Cotton Growers and a past president of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau.

He and his wife Reta have two children, Lanny and Melodie, both Tech graduates. There is one grandson, three-year-old Gregg Snodgrass.

"As long as legislative experience remains the issue," the veteran lawmaker says, "the West Texas voter can come out on top in Washington."

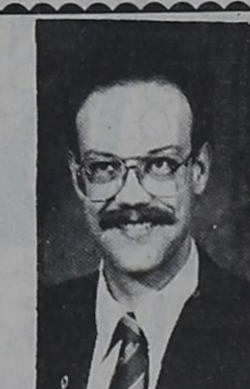

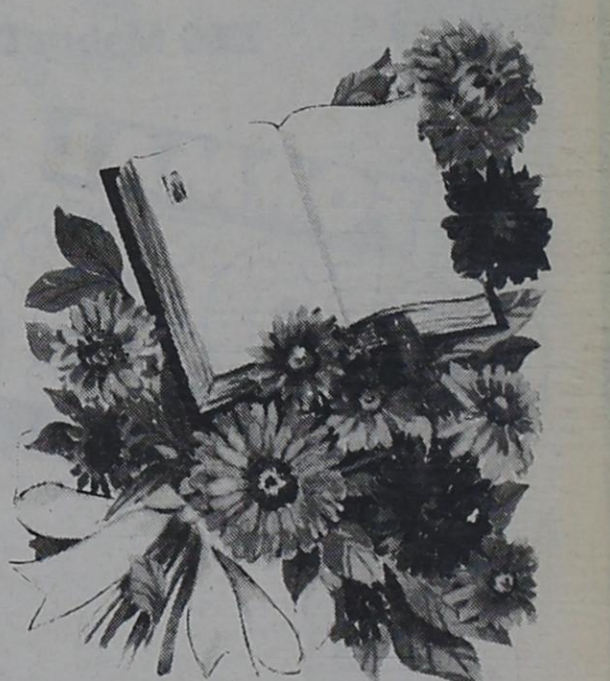

## IN LUBBOCK

# Swine Course Features Barrow, Boar Selection

Producers and breeders will join county agents and specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to share information on show pig production and boar selection April 11 at the annual Texas A&M University swine short course for the High and Rolling Plains.

The program here, at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, will focus upon topics not being featured in two other swine programs at Stephenville April 10 and Luling April 13, said Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Extension swine specialist at Lubbock.

Registration at the Lubbock program will begin at 8:30 a.m. The A&M center is just east of I-27 on FM 1294 at the Shallowater exit.

The segment beginning at 9 a.m. will examine production, selection, marketing and feeding of show pigs. Facilities for small swine operations will be discussed by Norman Kohls, Glasscock County Extension Agent, Garden City. Boar and sow management to optimize show pigs produced will be the topic for Joe Tarter, purebred breeder from Friona.

The influence of the show date upon the farrowing date will be examined by Marcus Phillips, vocational agriculture teacher at Hereford. Tarter will discuss ration selection for the show pig producer and feeder. Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, Extension swine veterinarian from College Station, will explain preventive vaccination programs for the show pig producer.

Castro County Extension Agent Seth Ralston will discuss the preparation of pigs for the show pig sale. Producer Jay Winter of Wintex Farms, Lubbock, will explain ways to ensure that a new boar is a success in the swine operation.

The segment will conclude with a panel discussion of what producers look for in selecting a show pig. Panel members will be Winter, show pig producer Malcolm Osbourn of Valley Spring and Lynn County Extension Agent Stanley Young of Tahoka.

During a sponsored lunch, participants will hear a report from the Texas Pork Producers Association. Making the report will be Chuck Real of Marion, TPPA president, and Ken Horton of Austin, association executive vice president.

The next segment of the program will feature a panel of breeders and commercial producers in an examination of considerations in boar selection and purchase. Jerry Jones of Sunnyside Pork Producers of Sunnyside, will explain what he considers important in buying a boar. Purebred breeder Larry Tackitt of Bilt Rite Farms, Happy, will tell what he finds important when he sells a boar to a commercial producer.

Tom Higley, Triple H Hog Farm, Dumas, will explain information he needs to make a decision to purchase a commercial boar. The breeder's responsibility to the commercial producer after selling a boar will be discussed by purebred breeder Dennis Blair of LaPryor.

A question and answer period will follow the panel.

The concluding segment of the short course will feature computer applications to the swine operation, reports and a live evaluation of pigs on a gain test.

Benefits of the computer in the swine operation will be examined by Cohen. Dr. T.D. Tanksley, Jr., Extension swine specialist at College Station, will report carcass results of the Houston barrow show and discuss current swine research. Archie Abrameit, manager of the Luling Foundation, will report results of the test station sale at Luling.

The live evaluation of pigs will conclude the session. It will include cull and keep evaluations, backfat probing and ultrasonic estimations. Leading the evaluation will be Tanksley, Winter, Osbourn, Young, Ralston and Cohen.

Cohen said the Lubbock course was developed by the swine task force of the South Plains Development Program to meet special interests of area producers and breeders.

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
