PLENTY OF WATER NOW

Water Works Company Makes Lightning Record in Installing New Water Service and Equipment.

Brady has plenty of water to drink, water to wash in, water, water, plenty of water to use or to waste this week. Following the sudden giving out of the water supply last week Supt. A. M. Martin proceeded to get busy, with the result that some lightning like changes in the services were effected.

As soon as the Crothers lake was secured Mr. Martin went to Dallas where he bought a complete new pumping apparatus which was shipped out by express, arriving in Brady at noon Saturday. While he was gone a large force of workmen completed the laying of the pipe line to the lake, and on his return the new pump and engine were installed all hands and the superintendent working day and night until the work was completed. By 1:00 o'clock Sunday morning the pump was working, and by daylight the mains were full. During the day Sunday the big new standpipe was half full and everybody in town had all the water they wanted. It is good water, too, and the lake on Live Oak contains a supply good for several months.

The company has plans maturing looking to a permanent storage capacity which will take care of Brady regardless of her growth. These plans are not yet ready to be given out, but The Standard is informed that the company will leave no stone unturned in their efforts to secure a permanent water supply.

BRAKEMAN HOLT SHOT

Well Known Frisco Railroad Employee Shot in the Face Today—Assailant is Not Known.

Bob Holt, brakeman on the Frisco local freight from Brownwood, was shot in the face this (Tuesday) afternoon at a point near Sellman switch a few miles north from town.

Mr. Holt was seated in the look-out of the train caboose and as the train crossed Onion Creek the shot was fired, apparently from the east side of the track. The bullet, which was evidently from a Winchester rifle, struck Holt near the left ear, shattered the cheek bone and came out just below the eye, making a very ugly wound, although the attending physicians think it will not result seriously nor damage the eyesight.

It is not known who did the shooting or whether it was accidental or intentional. The train crew saw no one except a woman and a child near the scene, and Holt says if he has an enemy in this country he doesn't know it. Sheriff Wall was taken to the scene of the shooting on an engine, and is up there at this writing making an investigation of the affair.

Pecans and Turkeys.

H. P. Roddie, manager of the McCully Company, reports his firm as having shipped three car loads of pecans so far this season, with another car almost ready. He thinks the four cars will wind up the season's pecan business except local shipments, of which there have been a good many.

In the turkey business Mr. Roddie reports a scarcity of the birds. For the Thanksgiving trade he was only able to secure and ship 600 turkeys, and for the Christmas orders he has but 1000 in sight. The turkeys are averaging the producers better than a dollar a head, and Mr. Roddie says he could handle several times the number available.

The farmers of the Brady country are beginning to take greater interest in such things, however, and within a few years the revenue from eggs, poultry and truck will be a much bigger proposition. The sentiment is growing all the time.

Mr. Roddie is in the market for every turkey in the country, and is advertising for same in another column.

Buy 1,000 Acres Land.

Meers Bros. Saturday closed a deal with Claude C. Ledbetter for 1,000 acres of land located about 16 miles north of town, 200 acres of which are in cultivation. Consideration \$12,000. They will plant it in milo maize next year for the purpose of feeding steers, and expect to place the land on the market next fall.

Prohibition Mass Meeting.

The mass meeting at the courthouse Sunday afternoon, called by County Chairman J. F. Montgomery and other good prohibitionists, was well attended and a great deal of enthusiasm in the question was evidenced. Hon. J. T. Hamilton, of Mercury, was made chairman of the meeting, and Sam McCollum secretary. A number of good speeches were heard, among the speakers being Mr. Hamilton, Thos. Bell, Judge Newman, J. F. Montgomery, J. T. Mann, Revs. Caperton, Knight, Hardison and King, and others.

The call was for the purpose of appointing delegates to the big statewide prohibition convention to be held at Fort Worth on the 8th inst. A motion prevailed that the county chairman communicate with every prohibitionist in the county, and induce as many as possible to attend the convention.

All the pastors of the city preached on subjects pertaining to temperance and the prohibition question Sunday morning, and the prohibition sentiment in McCulloch county was probably never so strong before as it is right now. It is hoped that a large delegation from this county may be induced to attend the rally at Fort Worth on the 8th.

AN OBJECT LESSON.

"Does newspaper advertising pay?" This is a question often asked and as often answered in the affirmative. The man who asks himself this question would have received a mute but unquestionable answer had he viewed the crowds that surrounded the mercantile establishment of Wm. However, it is never too late to do good, and The Standard will continue to work for the measure.

Friscio Track Inspection.

R. D. Parker, engineer for the Texas railroad commission, will arrive in Ft. Worth Monday or Tuesday to take a trip over the Fort Worth & Rio Grande as far as Brownwood in the interest of the commission.

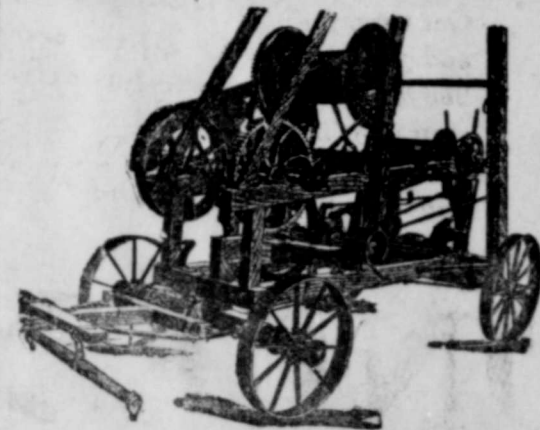

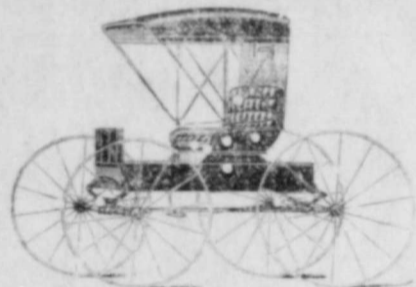
