Mr. Farmer, suppose you should sell a horse, a cow, some hay or grain and are paid by check on some bank in Brady or some neighboring town. You are busy and cannot come to town for a few days. Do not carry that check around or hold it at your home. You are sleeping on your rights if you do. Let Uncle Sam help you. Endorse the check. Make it payable to the order of the Brady National Bank and sign your name below. Mail it at once to us and ask us to place it to your credit. We will mail you a receipt.

You have thus protected yourself by using due diligence in presenting the check for payment. If the buyer's account should be closed from any cause, you could go back on him, otherwise he would escape. It is never good policy to hold a check out long after it is given to you. The giver may close his account and cause you trouble if not loss. Use the mail and telephone. You do not have to come to town to make your deposit. Mail us your checks and save trouble. FAVOR \$75,000 BONDS

Directors of Commercial Club Will Ask Commissioners Court to Submit Road Bond Issue.

At a meeting of the directors of the Commercial Club last Friday afternoon it was unanimously decided to present a petition at the next meeting of the Commissioners court asking the court to submit a specified road bond issue for \$75,000 to a vote of the people, for the purpose of building first class roads into Brady. It was further decided to make Brady a center of a district 20 miles running north and south, and 12 miles running east and west.

That everyone may fully understand the object and purpose of the action of the directors, a mass meeting will be held at the courthouse next Saturday afternoon, January 28th, at 2 o'clock, at which time the matter will be fully and freely discussed. Every citizen of McCulloch county who is interested in good roads should be present at this meeting. Your opinion in the matter is wanted, or if you have any objections to the move then will be the proper time to state them. Let everyone come.

Celebrate Lee and Jackson's Birthdays.

The old Confederate Veterans and Daughters of the Confederacy celebrated the birthdays of Generals R. E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson in a most fitting manner last Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Odd Fellows Hall. Tom Bell made a short address and then introduced Rev. D. R. Hardison as the speaker of the day, and all who were present say Bro. Hardison did himself proud in his speech. Talks by the ex-Confederates proved not the least entertaining feature of the afternoon, the one by Rev. W. G. Caperton being especially noteworthy.

The occasion was one of the most pleasant gatherings ever held in our city, and it has been decided to make it the first of a series of meetings at stated intervals upon which the ex-Confederates and Sons and Daughters may foregather and live over once more the stirring scenes of by-gone days.

TEXAS NEED OFFACTORIES.

During 1910 eighteen car loads of fresh tomatoes were marketed in Texas, most of them being shipped to points in the North and East. The tomatoes put \$1,400,000 into the pockets of the farmers who produced them, with practically no extra cost for cultivation, as in most cases they are planted with other winter crops, thereby requiring very little extra work.

The one dark spot on this bright agricultural picture, however, is the fact that these tomatoes were shipped to the canning factories of Maryland and other New England states, only to be shipped back again for consumption by Texans who have to pay the freight both ways. With a production of over a million car loads of tomatoes alone, not to mention thousands of cars of other truck, annually and with cheap fuel in abundance, and all other requisites for the building of factories, the shipping of our products to other states to be canned is not in keeping with the spirit of progress which is manifested in other lines of Texas industry.

FIGURES recently compiled by the Manufacturers' Record show that cotton is still King of the South, and that his reign will continue throughout the ages. To fully appreciate the vast realm over which his dominion extends, one has but to consider that the entire output of gold and silver in all the world would not purchase by over a billion dollars the products of the cotton field in the South alone. During the decade beginning with 1900 and ending with 1911, the total output of gold and silver in the world was \$4,625,262,200, while the cotton products of the South brought \$6,387,000,000.

CLIMATE is one of the most important factors of any country

and is as important a part of the environment of animal life as it is of the vegetable existence. If the soil is not fertile, it can be artificially changed by irrigation and other methods, but if a climate is undesirable, it must necessarily remain undesirable forever. Texas presents a varied climate, from invigorating winds of the Panhandle to the gentle breezes of the Gulf, and having an area of 262,000 square miles can furnish climate of all kinds adapted to encouraging vegetable and animal life. Come to Texas.

EVERY good citizen should pay their poll tax and qualify for citizenship during 1911. There are important issues coming up for disposition during this year and among them will be bond issues for road improvement. Texas has just begun to realize the necessity of improving public highways and the importance of building for the future. Permanent improvements of public highways are money makers, time savers and they add to the happiness and prosperity of the country. Build roads.

THE dissemination of information has largely to do with the prosperity and development of a country and in no country on the globe does nature possess such astounding possibilities and reveal them in such rapid order as in Texas, making an imperative necessity for newspapers in the home of every farmer who desires to profit by the gifts of nature and the experience of his neighbors.

AGRICULTURAL reports show that during the year of 1910 over 3,000,000,000 bushels of corn were raised in the United States, which sold for \$195,000,000,000. Of this amount Texas produced 151,280,000 which sold for \$11,420,640,000, on an average of 63 cents per bushel.

TEXAS is bidding for first place as the home of the watermelon and Georgia will have to look well after her laurels. According to government reports, Texas shipped 2,000 car loads of melons in 1910, which, of course, does not include home consumption.

If you can't agree, "scrap" about other things, but present a united and solid front on the good roads question in Texas.

Superintendent Must Approve Vouchers. Brady, Texas, Jan. 16, 1911. F. M. Bralley, State Supt., Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir: The banks and banking houses of my county have been cashing vouchers drawn on the McCulloch County School Fund, then sending them to their correspondence banks, who in turn send them to some other bank and finally the vouchers reach the County Depository, which Depository then presents the vouchers to me for approval.

Is this permissible? The banks say it is perfectly legitimate, for it neither endangers the county school fund nor deprives me of any supervisory power, for I can turn the vouchers down and if so turned down, they through whose hands it had passed would be the losers.

They insist that I allow them to dispose of the school vouchers in this way.

What is your ruling on this matter?

Water Works Company are at
work on the solution of Brady's
water problem. The water works
company announces that they
have decided to use the water in
the hole near the creamery and
ice plant and are preparing to
move their engine and pump to
that place. Manager Martin as-
sures us that they will not rest
one moment until they have 'the
pipes full of water. He ex-
presses the belief that they will
be able to have water to every
patron by Thursday. The water
in this hole is clear and appar-
ently as good as can be had any-
where, but Mr. Martin states
that those who are afraid it might
not be pure can take precaution
by boiling it before using.

At a special meeting of the
City Council Monday the written
report of Mr. Hawley, the water
expert, was received. It was
substantially the same as pub-
lished in The Standard recently,
with the exception that the dams
would cost but \$7,000. The
water committee recommended
that Mr. Hawley's report be re-
ceived, whereupon the council
appointed a committee consist-
ing of J. F. Montgomery, W. D.
Crothers and F. M. Richards to
secure options on sites for the
dams and pumping stations, and
also a committee consisting of
A. B. Reagan, J. W. Matthews
and S. A. Conley to draw up and
circulate petitions for the bond
election.

As soon as the petition can be
formulated and the necessary
signatures obtained the City
Council will call the election.

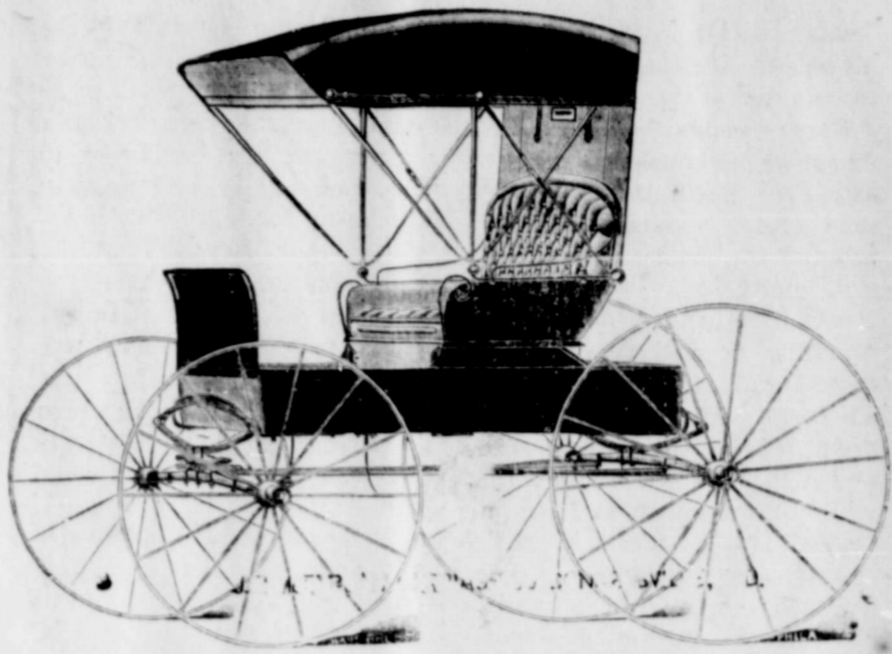
