ELECTION MARCH 25TH

City Council Sets Dates for Voting on Water Bonds—\$40,000 Bonds to be Issued.

The City council meeting in regular session Monday, ordered an election to be held Saturday, March 25th, for the purpose of voting on the issuance of \$40,000 water bonds. S. M. McCollum was appointed Presiding Judge; John M. Duke, Assistant Judge; John E. Cooke and C. H. Bradley, clerks.

The water question has long been a serious problem in Brady, and the Council has been working on the solution for some time. The issuance of \$40,000 bonds for the purpose of erecting a series of chain dams on Brady creek seems to be the only possible way to settle the question for all time to come. By means of these dams and the use of a filtering plant Brady will have a supply of water sufficient for a city of 10,000 and as pure as any artesian water. The council has rushed this matter with all possible haste and the date of the election has been set as early as the law would permit.

CAPTURE CATAMOUNT

Monster Specimen Captured Alive and On Exhibition at McCully Co.—To Form Beginning of Menagerie.

The animal was caught by the foot in a steel trap, and being a fine specimen, and practically uninjured, he was purchased by McCully Co., who will let him be the foundation of a menagerie of Texas wild animals. They expect to add wolves, foxes and the various other animals whenever they have an opportunity to pick up a good specimen, and will have them on free exhibition for the benefit of the citizens of McCulloch county, as well as visitors to our city.

A second catamount was captured Monday night by Mr. Crofford in the Shropshire pasture, and has been added to the collection. Both animals are beautiful specimens, and their growls and lightning like thrusts at curious visitors show that they are not far distant relatives of the tiger.

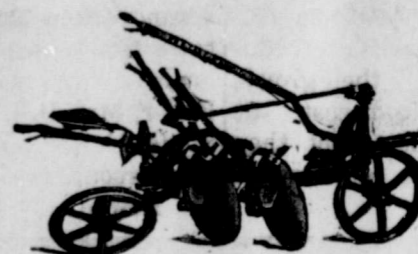


