REGARDING IRRIGATION

Assistant Attorney General Rules Ordinary Flow May Not be Impounded Without Consent of Riparian Owners.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 10, 1911.
Hon. J. T. Hamilton, Representative 88th District, House of Representatives, Capitol.

Dear Sir:—
Your letter of the 7th instant has been received. You say, "Is there any law compelling irrigation plants, companies or individuals to permit the flow of water in natural water courses for domestic use by land owners or citizens along the lower courses of said natural water courses? If land owners or citizens along the natural water courses in this State are amply protected, by our present statutes, I shall be glad to have you cite cases in the Texas courts wherein favorable decisions have been rendered to land owners or citizens."

I beg to advise that Article 3119 of the Revised Statutes provides that all storm or rain waters as described in Article 3116 may be held or stored in dams, lakes or reservoirs built and constructed by a person, corporation or association of persons for irrigation, mining, milling, the construction of water works for cities and towns or stock raising within those portions of the State which by reason of the insufficient rainfall or by reason of the irregularity of the rainfall, irrigation is beneficial for agricultural purposes, may be diverted by the person, corporation or association of persons owning or controlling such dam, reservoir or lake for the purposes named.

This is the theory that riparian owners are not entitled to the use of storm or rain waters as a matter of right and that the person, association of persons or corporation impounding such waters have the right to use all water as impounded.

A different doctrine obtains, however, and is specially provided for in Article 3117 of the Revised Statutes in regard to the ordinary flow or underflow of running waters. This Article reads as follows:

"The ordinary flow or underflow of the running water, of every natural stream within those portions of Texas described in Article 3115 may be diverted from its natural channel for irrigation, mining, milling, the construction of water works for cities or towns or stock-raising; provided that such flow or underflow of water shall not be diverted to the prejudice of the rights of the riparian owner without his consent except after condemnation thereof in the manner as hereinafter provided."

RESIDENCE DESTROYED

Fire Yesterday Morning Destroys Residence Occupied by S. Goldwasser—Defective Flue the Cause.

Fire yesterday morning about 11 o'clock completely destroyed the residence on the north side occupied by S. Goldwasser. The fire boys did valiant service, and succeeded in removing nearly all of the household goods, but were unable to save the building, the fire having had too great headway. The fire originated from a defective flue, and the high wind soon caused the entire building to be enveloped in flames. The work of the fire boys in preventing the flames from spreading and in recovering as much of the household goods as they did is worthy of commendation. Mr. Goldwasser carried no insurance. The house, which was the property of Claud Wallace, was insured with the Brady Loan & Investment Co. for \$1,200.

T. L. Sansom is one of McCulloch county's progressive farmers who signed up with County Demonstrator Love as a co-operator and is enthusiastic over the work as outlined by the government, saying it coincides with the views he has always had of the correct method of farming, and he expects to cultivate his entire crop according to instructions given. Mr. Sansom broke something like 100 acres by himself this spring, plowing as deep as the soil would permit, something like 6 to 8 inches. Some of this land he expects to break the second time. If there is any virtue in scientific farming Mr. Sansom will endeavor to demonstrate it this year.

OFFICIALLY CONFIRMED

New Schedule on Frisco in Effect on Feb. 25th—Through Service Fort Worth to Menard.

The new schedule on the Frisco as announced in last Tuesday's issue was officially confirmed by Agent Hundley Wednesday, the time card being in effect beginning Saturday, Feb. 25th, and is as follows: Southbound—No. 5 leaves Fort Worth 11:00 p. m., arrives Brady 8:00 a. m., leaves Brady for Menard 8:30 a. m. No. 3 leaves Fort Worth 8:00 a. m., arrives Brady 4:15 p. m., stops at Brady. Northbound—No. 4 leaves Brady 9:00 a. m., arrives Fort Worth 5:15 p. m. No. 6 arrives Brady from Menard at 8:30 p. m., leaves for Fort Worth 9:00 p. m., arrives Fort Worth 6:45 a. m.

It will be noted that the through train from Fort Worth to Menard makes a stop of 30 minutes at Brady, also a stop of 30 minutes at Brady on its return from Menard to Fort Worth, for the reason that Brady is the coal-ling station. This gives excellent service both ways. Trains 5 and 6 carry through sleeping car, and arrangements may be made for No. 5 to take breakfast at Brady. Trains 3 and 4 will take dinner at Comanche. This gives this section of our country first class service and by leaving here on train No. 4, connection is made in Fort Worth with the Frisco Hustler for Kansas City, arriving Kansas City 11:15 p. m. next day, also connection is made with the Frisco Texan for St. Louis and all points North and East. Train No. 6 makes connection with the Frisco St. Louis Limited at Fort Worth, also with the Meteor for all Oklahoma points and points North. Connection, according to the schedule, will be made with all lines at Fort Worth. The change in the schedule will cause the daily papers to come in on No. 3, arriving in Brady at 4:15 p. m.

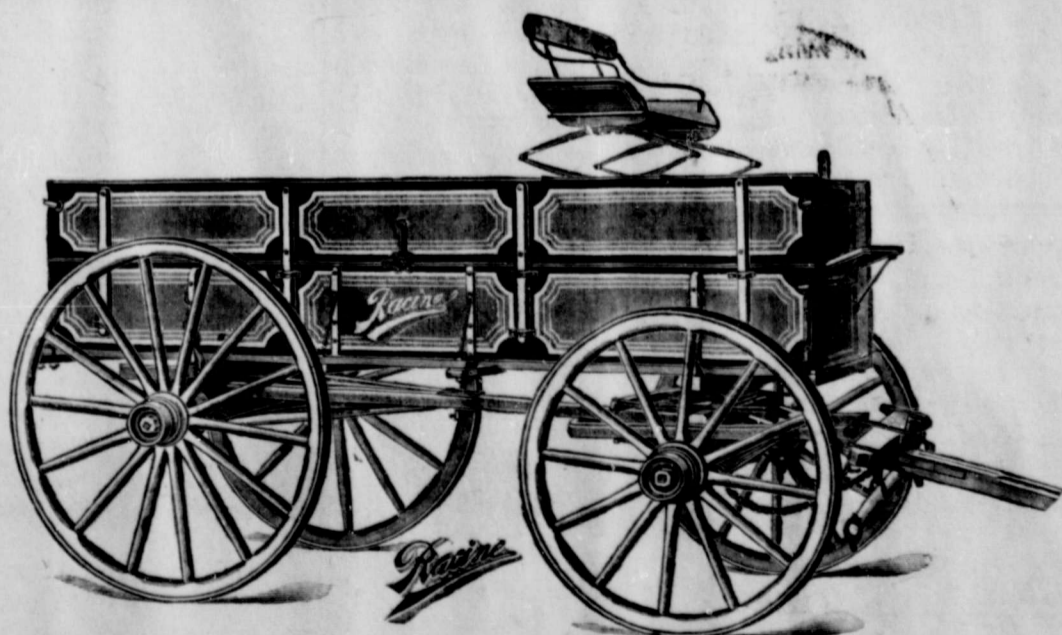

FROM A SANITARY STAND-POINT.

While John B. Hawley, the water expert, was in Brady to make his report to the City Council on the water question, he touched also upon the sanitary feature, remarking that Brady undoubtedly had as splendid natural drainage as any city in the state, and that a complete sewage system could be installed at a comparatively low cost. He was quite enthusiastic over the possibilities in this line, and congratulated our citizens upon having such inestimable advantages.

Brady has been richly endowed by nature, and while The Standard lays claim to already having the cleanest city in the State, yet it is gratifying to know that, as Brady grows and develops, our great natural advantages will, to a great extent, aid the progress while placing no great burden upon the citizenship.

FERTILE McCULLOCH.

There are very few counties in the state blessed with the great variety of soils, capable of producing the great variety of fruits and vegetables, as well as general agricultural products, such as is and can be grown in the soil of McCulloch county. Here can be found the deep sand upon which cotton and corn never fail and especially adapted to fruits, melons and vegetables. Then we have all the mixed soils, from the sand to the heaviest black waxy, all of which are especially adapted to some special plant and generally productive in cotton, cane and milo maize. We need only one thing to make our county an ideal county, and that is development, though this is not possible while the county is a county of large farms and ranches.

The small farmer is the developer of the country and is also the most desirable class of citizens. When the artesian belt of our country is populated with the 40 acre farmer, making an intelligent use of water for irrigation of such products as will find home market and will bring a good profit, then that portion of the country will blossom as a garden and rival the great Pecos country in beauty and wealth.

The Texas Industrial Congress, of which Col. Henry Exall, of Dallas, is president, has offered \$10,000 in gold prizes to the farmers of the state for best yields of corn and cotton from 10 acres of each. This generous offer is also open to the women. For the boys and girls there are some big prizes for the best crops from 2 acres of corn and 2 acres of cotton.

All the roads lead to Brady, but the trouble is that they are not good roads. Vote for the \$75,000 bond issue and put the town in shape to invite trade. Good roads are the open door of the town and the people never fail to go where they are welcomed.

TEXAS produces enough onions to put proper aroma into the salads of the world and we can furnish six onions per capita to every citizen in the United States and then have enough left to give the Texas population one onion each as a souvenir on Onion Day. Whenever the Texas onion makes its appearance in the market it invariably drives out its competitors and rules the market at an advance of 10 cents on the bushel in price.

THE Mexican government continues its semi-occasional announcements that the rebellion in Mexico has been crushed, and that they have the matter under control, while one victory after another is reported to have been gained by the opposition to the government. It may be that the way to crush an insurrection in Mexico is to let it secure control of the country, and thereby, crush it out of existence with responsibilities.

BOTH branches of the Legislature are about to pass the Hudspeth sheep scale bill which provides a penalty of fine and imprisonment for the County Judge and all members of the commissioners court of any county failing to enforce its provisions. Just before passing such drastic measures we recommended that the 32nd legislature adjourn and go home.

TEXAS raised hogs sell at top prices and Texas farmers are following the injunction of the Texas press to "plant hogs" and if the rate of increase maintained during 1910 continues during the coming year practically all the hogs consumed by the packing houses of Texas will be raised in this state.

FIGURES on hogs marketed in Texas show that the campaign of education waged by the press for the raising of more hogs is bearing fruit and more than twice the amount of hogs shipped to the packing houses in Texas during 1910 were Texas raised, whereas those in 1909 were raised in surrounding states.

D. C. Broyles has sold the Mason Herald so S. F. Bethel, who took charge on the 1st. Mr. Bethel resided near Streeter a number of years ago and is quite well known in the Mason community. He is an experienced newspaper man and will, no doubt, give Mason a creditable paper.

IN offering \$10,000 in gold prizes to the farmers of Texas for the best yields of corn and cotton secured this year, the Texas Industrial Congress has inaugurated a campaign for better cultural methods that has never before been equaled in any state in the union.

MENARD climbed into the front seat on the band wagon of progress last week when the bridge bond election carried by a vote of 246 to 93. Editor Callan will now have to concoct some new excuse besides swollen rivers for "seeing things."

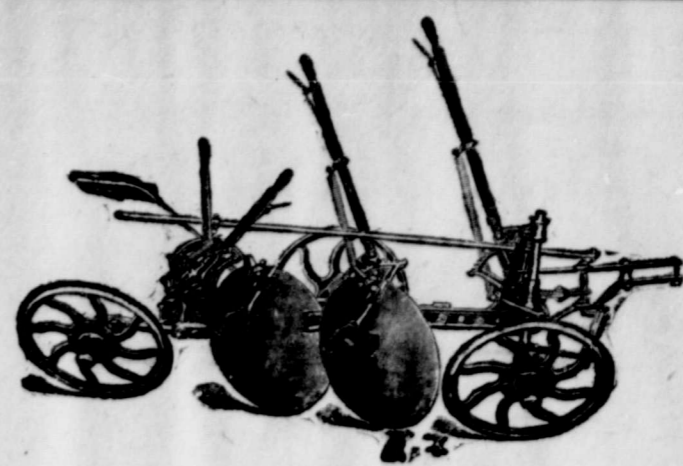

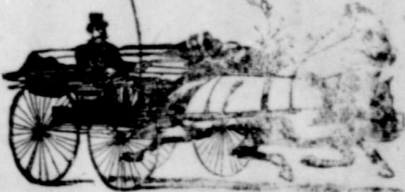

Commercial Corner

It is gratifying to note that the Commissioners court has ordered the election for the road bonds. This question is receiving more attention all over the state than at any previous time in its history. A "Good Roads Measure" has been introduced in the present legislature by Senator Terrell that has three salient features for consideration: First, A highway commission without salary and the employment of a civil engineer at a salary of \$3000 per year and expenses; this office to assist in building roads and bridges. Second, State aid in building roads. Third, Taxing automobiles \$5.00 per year to provide a fund to pay the above named civil engineer and the remainder to assist in the construction of good roads.

Another item indicates the great interest in good construction: It is estimated that Texas counties will during the year of 1911 expend the sum of \$25,000,000 on macadamizing roads! We trust that the good people of McCulloch county will see that the present bond issue carries by overwhelming majority. We need the roads; the farmers above all others need them. Property all along the lines of these roads will be greatly boosted by reason of a good highway.

WITH CLUB DIRECTORS

Commercial Club Good Roads Committee Reports—Secretary Hardison Re-elected for Another Year.

The directors of the Brady Commercial Club yesterday passed a resolution heartily endorsing the Water Bond, and urging every member of the club to use his influence toward the carrying of the election. The directors also expressed their confidence in the ability of the council to have the water, once secured, properly distributed to every part of the city. The directors were unanimous in advocating that every effort be made to secure the carrying of the election. The committee on Good Roads reported that the Commissioners court had created Road District No. 1 and had expressed their willingness to order an election calling for the issuance of \$75,000 road bonds. The committee further reported the petition ready to be presented to the court.

A number of other matters were also taken up by the directors, chief among them being their endorsement of a move to secure a Union station for the Frisco and Santa Fe railroads.

The work of Mr. Hardison as Secretary of the Commercial Club was endorsed and Mr. Hardison was commended for his efforts and the manner in which the welfare of the club had been looked after. Upon motion Mr. Hardison's appointment as Secretary was made for one year.

Secretary Hardison reported on the financial conditions of the club, his report showing a neat sum on hand.
