TEXAS is making rapid strides
in increasing population. In 1836
the first census of Texas was
taken with the following results:
Americans.....30,000
Mexicans.....3,740
Indians.....14,200
Negroes.....5,000

Total.....52,000

We now have 3,896,542 people
and we have all nationalities
and most all languages are
spoken. We have a cosmopolitan
state and every person from an
American Indian to an European
Count can find congenial sur-
rounding in Texas. One county
has not more than twelve people
who can speak the English lan-
guage and only one of the county
officers—the Judge—can speak
American, but as a whole 98 per
cent of our population can speak
English.

Little Bit Helps.

papers about the water question,
and have interested me so
much that I say this because it
caused me to write this

As everybody seems to ad-
mit that we need more water and
that the only obstacle in the way is
distribution question. As for
myself I am satisfied with what
has been given out on the ques-
tion, but I don't expect every-
body to believe as I do.

Everybody knows what was in
the Hawley report, and that is
about all the Council knows at
this time. The committee on
the 7th of March will probably
know more, so let's keep cool and
all pull together for the upbuild-
ing of our town. I say our be-
cause it belongs to every citizen
and not to any one man, set of
men or corporation.

"The Small Tax Payer" seem-
ed to suspicion that this move
was to cripple the Brady Water
& Light Company. I have more
confidence in the citizenship of
Brady than that, but if plenty of
water injures any one man
financially when the health and
prosperity of the balance of the
Brady population is at stake—I
say give us water.

In regard to the A. Lewis mis-
take, let us forget it. I don't
believe there is a man on the
board did an intentional wrong
in that matter, but that is spilled
milk and we cannot profit by
talking and grieving over it.

I believe one dam will hold all
the water we will need in some
time, which leaves \$32,000.00 to
distribute the water, and con-
servatively figuring on the price of
things, it is plenty. I am in
favor of buying anything from
the Brady Water & Light Com-
pany that we can use to an ad-
vantage, at its intrinsic value
set by an expert.

Houston used to be watered by
a private concern, but this is
what they did. Put in a water
works, charged 50c meter rent
and 15c per thousand gallons for
water, and have finally paid back
all meter rents, are making
money and giving their citizens
plenty of cheap water. Houston
is no back number, neither should
Brady be. Lay aside all pre-
judice and let's solve this in a
business way.
