Newest Railroad Town on the Map With Assistance of 5,000 Visitors Celebrates Arrival of Frisco.

Menard celebrated the greatest day in her history last Sat-
urday, when the first regular urday, when the first regular

the track amid cheers, honking autos and tumultuous applause. Four trains carried excursionists into the city, the first being the Brady special, the second was the Brownwood special, the third the Rugular passenger, and the fourth the Fcrt Worth special.
