The jury in the case of State of Texas vs Wesley Spiller last Friday found the defendant guilty of an aggravated assault and fixed his punishment at 30 days in the county jail. While the sentence is very light it carries with it the costs of all the trials.

In the case of Mary Daniels (col) charged with the murder of her husband, the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty."

The case of Jim Smith, alias Yellow Rose, charged with murder, was continued until next term of court.

The Grand Jury returned 38 bills, 8 for felonies and 30 for misdemeanors.

CHIEF ENGINEER DEAD

C. M. Case Dies in Fort Worth Last Friday Following Brief Illness—Prominent in Railroad Circles.

The death of C. M. Case occurred last Friday afternoon at 1:30 at the All Saints hospital in Fort Worth, following an illness of only a few days, death resulting from pneumonia. Mr. Case left Brady for Fort Worth on Saturday, February 25th, in the best of health, going there for the purpose of attending his wife who was at the hospital to undergo an operation for appendicitis.

Mr. and Mrs. Case came to Brady November 1st, 1909, Mr. Case being the Chief Engineer in charge of construction on the Frisco extension to Menard. Previous to coming to Brady he was Chief Engineer of the Gulf Line of the Santa Fe. He was a native of Ohio, and had been in the railroad business all his life. He was a member of the Fort Worth Elks lodge. The remains were shipped to Chicago for burial Saturday night. His wife, who was very low at the time of his death, was not informed that he had passed away. Jack Brannum received a message this (Tuesday) morning stating that Mrs. Case was doing nicely and would be able to leave the hospital Thursday.

Mr. Thos. Yates, of Dubuque, Iowa, succeeds Mr. Case. Mr. Yates has also been here since the work first commenced, being Resident Engineer in charge of

the 2nd Residency out of Brady under Mr. Case.

Concerning the death of Mr. Case, the Fort Worth Record has the following to say:

"The death of C. M. Case, chief engineer of construction on the Frisco railway, at All Saints' hospital in Fort Worth Friday afternoon closes the career of one of the most prominent railroad builders in the southwest. He completed his last railway project, the extension of the Frisco from Brady to Menard, only six days ago, and returned to Fort Worth in apparently good health, after participating in the celebration which marked the formal opening of the line.

Other notable railway projects in the southwest which he engineered and supervised include the Dallas and Fort Worth interurban line, the Rock Island extension from Bridgeport to Graham, and the Rock Island-Frisco branch from Irving to Carrollton.

Mr. Case came to Texas a number of years ago from the North. After building the Interurban between Fort Worth and Dallas for Stone & Webster, he went to the Rock Island, leaving the service of that company eighteen months ago when the Frisco started plans for an extension south from Brady. He exhibited great skill in all the construction which he engineered, and the splendid condition of the new roads which he turned out is a matter of comment."

DOBBIN'S VALUE.

It has been predicted by many students of practical economy that the invention of improved machinery, the extended application of electricity and the extensive use of automobiles as pleasure crafts and vehicles would eventually reduce the value of the horse as a factor in commerce if indeed it did not drive this faithful animal from the highways to its native pastures, but according to the Federal Agricultural Department reports, Dobbin has not only been holding his own while press agents were predicting his downfall, but has become quite a factor in the high cost of living and he now proudly stands as the foremost member of the nation's stock-yard.

The horse came out of the war valued at \$59.05 and has steadily climbed the ladder of fame until he is now quoted by Uncle Sam at \$111.67 and is the most valuable animal we have except the mule, for which the horse must of course take his share of responsibilities.

WIRELESS UNDER BAN

Offices Raided and United States Authorities Arrest Officials of Texas Fiscal Agency—Fraud is Allegation.

San Antonio, March 1.—John R. Dickinson manager, and William Bomar secretary of the Texas fiscal agency, with offices at Houston and Soledad streets, were placed under arrest this morning at 11 o'clock by United States Deputy Marshal Holloman. On the complaint of William E. Greenaway, a postoffice inspector, United States commissioner R. L. Edwards issued warrants charging a conspiracy to commit a crime against the United States in the operation of a scheme to defraud by use of the mails in violation of section 5440 and 5480 of the United States statutes. Both men were immediately taken before the commissioner and furnished temporary bonds, Dickinson in the amount of \$2,000 and Bomar in the sum of \$1,000 for their appearance at a preliminary hearing Monday morning.

For the last three weeks postoffice inspectors have been at work on the case and in that time have gathered a mass of evidence. Greenaway, who is stationed at Louisville, Ky., has been a leading figure in all the raids made upon wireless companies, and he stepped in here quietly with Inspector Emmens Rolfe of Fort Worth early in February. Also working on the case is R. C. Clark, an inspector stationed here.

The government's witnesses for the larger part will be residents of other parts of the state. From these have been obtained circulars, copies of the prospectus of the wireless companies, receipts for stock and other documents that will be used in the case. It is not probable that more than four or five witnesses will testify in the preliminary hearing.

Inspectors of the postoffice department will be in the city until the middle of next week at least. If any further action is contemplated it is being kept under cover until such time as the officials believe the public should know about it.—Fort Worth Record.

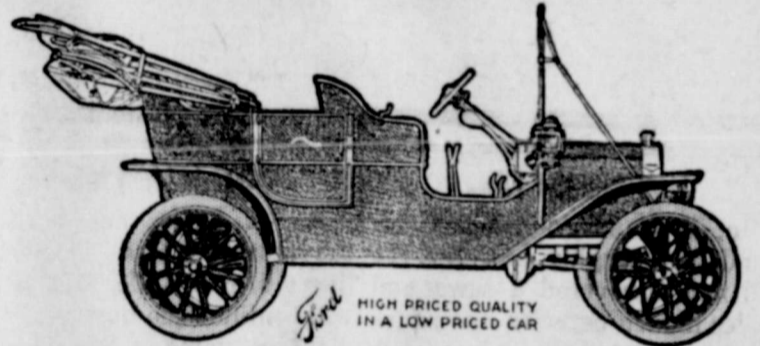
