THE ROAD BOND ISSUE

Some Pertinent Facts Regarding the Bonds by the Secretary of the Brady Commercial Club.

On the 25th of this month we are called upon to vote for or against a road bond issue of \$75,000.00 to be paid in forty annual installments with interest at five per cent. The road district, as has been stated in previous articles, is ten miles wide and twenty miles long, with Brady as nearly the center as possible. The object of the road bond issue is to make Macadam roads of standard width, reasonable grades and as nearly permanent culverts as can be made with the material we can procure.

There are some objections urged against the bonds. It is the purpose of this article to call attention to these questions and honestly state what is intended to be done.

First, there are those that think that the money asked for in this issue will be inadequate to build the roads to the limits of the district. They tell me that there will be a few roads out of Brady finished, and then it will require another bond issue to finish the roads to the road limits. This matter has been carefully discussed by many interested parties, experts consulted, and men have gone over the ground; and without a single exception it is the opinion that not only will we have enough money to build our roads as we want them, but there will be money left in the treasury after the work is done. The Brownwood road man has stated that we have better road beds than Brown county and far more material and more convenient to the road beds, making it cheaper to construct than in most any county in the state. So that matter is not a just one to urge against the bond issue.

Second, there are those who state that the automobile men are behind this proposition, and when the roads are finished out on a radius of four or five miles the work will stop and those that have the taxes to pay will not get the benefit promised at the beginning. Allow me to state the intention of the promoters of the bond issue. It is the purpose and business of the County court and the Brady Commercial Club to see that when a road is started to finish same to the limit, as stated from time to time. That is the only way to give satisfaction. It is now the intention of the men behind this matter to see that justice is done.

Third, some claim that so much is asked for that the taxes will be so high that it will prove a hardship on the property owners. We have carefully gone over the ground in that matter also. If this article was not so long, we could show you beyond a doubt that the cost of the roads will be very cheap to all tax payers. Suffice it to say that those who pay upon tax rendition of \$5,000.00 not more than four or five dollars will be for taxes for roads that will be worth many times that amount to him for convenience and many times more in the raise of land values. In our next issue we will be prepared to give the exact rendition of the road district and the exact amount that will have to be paid to create a sinking fund and to pay the interest.

Quite a number of our farmers know the condition of the roads in Brown county before the con-

structions of the good roads there by the bond method. A number of men who were unalterably opposed to the bonds have become ardent advocates of them since the roads have been opened to the public. I wrote a few days ago to Secretary D. F. Johnson relative to the campaign they inaugurated to carry their bond issue through. His letter is a private one, but knowing his character as I do—that he is always anxious to do good, I will take the privilege to copy an excerpt for the benefit of our readers:

"In reply to your letter of the 1st, beg to state that when we voted our first bond issue of one hundred thousand dollars, we conducted a school house campaign and a personal campaign, not soliciting a vote, but explaining to every citizen just what it would cost on the hundred dollars and as nearly as we could tell what the roads would cost per mile.

"We also showed them that the average farmer would pay out more every year in the way of taxes for blacksmith repairs, breaking of vehicles and harness, and extra horse feed, than the taxes would cost them in five years.

"If any man was unalterably opposed to the measure, we never argued with him, but conceded his right of opinion the same as ours. I would suggest that you get a committee of farmers to come to Brownwood, go over the roads and see what they are, what is being done and what has been done.

"I know of one instance where one farmer had some six thousand pounds of pecans on which he was offered a certain price to get them here by eleven o'clock to be placed in a car that had been sold; if he failed to get them here by that time, he would have gotten one cent less per pound. As he could travel all the way over the good roads,

he place the entire load on one wagon and got here on time, thus saving sixty dollars, enough to pay his taxes for two years.

"While our roads are still incomplete, I do not believe there is a man who would sell them for the use in a single year for all that it may cost them in forty years.

"Mr. I. N. Evans, who lives 12 miles south and whose annual taxes are about \$30, says that if he had no hauling to do, he would most cheerfully pay the taxes, as he believes his life will be prolonged enough by having to travel over the roads to

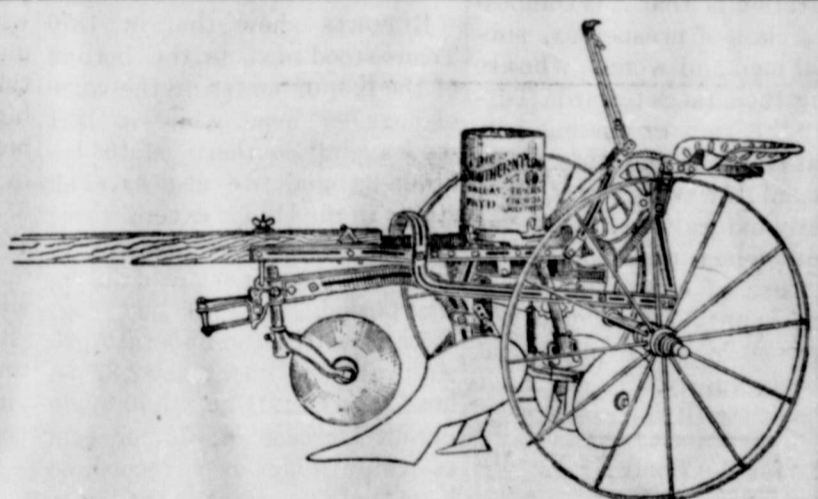

HELP BRADY GROW.

THE little town of Mercury has been handicapped since its birth because of its limited supply of water, but the enterprising citizens got together and paid over two thousand dollars for a deep well which rewarded them with an abundant supply of pure water. If Mercury people can afford cash to secure water for their town it does seem that Brady could afford to bond herself for water. Let us follow the example of Mercury and get together on this possible solution of the water question and do it promptly on March 25th. There are two ways to have water handy, one way is to go to the water and the other is to bring the water to us. If we fail to bring the water to us it would be well for us to calculate the cost of going to the water. If we fail in this essential matter we will be virtually destroying ourselves and diminishing our own wealth.

HELP Brady Grow.

THE immigration movement towards Texas is assuming larger proportions every day, and practically every important railroad whose lines extend into Texas are running special excursion and homeseekers trains into the state. A pleasing feature of our immigration is that it is composed of a class of prosperous, substantial men and women who are turning their faces towards Texas with the view of making permanent homes in the state. The movement towards Texas is a perfectly natural one, as Texas presents golden opportunities to every class of citizenship. McCulloch county's wonderful resources should be exploited at every opportunity, for we have the homes for the homeseekers.

VOTE for the Bonds.

THE construction of good roads will go a long way towards solving the problem of keeping the young men on the farm, which is a question that is receiving much attention at this time. It

is not hard work that drives the young people from the farm to the city, nor is it the allurements of the city that entices them away from the old home down on the farm, so much as it is the isolation of farm life that discourages the boy in the rural districts. The building of good roads, besides checking this exodus from the farm to the city will add thousands of dollars to the value of contiguous property and will give quick returns for the money invested.

WATER in abundance.

TEXAS has 400 miles of Gulf Coast and 2,000 miles of inland waterways susceptible to navigation. Texas ports rank among the first in the South and a large per cent of the commerce of the South is carried on through Texas ports. According to statistics furnished by the Manufacturers Record of Baltimore, exports passing through Texas ports in 1910 amounted to \$216,744,870, an increase of \$196,370,271 during the past two decades; imports through Texas ports amounted in 1910 to \$15,456,709 which is an increase of \$13,080,016 during the past two decades. A pleasing feature is that in several instances, Texas ports which were not opened to commerce when the last census was taken, are now among the leading sea ports of the South.

GOOD Bridges In the County.

THE public schools of Texas are on a higher plane of efficiency and are enjoying an era of greater prosperity than ever before in their history. The extension and improvement of our rural schools during the past few years is an important step made by our educational system and reflects great credit on the people of this state. The spirit of co-operation among all educational forces of Texas has created an educational atmosphere which has tended to give strength and impetus to the movement for better schools and for the highest type of citizenship.

AND Good Roads to the Bridges.

REPORTS show that in 1870 Texas stood next to the bottom of the list of states in the value of hogs per head, while in 1911 we leave all Southern states behind us and we also excel all states in the Union except three in the per cent of increase in value of hogs per head during that period. In 1870 our hogs were valued by the Federal Agricultural Department at \$2.87 per head, and in 1911 at \$7.70 making an increase of 373 per cent in value which is a record on hogs that few states in the Union can equal.

BOOST for a Bigger Brady.

THE Government Census Report on cotton ginned places the

1910 crop for the United States at 11,254,115 bales against 9,787,592 bales for 1909, making an increase in production of 1,436,523 bales over last year. Of the 1910 production Texas furnishes 2,912,244 bales, and of the increase in production we show 534,650 bales. When we enter the realm of King Cotton Texas is a power that must be reckoned with. We have just had a statewide rain and the prospects for a bumper crop in 1911 look bright.

VOTE for the Water Bonds.

THE Menard Messenger has heralded its abundance of water so profusely that we looked through every item of the Congressional Appropriation bill expecting to find a few millions appropriated for deep water at Menard. But to our disgust we found that editor Callan had shed his sweetness on desert air as far as Congress is concerned.

AND Bridge Bonds too.

SENATOR CULBERSON voted for the expulsion of Senator Lorimer and Senator Bailey for his retention. Thus Texas is not blamable if Lorimer bribed votes to get into office and is not responsible if he was accused falsely because as a State it did and didn't stand for his removal.

LET Brady Grow.

THE Brady Fair Association is now collecting a lot of stock subscribed two years ago, and is preparing to make the fair this fall a great deal larger and better than ever before. Every farmer should plant some plant or breed some animal or fowl for exhibit at the county fairs. It pays both the fair promoters and exhibitors.

The University tax bill has passed authorizing a levy of 4 cents which shall be divided between the University and the A & M college, the former getting 2:45 and the latter the remainder. This levy will raise approximately \$800,000 per annum.

GOOD roads are winning a permanent place in popularity with the farmers and no community is considered progressive that has not improved its public highways. Vote for the road bonds and place your community in the progressive class.

GRAND old McCulloch will don her glad rags this fall and Brady will tender her a swell reception all during the visit of King Cotton and his attendants. The invitations will extend to all neighbors.

We are still anxious about the full scope of Taft's reciprocity bill. Can we trade a fake discoverer of the north pole without making an indemnity bond that he was the first north pole discoverer.

THE purpose of a Commercial Club is to promote the prosperity of a community, and no city is up-to-date unless it can boast a live commercial club. Help to boost Brady by joining the Brady Commercial Club.

Grand Jury Report.

Brady, Tex., March, 1911. To the Honorable Jno. W. Goodwin, District Judge:

We, your Grand Jury impaneled for the February Term, 1911, of your Court, beg to submit the following as our report:

We have been in session twelve days, have investigated all violations that have been brought to our knowledge and have returned into your court 8 true bills for felonies and 30 true bills for misdemeanors. We have had summoned before us something over three hundred witnesses and while we find considerable violations of misdemeanor law, we find that most of these violations are committed by transients.

We are glad to say that we find our county almost clear of cattle theft and violation of the Local Option Law. We find that the different officers have been very diligent in the enforcement of the law of every nature.

We have visited the county jail and find seven prisoners confined in jail. We find the prisoners well cared for and the jail well kept. We suggest that there is very much need of an iron door in the partition wall leading from the jailer's quarters to the main entrance to the jail.

We also find some repair is very much needed on the plaster of the jail walls, as the same is cracking and falling off in several places.

We find the courthouse and grounds in fairly good condition with the exception of some repairs needed on the walls of the courthouse, and great need of a private toilet for ladies.

We wish to thank your Honor for the advice and information given us in your charge at the beginning of our work, and assure you that same has been of great benefit to us in our labors.

We wish to thank the District and County Attorneys for their assistance as well as all other officers with whom we have been connected in our work. We wish to thank the County Attorney especially for his efforts to render us assistance in our work.

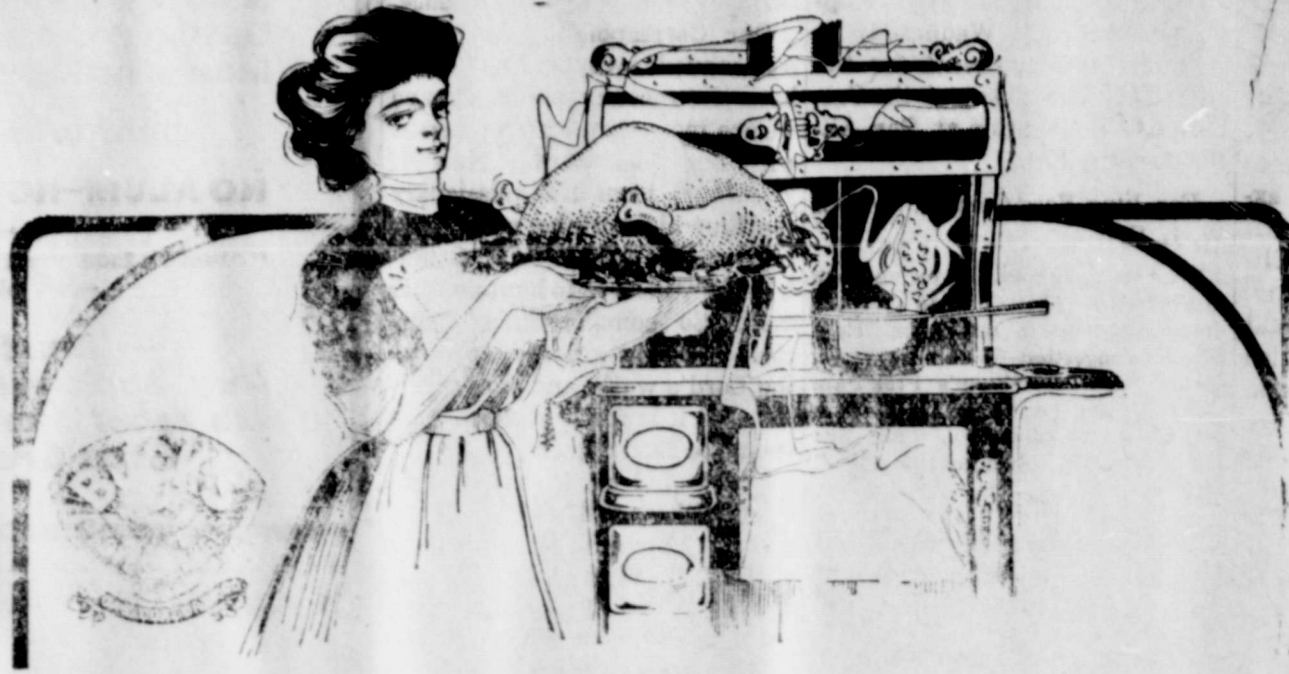
