Splendid Rain.

Nothing could have contributed more to the broad smile already worn by the McCulloch county citizens than the splendid rain that fell for about four hours last Saturday, starting shortly before dinner. The rain fell slowly and steadily, allowing every bit of it to be absorbed. According to the government gauge a total precipitation of 7-10 of an inch was had in Brady. At Waldrip, Fife, San Saba and Katemcy the rain was said to have been even better than in Brady, while at other points it was not quite so good. The rain means much to McCulloch county just at this time, and besides the good it will

do corn, grass and feed stuffs, it will be sufficient to bring up cotton.

Silas Mayo returned Saturday night from his farm near Waldrip where he has been the past few weeks. He reports an even better rain at Waldrip than he had here, the water filling all the ponds, and even standing in the plowed fields. In the Lohn community and until about four miles out of Brady the rain was not so heavy.

\$24,960 WATERWORKS

Jacksboro Lets Contract for Complete System of Waterworks Including Powerhouse, Mains, Etc.

Jacksboro, March, 18.—At a recent meeting of the city council of this place a contract was let to W. C. Shaw, of Lawton, Okla., to install a complete system of waterworks here. The contract price was \$24,960 and provides for powerhouse, standpipe, four miles of water mains, fire plugs, etc. Some months ago the wells were drilled and after an exhaustive test, they show a supply of fine artesian water sufficient for a city of 10,000 people. Work will begin at once and will probably be completed before August 1.

Brady will have \$23,000 left out of \$40,000 bonds, after building one dam and bringing the water to the square, with which to build a standpipe and distribute the water over town, if such be the course decided upon.

A. B. Carrithers and Judge Adkins were in Eden Friday in the interest of the Brady Land Co. A. B. reports corn up in a number of places along the road. He states also that F. G. Pettibone, vice-president and general manager of the Santa Fe, was in Eden Friday and made a new contract with the Eden railroad committee. The old contract included an obligation on the part of the committee to furnish the Santa Fe with right-of-way through Concho county, while the new contract calls for right-of-way only through Eden, which the committee has already secured. According to several prominent citizens of Eden, Mr. Pettibone practically assured them that Eden would be the Santa Fe terminus for several years at least. Naturally the Eden citizens are quite elated over the new arrangement.

RELIGION IN BRADY.

The Standard has always maintained that Brady was a moral town, and in matters of religion was far ahead of any town of like population in Texas. It is extremely gratifying to us to note how well our point of view was substantiated less than two weeks ago when this city carried off the honors at the State Sunday School Convention at Fort Worth. Brady had the largest delegation at the convention, traveling traveling the greatest distance to get there—a fact which elicited much favorable comment among the church workers of the state. Another instance of Brady's interest in spiritual as well as material things was witnessed last Friday night when a religious lecture for which it was necessary to buy tickets of admission completely routed a widely advertised mass meeting of citizens who had expected to discuss the good road and water bonds, and for which several speakers from out of town had been secured.

WHO MAY VOTE.

In the forthcoming election, any man is eligible to a vote who pays taxes upon any article of property whatsoever, be it furniture, a watch, pistol, bank stock, or anything of a taxable value.

If you can't pull for Brady, go way back to the rear—and push.

It is with genuine pleasure that we note in the last issue of our esteemed contemporary, The Brady Sentinel, the firm stand they have taken for the bonds—both the road and water bonds. Always conservative, and given to mature reflections upon any matter of public interest before it takes any stand, its action always carries with it the weight of honest conviction. Get this paragraph from The Sentinel's editorial in favor of the water bonds: "There should never be a shadow of a doubt in the mind of any well wisher of our town as to the necessity of plenty of water. Those who have devoted a life time to the solution of water problems have told us that we can have it. Why put our crude and limited knowledge in opposition to theirs? Could they afford to risk their reputation as experts when there is all to lose and nothing to gain? We want something more than water to drink and wash our dish cloths. VOTE the water bonds and give your town good water and plenty of it."

The City of Hamilton recently voted the saloons out, but on last Saturday Justice Precinct No. 4 of Hamilton county voted against prohibition by a majority of 53. The precinct adjoins the county line and is about six miles from the city of Hamilton. Two saloons will be opened immediately.

RUNNELS County went dry last Thursday by a vote of 1506 for and 1170 against. Only five boxes in the county gave a majority against prohibition.

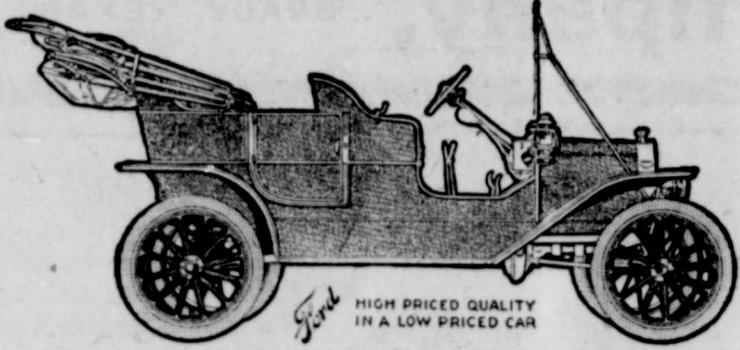

LETTER FROM HAWLEY

Covers Questions Raised at Recent Mass Meeting Regarding Creek Bed Holding Water and Riparian Rights.

At the recent mass meeting on water bonds, someone took the position that holes on Brady creek would not hold water, and another that the law would not protect the city water from use by private parties, who desired to pump it out.

The following letter from our water expert should satisfy every one on these points:

Ft. Worth, Tex., Mar. 8, 1911.
Mr. Jeff Montgomery,
Brady, Texas.

Dear Sir:

Yours 8th inst. I have looked up the law on the subject you mention and find it to be in the volume reporting enactment on the 24th Legislature, page 21 and 27.

It is quite possible that the lawyer friend to whom you refer has overlooked this particular legislation. The act gives special prominence to the right of the first person, firm or corporation, to the use and benefits of all waters impounded and stored for irrigation or water works purposes and I am greatly inclined to believe that the law means what it says. To make the point more clear, I believe that when your city has built a proper dam, catching and storing the waters of Brady creek, these waters are yours except for ordinary domestic use and ordinary stock use, such as any ordinary land owner might have needed or used prior to your building of a dam or dams.

When your own attorney investigates the law mentioned he will doubtless find that you will have to, by negotiation or condemnation arrange for such riparian rights as owners of land along the river banks may have, but your city being the first to impound and store the waters for useful purposes will have the first call on everything except what owners might show they had been accustomed to use before the building of your dam.

You need not be at all alarmed about the water holes in your creek going dry. At a certain point where nothing but gravel banks separate water holes, these holes drain one into the other, but your own knowledge of the situation will certainly convince you that the main holes which were full of water after the two years' drouth whose lower ends were stopped by ledge of good rock did not fade away.

I trust that the foregoing remarks have covered the questions submitted to me in your letter, but if necessary please feel at perfect liberty to write or telephone me for any assistance that I may be able to render you in getting the water works proposition fairly and squarely before your people.

The Law referred to above is too extended to quote here. See amended Sec. 10-11 and 19, Chap. 23, page 27, Acts 24th Legislature. It will convince any one who cares to be convinced that the city water is amply protected for the city's use.

Someone has stated the phrase "Purchase and construct a system of water works," appearing in an election order would force the city to build one system and in addition buy the present water system.

The phrase does not read "purchase a system of water works and construct a system of water works," it reads "purchase and construct a system [meaning of course one system] of water works." The phrase simply gives the city the right to purchase material and construct a system of water works. Or the city would be allowed to buy the present system.

The Attorney General of Texas has approved the election order for the city which fact will satisfy every one in favor of water bonds for Brady.

In a former letter Mr. Hawley says: "Should you find it proper to build simply one dam for present use [enough for 5000 people] and leave off filter, as

suggested in your letter, the \$23,000 remaining would certainly enable you, at present cost of cast iron pipe, machinery, etc., to build a pretty good plant [complete] of your own, covering about same territory as the present water system." But he advises buying all available parts of the present water system if it can be done at a reasonable price, and every man in town seems to be in favor of doing that on proper price and terms. But in case it should not be possible for the city to trade with the water company, Mr. Hawley says, \$40,000.00 is enough money to put in a complete water system owned by the city.

Brady MUST have water in order to grow and it is up to the city to get this water. In fact every piece of property in the town will go down in value unless we get plenty of water. On the other hand an adequate supply of water for the city would increase the value of all property in Brady.

I am for water bonds because I am for Brady. As I see it property owners cannot afford to fail in the matter of providing an abundant water supply, and I am sure that they are determined to succeed.

Desiring to get Mr. Hawley's letter in Tuesday's paper, I did not have the opportunity to take the matter up with the water committee. I am therefore issuing this statement on my own responsibility.

The water committee has kept nothing back. All of Mr. Hawley's conclusions have been given to the public in a recent statement by the committee approved by the city council. We want everyone to know all available facts. Of course details will have to be worked out later.
