A GOV'T ROAD EXPERT

Letter from U. S. Department of Agriculture Offering to Furnish Engineer to Supervise Road Building.

One of the most important announcements in connection with the road bond issue is made this week by Secretary Hardison of the Commercial Club to the effect that the U. S. Government will send an engineer to superintend the construction of the roads for which \$75,000 worth of bonds were recently voted.

The following letter from Acting Director Sargent of the Office of Public Roads, Department of Agriculture, is self-explanatory.

Washington, Apr. 5.

Mr. D. R. Hardison, Secretary, Commercial Club, Brady, Texas.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of March 27, I am enclosing a blank form upon which application should be made for an engineer to superintend the construction of an object-lesson road. You will note that this application must be signed by the officials having legal control over the roads which it is intended to improve, they agreeing to furnish all labor, teams, materials and necessary machinery, while this Office will supply an engineer to superintend the construction.

If the application is signed and forwarded to this Office immediately, it is probable that we can send an engineer within a very short time. I suggest that you have the application signed at once and wire me to that effect, Government rate collect, as it seems probable that we can send an engineer right away, and I wish to know immediately, in order to make our arrangements.

Secretary Hardison at once wired that the application would be signed and forwarded in due time. As will be noted in the letter there will be no charge whatsoever made by the Government for the services of the engineer furnished, and the only expense involved will be his livery hire. Inasmuch as the best offer previously made by any engineer for his services in superintending the construction of the road was 5 per cent of the amount to be expended, this offer of the Government means a saving of \$3,750 at the very outset—more than enough to put three miles of road in first class condition. A further advantage is that it being an object road building is assurance in itself that the work will be done right.

Too much cannot be said in praise of Secretary Hardison's successful efforts to secure this assistance from the Government. From the time the road bonds were first talked of, he has been at work in an endeavor to secure government aid, and quite naturally he feels elated over his success.

The securing of a Government road expert has converted many opponents of the road bond issue, and with the beginning of road building in Precinct No. 1, we feel sure that the good roads movement will find unanimous favor in all parts of the county, and within the next few years McCulloch county will be renowned for the excellence of her roads.

P. Burleson, Justice of the Peace, in the town of Mercury in said Precinct No. 5, on the 4th Monday in April A. D. 1911, the same being the 24th day of April A. D. 1911, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 24th day of March A. D. 1911, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 62, wherein R. W.
