Not to be outdone, the local lodge of Odd Fellows at their last meeting decided to place Brady in the contest and see if they could not land the plum. A committee composed of J. E. Shropshire, J. C. Wall and John H. Moore was appointed to have charge of the campaign, and take up the matter with the Brady Commercial Club and secure its endorsement and assistance.

Mrs. Mary M. McKnight.

Mrs. Mary M. McKnight died last Saturday at the home of her son, S. E. McKnight, at Lohn, her death occurring suddenly and unexpectedly from an attack of heart failure. The remains were brought to Brady for burial, the funeral taking place Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock from the residence of Dr. J. B. McKnight, and interment being made in Brady cemetery. Rev. D. R. Hardison conducted the funeral services.

Mrs. Mary McKnight was a devout Christian woman, and for more than a quarter century had been a member of the Christian church. She was a woman of noble mind and highest character, one who was loved and esteemed by all, and whose death casts a gloom over many a home in McCulloch county.

Mrs. Mary McKnight, before her marriage to J. P. McKnight was Miss Mary Elkins. She was a native of Tennessee, coming to Texas with her family in 1846. Her husband died in 1882, since which time she has been making her home with her sons, M. B. McKnight of Eldorado, S. E. McKnight of Lohn, and Dr. J. B. McKnight of Brady. She was well advanced in years, having passed the 78 milestone on the 29th of last March.

The sincere sympathy of the many friends and acquaintances of the deceased goes out to those who are left to mourn the loss of this good woman.

Hinsley by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 35th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 35th Judicial District, to appear at a regular term of the Justice's Court of Precinct No. 5, McCulloch County, to be holden at the office of W. P. Bureson, Justice of the Peace, in the town of Mercury in said Precinct No. 5, on the 4th Monday in June A. D. 1911, the same being the 26th day of June A. D. 1911, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 24th day of March A. D. 1911, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 62, wherein R. W. Scoggin is Plaintiff, and J. O. Hinsley and J. M. Egger are Defendants, and said petition alleging that on March 9, 1909, the defendant J. O. Hinsley executed to the plaintiff his promissory note in writing for the sum of \$93.15, due October 1st, 1909, payable at Mercury, Texas, to the order of R. W. Scoggin & Co., with ten per cent interest from date until paid and ten per cent attorney's fees if not paid at maturity and placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, signed by defendant J. O. Hinsley; that to secure the payment of said note said defendant Hinsley, executed and delivered to plaintiff, his chattel mortgage lien in writing, of even date with the execution of said note, on one double-side spring buggy, one black cow about nine years old branded 31 on left side; one red two year old heifer unbranded, also increase of said cattle; one mouse colored mare mule five years old and branded 32 on left thigh, about 14 1/2 hands high; also the third bale of cotton raised by said defendant during the year 1909. That at the date of said note and mortgage plaintiff was doing business in the name of R. W. Scoggin & Co., but plaintiff is the sole owner of said business and plaintiff is the sole owner of said note and mortgage lien, aforesaid. That the defendant J. M. Egger has secured possession of said mortgaged property above described and is asserting some character of claim there-to. Said note credited with a payment of \$34.00 paid on December 14, 1909. MASON WANTS FRISCO

Committee of Mason Citizens Impartune
Chairman Yoakum of the Frisco for
Extension to Their City.

A committee of Mason citizens, headed by A. N. Moursund, and W. D. Crothers, of Brady, left on last Friday night's train for Fort Worth where early Saturday morning they routed B. F. Yoakum from his sleep in his private car to petition him for an early extension of the Frisco from Brady to Mason. Mr. Yoakum listened attentively to the proposition of the delegation but gave them no definite encouragement.

Mason has subscribed a bonus of \$50,000 for a railroad, and Fredericksburg, which is in line of an extension from Brady through Mason to San Antonio, has a standing bonus of \$150,000 to the first road that is built. The Mason delegation had no definite proposition to offer, however, and they returned to Brady on Saturday's train. A mass meeting of Mason citizens will be held tomorrow at which time it is hoped to reach some definite conclusion in the matter.

The following composed the Mason delegation: J. W. White, Ernest Lemburg, E. O. Kothmann, Max Martin, Will Hoffman, Chas. Bierschwale, A. N. Moursund.

Mr. Crothers, who remained in Fort Worth as a guest of the automobile party that took Mr. Yoakum and other members of his party over the city for a pleasure ride, returned Sunday morning.

We quote the following interview given out by Mr. Yoakum in Sunday's Star-Telegram:

"We cannot say what action will be taken on the Brady-Mason extension. I cannot say whether the road will be built, as the matter has not been considered thoroughly enough. I do not want to create any false enthusiasm on the part of the people who would be affected by the promised line."

"Will the Frisco be extended from Menard to San Antonio," he was asked.

"Not at present, at least. The matter has not been even seriously considered, yet."

Sheriff's Notice of Election.

The State of Texas,
County of McCulloch.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 6th day of May, 1911, at Melvin, in Common School District No. 18 of this county, as established by order of the Commissioners' Court of this county, of date the 2nd day of July, 1884, which is recorded in Book 2, pages 319 to 320 of the Minutes of said Court, and changed in boundary as recorded in Book 5, page 150, at the August term 1906 of the said Commissioners' Court, and as changed in boundary as recorded in Book 5, page 252, at the August Term 1907 of said Commissioners' Court, and as changed in boundary as recorded in Book 5, page 457, at the August Term 1910 of said Commissioners' Court, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax paying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said common school district in the amount of \$8700.00, the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 87, both inclusive, payable 40 years from their date, with option of redemption after ten years, and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in constructing and equipping a public free school building of stone or brick and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Said election was ordered by the county judge of this county by order made on the 6th day of April, 1911, and this notice is given in pursuance of said order.
