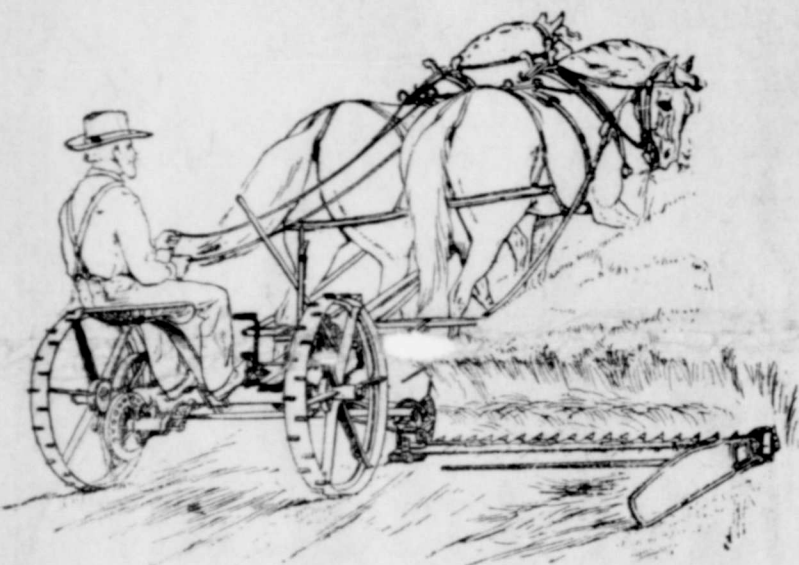

Adds Typesetting Machine  
to Splendid Equipment--Does  
Work of Five Men.

Brooklyn, N. Y., May 13.

a lever when a bell rings notify-

Orleans by taking a thorough  
course in linotype construction,  
erection and care, will install the  
machine and have it in charge.

letter, the machine was shipped  
from the factory at Brooklyn, N.  
Y. on the 13th inst, being carried  
by ocean steamer to New Orleans  
from whence it will come to Bra-  
dy by rail. We confidently ex-  
pect to have it in operation by  
the first of next month.

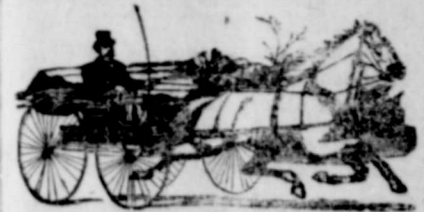

W. R. Rice made his first cutting of alfalfa last week, and says the alfalfa that was planted during the dry spell last fall, and which was most heavily grazed during the winter made the best hay. Mr. Rice has tried both upland and lowland, and is of the opinion that the upland is better for growing alfalfa, but says it will grow anywhere with proper attention. The secret, he maintains, lies in the preparing of the soil. His plan has been to start in July or August and plow the land three or four times, breaking and cross breaking, harrowing and rolling the ground thoroughly to preserve the moisture. The seed must be harrowed in shallow. He says there is nothing can beat alfalfa, and planted in September it makes the finest of feed during the winter months when feed is most needed.

Our last week's issue THE STANDARD presented "Buy At Home" facts from the standpoint of the dealer. This week we quote an article from The Geocors' Magazine illustrating a duty the dealer owes his customer.

A general merchant was disgusted because so many people were buying of mail order houses, and one rancher being concerned the other day was asked about it. The rancher told the merchant that he could do better by buying of the catalogue houses. He then asked the farmer for his order blank and did a little figuring.

"Why," he exclaimed at last, "I could have saved you a dollar and six bits on that bill and delivered at your kitchen and done it right away."

"Why," said the rancher, as much disgruntled as the merchant, "why in the heck didn't you say so before? I never saw any of the goods advertised, so how am I to know? The mail order people send me a catalogue and tell me how the goods look and how much they cost and some of them look good to me. I never see your advertisement anywhere and don't know what you have."

That was, of course, a hard rap. It taught the merchant that unless he displayed his goods and reminded the people of what he had to sell, the goods might just as well be where he bought them.

Print a list of the goods you have to sell once in a while. One reason people send away for goods is because, as in the instance here cited, people don't know you have the goods they want.

## NEWS NOTES OF TEXAS

Compiled by Texas Commercial Secretaries Association

Good roads cost money, but if the roads are properly constructed and the money honestly expended, the investment will prove more than satisfactory and profitable.

With numerous corn clubs over the state to encourage an increased production of corn, it is fitting that the Hog Clubs should follow in order to consume the surplus of corn, and the raising of hogs is one of the most profitable pursuits that the boys of the state to engage in.

Canadian has just sold \$10,000 worth of bonds for street improvements. This money will be used to grade the streets and put in crossings and fifty blocks of cement walks will be built.

Good roads make the consumer's dollar go farther and they put into the farmers pocket a greater portion of that dollar.

Plans have been completed for the paving of the public square at Denton. A combination of crushed rock and bitulithic substance will be used. The services of a landscape gardener has been secured.

Comanche has laid three and a half miles of sidewalks during the past three weeks and as much more has been contracted for.

The Marble Falls precinct of Burnet County will hold an election for the purpose of issuing bonds for building good roads.

Belton has let the contract for the extension of the waterworks on the south side of the city and the building of a new standpipe at a cost of \$11,000.

There is a tremendous demand for Pork Products in the South and Southeast among the states where the farmers have not yet learned to raise their own meat. The clamor of the Texas packing houses for hogs has reached the ears of the Texas farmers and they are planting more hogs, but the Texas farms will have to all be converted into breeding and feeding pens before we can supply the demand.

Good roads have been the glory of the nations of the past and will add to the greatness of our present generation and make us powerful in commerce, industry and in learning and are the most beneficent power that ever blessed progressive humanity.

The localities in the state where good roads have been built are becoming richer, more prosperous and more thickly settled, while those which do not possess transportation advantages are either at a standstill or are becoming poorer and more sparsely settled.

People generally are beginning to realize that road making is a public matter and that the best interests of agriculture demand the construction of good roads and that money wisely expended for this purpose is sure to return.

The haphazard way of attending to the road interests of the different counties is fast disappearing and is superseded by order and system under the supervision of the county highway engineer.

Dispatches from Waxahachie state that the creamery recently established in that city is proving a decided success and the increase in the output of that enterprise since beginning operations has been very remarkable. During the first month the creamery was in operation about forty pounds of butter was manufactured weekly; at this time the weekly output is more than one thousand pounds. Creameries are being established in many parts of the state and in

## BURNT CORK.

The Paste Used by Minstrel Performers When "Blackening Up."

The popular impression as to the application of burnt cork by minstrel performers and actors in general is that it is rubbed on the face and hands of the player from a cork whose end is charred in a convenient gas jet. This impression is, however, incorrect. The burnt cork used by minstrels and others is the product of the theatrical "paint factories," just as is any other cosmetic or pigment employed by the profession.

One house makes it in the following manner: The corks are placed in three tin vessels, resembling wash boilers, with holes punched in their sides and bottom. Alcohol is sprinkled over the corks, and they are "fired." When the corks have been properly charred they are placed in muslin sacks, which are kneaded in barrels of water. This operation forces the powdered charcoal through the sacks into the water.

When all the charred corks have been worked through the sacks into the water in this way the water is drained through a close canvas sack, and what remains in that sack is ready for the performers. The stuff is put up in cans, from which, when the minstrel is ready to "black up," he takes a little of the black paste in his hands and applies it to his face, neck and sometimes his hands.—New York Herald.

## A CURIOUS BIRD.

The Crested Hoatzin When Hatched Has Four Legs.

The crested hoatzin of British Guiana is the only survivor of a certain race of birds most of which are now known only as fossils. The hoatzin inhabits the most secluded forests of South America, and its survival beyond its congeners is doubtless owing to its retiring habits and to the fact that it feeds on wild arum leaves, which give its flesh a most offensive flavor, rendering it unfit for food.

The chief peculiarity of the hoatzin consists in the fact that when it is hatched it possesses four well developed legs. The young birds leave the nest and climb about like monkeys over the adjoining limbs and look more like tree toads than birds.

The modification of the fore limbs begins at once after hatching, when the claws of the digits fall off and the whole clawlike hand begins to flatten and become wing shaped. Feathers soon appear, and before full growth is reached not a vestige remains of the original character.

The adult birds not only have no claws upon their wings, but their thumbs even are so poorly developed that one would hardly suspect that in the nestlings we have the nearest approach to a quadruped found among existing birds.—London Tit-Bits.

## Tung Po and Teamaking.

There is but one way of making tea, for—

Unless the water boiling be  
To pour on water spoils the tea.

The teapot itself should be heated very hot before the tea is placed in it and the boiling water poured on. It should be scalding hot water or the leaves will float to the top.

No less authority than Tung Po, the Chinese poet, is quoted for a recipe for teamaking. He says: "Whenever tea is to be infused take water from a running stream and boil it over a lively fire. It is an old custom to use running water, boiled over a lively fire. That from springs in the hills is said to be best and river water the next, while well water is the worst. A lively fire is a clear, bright charcoal fire. When making an infusion do not boil the water too hastily. At first it begins to sparkle like crabs' eyes, then somewhat like fish's eyes, and lastly it boils up like pearls innumerable springing and waving about. This is the way to boil water."

## "Touch Not the Queen."

Under this title a Paris journal professes to give an account of the tragic death of the queen of Siam, who was as greatly loved as her consort. Some years ago her unjesty was boasting with ladies of the court in a lake in the gardens of the palace at Bangkok. The boat overturned, and the queen could not swim. She was surrounded by numerous personages who could have saved her life, but no one has the right to extend the hand upon the queen. "The king alone could have aided her up and prevented her from sinking, and he was nowhere at hand. Respectfully the court allowed the queen to drown."

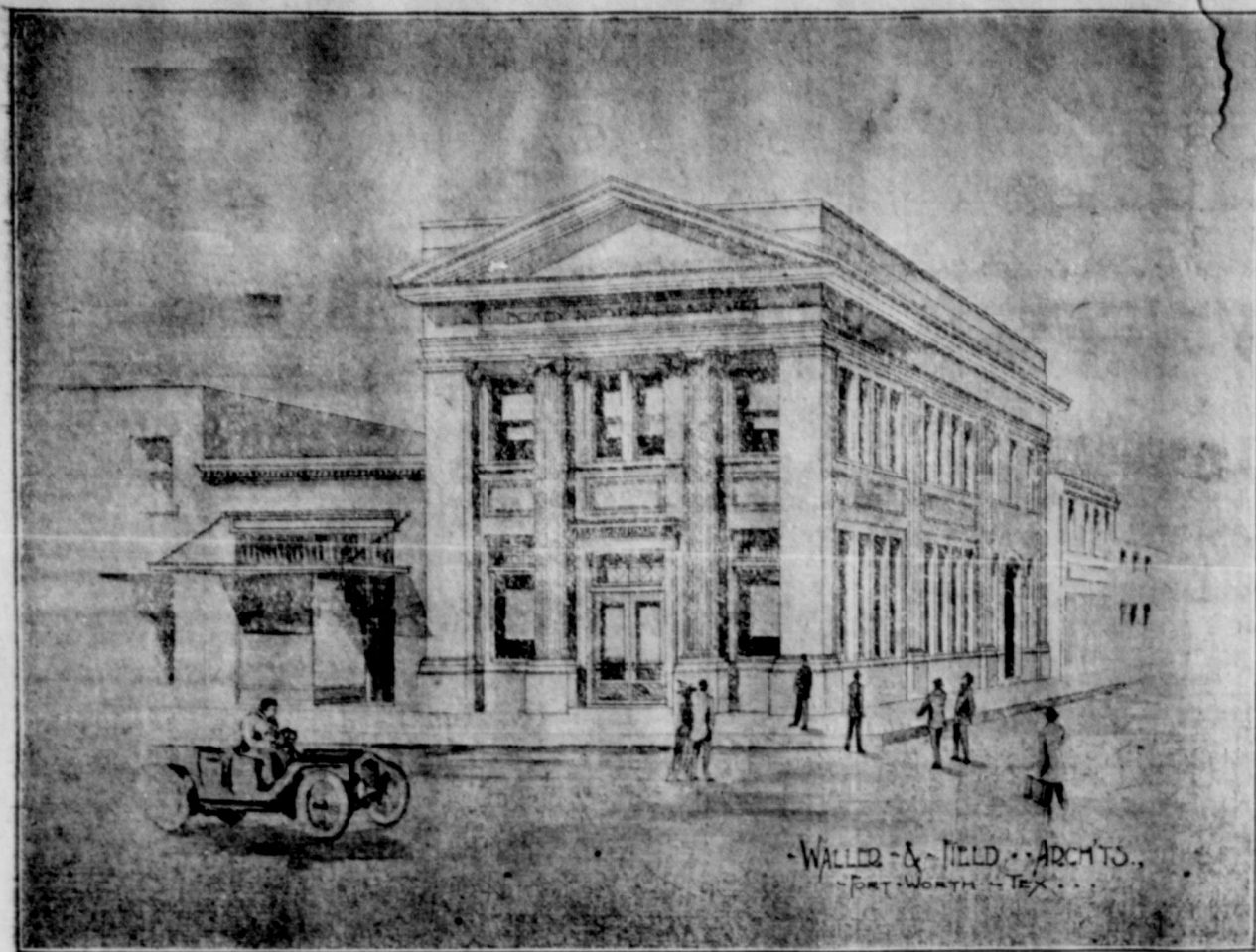
## A Real Pretty Excuse.

# THE NEW BRADY NATIONAL BANK



With the finishing touches being put on the fixtures this week, the Brady National Bank presents a very "at home" appearance in its handsome new quarters, and the officers and directors are receiving the congratulations of their friends and the public in general, for they have planned and built well. The Brady National Bank can without hesitation boast of one of the most modern and up to date banking houses in this section of West Texas.

In the planning of the building, light, comfort and convenience, three most essential features, were carefully considered. Safety, the watchword of the banking fraternity, was another consideration, and the completion of the building shows the foresight of the directors, and how well their plans were carried into execution. The building throughout has been alabastined an attractive green, while the trimmings are white, making a modest yet attractive combination. The windows will be screened with Venetian blinds, shielding the interior from the glare of the sun and the noise of the street.

Through courtesy of Cashier Jeff F. Montgomery, The Standard reporter had the pleasure of thoroughly inspecting the building and of noting the superb arrangement and facilities for taking care of the business. As above stated, convenience has been a keynote in the arrangement of the building and the greatest volume of business may be transacted without unnecessary work or loss of time. At the same time there is no indication of cramped quarters but, on the other hand, comfort, that indispensable adjunct to convenience, is fully in evidence.

In the front of the building a private consultation room has been arranged, Florentine glass windows screening the occupants from view, and assuring privacy in the transaction of business of importance. The cashier's desk is conveniently placed near the front entrance, and adjoining the private consultation room. Immediately behind his desk is the telephone booth with doors opening both on the cashier's side and on the bookkeeper's side, making it accessible to either.

At the end of the lobby is a room cut off for the convenience of customers, and through which access may be had to the customer's side of the vault, and wherein they are at liberty to store for safe keeping valuable papers and documents. On the left hand side of the vault is a passageway leading to the rear of the building where the directors' room is located.

The vault, however, is the feature attraction. The safe it-

self is manufactured of New York manganese steel and is recognized as one of the best in the world. This is surrounded by a vault which is lined with double plates of steel, not only the sides, but the top, floor, door and all being protected in this manner. These sheets of steel are constantly charged with electricity, and any attempt to enter the vault, either through the door, the walls, the floor or the top, at any point, by the use of drills or explosives, or the turning of the door handle or lock, results in the ringing of immense gongs located both outside and inside the building. This electrical device is in duplicate form so that should one part of it fail to work the other would be sure to respond. Any attempt to muffle the gongs by pouring molasses or tar into them merely results in setting them to ringing, so delicately are they adjusted. This same system is used by hundreds of banks all over the United States and has never been defeated.

At some date in the near future, the bank will have "open house," at which time the public will be extended an invitation to visit them and examine the working of this wonderful system of electrical vault protection.

The second story of the bank building is divided into six sets of rooms admirably adapted to office purposes. Each set contains two rooms, and each and every room is well ventilated and lighted, and added to this fact that the entire building is equipped with running water and steam heat, makes them most desirable.

The rental value of the entire building is over \$2000 a year, which not only pays a dividend on the total investment but gives the bank the use of their quarters free, and is another compliment to the foresight of the bank management in the working out of the details of construction.

Through courtesy of the cashier, The Standard obtained a brief history of the bank.

The bank opened for business July 10, 1905, under its present name, with a capital of \$50,000, 18 stockholders, the directors being F. M. Richards, F. W. Henderson, Jno. P. Sheridan, T. J. Wood, and E. E. Willoughby.

The officers at that time were F. M. Richards, president; John P. Sheridan, vice-president; and F. W. Henderson, cashier.

The bank was successful and on February 19th, 1907, the stock holders were encouraged to increase the capital from \$50,000 to \$75,000.

July 1, 1909, F. W. Henderson was elected active vice president of the bank, and Jeff F. Montgomery, cashier. January 1, Mr. Henderson retired from active work with the bank, but contin-

ed as its nominal vice president. Up to this time Mr. Henderson had owned controlling interest in the bank, but sold the larger part of his stock to Mr. Montgomery and the balance of the directors, retaining an equal amount with them.

The rapidly increasing business of the bank encouraged the stock holders to increase the capital stock from \$75,000 to \$100,000 which is its present capital. This was done Feb. 1, 1910.

Practically all of this increase in capital stock was placed among the farmers of McCulloch county, and the bank now has 57 stockholders, and boasts among its stockholders and directors many of the wealthiest, most conservative, yet most progressive citizens of the county.

The present board of directors of this bank are F. M. Richards, F. W. Henderson, John P. Sheridan, T. J. Wood, E. E. Willoughby, Chas. Gray, J. E. Bell, Abner Hanson, and J. F. Montgomery.

The officers are F. M. Richards, president; F. W. Henderson, vice president; T. J. Wood, vice president; J. F. Montgomery, cashier; Clarence Snider, assistant cashier. Added to these are L. P. Cooke and A. F. Lockhart, bookkeepers, and Katherine Proctor, stenographer.

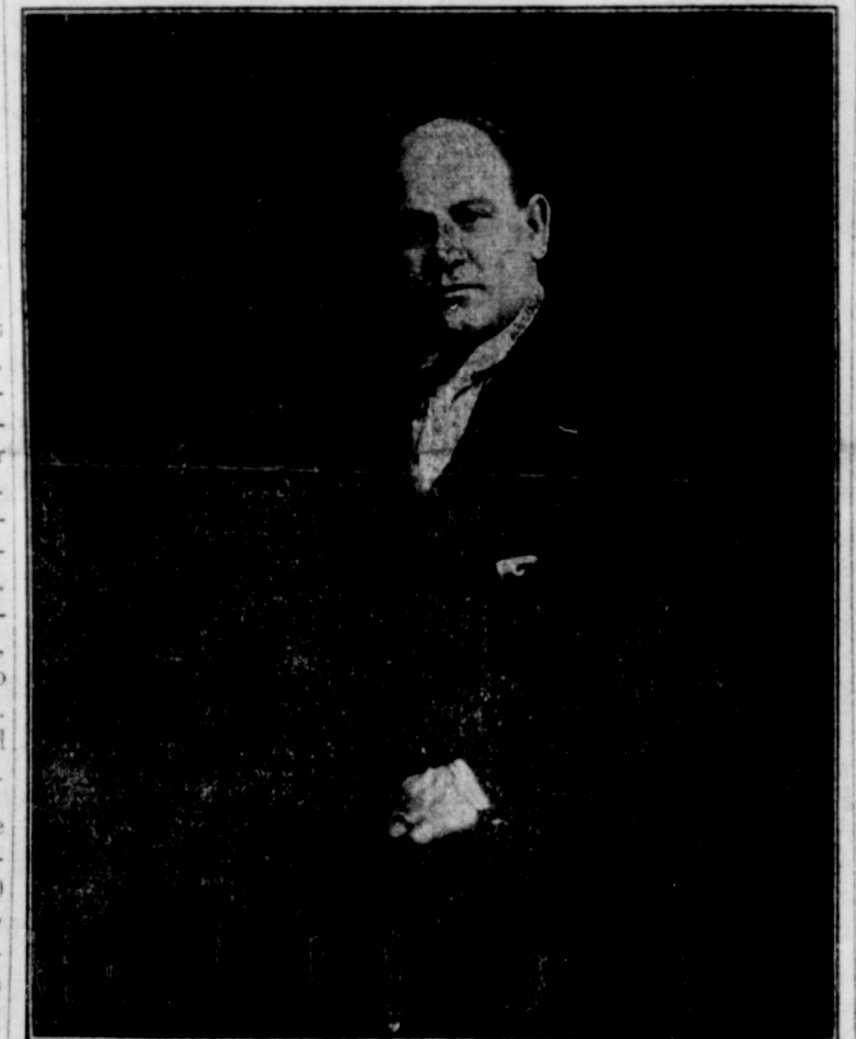

## Texas Corn

Texas is a world's force in agriculture. Withdraw our farm products from the market and the people of two hemispheres will go hungry and shiver with cold. Out of the soil and from the air our farmers take annually nearly a billion dollars of wealth. In plowing the land the Texas farmers walk 330,000 miles per annum, which is equal to traveling around the globe 13,200 times.



1000 VALUE PER ACRE

The chief products of Texas in order of their value, as estimated by the Federal agricultural department for 1910, are cotton, corn, wheat, oats, hay, rice, potatoes, etc. Cotton as the leading product is far ahead of its rivals. Corn occupies second place without challenge. Wheat and oats have been disputing for third place, but the separation this year is so pronounced that there can be no longer any controversy over their respective positions.

An examination of our cereal products dispels the idea that Texas is a one-crop state. In 1910 we harvested 235,000,000 bushels of grain. Although a bushel of oats weighs less than a bushel of any other grain, yet there is some significance in the total quantity of all cereals produced. Our cereal belt is following closely behind the plow as it turns the virgin soil, and we have so far found no geographical limitation placed upon it by nature.

Our corn acreage in 1910 was 8,800,000 and production 181,280,000 bushels and it had a farm value of \$114,206,000. This corn was raised in 127 days, making an average production of approximately \$1,000,000 per day. We raised 20.6 bushels per acre at a farm value of \$12.98 per acre. The corn crop of 1909 and 1910 will purchase the railroads of Texas using the railroad commission's valuation on railroad property.

This giant industry has scarcely begun its development in Texas and the possibilities of extending the corn area and increasing the yield per acre present a wide field for enterprising farmers and there are millions of acres of idle land in the corn belt.

Just as an example of what can be accomplished in poultry raising, we give some data furnished us by J. C. Duff, of O. D. Mann & Sons. Mr. Duff has 50 hens, and in the 17 days that he has had them he has averaged 30 eggs per day. These eggs are disposed of to a grocer, who calls for them at the door, at 15c per dozen, or 37 1-2 per day for the output. Placing the value of the hens at 30c apiece, makes a total investment of \$15.00, from which at the present rate, \$136.87 1-2 worth of products will be derived in the course of a year's time. The \$36.87 1-2c will more than cover the cost of feed in that length of time, which leaves a net profit of \$100.00 on an investment of \$15.00. Looks like a "good thing."

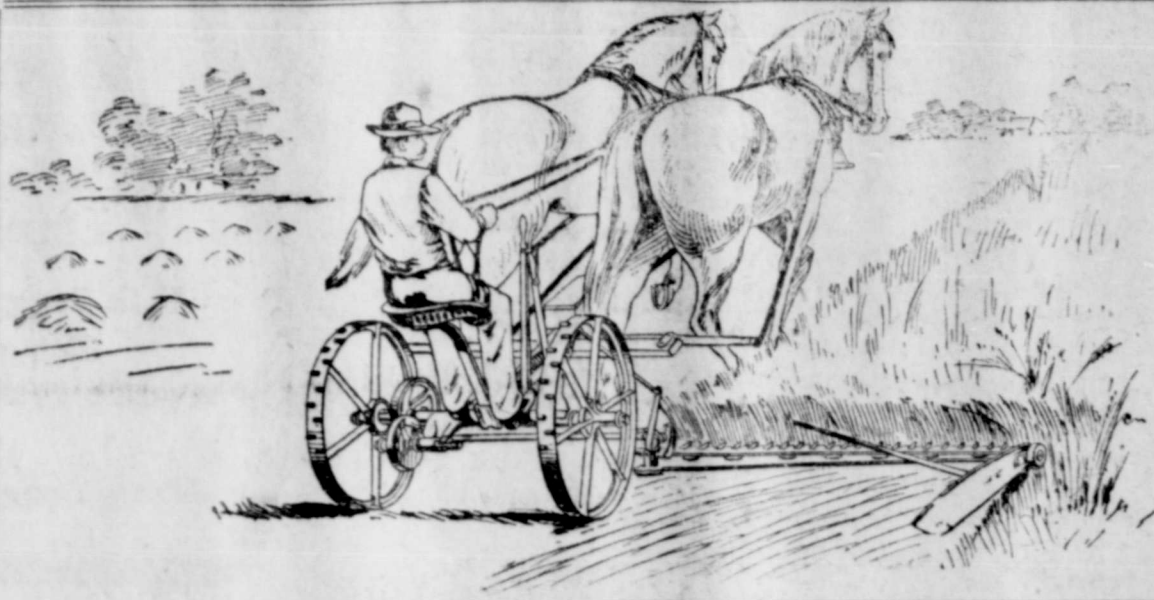
