ALL OF FRISCO'S CONDITIONS ABOUT MET.

Mason Committee Experiences Less Trouble Than Was At First Anticipated.

A phone message to Mason yesterday at noon regarding the meeting held Tuesday for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the contract secured from the Frisco officials in the building of the Frisco extension to Mason, secured the information that the committee was making splendid progress in the work of securing the right-of-way, and of getting the signers of the bonus to extend their notes the required six months, and in fact they were experiencing little or no trouble in securing the change.

It is announced that practically all the right-of-way has been secured, and the committee has been authorized to sign the contract as soon as they have secured the required bonus, which is thought it will be but a few days. The heaviest contributors to the bonus were Martin & Son, who swelled the list with a contribution of \$8,000.

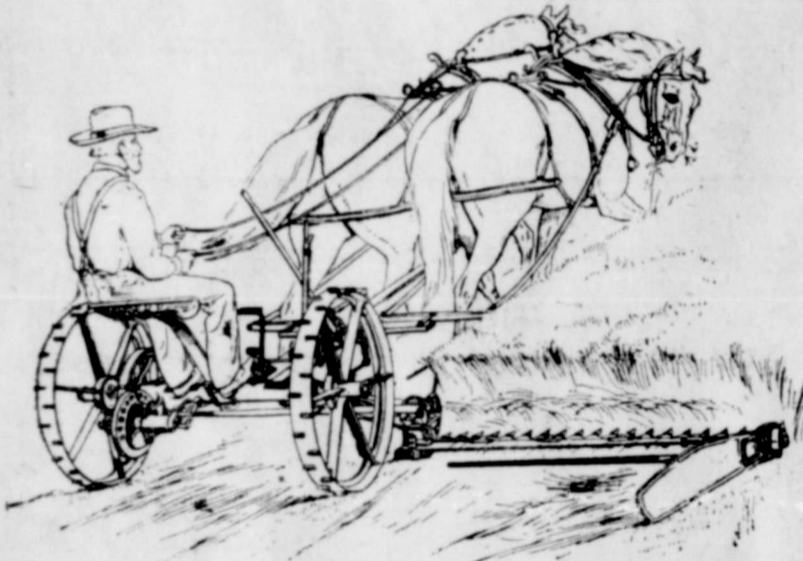

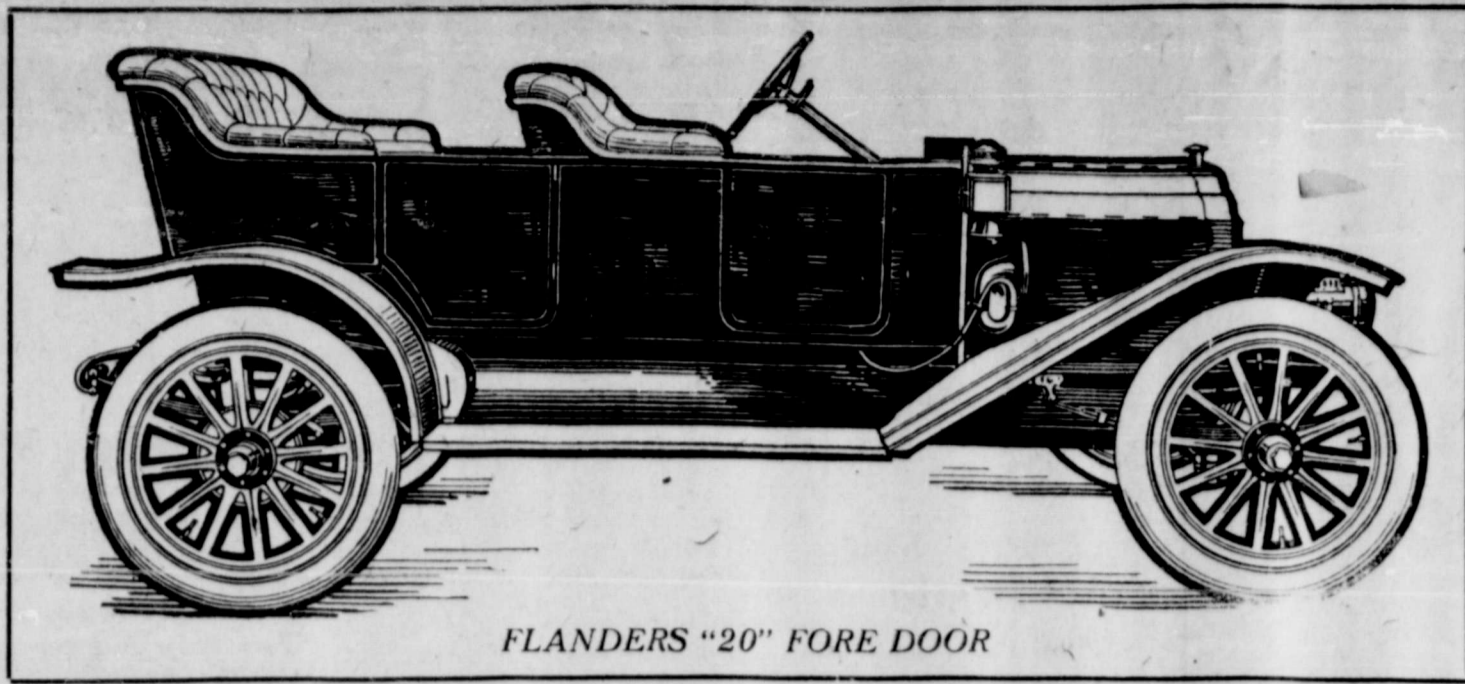

The Demagogue

The passing of the demagogue has marked an important epoch in the progress of Texas. Like the desperado and the cowboy he has had a thrilling and exciting career and like them he has been compelled to give away to the trend of civilization.

He was the product of the times and the harder the times the more perfect the product. A Prince Albert coat, a slouch hat and a strong pair of lungs and he was ready for the hustings to warn the people against the approach of capital. He thrived best upon strife and dissension and his principal occupation was to shrewdly arraign class against class and then leading the stronger against the weaker force. With star defying audacity he would publicly attack the character of a prosperous industry and argue its destruction with all the logic and eloquence of a Pilgrim father pleading for the burning of a witch. He was a mixture of ignorance and genius, and would hunt out prosperous corporations and make their success a springboard on which he could bound into the spotlight by denouncing capital as sapping the life blood of the people and then proceed to accuse hypothetically the cause of the down-trodden masses with the earnestness of a starving lawyer pleading his first case.

He was a patriot for applause and a politician for revenue and he sought the goal of his desire with the intuition of a gifted criminal and he would track his prey with the instinct of a hungry bear. But he is gone and may his shadow never again darken the threshold of Texas.

According to estimates of the Federal agricultural department's reports, in 1910 the wheat fields of the world harvested 3,667,494,000 bushels, which makes 2.5 bushels per capita. In Texas we raised 18,790,000 bushels, which is approximately five bushels per capita.



An examination of the wheat acreage planted in Texas each year for the past three years shows an irregular and volcanic condition. In 1908 we harvested 324,000 acres, in 1909 there were 455,000 acres harvested, and in 1910 we harvested 1,252,000 acres, indicating sudden and rapid change in our wheat acreage.

Our wheat crop ranks third in value of Texas agricultural products and has a farm value of \$18,404,000. We produced fifteen bushels per acre and the farm value was \$14.70 per acre.

Good Roads

A farm with bad roads is worse off than a farm with bad water. It is hard to understand how a farmer, otherwise enterprising, should be backward in building roads. Travel through some of our rural districts and you will find farmers with blooded stock, land highly cultivated and premises well kept and with public highways that bog up an empty wagon six months in the year. Build roads and keep up with the procession.

Back to the Soil

There is too much money going for the luxuries of city life and not enough for country improvements.

The cry of "back to the soil" should apply to men as well as to men. It takes the coin of the realm to improve farms; build public highways and make farm life profitable and attractive.

Texas Oats

Our oat crop ranks fourth in value. In 1910 we had an oat acreage of 695,000, producing 24,325,000 bushels, farm value \$11,433,000. Our oats yielded thirty-five bushels per acre and a farm value of \$16.45 per acre.



Texas is fast taking its place among the cereal producing states in the Union.

"Correspondents of the Texas Industrial Congress who are following its instructions in contesting for the \$10,000 cash prizes, for the best yields of corn and cotton, report excellent results from shallow cultivation of their crops and the maintenance of a dust mulch to prevent evaporation of the moisture in the ground. Shallow cultivation every four or five days, keeps down the weeds and saves the fertilizing elements of the soil for the growing crop and at the same time keeps the ground from crusting. Many farmers who are practicing these simple but effective methods say their corn and cotton are fresh and green, while their neighbor's crops are burning up, which emphasizes the fact that the dryer the weather conditions the greater is the necessity for continuous shallow cultivation."

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

The Llano Gold Metal & Mining Company has recently completed the construction of a new reduction plant at Llano, which is the first of its kind to be opened up in the State. The mill has a capacity of 50 tons per day and will be operated day and night. The opening up of our mines will put Texas in a promising place on the list of gold producing states and will add greatly to our wealth.

Messrs. Culp & Riquemore of Coleman, have recently purchased a nine thousand acre tract of land in Val Verde county, which they expect to convert into one of the largest sheep ranches in the United States. The wool raising industry is rapidly coming to the front in Texas and the Southwestern section of the state offers exceptional advantages to this line of industry.

The home patronage of our present factories would result in flooding them with orders and enable them to enlarge their plants and make it much easier to secure factory investment. Every citizen in Texas can join in this campaign for patronizing home industries tries get better goods and cheaper goods, as well as provide a home market for our farm products. The campaign for patronizing home industries will be carried on vigorously until the whole state gets the "factory spirit," and then attention will be turned toward bringing factories to Texas.

Texas is today the most inviting field on the globe for capital and when our opportunities are understood and our citizenship ready to welcome factory investments by patronizing their products, we will experience no difficulty in building up a civilization that will be the marvel of the twentieth century.

According to data compiled by the Commercial Secretaries Association, the citizens of Texas spend \$12,000,000 annually in visiting among their relatives and friends. This item of expense measures to a certain extent our prosperity and sociability. We are all good fellows and we like each other. HOW TO KILL FLIES.

Four Recipes Claimed to Be Efficacious for Pest Destruction.

In the agitation to kill flies the fact that a great many are without a reliable remedy to aid the work, of the solution in shallow dishes and outside of the usual fly paper and patent articles, seems to have been overlooked.

Flies are inordinately thirsty. Dissolve one drachm of bichromate of potash in two ounces of water and add a little sugar. Put some of the solution in shallow dishes and distribute about your room.

Here is another: A spoonful of formaldehyde put into four ounces of water and exposed in a room will kill all the flies.

This is a good one also: Burning pyrethrum powder in a room will stupefy the flies immediately, when they may be swept out and burned.

Still another: Drop twelve drops of carbolic acid on a heated shovel and the vapor will kill the flies.

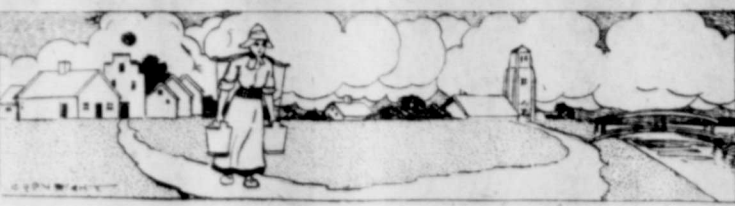

FARM NOTES

Horses with good dispositions are always safer and more valuable. Never breed a crazy-headed mare.

Raise the type of colt that sells best in your community. Select the sire and dam that will bring this type of a colt.

Do not let the little colt follow the dam while she is at work. If the dam becomes heated the milk is injurious to the colt. If a colt is worth raising at all he is worth raising well.

Some folks get so in the habit of saying "Whoa" to their horses when they do not mean it that these faithful animals can not tell when their masters do really mean to have them stop, so they keep going. When you say, "Whoa!" mean it. That is the only way your horses have of knowing what to do.

Diseases get a fast hold of fowl drinking water. Never give stagnant water if you can help it.

A few trees in the pasture adds greatly to the comfort of sheep, these hot days. If you can't have them, set up a few posts and cover a bit of ground over for a shed.

To dip the flock the first warm weather is good practice, as this spares the lambs. Any one of the carbolic dips is good. This poison destroys the tick and scab parasites by contact on the outside.
