### New Plan to Grow Corn.

George Darley, our progressive farmer friend, was up from the Voca community Saturday, marketing three or four loads of oats. Mr. Darley had about 20 acres of oats which threshed out something like 50 bushels to the acre.

He reports corn holding up well, and says several of the farmers out his way are trying a new method of corn growing that he thinks is proving entirely successful. The plan is to plant the corn in 7-foot rows, drilling twenty-four inches, instead of the usual 3 1/2 foot rows and 3 foot drills. Between the rows pea vines are planted. This plan not only gives about the same acreage, but is claimed to produce five more bushels to the acre and give a crop of excellent feed in addition. The

advantage of planting in this manner is that the crop can be cultivated all through the season; then the pea vines gather and hold the moisture, besides putting nitrogen into the soil and building it up.

Mr. Darley read of this plan in some farm paper, and determined to test its merits. Several of his neighbors have taken up the experiment, varying the width of the rows and the length of the drills to suit their fancy.

## APPROVED AT LAST

ATTORNEY GENERAL APPROVES WATER BONDS.

Council Meets This Afternoon to Discuss the Issuance and Appraisal of Waterworks.

Word was received here a few days ago from the Attorney General's department at Austin to the effect that the water bond issue had been approved. The council is in session this afternoon to look after the issuance and disposal of the bonds. The \$40,000 bonds will be issued in the form of interest bearing coupon bonds, of the denomination of \$1,000 each. The city already has an offer for the purchase of the bonds at par.

Another matter that will be before the council for discussion will be the matter of purchasing the local water plant, and it is likely that the services of an expert will be secured to appraise the property.

Railroad Commissioner Allison Mayfield, Chief Engineer F. B. Parker, of the railroad commission, W. B. Drake, vice president of the Frisco, and other officials were in Brady the latter part of last week on an inspection tour of the Frisco extension to Menard, for the purpose of securing data to enable the railroad commission to act on the Frisco's application for registration of \$500,000 bonds on this line.

## POSTAL SAVINGS BANK

GOVERNMENT WILL ESTABLISH ONE IN BRADY.

Institution Will Be Opened July 3rd—Postmaster Doole Will Give Personal Supervision.

The information given out by Postmaster D. Doole, Jr., last Saturday to the effect that he was just in receipt of advice from the Government Postal Bureau to the effect that a Postal Savings Bank would be established in Brady, created no little degree of surprise. While it was generally known that Postal Savings banks would be established in all first-class offices, no one had given the matter much thought or consideration and Brady was hardly considered in the running.

However, Postmaster Doole always works on the basis that nothing is too good for Brady, and goes after everything in sight, with the not unusual result that he lands the plum. The bank will not be open for business until July 3rd, at which time Mr. Doole intends to take personal charge of the new departure and use every effort to make it a success.

The action of the government in establishing the postal savings banks is from a purely paternal standpoint. The bank is intended for the small individual, and the principal object is to encourage thrift, especially among the rising generation. Wherever savings banks have been established it has been observed that thriftiness prevailed, and the community enjoyed greater prosperity. In order to foster this habit, and inculcate it into the minds of the children, the men of tomorrow, the government has undertaken to supply the savings banks wherever needed.

In our Friday's issue we will give more complete information with reference to the postal savings system and the plan upon which it is to be operated.

**LET US PAY OUR TAXES IN MONEY AND NOT IN BOYS**

This was written on a banner displayed at a State-wide Prohibition rally not long since. It was and is a noble sentiment to which every man with red blood in his veins can subscribe. We most heartily do, and we would not give one boy for all the taxes of the universe. But the trouble is that the motto is wrong in conception and in application. That is to say it has no earthly place in this campaign. Why? Because there is no proposition before the people to pay our taxes in boys. Not a bit of it. It is an issue thrown into this campaign ill advisedly, or for the purpose of rushing the tender of heart pell mell into the prohibition camp. Calm and dispassionate reasoning and not sentiment should control. We must carefully, candidly and frankly look at the probable results before we leap. If we decide to increase our taxes one million dollars or more each year as we would be in adopting State-wide prohibition, let us be certain that we will save our boys by it. Let us not buy a pig in a poke. For if we make a mistake now we cannot correct it. Texas has never had State-wide prohibition and we can only judge of it from the experience of other states. If it has proven successful in other states it will do so in Texas. If it has saved the boys in other states it will do so in Texas. While on the other hand if it has failed to do these things it will fail in Texas. The plain, unimpeachable record is, that of 29 states that have considered State-wide prohibition, 21 states have repudiated it because it was a flat failure. Of the other eight, Maine, where it has been tried the longest, will vote to repeal it in September. We make this statement because of the fact that a Governor and a legislature was elected on that issue. In still another, Kansas, now being made with a great show of success, because of the fact that whiskey selling and whiskey drinking has become notorious. In Tennessee there are at least fifteen hundred more whiskey selling and more whiskey drinking places than before State-wide prohibition.

The licensed, regulated saloon has been succeeded by the doggery, the dive and the bootlegger. Under the regulated saloon system boys and girls could not visit them and buy whiskey. Yet under State-wide prohibition, as shown by the sworn statements of Memphis prohibitionists, boys and girls of tender ages visit these unlicensed doggeries and buy and drink freely of the intoxicating beverages so openly sold in that state-wide state. So we ask what will it profit us if we increase our taxes to the extent of nearly one million dollars each year and at the same time multiply the places where our boys are made drunkards and our girls are debauched?

Remember that the only issue before the people is, shall we exchange our perfected local option system for experimental State-wide prohibition? Those living in counties where local option (prohibition) prevails have all to lose and nothing to gain by swapping local option for State-wide prohibition. Why take the chance? (Advertisement.)

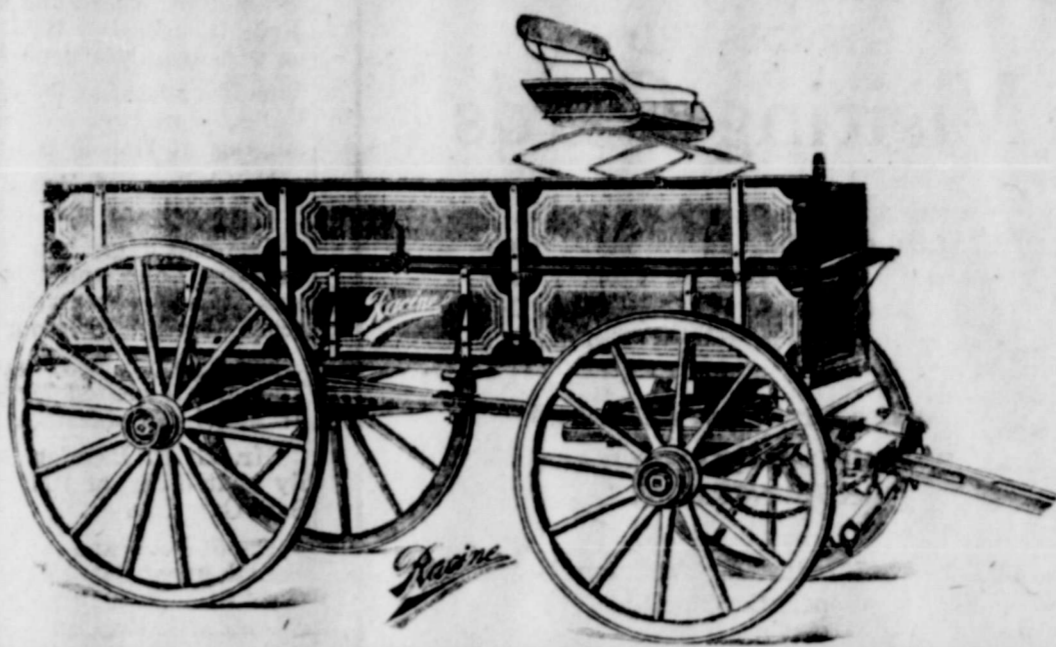
