BUYING THE WOOL.

McCully Company Pulling the Business to Brady.

The McCully Company Wednesday received 10,000 pounds of wool recently purchased from R. C. McCollum and W. J. Mogford, of London.

This company is one of the liveliest in West Texas and is pulling business to Brady from points heretofore considered entirely out of Brady territory. They purchased virtually the ca-

tire output of Mason county this year, and so far something like 200,000 pounds have been handled through the local house. Each year they branch out and enter new territory and it is safe to say theirs is one of the most rapidly growing businesses in the West.

RATIFY WATER BONDS

COUNCIL MEETS IN SPECIAL SESSION TUESDAY

Judge Newman Voices Opinion Bonds Should Be Voted Over To Include Light Plant.

The city council met in called session Tuesday, with a full attendance, for the purpose of discussing the condition of the fire plug at the corner of the Brady National bank building. After quite an animated discussion of the subject by several members of the council and by Mr. White, representing the Brady Water & Light Co., the contract between the aforesaid parties for fire protection was produced and read by the city attorney. Mr. White then made the proposition that if the council would unanimously agree that it was the duty of the Brady Water & Light Co. to put the plug in the proper condition that he would have it done without further question. The question was put and received a majority, but not a unanimous vote. Mr. White then suggested that the matter be left to arbitration, but nothing definite was decided upon.

The question of the water bonds was taken up and Judge Newman was invited to give his opinion on the subject. He suggested that the bonds be voted over and that it be stipulated that they might be used for the purpose of buying or installing electric lights as well as a water system, saying that the two together could be operated more economically than when separated. He also mentioned the fact that a 15c tax was sufficient to carry the street bonds and suggested that the present 20c street tax be reduced to 15c and the extra 5c tax be used in helping to carry the water bonds.

The council passed the following resolution:

The city of Brady shall make no remuneration to the Brady Water & Light Co. for the fire plug situated at the corner of the Brady National bank building until said plug shall be put in such condition that it will be accepted by the fire committee and by the insurance inspector at which time, the stipulated conditions having been complied with, the city of Brady will resume the payment of the \$50 to the Brady Water & Light Co.

The council hereby levies a tax of 15c for street bonds, 25c

for general purposes and 25c for the sinking fund.

The council hereby passes an ordinance ratifying the water bonds.

F. A. Gayle, of Brownwood, was in the city on business Wednesday. Mr. Gayle, it will be remembered, was the engineer in charge of the building of Brownwood's roads, and his work there has received most favorable comment, both from his home citizens and from visitors who have inspected the roads. Mr. Gayle has a number of propositions from East Texas communities to take charge of their road building, but prefers the western country, and has decided to remain in this section of Texas.

Henry Carlson and Carl A. Anderson were in Brady Wednesday purchasing lumber for a handsome new residence which Mr. Carlson will build on his place, two miles east of town. The house will have five rooms downstairs and two upstairs.

WOOL GROWERS ASSURED.

Need Not Fear Downward Tariff Move.

Pendleton, Ore., June 8.—Assurance that wool growers have nothing to fear from the proposed downward move of the tariff was received yesterday by Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the Oregon State Wool Growers' Association, in a letter from Dr. S. W. McClure, secretary of the National Wool Growers' Association, who has been in the National capital.

The letter says in part: "I have gone over the situation in Washington very carefully and feel safe in assuring your wool growers that there will be no legislation affecting the tariff passed at the present session of Congress.

"The bill should not affect the wool market, for it will never become a law. Please advise your wool growers not to sacrifice their clip, for there is every reason to believe better prices will be received later in the season."

Fred Hess, representing Hess & Skinner, the contractors who built the Brady bridge, has let the contract for building the approach from the south side. Mr. Hess was out at Waldrip yesterday inspecting the work on the bridge there, and reports everything progressing nicely.

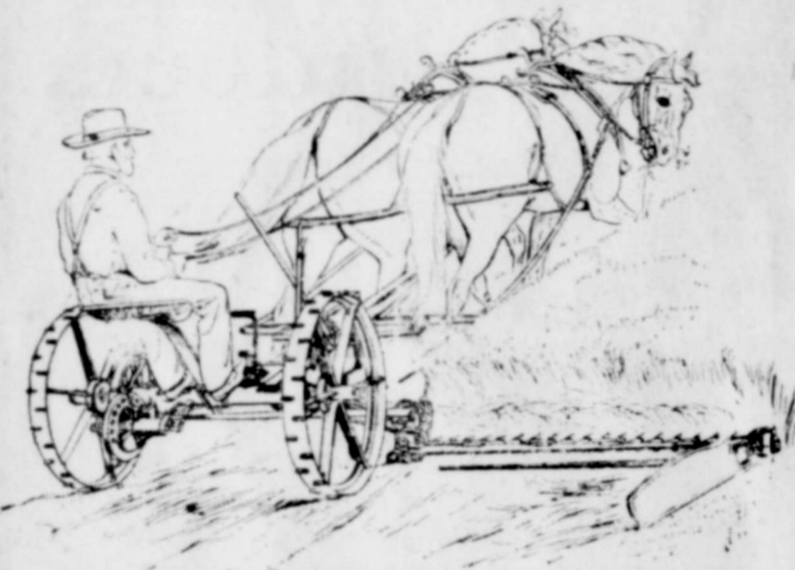

CONTRACT IS SIGNED

MASON COMMITTEE SIGNED CONTRACT SATURDAY.

Everything in Readiness for Extension of Frisco—Work Not To Begin Before Fall

The Mason railroad committee Saturday signed the contract given them at St. Louis two weeks ago by the Frisco officials. This is the final act in closing up the deal, and denotes that the committee has successfully accomplished their object—that of meeting the Frisco's requirements.

The citizens of Mason are to be congratulated upon the way they came up with their renewals and additional subscriptions, and the committee experienced no great trouble in securing everything they desired. The 242 acre farm of Albert Schuessler one mile west of Mason, was secured for the holding pens at \$32 per acre.

We quote the following regarding the terms of the contract from the Mason News:

The contract requires Mason county to give the right-of-way from the end of the road near Brady through Mason county to the Gillespie county line, depot grounds at Mason, satisfactory to the railroad people, 300x300 feet, or as near as can be secured, 200 acres of land for holding pens, and about ten acres for stock pens, \$40,000 in cash when trains are running into Mason.

The committee is to have the privilege of selecting the places for two stations between Brady and Mason and two between Mason and the south line of the county.

The railroad people are to have their survey located by Sept. 30 and furnish field notes to the committee of every tract wanted. The committee will then have sixty days in which to secure right-of-way deeds, and a reasonable time to conduct condemnation proceedings, failing to do which the company will conduct the condemnation proceedings at the expense of the committee.

Owing to the uncertainty of business affairs the company requires until June 30, 1913, to complete the line, and will not specify any certain time to begin construction, but have said that they expect to begin construction in the fall.

They stipulate in case they do not build they will repay the committee for whatever property they have bought.

BEN KILPATRICK BACK.

To Face Trial for Murder at Paint Rock.

Ben Kilpatrick, the celebrated desperado and trainrobber who gained notoriety through the sensational holdup of a train in Montana and afterward engaged in a running fight with the officers in St. Louis, passed through Brownwood Wednesday morning enroute to Paint Rock where he will face trial on a charge of the murder of Olive Thornton at that place. Kilpatrick has completed a ten year term in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., on the train robbery case and when he was released last week Sheriff Maddox was in waiting there to bring him to Texas. Ben Kilpatrick was reared in Concho county and began his wild career there just a few years before his Montana experience. He once engaged in a fight with the sheriff of Sutton county, when a brother of his was killed. Ben Kilpatrick seemed to bear a charmed life, and although bullets were flying thick and fast he escaped injury. Once a fugitive from justice this Texas cowboy wandered farther and farther north and west, staging some up-to-date stunts at Denver, in Montana and in St. Louis.

The ten years of service in the federal prison has aged Ben Kilpatrick but very little. To a press reporter he said he expected to come clear in Paint Rock case and in that event he expected to settle down and live a law-abiding life. He was regretting very much that Sheriff Maddox would not let him have a day's lay over in Birmingham where his wife lives. The woman has served a term in prison for forgery. The two were together in the running fight in St. Louis, the woman riding in delivery and ice wagons with Kilpatrick in his desperate effort to escape.

THE FREE WOOL MANIA.

A great many people imagine they cannot keep their democracy on straight and be in favor of a duty on raw wool. The truth of the business is they must favor such a duty to be in harmony with the party in Texas. But with us it is not so much a question as to whether a certain measure is democratic as it is a question of it being equitable and right.

We have never been able to see any virtue or fairness in free wool, while we do remember that when the duty was removed from this, our leading staple of product, under the Wilson bill, desolation followed all over the West and ninety per cent of the sheep men were swept out of business.

The howl that we daily hear of giving the consumer a square deal, by giving him wool free of duty, is a delusion and a snare, even if it does come from such men as Bryan. Did the consumer find the price of shoes reduced as a result of free hides? No, for the consumer never buys hides. The manufacturer, perhaps, is getting his raw material for less money than previously, but his ready-to-wear shoes still enjoy protection and he has not been kind enough to share any of the additional profit he is making with the fellow down the line, the consumer.

Here is an illustration taken from conditions right at home: Del Rio is not far down the line from the leading wool center of the United States. Ten days ago our wool was sold. Every wool buyer in the land knows just when the Del Rio wool is to be sold and the most of them have an agent here to bid on it. They always do and they did this time. But how many were there in the market for this great product of the West? There were six buyers; six and no more to buy the million or so pounds. These six, or rather the concerns they are buying for, can save money if wool is cheap, and Mr. Bryan and some other democrats of his stripe, want the duty taken off so that they can buy it for less than they have to pay for it now.

On the other hand we have 8,000 people who buy woolen goods; these woolens, the manufactured products, are enjoying a high tariff, and so long as they enjoy such protection they can, and of course, will sell the output of their mills and manufacturing establishments at the same old price. Free wool would give a handful of them the raw material for less money than they are compelled to pay for it today, but it would not force them to sell one article for less, because they do not gauge their prices by what they have to pay for the raw material, but they make the price as high as the existing tariff on woolen manufactured articles will permit them to make it.

By crippling the best industry we can have in the West you can force the wool growers to sell their product to these 'six buyers' at a reduced price and save them money, but you cannot force the manufacturers to sell their finished woolens to our 8,000 people for one cent less so long as war is not made upon the protection they have always enjoyed, and which Mr. Bryan and his followers are willing that they shall continue to enjoy.—Del Rio Herald.

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

The San Angelo Chamber of Commerce has appointed a committee to lay plans for a bond issue for good roads in Tom Green County.

A home company has been organized at Bowie, for the purpose of boring for oil. Work has already been started on the wells and the cap rock has been struck at a depth of 900 feet.

Temple has finished paving the business section of that city and will soon begin the paving of North Main street with vitrified brick, a distance of eight blocks.

A mass meeting was held in Temple, for the purpose of encouraging the building of good roads. It was voted to request the Commissioner's Court to order an election in that district on July 1st, for a bond issue of \$350,000 as a starter for good roads.

The track has been laid on the Coleman Cut-off between Coleman and Lubbock, and it is expected that the road will be in operation by June 15th, and will open a new route to California.

The Government will begin work next month, deepening the Brazos river. A system of locks and dams will be built; there is an appropriation of \$300,000 now available for construction work.

Robertson County is to soon vote on the issuance of \$100,000 bonds for improving the public highways. It is to become a part of the Red river to the Gulf highway.

Rural free delivery follows in the wake of improved public highways, and the mail cart in most instances follows the road grader.

The Abilene Chamber of Commerce has just completed the raising of \$11,500 for the erection of a training school for boys in that city. The building is to begin at once and will be ready for occupancy by Fall. The building grounds are to be under the care of a Board of Directors selected from among the citizens of Abilene, and the building and grounds are to be the property of the citizens of Abilene.

Good roads make better homes, happier firesides and more patriotic people. Build good roads.

The farmers have joined hands with the automobile owners in the campaign for good roads for the old horse that formerly frightened at the auto is either dead or too slow, and the farmers are fellows that now have the cash with which to buy automobiles.

The people of the cotton districts of Texas, are pushing the proposition of building cotton and cotton oil mills for the utilization of the raw material and a number of cotton and cotton oil mills have been built in different sections of the State recently.

Good roads make farm life profitable and pleasant and enhance its usefulness.

fitable pursuits that the farmers of that section can engage in. A great many of the finest goats in the world are to be found on the Texas range, although the industry is practically in its infancy in the State. The goat is a valuable animal and serves the double purpose of supplying food and clothing, and also of clearing the land on which he is raised of noxious weeds and underbrush by browsing. Most of the land devoted to goat raising in Texas, is paying fair dividends, but there is still a wide field for development of this important industry.

Cotton is the most youthful of staple products, having had less than a century of commercial recognition, but it has rapidly acquired power until today it is the King of Products. The fleecy staple is as good as legal tender on any market,

and based on factory values is the richest of all industrials.

An inordinate desire to get something for nothing leads to greed in business and unless restrained sometimes results in crime; but every property owner in Texas can get something for nothing in a perfectly legitimate way by joining in the crusade for improving and extending our transportation facilities.

Judge Walker, in behalf of the court, responded, calling to mind the fact that the members of the court had taken upon themselves an oath to see that renditions were made as required by law, and said the court would make all reasonable allowances.

COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

State Director of Farm Demonstration Work of Texas, J. L. Quicksall, of Waco, was here Saturday in the interest of the farmers of McCulloch county. Plans for the coming fall were discussed and quite a number of things good for the farmer were suggested by him. Mr. Quicksall says that Texas is very dry at this time, but that the cotton crop is in fine shape. He expressed himself as being well pleased with the conditions of the cotton crop in this section. Corn, gardens and orchards are the things now suffering most for rain. Maize, Kaffir corn, Egyptian wheat and such feed stuff do not need rain like the other things; still everything would be much improved by a general rain.

It seems that the good roads germs are affecting the entire state. A widespread feeling for good public highways is getting general. Dallas county will soon vote on another bond issue on July 22nd for \$500,000, Sour Lake for \$35,000, Bryan, Brenham, Dayton and many under way for good roads. A highway from Red river to the Gulf is attracting attention at this time.

There will be a meeting soon of the Mid-Texas Industrial Association for the purpose of securing regular uniform rates on the roads for the homeseekers and factories. McCulloch will be well represented, we trust, by several of her best citizens.

Some of the products of the farmers are being exhibited in our office. Saturday we had several very large onions sent to us. Also Mr. Evans, of the Prairie View neighborhood, brought in a sample of roasting ears. From the looks of the sample, a good rain at this time would insure a fine crop of corn on this place. Some very fine stalks of corn also were exhibited. The very hot winds are materially injuring the prospects for a corn crop.

FARM NOTES

Sheep that have not been sheared this spring will doubtless suffer from heat. Shear them at once.

It is poor judgment to stop work in the crops because crops are poor. Keep up work and hope for the best. Do your part of the management.

Do not feed the work stock too much corn. The weather being extremely warm, it is advisable to feed more light foods, such as hay, oats, cotton seed meal, etc.

Give the animals plenty of cool water whenever they will drink it. With high temperatures the stockman should remember that an enormous quantity of water is required by animals.

Soy beans may be planted any time from June 1 to July 15 in most sections of the Southwest. They are good to build up the soil and furnish very rich hay for stock. Try a few soy beans on your farm.

There is nothing more essential to the profit and well-being of dairy cows than a shady pasture. Cows do most of their grazing during the cool hours of the day and lie down in the shade when the sun is hot.

You are unfortunate if your cotton is not yet "chopped," while the weather is almost ideal for destroying noxious weeds, it is not at all favorable for bending the back all day trying to "chop" weedy cotton.

Cowpeas are the best plants for your oat stubble provided they are adapted to the soil in your locality. Prepare the land promptly and plant the peas when the season will justify it. You need plenty of legume hay for your stock.

The result would have been a fortune of \$100,000,000, and said the senator: "What a lucky escape! I would have been dead long ago from high living and my family ruined by too much prosperity."

Now how much of that was sincere and how much a jest? To ask the question may seem like a confession of inability to see a joke, but both the senator's statements may well be true in gravest earnest, and many a philosopher—with no chance of getting even one million—would say that there was no doubt about the accuracy of either of them.

Nevertheless, the "lucky escape" was one that most people would be content to miss, and the well recognized and often demonstrated perils of great wealth are usually confronted with reckless audacity by everybody who has even half an opportunity to risk them.

POSTAL SAVINGS BANK

DAILY PAPERS PRONOUNCE THEM A SUCCESS.

Liberally Patronized by the Public, and An Inducement to More General Saving.

That the postal savings banks fill a long felt need is indicated by the success of the forty-eight initial depositories established on January 3, last. During the first month of their operation deposits were made aggregating \$61,805, and an average of \$16.14 for each depositor. Since then the business of these banks has increased to an average of about \$100,000 a month, with an average deposit for each individual of about \$35.

There will be in operation on July 13 a total of 650 postal savings offices, 100 additional offices having just been named, 50 to be opened July 10 and 50 July 13. Deposits made in these institutions cannot be attached in any state in the union—absolute secrecy, etc.

Absolute secrecy must be maintained as to the identity of depositors, and courts are helpless in any attempt to force the postmasters to produce their records. Money thus deposited is not subject to attachment or other legal proceedings at the instance of creditors.

Postmaster Doole has placed an order for several hundred blanks giving full information for depositors, which he will distribute among those interested. These blanks can be had printed in various languages, which provides against any misunderstanding or misinterpretation of the government's objects and aims.

An idea of the immense amount of mail handled in the local postoffice can be gathered from the figures of the official count during last month. As will be noticed there were over 82,000 pieces of incoming mail and nearly 80,000 pieces of outgoing mail handled during the month of June, and taking into consideration that each piece is handled an average of four times it can readily be seen that the postoffice employes are no slouches when it comes to work.

FOR THE COOK.

Assorted Meat Salad.

Pile the thinly sliced white meat of a cold roast chicken in the center of a dish, preferably a round platter, add a circle of shredded ham and another of thinly sliced veal, roast beef or any convenient cold meat; surround the meat with a wall of lettuce hearts interspersed with sprays of water cress. Garnish with hard boiled eggs cut into thin rings, and just before serving add a thick mayonnaise arranged at intervals between the rings of hard boiled eggs.

Potatoes Lulu.

Peel, wash, chop fine and wipe on a cloth half a dozen or more raw potatoes. Put them in a saucepan with a lump of butter; season with salt and pepper and cook very slowly, tossing them frequently until they are soft. Then beat them until they are light; put them in a baking dish, cover with grated cheese and pour over them half a cupful of melted butter. Bake slowly in a moderate oven for half an hour.

Pineapple Pudding.

Make a pudding crust of a quarter of a pound of suet chopped very fine, half a pound of flour and sufficient water to mix. Use a knife for mixing. Line a butter or pudding mold with the crust, fill about three-quarters full with chopped pineapple, add a wine glass of white wine and a little sweetened custard prepared with a teaspoonful of scalded milk and one egg. Cover with a thin layer of the paste and steam for an hour and a half.

Portuguese Eggs.

Chop an onion and fry it in a tablespoonful of butter until brown; add six tomatoes cut into small pieces, season with salt and pepper and cook until the tomatoes are reduced to a pulp. Pass the mixture through a sieve into a buttered baking dish and set aside until perfectly cool; then with a spoon hollow out six cavities in the tomato bed, slip a raw egg into each and place the dish in the oven until the eggs are set and the tomatoes are hot; then serve.

McCulloch County Radish.

G. W. Young was up from Rochelle Wednesday, bringing with him an immense radish as a sample of what McCulloch county could grow. The radish measured eighteen inches in circumference and twelve inches in length. At that, Mr. Young complained that his garden was not very good this year, having overflowed during the heavy rains.

He reports having made good oats, and says his wheat will thresh out twenty bushels to the acre. He is giving particular attention to his farm work this year, fertilizing his land, plowing deep and harrowing frequently, and says if there is anything in intensive farming this year ought to demonstrate it fully. He reports his cotton, planted deep in the furrow and kept well covered, as standing the dry weather much better than that of his neighbors who planted shallow and kept the cotton ridged up.

Mr. Young will next year plant less cotton than ever before, and intends to diversify and build up his land to the best advantage.

1,850,000 Pounds Sold by West Texas Holders.

San Angelo, June 12.—The sale of 1,850,000 pounds of wool has just been announced here. The Wool Growers Central Storage company sold 1,000,000 pounds of twelve months clip to Fred Rising, representing Mallowell, Jones & Donald, and 650,000 pounds of eight months clip to C. D. Stokes, representing Willett & Co. March Bros. sold to Fred Rising 65,000 pounds of twelve months clip and 135,000 pounds of eight months clip. The sale of the short wool held by George Richardson and Chas. W. Hobbs to Mr. Rising has also been made.

It is estimated the total accumulation of spring clip here will reach 3,000,000 pounds. Several buyers are here negotiating for the purchase of the balance.

Good Shower Tuesday.

Tuesday evening's prospects for rain were the best McCulloch county has had in over a month. Threatening clouds and lightning gave rise to the hope that the long-looked-for rain had come. The rain only proved partial, however. At Carroll Colony it was probably the best, and for about ten minutes fell in sheets, W. B. Hall reporting water standing in his cotton rows Wednesday morning. At Ward school house and in the Cow Gap community the rain was just in streaks, and light at that.
