## GOOD RAINS REPORTED

AT LOHN, WALDRIP, MELVIN AND EDEN.

Showers and Rains Fall Friday, Saturday and Sunday—Parts Still Dry.

Brady had three shots at rain the past week, securing a good shower out of the first, and missing the last two. The first rain for a month or more fell in Brady Friday afternoon commencing about 6:00 o'clock. In Brady the rain fell for about one hour, there being 4-10 inch of precipitation. Melvin and Nine had splendid rains, putting out stock water at both of these places. Showers and sprinkles were reported in various other places in the northern and western part of the county.

Saturday Jupiter Pluvius made another try at it, and wound up his effort Sunday by filling the ditches at Lohn and Waldrip to overflowing. Splendid rains are reported reaching all the way from Goldthwaite to within a short distance of Mercury. Mercury had only a light shower, as did also Rochelle. The country from eight miles this side of Eden to twelve miles beyond also secured a fine rain, and at Millersview and Meard good rains fell. Stacy secured a shower, while Mason, Voca and other points south of Brady were passed up entirely by the rain.

Some hail is reported in the Eden country Saturday night, but no great damage was done.

### SECURING RIGHT-OF-WAY

Depot Grounds Approved by Chief Engineer F. G. Jonah.

The Mason papers report having secured the approval of Chief Engineer Jonah of their selection for depot grounds. The grounds consist of a strip of land between Bowser and Cemetery streets, and in the words of Mr. Jonah "look as though nature had intended them for such use."

Mr. Jonah stated that the work of locating the line would begin within three weeks, and would take about ten days to complete. The former survey will be followed and will be the line over which the road will be built if right-of-way can be secured. The work will be in Mr. Jonah's charge, and the survey will be continued on south to the Gillespie county line.

Only 3 1-2 miles of the 12 miles of right-of-way in McCulloch county has been secured up to last week. The News reports considerable apathy among the citizens of Camp San Saba and states it is likely they will lose the line unless they awake to the situation. Katemey is alive to the opportunity and is putting forth every effort to assist the committee, and has raised \$4,000 toward the bonus.

### AN OLD SPANISH MINE.

Unearthed in William Rosburg's Pasture.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Antone Anderson and William Rosburg were at the News office and showed us specimens of ore taken from what is supposed to be an old Spanish mine.

Mr. Anderson has been working for several months in the Llano country in search of Spanish mines and fully believes that he has succeeded in locating one within only a few yards of the home of Mr. Rosburg. He says he has found two old smelters about four feet under the ground and some several feet apart, and that while he has not yet made a close examination, he has gone far enough to find that old smelters are there. From the ore shown it is plain that some of it has in the far distant past gone through a furnace. He also exhibited some fuel which bore the same mark of evidence.

It is Mr. Anderson's opinion that the old mine was covered up and the owners never returned, therefore for years and years it has lain unmolested. He expects to make further developments as soon as possible and feels sure he will discover something which is going to cause the people of this section to sit up and take notice.

When asked what he expected to do with his new property, Mr. Rosburg replied that it was out of his line of business and therefore he would put it on the market and offer some miner a chance to develop that which the Spaniards left so long ago. —Llano News.

## OLD NEWSPAPERS.

Usefulness Not Gone Because You Have Read Them.

The mere fact that moths can not read is no reason why they should detest papers, but they do nevertheless. It isn't exactly the newspaper or its editorial policy that moths dislike. It's the ink used in printing the type that makes the moths stay away. That is why, in the absence of mothproof bags and cedar chests, some housewives pack their furs and woollens away wrapped in newspapers at the end of the winter season and find that it is a satisfactory way of preserving them against the ravages of moths. There is nothing better than old newspapers for use under the carpets for the same reason.

Old newspapers have many other uses as well. Wet in water they serve to clean out the stove splendidly. Crushed newspapers are excellent to clean lamp chimneys. They can even be used for an iron holder for an emergency.

Newspapers dipped in lamp oil are useful for cleaning windows. Irons not much soiled can be rubbed on old newspapers and thus made fit for use. Dipped in lamp oil they are splendid to rub the outside of the dishpan. They keep it bright and shining. Torn in shreds, slightly dampened and scattered over the carpet, they keep down dust when sweeping. They clean the sink of its grease and sediment. Nothing is better for the greasy paper can be burned after use.

Many times folded newspapers will serve as a mat to stand hot and blackened pots or kettles on and save soiling the kitchen table. The kitchen stove is kept bright after the cooking of each meal with old papers, and this saves many polishings.

## Statewide Prohibition and the Bailey Issue

"Statewide prohibition and the Bailey question are now the paramount issues in Texas, and it is the privilege of every citizen to vote his convictions on these questions, but when they are finally settled we submit a few subjects for the consideration of the public," says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

**New Campaign Issues.**  
There are 127,000,000 acres of land in Texas that have never been plowed; we have 40,000,000 acres of land that is located ten miles and over—some of it 150 miles—from a railroad. The Texas farmers ship \$1,200,000 worth of raw material to the foreign factory daily; we have vast beds of mineral wealth stored beneath the surface which have never been touched and the list could be extended indefinitely. We would like to place these subjects in the box for those who draw campaign issues to select from. The building of an empire is a question about which there can be difference of opinion sufficiently wide to give spice and vigor to a campaign and if, after the campaign is over we could get our orators and writers to discuss Texas development for a few months and present the merits of the plow and hammer, we would awaken to vigorous activity the wealth, talent and enterprise of the people and make Texas the greatest state in the Union.

**The Purpose of Government.**  
Settle the prohibition and the Bailey issue either way, and we have not brought another acre of land under cultivation; have not constructed another mile of railroad, built another factory, opened up another mine or given additional employment to labor. In this life, first of all things, we must have bread and making it easy for the bread winner is the first duty of government. Agriculture, commerce and industry are the cornerstones of government and we cannot induce men and money to come to Texas and develop our resources by merely wishing for them as a child yearns for the moon, but we must go about it with the zeal and enterprise that a business man undertakes to increase his business or a farmer improves his farm.

**Texas Growing.**  
When the government completes the Panama canal and the plans for the improvement of the Texas harbors are fully consummated, our industrial horizon will be greatly widened and we will be brought face to face with conditions which will force us to enlarge our ideals of the commercial destiny of Texas. Faith is a good thing in government, but work is better and we should prepare to meet conditions as they unfold to us like the ten wise virgins of the Scripture—with our lamps trimmed and burning.

God, the government and outside capital have done everything possible for Texas, and if we will only meet them half way we will soon build up a civilization that surpasses anything on the globe.

### EFFECTIVE REMEDY.

#### Government Agent Urges Use of Poison for Grasshoppers.

J. W. Butcher, the government farm agent for the San Angelo country, says that some complaint has reached him that grasshoppers are damaging cotton; and to prevent further injury to the product, the farmers who are menaced are urged to use branmash, scattering it around and over the field. To make the branmash mix one pound of paris green or arsenic with five pounds of wheat bran, using water to work into a moist mass and sweetening with a quart of molasses. Find out where the grasshoppers enter the cotton field and there sprinkle plenty of the mash late in the afternoon, as the insects do most of their work at night. Mr. Butcher says this remedy for putting a stop to the menace has always proved effective. —San Angelo Standard.

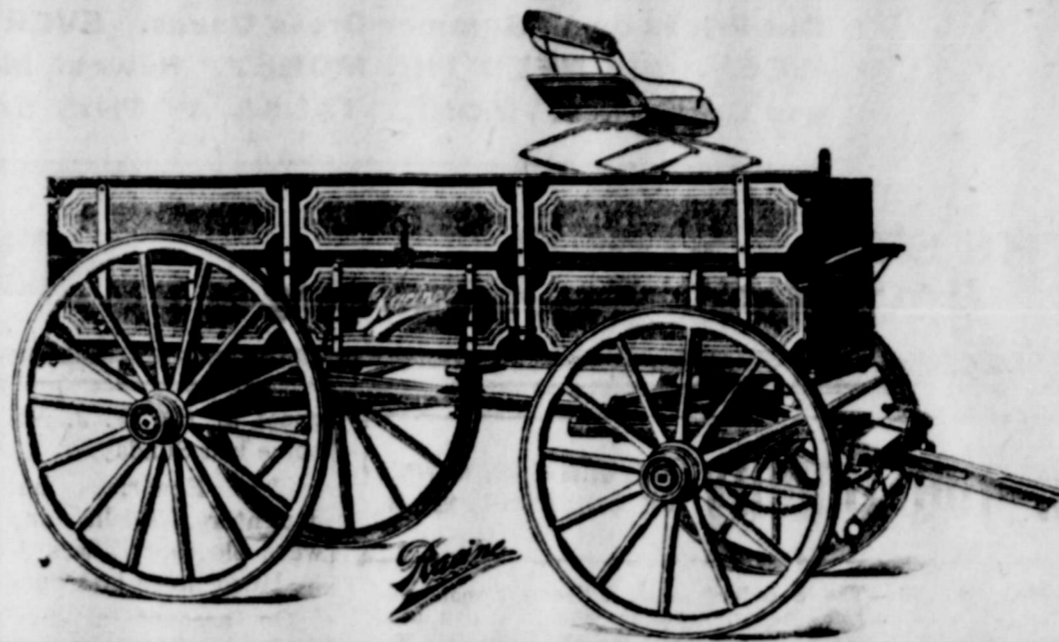

#### TURKISH DAY OF REJOICING

Hospitable Welcome Accorded to All During the Month of Ramazan.

Every year in Turkey, in the month of Ramazan, as they term it—which is the month when the Koran was revealed, in 26 parts, to Mohammed—was for years a general custom in Turkey for the Turks to open their houses at 12 o'clock, the Turkish sun set time, to strangers and anyone was permitted to enter and take supper, a meal the Turks call *otfirar*, during Ramazan.

No matter how poor or how rich the persons, and whether a complete stranger or near friend, they come just before the sunset hour, and are seated at the truly hospitable table before 12 o'clock. Immediately after the roar of the cannons announces sunset the Turks eat either an olive or a date, it being the legend that the holy prophet did this, and those who smoke may begin as soon as the date or olive, supposed to be the fruits of paradise, disappears. Then come jellies, as it is a belief in Turkey the sweets "collect the senses," whatever that may mean. Oddly enough, soups follow the sweets, and then after that eggs cooked in butter are served, followed in turn by mutton chops or roasted meat; these are succeeded by vegetables, and the vegetables by a sort of sugarless pudding, called *bennek*, and after this the famous *baclava* or *kadaiif*.

After all this more meat courses, fish, and vegetables are served, and such sweets as rice *mitik* (*gullaj* and *laj*), native *blanc mange* (*mahallebi*) *plaf* with *hishad* or *junket* (*yaourt*) and coffee.

#### PRESERVE CHARM OF VOICE
