FLOOD WATER CLUBS

INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS INITIATES MOVEMENT.

Would Conserve Water in Every Creek, Ravine or Gully, Converting Texas into an Eden

Dallas, Texas, June 20.—On a large proportion of the farms in this state there are creeks, ravines or gullies that could be dammed at comparatively small expense, thus forming lakes or pools to catch and hold in the aggregate a vast amount of water. The lakes already built could and should be greatly enlarged, thus insuring an abundance of water for man and beast, and in many cases enough to irrigate on a moderate scale. Useful shade or fruit trees could be easily, cheaply and profitably grown on the banks of these lakes, and the evaporation from the waters would, to some extent cool the atmosphere and presently, when we have a great number of such pools, might possibly increase our rainfall. If the people generally will become enthusiastically interested in this subject and show their faith by their works, our lawmakers will soon catch the spirit of the enterprise and give county and state support to water conservation on a larger scale, by creating water bonding districts on the order of our road, levee and drainage districts. The combined efforts of the state, counties,

in the state, and by concerted action and neighborhood co-operation we will work wonders and dam Texas for the good of all the people.

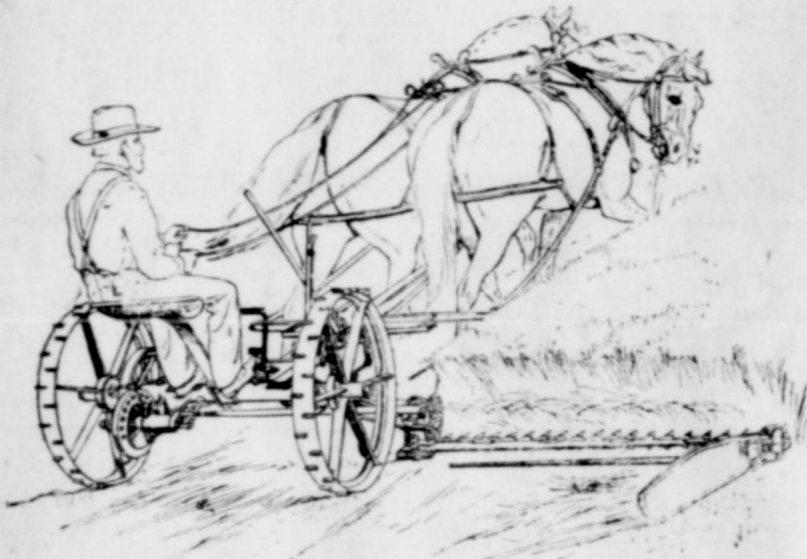

WOOL BILL IS PASSED

HOUSE GIVES BILL LARGE MAJORITY.

Lowers Duty on Raw Imports From 44 Per Cent to 20 Per Cent Advalorem.

Washington, June 20. — By the decisive vote of 221 to 100 the House this afternoon passed the wool bill. One democrat, Representative Francis, of Ohio, voted against the measure. For the measure were 194 Democrats, 26 Republicans and 1 Socialist, Representative Berger, of Wisconsin.

Before the final vote was taken Representative Payne offered the expected motion to recommit the bill to the Ways and Means Committee, with instructions to hold it until it received next December the report of the tariff board giving the results of the latter's pending investigation into the conditions of the wool industry and then to bring it back to the House amended in accordance with the data furnished by the tariff board. The Payne motion was defeated by a vote of 118 ayes and 189 noes.

Preceding this, many amendments had been offered by Republican Leader Mann and other insurgents, but all were voted down by the united and enthusiastic Democrats.

The bill places a duty of 20 per cent advalorem on raw wool imports as against an average duty of a little more than 44 per cent advalorem under the present law. On partly manufactured wool and on products manufactured in whole or in part wool the average duty under the proposed law would be about 42.5 per cent ad valorem, as compared with the present average ad valorem duty of more than 90 per cent.

The Ways and Means Committee has estimated the bill would reduce the annual revenue under the woolen schedule of the tariff bill a little more than a million dollars.

The measure prescribes it shall be in effect Jan. 1, next, but it is not believed the bill will pass the Senate at this session.

Editor Brady Standard:

Please allow us a word in The Standard to thank the Commercial club of Brady for their timely expression before the board of equalization relative to the higher tax valuation on land and their request to let it remain as it was, not that they did us any good in lessening the tax valuation, but what they said caused us to appreciate and see them in a different light to what we held them heretofore. We realize them to be honest in their views and strictly for the good of the country—common interest. On the other hand we noted that the court considered that their oath had been assailed and trampled on, and the indignant speech in reply to remarks made by the club, while the common layman's—land taxpayer—oath wasn't considered by the board, not even was his statement as to what he had considered. If his neighbor said it was so, it was respected. We appreciate that men are human and liable to err, nevertheless until a man's oath is impeached or he is a felon, one man's oath should be taken as readily as another's.

When I was a boy a lot of young men with their sweet-hearts, pretty young girls, gathered on the beach just to hallo and hear their voices echo. Like these young men, I think this commissioner's court will hear their actions reverberate from one end of the county to the other and be echoed back in a substantial way.

I am for a Board of Classification. If you have no law for it, demand it. Instruct our legislature to furnish us this relief. I'm for tax on land according to its productive value.

It is our opinion that Awalt, Hurley, Sorrells, Jordan, and in fact all of them are up-to-date farmers and fully understand modern methods of agriculture. They asked that we help them secure a demonstrator for Mason county for another year. I am glad to announce that the matter is practically settled for Mason to get what they ask for in the matter. We are going to do our best all the time for them, and assure the good people that we will rejoice in every success that may crown their efforts.

We have reports from several sections of the county and the state, and find that feed stuff will be sufficient where rain has fallen. Corn, however, is almost a failure, but cotton, maize and kafir corn promise fair yields. I suggest that the farmers cut the corn before the fodder and stalks dry so as to be unfit for use. Some places the corn will make a fair yield, but where it is so far gone as to be out of the question of production, the next best thing to do is to save what we have.

I wish to assure the farmers that we are in a much better condition in McCulloch county than in many sections of the state and the South. The drouth is general all over the country. But we should be thankful that we are getting some of the first rain of the crop year and that we still have time to make feed stuff and cotton.

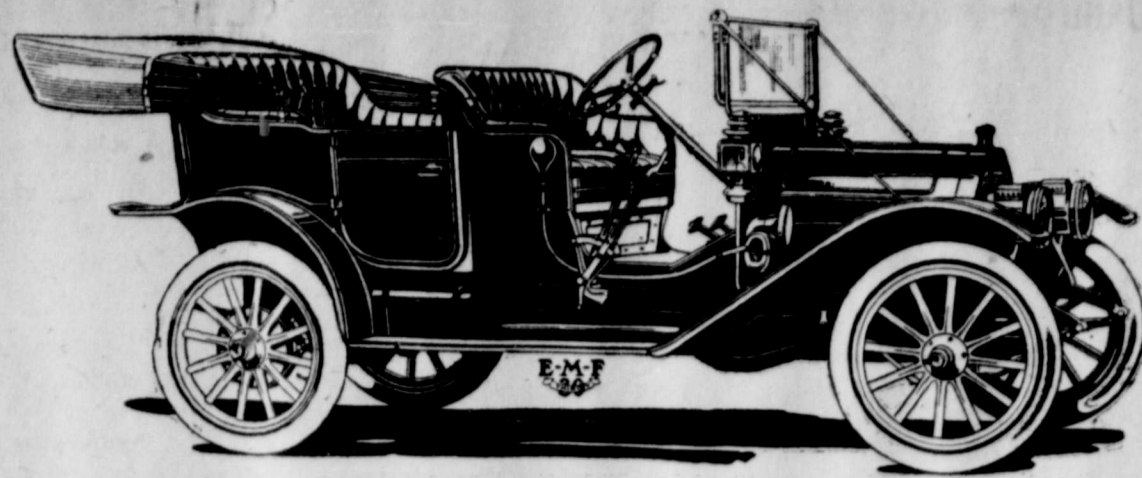

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

The Medina Irrigation Company has purchased 13,000 acres of land which will be placed under irrigation. The company is now building a dam across the Medina river which will be 1360 feet long and 160 feet high and will be one of the largest bridges in the United States.

The election held at Estelle for the purpose of voting \$40,000 for the building of good roads carried by a handsome majority.

A company has been organized in San Antonio with a capital stock of half a million dollars which will manufacture automobile wheels. J. O. Howard of San Antonio was made president and E. L. Farnsworth of Waco, secretary.

The contract will be let soon for the two new buildings that are to be erected by the Cotton Palace Association at Waco. The building are to be completed by the time the Cotton Palace opens in the fall.

A contract has been signed for a 3,000 foot artesian well at Dalhart. It is to show the possibilities of Dallam county in gas, oil and artesian water.

In building for the month of March, Houston stood second in the cities of the United States, Louisville leading the list. Louisville increased 274 per cent and Houston 163 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

The Corsicana Good Roads Association has secured the services of a government engineer from Washington to give a good roads demonstration in Navarro county. The demonstration is one of the preliminaries to a good roads bond issue election which is contemplated at that place.

The Price-Brooks Manufacturing Company is building a canning factory at Mineola, which will be open for business within the next few weeks.

Contract has been let to a San Antonio firm for the construction of the new Federal building at Victoria.

An election has been called for June 26th at Rosenberg, for the purpose of voting bonds to the amount of \$75,000 for building good roads.

Four hundred acres of broom corn is being cultivated in the San Angelo country and this industry which is new to that section of the country will be rapidly widened out and many hundred acres more will be planted next year. Mr. J. J. Cook of Hot Springs, Arkansas, is in San Angelo with a few of establishments a broom factory at that place, and believes that broom corn can be raised with great success in the Concho country.

A Split Log Drag Club is one of the latest organized movements for road building in Texas. The territory covered by a Club usually embraces about six miles of road and the farmers along the route join the club and they pay fifty cents membership dues per month. All the money received by the club is used in defraying the expenses of running a split log drag over the road when needed. The County Commissioners of Cooke county furnish free of charge to each club, a split log drag of steel construction, which cost \$25.00 to build and the club stands the expense of operation. Cooke county now has eleven of these clubs in op-

eration and the results are so satisfactory that the movement is rapidly spreading through the entire county. The businessmen of Gainesville assist in the organizations. It is quite a common occurrence for fifteen or twenty merchants and bankers to ride ten or twenty miles in the country to attend a Split Log Drag meeting and they usually join the club, lending their moral and financial support to the movement.

Government engineers are making a preliminary survey of the boundary line between the United States and Mexico. At present the Rio Grande river is the boundary line, but this stream changes its bed as often as a tramp and has kept Uncle Sam guessing ever since the Treaty of Peace with Mexico and he is now endeavoring to more permanently locate the border line.

Hill county has been largely a corn and cotton section heretofore, but is gradually widening its wheat district and the splendid success with this year's crop in spite of the drouth which has prevailed over the State will give an impetus to the raising of cereals in that part of the State.

The public flinger today is pointed to the duty of the States and nations towards the good roads question. Texas needs more roads and better roads.

Farmers everywhere are giving their earnest support to the good roads movement, for they realize that good roads will promote social intercourse as well as cheaper transportation.

A good feature of the bond issue for building good roads is that posterity will help to pay

for good roads which the present generation makes. As posterity will enjoy the benefits of these good roads this is but just.

A bond issue seems the logical and just way to finance a county's road building. By an issue of bonds all property owners become helpers in the road proposition and the town man with the automobile bears his part of the expense with the farmer.

Texas is to have a land show. The real estate men of Texas are making plans for an exposition of Texas products to be held in Houston in November, the date to be decided on later. Enough funds have already been secured to insure the plans being carried out, and prominent business men of Houston and other South Texas cities are taking active interest in the

movement. Mr. Max Rosen of Houston, who is general manager of the exposition, is mailing out thousands of pieces of literature and the association has established a press bureau in St. Louis for the purpose of working up interest in the project in the North and East. The fact that Texas leads all States in the Union in agricultural production assures the complete success of such an exposition.

The matter of the approach to the Brady bridge was satisfactorily adjusted last week, Hess & Skinner, the contractors, agreeing to fill in the approach for a distance of thirty feet.
