



SANTA FE SCHEDULE

REGULAR SERVICE WILL BE DELAYED SOMEWHAT.

Latest Advice From G. P. A. Keenan Says Regular Schedule Only From Sellman.

W. D. Crothers is in receipt of further advice from G. P. A. W. S. Keenan, of the Santa Fe. regarding the installation of regular train service into Brady, in which he states that he regrets exceedingly to advise that their engineering department now is of the opinion that it will be impossible to operate trains between Sellman and Brady by August 12th, as he advised in his previous letter, on account of the present condition of the track, and the further reason that it would seriously interfere with construction work. Accordingly, the regular schedule to and from Brady has been postponed until construction work is further ad-

However, he states that trains will be operated between Brady and Lometa on the four days of the San Saba Fair, upon the schedule previously announced. Commencing August 12th, regular service will be inaugurated between Sellman and Lometa.



WORK ON S. F. STOPPED

RAILS LAID TO THE FRISCO CROSSING AT SELLMAN.

Frisco Refuses to Allow Santa Fe to Cross Till Agreement for Maintenance is Signed.

Quite a party of Brady citizens who chanced to go out to the Frisco crossing at Sellman shortly after dinner Wednesday to see how the work was progressing and to watch the laying of the steel on the Santa Fe, were treated to the rare sight of two great railroad systems locking horns. Just as the party reached the point of operation section foreman, Herring, of the Frisco, took up his position in the middle of the right-of-way and warned the Santa Fe tracklayers not to attempt to cross the Frisco tracks. The steel had been laid up to the crossing and there remained nothing further for the Santa Fe tracklayers to do but lay down their tools and quit work until the barrier is removed. Accordingly, the crew was called off and returned with the engine to Richland Springs. Work on stringing ties west of the crossing was continued as before.


