BUILDING UNION DEPOT AVERT A WATER FAMINE

MATERIAL ARRIVING FOR
NEW DEPOTS.

Contractor Arrived Wednesday.
Six Cars of Lumber Here and
Work Begins at Once.

The north side presents a scene of surprising activity this week, and sightseers are well repaid for a visit upon the grounds. Possibly the most interesting news is that six cars of lumber are already on the ground and work on the freight depots will begin at once. H. D. McCoy, the contractor who will have charge of the building of both the freight and passenger depots, arrived from Cleburne Wednesday and is in active charge of the work.

There has been some doubt as to whether the Santa Fe and Frisco would combine their depots, more especially since the Frisco is contemplating the Mason extension, but this doubt has been dispelled, and Brady takes pride in the fact that it will have as well a union depot as can be found at any town of its size on either of the two great systems.

The freight depot will be of frame, the depot and platform occupying a space of 40x360 feet, and being located east of Bridge street, between the Santa Fe and Frisco tracks. The building will be double in construction, with a driveway through the middle, the Santa Fe occupying one side and the Frisco the other, each of the roads having their own agent.

The passenger depot will be built of brick, with tile roof, and will be located west of Bridge street, on the spot now occupied by the Frisco main line. Work will begin in the next few days, is the statement of Contractor McCoy. A joint agent will have charge of the passenger depot. The combined cost of the passenger and freight depots is placed at \$20,000.

A gang of about fifty men is at present engaged in laying track and putting in switches and side tracks. The main line of the Santa Fe is now being laid north of the track used as the main line at present and the latter will be torn up as soon as the permanent main line is completed, this latter being on a straight line with the Lometa extension.

F. Merritt, chief engineer, M. F. Temple, constructing engineer, and W. A. Hudson, right-of-way agent, were Santa Fe officials in Brady Wednesday looking over the grounds and inspecting the progress of the work. They left yesterday morning for the Eden country.

EVERY HYDRANT IN TOWN
SUPPLYING NEEDS.

Prompt Action by City Council
and Untiring Efforts of Water
Co. Deserving of Praise

Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock the engine at the hole of water in Bumgardner's pasture was started, and at the time of this writing, Thursday morning, every hydrant in Brady is supplying water for every need.

That a serious shortage of water was averted is due entirely to the timely action of the city council in purchasing the pipe necessary to connect the city mains with the hole of water generously offered by Mr. C. C. Bumgardner, and to the untiring efforts of the water company in making the connection. The feat of laying and connecting 8,000 feet of pipe, moving the engine and pump from the hole west of town and getting it in operation was accomplished in a period of 43 hours, the pipe having come in at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, and water being pumped into the mains by 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

At that the company had to break in green hands, and with such disadvantages as the pipe being too hot from the sun's rays to be handled with any facility. Yet the work went on day and night, one crew working without stopping the entire time, except to take lunch at noon and again at midnight. Manager Martin himself was on the job for 54 hours without a wink of sleep.

The most pleasing feature of the work, at least to the management, was that there was not a single leak of any consequence in the whole 8,000 feet of pipe when the water was turned into it.

City Council Meeting.

The city council held the regular meeting Tuesday night, with Aldermen Anderson, Martin, Baze and McKnight present, and with Mayor Pro Tem Abney presiding.

The monthly report of the city secretary and treasurer for the month of July was presented, approved and ordered filed. The report shows balances as follows: General fund, \$203.12; Street fund, \$519.11; Sinking fund, \$3,619.28; Officers' fund, \$75.40; The report of City Marshal Sheridan was also presented, approved and ordered filed, and shows collections amounting to \$60.00.

The City Marshal was instructed to notify parties having closets on their premises which are inaccessible to the city scavenger to have them to place same where it can be gotten to.



Ordered the survey of the 17,700 acres of school lands in Hockley county belonging to McCulloch county, and delegated Prof. Lowrance, of Rochelle, to attend to the surveying. The lands will be laid out in sections. The court expects to conclude its session this morning.

LOCKETT ADAIR ON BRADY

Interesting Letter from the Great Evangelist Giving His Impression of Brady and Her People--What Some Brady Citizens Think About Lockett Adair.

EDITOR'S NOTE--The article by Rev. Lockett Adair on Brady was not received until Tuesday, too late for publication in the Special Edition. Also several endorsements of the evangelist by Brady citizens had to be omitted. We publish them below, together with Rev. Adair's article.

I do not hesitate to say that Brady is one of the most progressive towns in the Southwest. Brady is near the geographical center of the state. It is therefore free from the oppressive heat of the long summers. The altitude is about 1750 feet, with climatic conditions that make it possible to enjoy every season throughout the year. Brady has enjoyed a marvelous growth. During the past year hundreds of residences have been built and new industrial and commercial enterprises started representing many thousands of dollars.

Brady has four feed stores, three tailoring stores, two saddle and harness shops, thirteen dry goods stores, three watchmakers and jewelers, four barber shops, four gins, five drug houses, six land companies, sixteen grocery houses, seven buggy and carriage houses, three racket stores, three millinery departments, six hardware and implement stores, two oil mills, one compress, four wagon yards, five blacksmith shops, two railroads, bottling works, steam laundry, ice factory, bakery, three furniture stores, two livery stables, two automobile garages, five lumber yards, planing mill, three photo galleries, one theater, four houses handling wind mills, three printing houses, paint shop, two meat markets, three shoe repair shops, two undertakers, two tin shops, three transfers, two second hand stores, eight physicians, two dentists, water works, electric light plant, with continuous service, three banks, high and ward schools, local and long distance telephone exchange, Western Union telegraph office, etc.

Brady is a farming and stock country combined, and is one of the best for cotton and feed stuffs, maize, kaffir corn, sorghum and oats. In 1899 Brady shipped 89,000 pounds of pecans--seven car loads. This was a great thing for the people who owned the pecan groves. Brady is growing rapidly, and will, I believe, be one of the great cities of the West. Its location is fine for the building of a city. Brady has two railroads, the Santa Fe and the Frisco. The latter has been running for nearly ten years and now is running to Menard. It is said the soil of McCulloch county is especially adapted to the growing of cotton, and it is in the production of the fleecy staple that this section excels. Cotton is notoriously a "hard labor" crop, but it is said that one man can cultivate two or three times the number of acres in cotton in the Brady country than he can "back east", and a cotton crop is made here with less expense and greater yield than there. Moreover, the crop is more nearly free from pests, such as the boll weevil, than in the older cotton growing sections of the state. Brady affords a splendid market for the staple, and in the season of 1908-09 50,000 bales were marketed in this city from wagons. The town has two large oil mills and a fine compress, which assures the best market prices at all times for both the lint and seed. Brady has established a reputation for being the best cotton market in Central West Texas.

Not only is Brady and McCulloch county noted for its cotton interests, but its cattle interests are said to be the best in the world. A great many cattlemen live at Brady. Brady has very fine schools and a fine lot of teachers. The people of Brady are among some of the finest I have ever met, being kind, hospitable, big hearted, generous, and a great people to live with. I have never enjoyed the company more in my traveling experience than those of Brady.

The business men of Brady are up-to-date, progressive and wide-awake. Brady has some very fine business concerns,

whose buildings are all modern. Brady has a first class hotel where any man can take his wife and children and leave them there in perfect safety. Mr. Cook, the manager of the hotel, will do all that a gentleman can do to guarantee the best attention. The noble men and grand women of Brady I'll never forget.

Brady is a dry town and a booze fighter would have a lonely time in Brady, for the law is enforced to the letter. The county judge, the prosecuting attorney and sheriff are good men and members of the church. The boot legger hikes when he reaches Brady and never returns.

There is at Brady a Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Christian, Episcopal, Church of Christ and Catholic church, and all doing a great work, led by the faithful pastors. The pastors of Brady are a wide-awake, up-to-date set of men, and their members are very devoted to them and all were hard workers in the meeting just closed. The Sunday schools are doing fine work. The Presbyterian church has the honor of having a lady superintendent, Mrs. A. M. Martin, who is also a faithful church worker.

Everybody and all denominations worked together for the salvation of souls in the meeting. One could not tell one denomination from another.

I was entertained in the home of the Methodist pastor, a noble man of God, and his wife was very kind to me. I have never been in a home that I enjoyed any more than Bro. King's. He is a king and his wife a queen.

Well, the best I can say is Praise the Lord for Brady, her people, her churches, her pastors.

With best wishes for Brady, and may God bless her.

LOCKETT ADAIR.

Brady, Texas, Aug. 7, 1911. Brady has just witnessed one of the greatest spiritual awakenings that was ever seen here.

Brother Lockett Adair, of Dallas, closed his meeting Sunday night with 452 conversions, after two weeks of the most practical evangelistic work I have ever seen, in fact his whole system of work is on a plain, practical, common sense plan.

Being raised in Brady, and loving her and her people, and interested in everything that would promote the well-being and up-building of her people, I feel prompted to submit the above remarks.

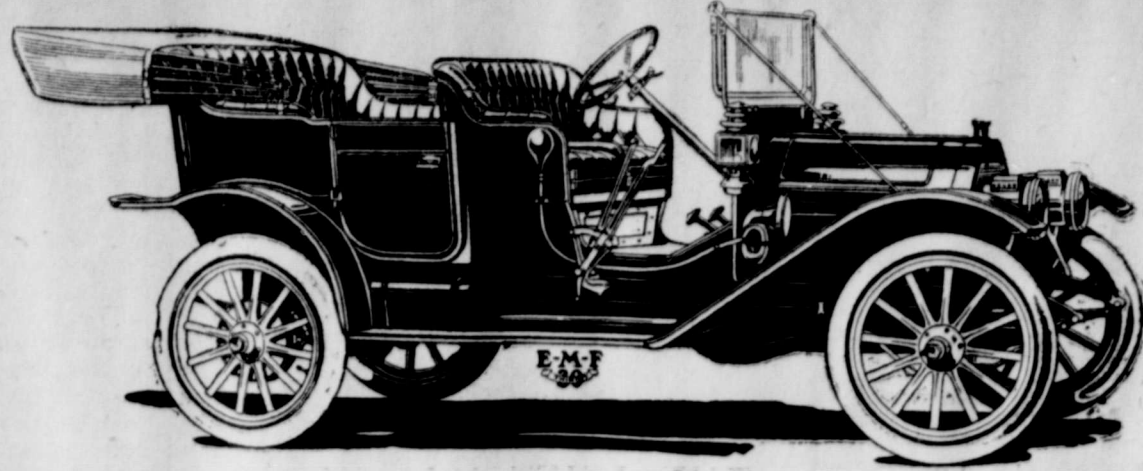

What Friends Say.

Rev. J. Frank Smith, D. D., of Dallas, wrote as follows:

"The Central church, Dallas, has had a genuine revival. It came not as a surprise, but as a thing planned, prayed over, preached about. The leader in the movement was Evangelist Lockett Adair, a member of the local church, and for the five years since his conversion known as the 'policeman evangelist.'"

"Mr. Adair is a plain man of the people, but this does not mean that he is ordinary. He speaks the language of the masses, but this is not to be interpreted to mean that it is not full of thought. Mr. Adair preaches the truth as pointedly as Finney. It is no sentimental something that he preaches, no string of Moody anecdotes. His message is that a soul should repent, get right with God and man, and live the Christian life here and now. From study of books since his conversion, and the deep experience before and since that memorable event, he knows what conviction, conversion and consecration are. He publishes facts; not theories. The spirit of God uses mightily this man and his truth.

"The results of the meeting cannot be fewer than seventy-five professions of faith. Fifty-eight joined the church during the revival—all but four, adults. Others will doubtless come in. The offering of the people for the meeting was over \$500. This was freely and joyfully given. People who had not worked before led men to Jesus. The youth and the gray headed met at the same mercy seat. All sorts of Christians mingled in the work and shared in the blessings. While strictly a church meeting, it was not offensively denominational. Preachers from other churches took Mr. Adair's place when he was ill, and the meeting went on with good interest. But in all services the church, the whole church, was exalted next to the truth of God. The attendance was a practical demonstration of the fact that men will flock to the church when there is something to flock to, and that no pastor and people need fear a meeting such as has blessed our church."

What Dr. Gambrell, editor of the Baptist Standard, says of Lockett Adair:

"Lockett Adair is holding a meeting in Dallas. He is a mighty man of valor, a kind of John the Baptist, in dealing with sin and unrighteousness, but after the manner of Paul in preaching salvation."

Rev. Lockett Adair left Elgin with the blessing of every saint and sinner in this town and in the surrounding country heaped upon him. He was the means of bringing father's son and mother's daughter to Christ; people who were at outs with one another and have been for years, have joined hands and forgotten the past; there is not a man nor woman in this country who are yet out of Christ who has not made a mental resolve to try and lead a better life in the future; in some cases whole families were converted and Lockett Adair is the cause of it all; every man, woman and child shook hands with him Sunday at the close of the service and his memory will linger in our midst throughout our remaining years.—Elgin Courier.

"I've a contempt for any church member who drinks whiskey. One of those old fellows who says his stomach is out of order and he gets a jug of whiskey and puts a dime's worth of roots in it and takes it again and again for his stomach's sake until he drinks it all up, then gets more whiskey, but no more roots. 'You old devil, you'd better stop!' Whiskey makes heartaches, widows and orphans. It destroys your influence and your character—men, for your own sake, don't sell out for a drink of whiskey."

"Some sell out for money. Have you any of those stingy scoundrels here who say, 'let everybody go to hell—just give me money.' Some of you old fellows will save until you die, and then your wife will marry a man with enough sense to live decent."

"We can help any man in Brady no matter how far away from God he may be, if he is only game. No man can do much for a coward. It takes a real man and a real woman, not a made up thing to do right."

"I want to inform you church peo-

ple who are opposed to personal work in the congregation, that you and the devil are agreed exactly."

"Keep your eye on these old boys who are well up on dancing, and you'll find most of them when they want to marry look in on the prayer meeting crowd."

"Let it be fully understood that I don't want any of you preachers or anybody else to be around apologizing for anything I may say while in this town. If anybody has a kick to make, let 'em come to me. I'm a man and can do my own apologizing."

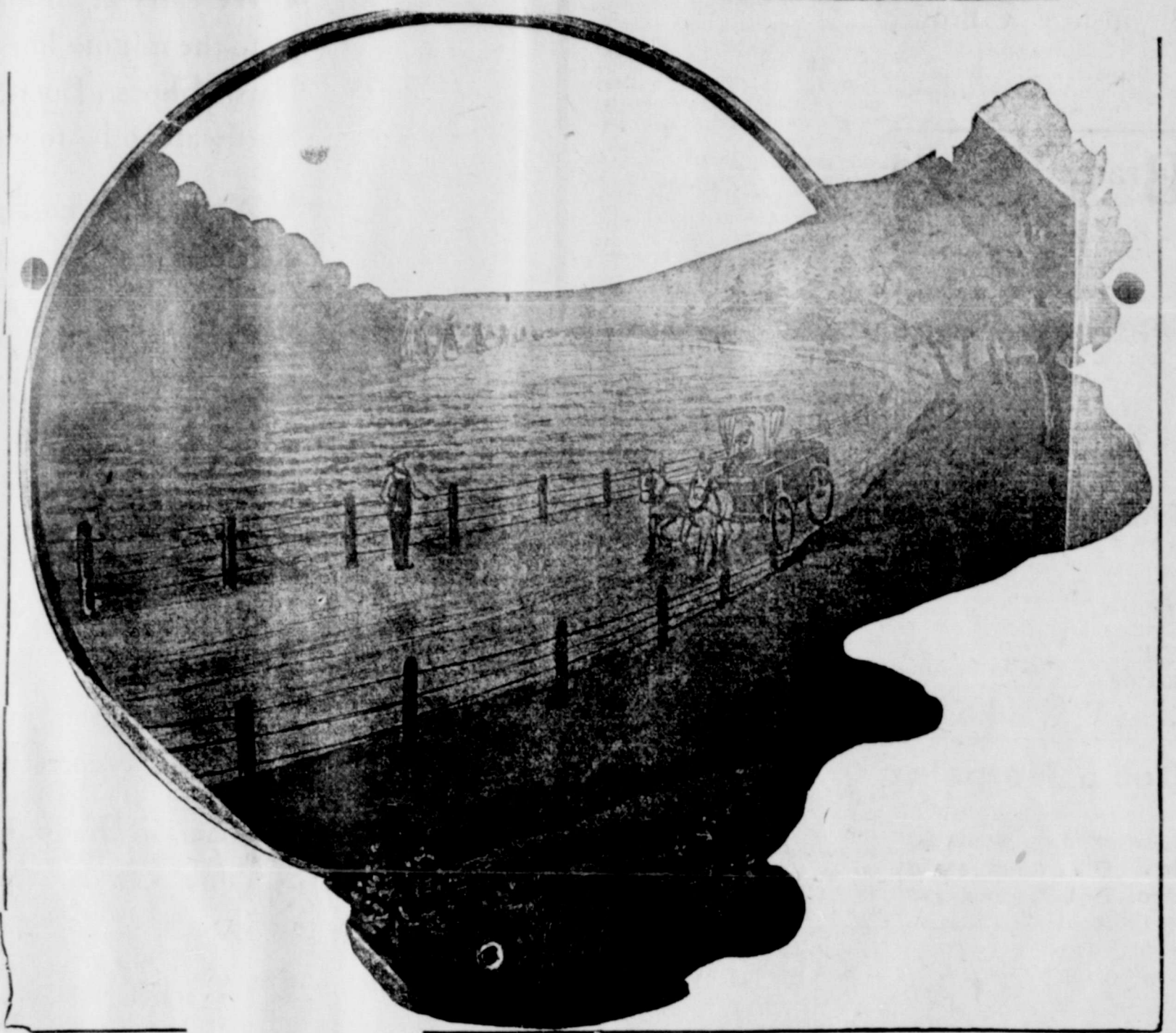

United Charities.

Every public enterprise, whether of independent or dependent nature, is subject to criticism and praise. It matters not how honestly men may perform their duties in the management of these institutions, some will growl because of envy or the business is not conducted according to the ideas of the fault-finder. Some are charitable enough to praise honest efforts even when they do not understand all the troubles that confront those who deal with the public.

In the organization of the United Charities Association for the city of Brady, it was understood that all funds raised to maintain this worthy institution would be for the poor of this city alone. It is next to impossible to raise sufficient funds for those elsewhere who may be in want. For instance, when a man meets with reverses by fire or otherwise who may live far out in the country, it would not be fair to take money raised for one purpose and give to another. If the people of the county had fellowship in the maintenance of the funds, then as a matter of justice, the help should be in proportion to the giving.

The object of the institution is for the protection of our poor, to protect the credulous and Christian people who are good enough to help the unfortunate and to keep out the professional beggar.

The United Charities has helped with the very meagre funds; they have had in their hands about twenty cases of real charity; bought shrouds and helped to dig the graves of at least half a dozen people; found homes for six orphans; found employment for quite a number of men; run out of the city five professional beggars who were unworthy; stopped at least a dozen people from circulating petitions on the streets, and in each case gave the subject a personal investigation; yet the officers and directors not only give their time without remuneration, but are regular contributors to the general fund. Our pay from the public consists in criticism and some very wholesome abuse. This sort of pay comes regularly, therefore we are not disappointed, nor the least bit discouraged.

We employ no collector, but depend altogether upon the contributors to pay their subscriptions whenever convenient. This may be the reason we are nearly always handicapped for funds to help as liberally as we should.

Inasmuch as this is a charitable organization, where every cent given is spent for charity, we feel that more of our citizens should be members. If we are to enlarge, as we should, the good people of the county should have fellowship in money, clothes and anything that is good for the poor.

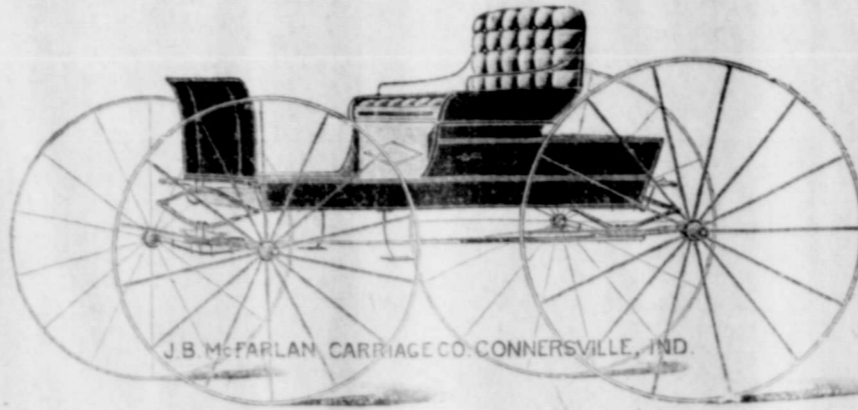
