R. K. Finlay, of Fife, was here Wednesday on business.

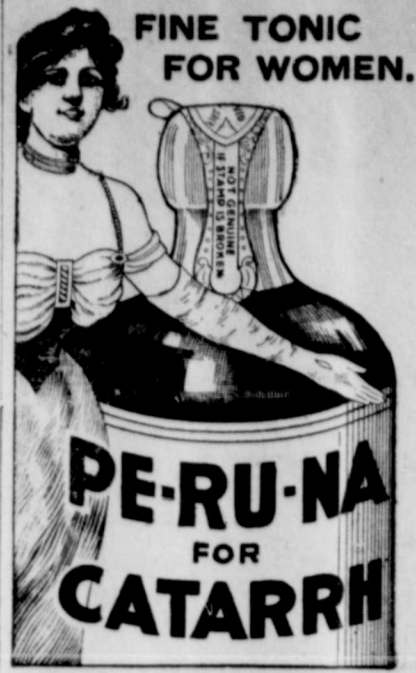

 Washington, Sept. 8.—Two Texas congressmen will be in the list of delegates from the United States to the international peace conference, to be held in London early next month. These will be Representatives John H. Stevens of Vernon, and James L. Slayden of San Antonio.

**A LOCAL PARCELS POST FOR A BEGINNING.**

As an entering wedge to start the system of parcels post which has been agitating the people of this country for a long time, the suggestion to be made by Postmaster General Hitchcock in his coming annual report is believed to be worthy of attention by Congress. This beginning looking to further accommodation of the people is simply that the parcels post be established at this time on the rural routes of the country and to be strictly local in its operation. That is to say, the local postoffice and its patrons on the several radial roads used for rural routes will constitute the system, there being no provision for sending parcels from one postoffice to another, but only between the postoffice and its patrons on the rural routes appertenant to it.

This is a very different proposition from the establishment of a general parcels post, but it is thought that it will serve to show the operation and the desirability of such a system. The limited service which is recommended by the Postmaster General will not entail much extra expense to the Postoffice Department. Rural carriers now possess practically all the equipment necessary to handle the business that is suggested to be embraced in the initial efforts of the department.

Some idea of the extent of the system contemplated by Mr. Hitchcock's suggestion can be gleaned from the fact that there are now approximately 42,000 rural free delivery mail routes in the United States, ranging from six to twenty-four miles in length. The number of persons served by these routes has recently been estimated by the department to be 20,000,000.—Dallas News.

He plants six to seven acres in corn every year and his experience is that he has made enough each year to fatten his meat hogs. Last year he made 48 bushels and this year he has made 70 bushels. But that is not what interests me so much as his remarks on his feed crops. He says that in proportion to amount of ground planted, his feed crops every year he has been here has made him more money than his cotton crop. Last year he sold \$120 worth of feed, the year before, \$250, and the year before that more than \$100. Last year he planted five acres in cane and got 4000 bundles. The Echo man never farmed in Texas, but the Echo can give the successful experiences of the farmers here and others can profit thereby.—Eden Echo.

"My husband, then a young man, clipped this twig and for more than forty years kept it placed beside a picture of the commander-in-chief of the Confederacy. Upon his death two years ago, he gave it to me as a trust and I will hand it down to my children, requesting that it may be preserved as an ever present reminder of the greatest struggle of modern times, in which their blood engaged.

"Several hundred pieces were chipped from the old tree and I doubt not but that these are being preserved as religiously in other homes as in my own. Without bread the veteran soldiers went to their homes throughout the South, carrying with them the twigs as a token that they had remained in the fight until the end."—Fort Worth Star Telegram.

**NAVY DESERTER.**

**Worked on Santa Fe Extension Near Brady.**

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 9.—The routine life of the men who go down to sea in ships, wearing the blue uniform of a man-of-war's man for Uncle Sam palled on Norman C. Beach, after about eight months of it, so he deserted his ship at New Orleans last June and started for Texas and the great Southwest.

In a cell at the Central police station Friday Beach gave it as his opinion that his life since leaving his ship at New Orleans had been worse than even the rigid discipline which prevails on a modern battleship.

"Honestly, I'm tired of dodging officers, and I couldn't get work," the boy said—he is only about 20 years old—"so I came to Fort Worth and decided to give up."

Beach met Detective Ben Bell on Thursday night and asked if he was an officer. Bell said he was and then Beach informed him that he was a deserter from the navy and anxious to return. Bell took him in charge and the navy department at Washington has been notified.

Beach enlisted at New York City Aug. 16, 1910. He was at the Newport training school for a short time and then was sent on board the old battleship Indiana for a trial cruise. He was transferred to the battleship Idaho when the warship started up the Mississippi river last spring. At New Orleans Beach says he deserted.

Beach is quite well known in Brady among the employes of Contractor D. J. Griffith, having worked on the Santa Fe grade for some time. From here he went to Fort Worth, where shortly after he surrendered. His appearance and actions here were remarked upon by W. E. Shotwell and others who formed the opinion that he might be a deserter.

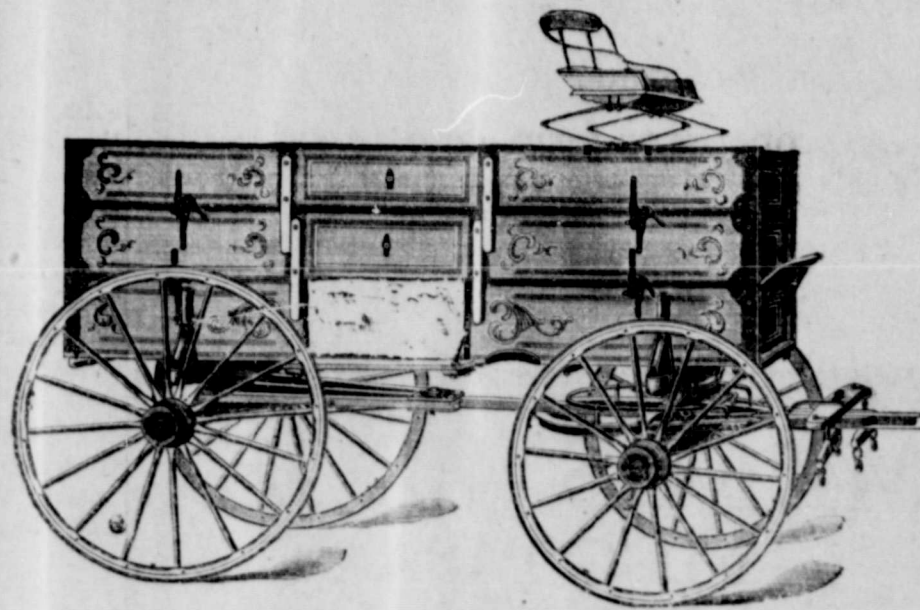
