FACTORY IS ASSURED

25-TON PLANT WILL BE INSTALLED.

Deal Was Closed Last Week for Lot North of the Creek for Location of Factory.

A deal was closed last week by the Melton Land Co., whereby they transfer to Stephen Boggs, of Lamar, Colo., a lot north of Brady creek at a consideration of \$1000 and arrangements are being made by Mr. Boggs to begin in a few days the installation of a 25-ton daily capacity ice factory.

Mr. Boggs was here a few weeks ago and looked over the local situation and stated before leaving that everything "looked good to him," and that he thought he would locate here. He asked the co-operation of the Brady Commercial club in the matter of some minor details to be looked after and stated that they were at liberty to investigate his standing thoroughly before taking any steps in his behalf. This was done, with the result that he was found to be thoroughly trustworthy and financially able to carry out any contract which he undertook.

Mr. Boggs proposes to take over the stock in the old ice factory with stock in the new concern and it is thought that this arrangement can be made without any serious difficulty, as the dividends in the old concern have

PLAGIARISM.

Magnified Menard is still trying to emulate bully old Brady. They have even adopted our city ordinances for the government of their citizenship.

The special edition of Comanche Pioneer Exponent recently issued is a very creditable one, both from a mechanical and editorial viewpoint. The issue consisted of sixteen pages, replete with half-tone engravings of Comanche homes and her prominent citizens, as well as rural scenes near the city.

RURAL PARCELS POST.

The proposal of the postmaster general to establish a limited parcels post on rural delivery routes is free from many of the most serious objections that have been made against the introduction of a general parcels post throughout the country. As we understand Secretary Hitchcock's plan it provides for delivery to patrons of rural routes of parcels posted on the route or at the postoffice from which the route is operated.

This, in effect, is only legalizing and fixing rates for a service that is now performed in a desultory and unofficial way by rural carriers, who for the accommodations of the people perform such service without charge or for their own profit.

There is a real necessity for some agency for handling small packages between town and country and between points in the country. There is no rural freight or express service and conditions are such that private enterprise will probably never establish one. The farmer who must have a small package from his trading town or desires to send one to a neighbor must carry it himself at a relatively high cost. The performance of this service by the postal department appears to be well within the rule, loosely stated, that it is the duty of government to do for the whole people those necessary things which the people cannot do for themselves.

Such an extension of the postal service is not open to the objection that it makes the government the competitor of private business, nor will it have the effect of subjecting local merchants to unfair and unequal competition of powerful mail order houses. It is merely an extension of the postal system to meet a real need.

As a matter of fact we already have a universal parcels post and have had since the postal system was established. The government now accepts for transmission through the mails countless articles of merchandise and things other than letters, papers and other communications of information and intelligence. At present, however, the carriage of parcels is limited to such as by reason of size and weight may not be conveniently or cheaply handled by freight or express. The minimum charges for freight and ex-

press shipments are such that it would not be practicable to send many small parcels by either, and such are now carried by the postal service.

Thus, the question is, not whether we shall establish a parcels post, but whether we shall extend the service. What ever may be thought of the wisdom and expediency of a universal extension there is much to be said for the desirability of going as far as has been suggested by the postmaster general and raising the limit of size and weight of articles that may be transmitted over rural routes. —Fort Worth Record.

PASSING BOGUS CHECKS.

Man Arrested Here Last Week for Forgery.

Deputy Sheriff John DeSpain returned to San Angelo Thursday, having in custody two men accused of passing bogus checks to which the name of Mayor J. D. Hassell had been forged. One of the prisoners was arrested at Brady and the other at Ballinger. They were lodged in the Tom Green county jail to await an examining trial, which has not been set.

Officers have been working on clues since a check bearing the bogus signature of the mayor was turned down and reported by a local bank teller, who knew at first glance that the signature was not genuine. Upon investigation it was found that three such checks had been passed on local merchants. Each was in the sum of \$7.70.

The authorities have been working up evidence which they believe will result in convictions. They think the checks were forged by transients who expected to be beyond the reach of local officers before the forgery would be discovered.—San Angelo Standard.

Henry Bobbitt, one of the men referred to in the above dispatch, was arrested in Brady last week by Sheriff J. C. Wall and turned over to the sheriff of Tom Green county. A quantity of clothing which was stolen in San Angelo, was found in the possession of Bobbitt.

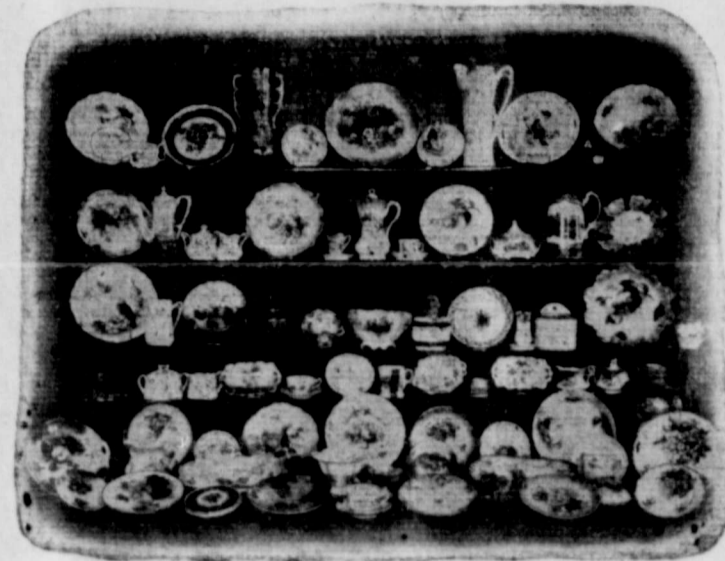

Santa Fe to Run Trains by that Date.

Official announcement has been made that the Santa Fe will operate trains into Eden on the Lometa branch Oct. 16. The citizens of Eden are planning a big celebration for that date and will ask for special rates in order to bring a crowd there from all over the state.

The Santa Fe officials of Texas are expected to be in Eden on that date. A barbecue and general jollification will be given in their honor. Tracklaying on the Lometa branch is progressing rapidly and the line will be completed early next month. Eden is 85 miles from Brady, to which place through freight and passenger service has been established already. It is 103 miles from Lometa.

For the present it is believed that Eden will be the terminus of the Santa Fe branch, although it has been rumored that it will be extended to San Antonio. A movement is on foot in San Angelo, fifty miles to the northwest, to build a railroad to connect with the Eden branch.
