THE UNIVERSITY Interscholastic League (UIL) announced changes in which brought at least a numerical change to every high school in the state. It's the first sweeping change in the "numbering system" which
groups schools into districts in about 25 years.

The UIL decided to do away with the " B " classification. Perhaps the schools which had been in this numerical division objected to the

rest. So, conference B has been eliminated, or re-assigned as conference A .
All the rest of the classification have been jumped up a step, so tha
the highest classification, which used to be AAAA, is now AAAAA. As we understand it, the same schools will remain in Bovina's district alignment for another two
