ENTERS SECOND YEAR

Bull Town Bulletins

THE UNIVERSITY Interscholastic League (UIL) announced changes in its classification system this week, which brought at least a numerical change to every high school in the state. It's the first sweeping change in the "numbering system" which groups schools into districts in about 25 years.

Bovina, for example, will be in class AA. No, the school won't be moved up to compete in the same district with such schools as Friona and Muleshoe, it's just that every level is being advanced a notch.

The UIL decided to do away with the "B" classification. Perhaps the schools which had been in this numerical division objected to the indication that they were below all the rest. So, conference B has been eliminated, or re-assigned as conference A.

All the rest of the classifications have been jumped up a step, so that the highest classification, which used to be AAAA, is now AAAAA.

As we understand it, the same schools will remain in Bovina's district alignment for another two years. The only difference is that the district will now be known as 3-AA.

So, like the Jeffersons of television fame, we're just "Movin' on up!"

DON'T KNOW IF you have been following the antics of Lubbock's cartoonist-mayor, Dirk West, in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, but if you have, then you probably know about the running battle which developed between the cartoonist and the people over at Muleshoe.

It all started about a month ago in West's weekly cartoons about the Southwest Conference games. He showed the Houston Cougar, who is portrayed as a scraggly alley cat, pawing through a trash can, and saying something like "This is about as bad as finding a good place to eat in Muleshoe."

West followed that up the next week with one of his "background signs," which proclaimed Muleshoe as the site of the "1980 Kaopectate Festival." The next one said that Muleshoe had been named the "City of the Year" by Maalox.

The good people at Muleshoe objected to West's remarks, and the Chamber of Commerce president there invited, and virtually insisted that West come to Muleshoe for dinner. (He admitted in a newspaper article that he had not eaten there prior to the cartoon episode, that "Muleshoe just had a funny ring to its name.")

We saw some friends from Muleshoe this week, and they were telling us that Monday of this week was the big day, when Mayor West came to town, to settle the issue. They said that Dirk played the matter to the hilt, dressed in a black tuxedo. He also had a big, burly policeman for a bodyguard, and an official "taster," just in case the Muleshoe cooks wanted to really get even.

The upshot of the whole deal was that Muleshoe received considerable publicity, and even though some of this publicity might have been considered a dubious honor, most people no doubt took the cartoons in the light in which they were intended.

Once before, West had had the Texas Aggie in his cartoon saying he had just won a contest, and that first prize was a week in Borger. He went on to say that second prize was two weeks in Borger. "I just pick these places out at random. There was no malicious intent," West assured the folks at Muleshoe.

New Ambulance Is Service's New Goal

Thursday, November 1, Bovina Ambulance Service completed a year of service to the area and community. Through the generosity of residents and businesses, the service has acquired all of the equipment needed for efficient emergency treatment. In addition, the crew has reached a high standard of training with ten members presently on the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians. Three others are state-registered EMT's and four are ECA's.

The organization moved into its second year of operations with a new, big goal, a new ambulance. "Although the old vehicle is running well, it is old and will become increasingly undependable," a spokesman for the service said.

"Also, it was not intended as an ambulance when it was built, so it offers only limited room for patient treatment. Only one patient can be carried and treated in the back of the ambulance. We could carry two, but there would be no way to give them any attention they might need on the way to the hospital as the two stretchers would completely fill the back of the ambulance."

At the present time, members of the service and the city council are looking at available equipment from several agencies which specialize in building ambulances. Bids are being taken and the advantages of each make are being studied to determine which vehicle will best meet the needs of the City of Bovina now and in the future.

Members of the service have been numbering houses in Bovina and collecting aluminum for recycling in their efforts to help raise the money needed for the new vehicle. "However, we feel that the new ambulance should be a concern of all the people in this area, not just those who are actively working on the service," a member of the crew stated.

"We hope that local people will want to have a part in this undertaking. For this reason, we are asking for donations of money or corn, cotton or other crops to help us make the down payment on the new ambulance. As things now stand, we will be making payments for a long time unless we get a lot of help. We want to purchase a vehicle the town can be proud of and depend on for the foreseeable future."

During the year of operation, the service has transported fifty-seven persons to area hospitals including one to Hereford and one to Lubbock. Of this number seventeen were children or youth and eighteen were senior citizens. The majority were injured in automobile accidents but seven were injured playing football, one basketball and one baseball. In addition, twenty-two were taken to the hospital as a result of illness.

Although several of these people later died as a result of their injury or illness, no one has died in the ambulance. The ambulance has also been staffed and ready at all football games, both varsity, junior varsity, and junior high, and members of the service have been in the stands ready to help at basketball and baseball games.

Local citizens are reminded to bring in their aluminum cans for recycling. Any kind of aluminum including old irrigation tubes can be used. Any farmer with old tubes can have them picked up by calling any member of the service. A new project just begun is recycling old batteries. Batteries may be left at Don's Medicine Chest or call and they will be picked up. It is hoped that everyone in town and the surrounding area will feel that this is their ambulance and will want to have a part in purchasing it.

J.L. Pruitt Named Freeze Date Champ

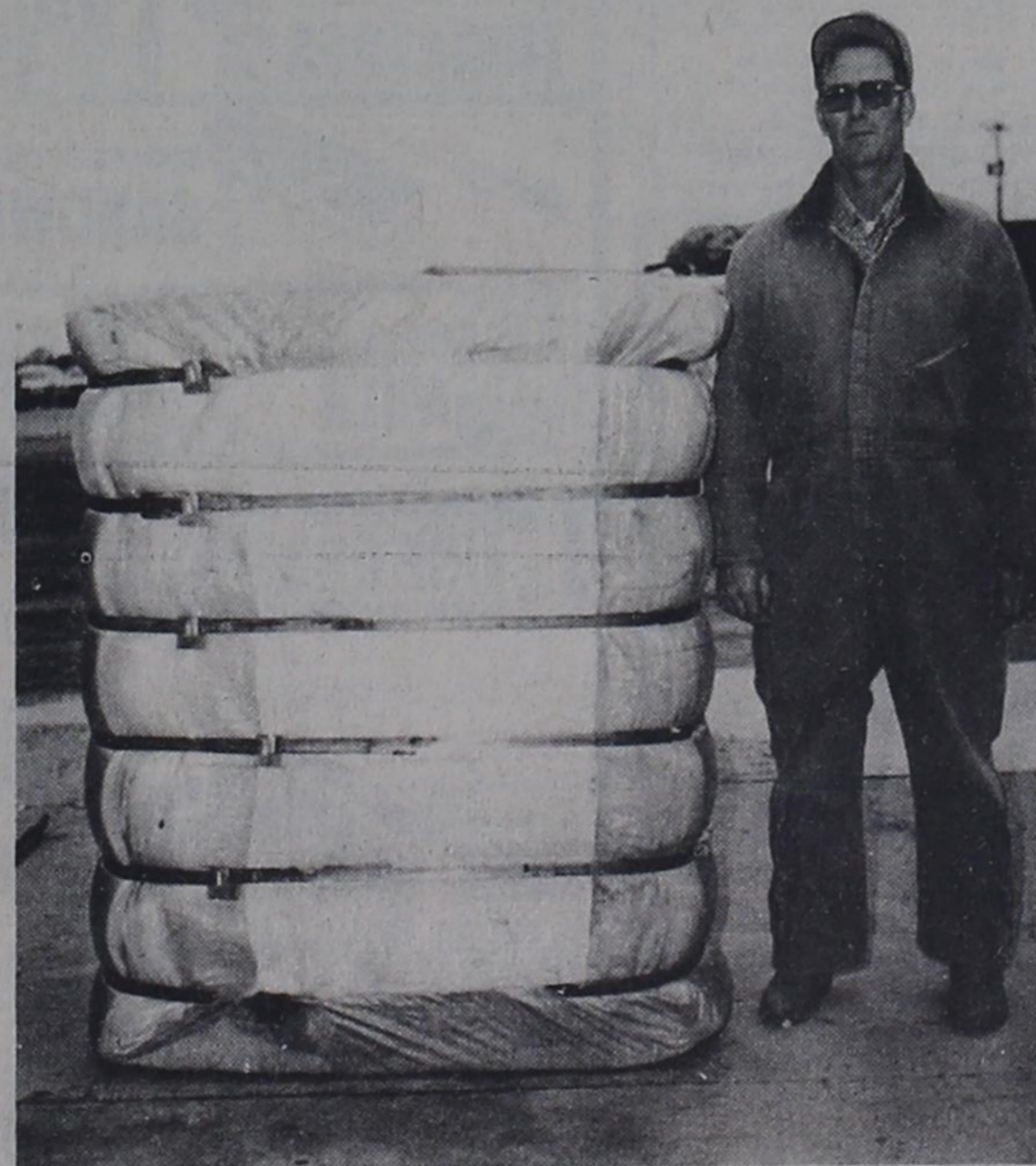

The Steers remained unbeaten, 3-0, in District 3A play, while the Mustangs fell to 0-3 in district. The Mustangs are 1-7 for the season with only two games left on the schedule.

Farwell opened up in the first period with a one yard run by Mac Lonsdale and a PAT to make the score 7-0. The Steers scored again in the second quarter when Langford recovered a Mustang fumble in the end zone. The PAT was good and the

Steers led 14-0 going into the locker room at halftime.

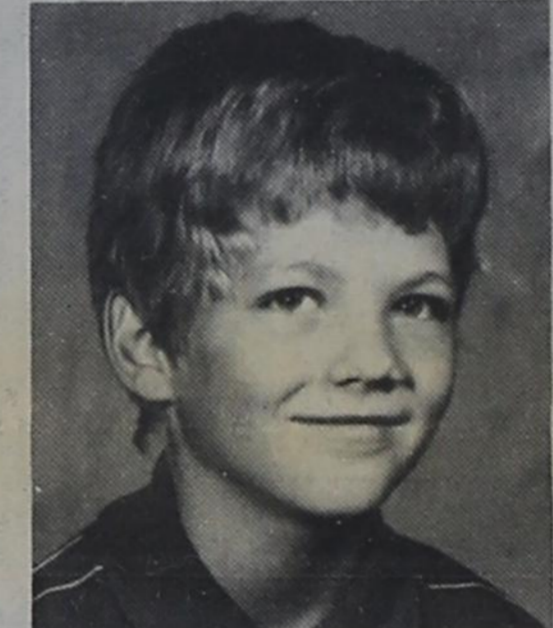

QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT YOUR EYES

By B.W. Armistead & Steven D. Smith Optometrists-Littlefield

Q: Are soft contact lenses for everyone?

A: Not yet, but through recent advances in soft contact lens design and manufacturing techniques, the number of people who cannot wear soft lenses is rapidly diminishing.

Q: What are the advantages of soft contact lenses over hard contact lenses?

A: Soft contact lenses are initially more comfortable than hard contact lenses. They can be worn over a more varied wearing schedule, they are more comfortable in a windy dusty climate, than are the hard contact lenses. Going back and forth between glasses and soft contact lenses is much easier with soft rather than hard contact lenses. Soft contact lenses are generally easier to put on, and to take off than are hard contact lenses.

Q: Can people who have astigmatism wear soft contact lenses?

A: Yes. Thanks to new technology, there are now three soft contact lenses which have been approved by the FDA that can correct for astigmatism.

Q: Can people who wear bifocals wear soft contact lenses and still be able to see both far away and up close?

A: Yes. However, they are corrected differently than they are with glasses. To date, there are not any bifocal soft contact lenses. The problem is solved by fitting one eye for distance and the other eye for near. This technique is monovision. One eye is always focused for distance and the other eye is always focused for near.

Q: Is it more difficult to care for soft contact lenses than for hard contact lenses?

A: No. It does not take any more time to care for soft contact lenses than it does to take proper care of hard contact lenses. After the patient has overcome the fear of handling the lenses and has become proficient in putting them on and taking them off, it actually takes less time to care for the soft contact lenses because part of the cleaning procedure is "automatic."

Q: Can soft contact lenses be worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week?

A: No. Continuous wear soft contact lenses have been used in Canada, Europe and Australia for several years now, but none have FDA approval for use in the United States at this time. The good news is that we expect approval of several lenses for continuous wear use for people who have had cataract surgery during 1979. Within 2 to 3 years, we expect approval of continuous wear lenses for everyone.

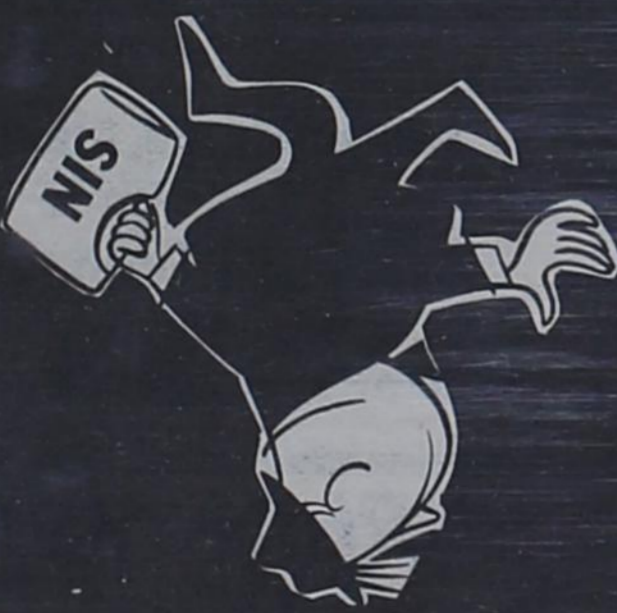

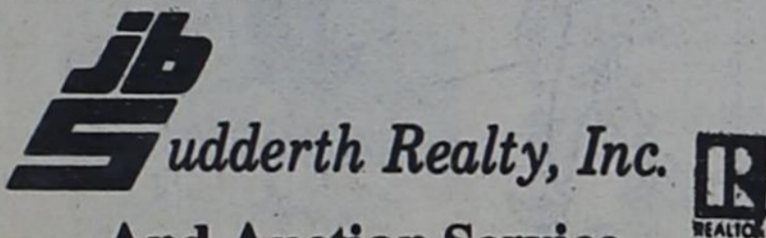

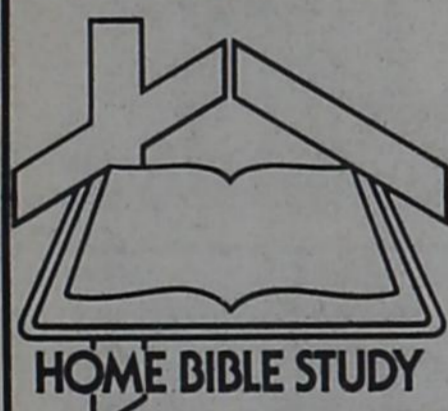
