TO BUILD AN ICE PLANT

NEW JERSEY MAN HAS OBJECT IN VIEW.

Visits Brady and Is Very Favorably Impressed—Takes Option on Location.

Coming all the way from New Jersey with the sole object in view of investigating Brady as a location for an ice plant, is the performance of Abraham Day, one of the most practical and expert ice factory men that has ever visited this section of Texas.

Mr. Day is at present engaged in the ice factory business in New Jersey, but is desirous of making a change of location, and for this reason visited Brady the latter part of last week and until Tuesday of this week. He went over the local ground thoroughly and was highly pleased with the local prospect, the town, and the situation in general, and before leaving stated that he had fully made up his mind to return and establish himself here.

As before stated, Mr. Day is an expert ice manufacturer. His system of ice making is known as the plate system, the ice being frozen in large masses, and the method being considered a long step in advance of the pan system in vogue in Brady at the present, as well as in all neighboring cities. Mr. Day has perfected the plate system, and by a process of his own, claims to be able to manufacture ice at a much lower figure than is possible by any other method. He stated that he could easily dispose of his property in New Jersey, and would install a first-class 20 or 25-ton ice factory in Brady; one that would not only supply every need locally for years to come, but a plant that would enable him to furnish neighboring towns and meet all competition.

Mr. Day took an option on two sites on Brady creek, and immediately upon his return to Brady will sink wells on both of the pieces of property in an endeavor to get a supply of well water sufficient for his needs.

Mr. Day left Tuesday night for Fort Worth, going from there to New Mexico for a look at the country, before returning home. He stated emphati-

cally however, that Brady was what brought him southwest, and that he found Brady a much better place than he had anticipated.

Death of Old Citizen.

S. W. Hughes returned yesterday from Mercury where he had been called by the death of his grandfather, J. W. Black, which occurred at his home Tuesday. Mr. Black had been very feeble the past eight months, and death was caused by old age, he being in his 83rd year. The funeral took place Wednesday, interment being made in the cemetery at Cow Boy.

Mr. Black was one of the old timers in McCulloch county, having located near Mercury in 1874, and having made his home there continuously since. He was an ex-confederate veteran, having served with distinction through the war. He is survived by his daughter, Miss Mollie, who made her home with him, Mrs. S. P. Hughes, of Mercury, and three sons, J. W., Chas. and H. P., all of whom are located in the northwestern states.

FARM DEMONSTRATION DEPARTMENT

J. W. Griffin, Demonstrator

We wish in this article to continue the subject under discussion in last week's issue of the paper.

Deep breaking insures air and heat to a greater depth. The capacity of a given soil to hold firm and capillary moisture depends upon how fine the soil pulverized land three inches of humas in it. Thoroughly pulverized land three inches can't store enough moisture for a crop, and the remedy for this is deep breaking and filling the soil with humas, partly decayed vegetation. The effect of the humas is to increase the storage capacity of soil for water and to reduce evaporation. A pound of humas will store seven and one-half times as much water as a pound of sand and the sand will lose its water by evaporation three and one-half times as rapidly as humas. A clay soil will store only about one-fourth as much moisture as humas and will lose it by evaporation twice as rapidly.

When should deep plowing be done? Always plow in the fall; early to get the benefit of the winter rains. Always use a winter cover crop of oats, barley, wheat, rye or crimson clover if possible. A clover crop is a net gain, it provides winter grazing and adds humas to the soil and benefits the land in general. These clover crops can be turned early in the spring, not plowing too deep.

Concretely stated, a deep and thoroughly pulverized seed bed filled with humas has the following advantages: First, it provides more food, because it increases chemical action and multiplies bacterial life; Second, stores more moisture and it loses its moisture less rapidly on account of its cooler lower strata and the presence of more humas; Third, it increases the number of roots the plant will throw out; Fourth, it allows the plant to root deeper and find permanent moisture; Fifth, humas enables the soil to store more moisture, increases its temperature, makes it more porous, furnishes plant food, stimulates chemical action and fosters bacterial life.

Some exceptions to the rule of deep breaking will be given in next week's issue.

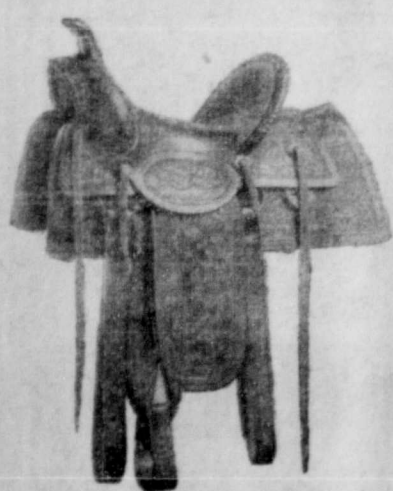

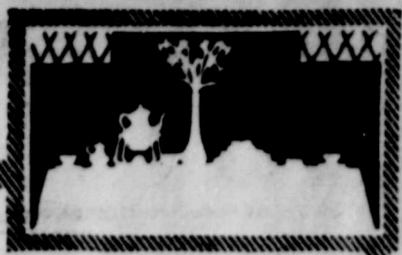

COMMERCIAL CORNER
 By the Secretary.

The substantial growth of any country is based upon its industrial prosperity. Greatness obtained any other way is short-lived and insignificant when compared to that derived from farms and factories.

We are told that Texas has limitless opportunities and boundless resources—have but little of the past and being all present and future. In order to have a greater future we must have a substantial present. Therefore the necessity of co-operation and organization, such as chambers of commerce, commercial clubs, etc., to build up local interests.

I wish to call attention of our farmers to the fact that we had at both the county and the state fairs, as fine samples of peanuts and broomcorn as were exhibited by any in the state. I mention this to show that our soil is adapted to something else besides cotton, maize, etc. If a little more diversification is practiced by our farmers, results will be most satisfactory and life on the farm easier. Remember, if we can get a fair acreage of broomcorn planted, we can get it all put into merchantable goods at home; thereby insuring the highest prices to the grower. A few years ago farmers thought that if they could get \$60.00 per ton for broomcorn they could make money. But look at the price today. They now get from \$160 to \$200 per ton. This should encourage a large number to plant broomcorn. There is absolutely no danger of getting an over-production. That is one market today that you cannot crowd. May I ask that a number of farmers plant a few acres this year? If so, send me your names and I will see that you get sufficient literature and personal help from our demonstrators, so that you will have no trouble with your crop from the time you plant to the harvesting time.

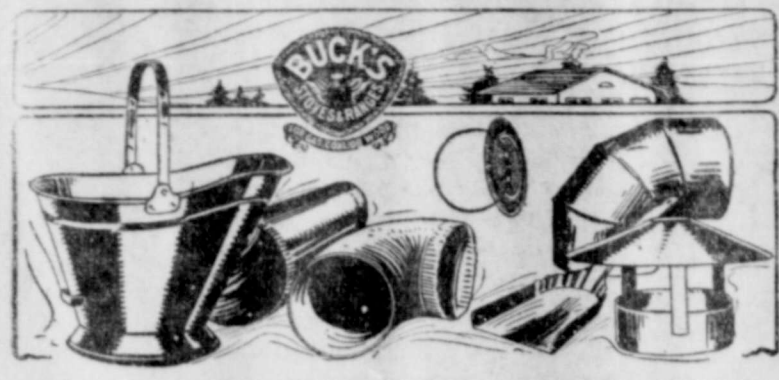

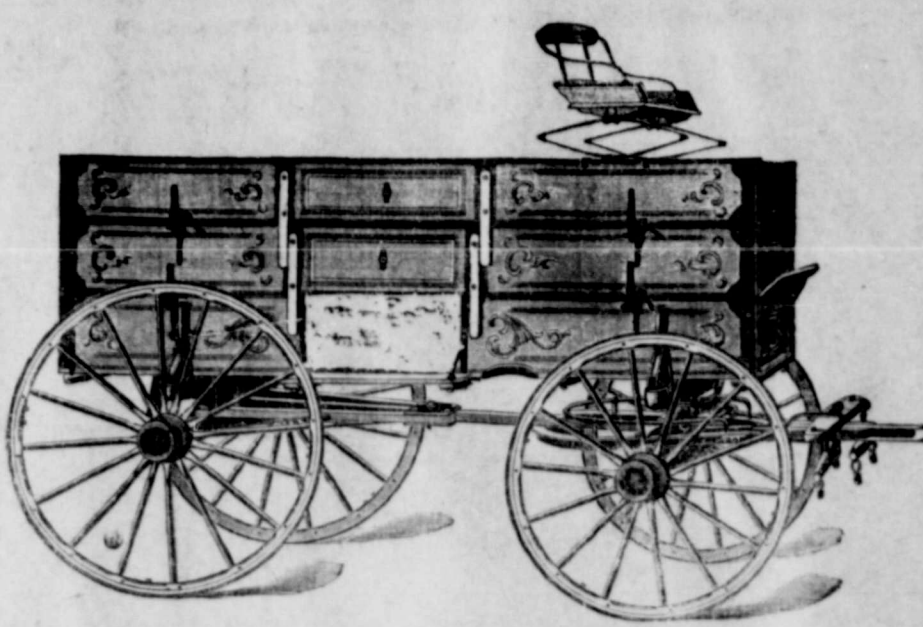

COUNTY SUPT.'S NOTICE.

The McCulloch County Board of Teacher's Examiners will convene Dec. 7, 8 and 9, 1911, at the court house in Brady, Texas.

The County Board of Trustees have approved the requirement made by the County Superintendent, that of use throughout the county of uniform monthly report books, and that the same be paid for by the district trustees out of the school fund. Teachers who have secured these books, awaiting payment for same upon determination of this question will please arrange for settlement at once.

The Board also recommended that the Superintendent refuse to approve vouchers, until the reports which should accompany the same are made in full, and that term reports and registers must contain all information called for in same, properly entered before last voucher be approved. Those handling vouchers will please note this. Teachers will please not overlook the filing of a copy of their daily program.

Teachers, I advise, yea insist, that you procure some first class pedagogical work to read in connection with your actual school work for the year, if you expect to stay in line with the practical progressive teacher. I would recommend as specially

fitted for your needs "Best Methods of Teaching in Country Schools," and "A Broader Elementary Education;" W. C. Hixson, Dallas, Texas. The first was written by a country teacher for country teachers; the second for those who have had college or normal training, and either occupy positions which make it their duty to shape the educational policies of their communities, as preparing for such positions.

Following is given a letter of instruction received from State Superintendent F. M. Bralley. Respectfully,
 J. K. BAZE,
 County Superintendent.

To The County Supt:

The public schools of the state should be adequately equipped with apparatus, and every facility for improving and vitalizing the instruction of the children in the schools should, if possible, be provided. However, in purchase of apparatus and furniture, including maps, charts, globes, school desks, blackboard material, and other necessary supplies, the law should be scrupulously observed, and ordinary business judgment and precaution should obtain.

There are only three purposes for which the state and county available school funds can be legally expended: 1, superintendents' salaries; 2, teachers' salaries; 3, remuneration for taking the scholastic census.

The local school funds may be used for the three purposes for which the state and county available school funds can be used, and for the following additional purposes: purchasing appliances; insuring school property; paying janitors and other employees; buying school sites; buying, building, repairing and renting school houses; and for such other purposes as in the judgment of the board of trustees are necessary in the conduct of the schools.

Condition school fund is sufficient to maintain the schools of eight months and

leave a surplus, said surplus may be expended for the purposes for which the local funds can be expended.

All accounts and vouchers against the school funds of a rural district must be approved by the county superintendent before payment, and no deficiency can be authorized by law or by contract, against the funds of a school district to be paid out of the funds of succeeding years, except by the issuance of bonds, which must be approved by the Attorney General and registered by the Comptroller of the state.

Boards of school trustees should not purchase apparatus, school furniture, and supplies without first consulting the county superintendent and fully satisfying themselves of the necessity of the purchase and of the reasonableness of the prices asked; and the county superintendent should not approve contracts for such school furnishings until he fully satisfies himself that no extortion in prices and no fraud in utility and quality are being practiced. Competitive prices on all such purchases should be required, and no warrants should be issued by boards of trustees, nor approved by the county superintendent, until the goods are delivered and are found upon careful examination to be as represented. The county superintendent has a better opportunity of informing himself on the prices of necessary school supplies and furniture than most trustees, and he should regard it as his duty to make thorough investigation of every such purchase by the boards of trustees before consummating it. The county superintendent is hereby instructed to require, with respect to the purchase of school supplies and all other school business, a faithful compliance with the law, and it respectfully suggested that he use his authority in safeguarding the expenditure of the school funds and in protecting boards of school trustees from the mis-

representations and fraud of unscrupulous agents.
