Both the McCulloch and Coleman county commissioners had refused to accept the bridges until certain changes were made in them in accordance with the report of the expert from A. & M. station who examined the bridges some months ago at the request of the two courts.

Other business transacted was the letting of a contract for a low water bridge at Camp San Saba, the bridge to be built of concrete and steel.

The reports of the various officials were examined and approved.

Several new roads were opened, among others being final arrangements for the opening of the Stacy and Brady road by way of Broadmoor.

No action was taken in the matter of disposing of the school lands.

BROWNWOOD FIRE.

Pump Station Burned Last Friday Night.

The explosion of accumulated gas in the gas producer at the pump station caused a fire at 4 o'clock last Friday morning, which destroyed the building, damaged the machinery and cut off the city's water supply until the machinery can be overhauled and put in running shape. The damage is estimated at from 5,000 to \$10,000.

Just how the fire started can not be determined, but it is supposed that one of the intermittent puffs or explosions of the accumulated gas set fire to the lignite stored on the elevator above the producer and this in turn set fire to the studding and rafters of the building. As the fire spread it ignited a tank of gasoline, causing a terrific explosion and spread the fire throughout the building.

DON'T FORGET.

That you owe taxes and if they are not paid before the first of Feb. 1912, there will be a penalty of 10 per cent added. Which is in compliance with the law governing the collection of taxes.

Later I will be at the various places in the county, as has heretofore been the custom, to collect taxes, for the convenience of those who prefer not to come to Brady for that purpose.

If you wish to pay your taxes through the mail you can do so, but I can not issue your poll tax receipt except you appear in person, or to an agent with a written application signed by you. The application must be as follows, or of a similar form:

Young men who become 21 years of age before the election at which they intend to vote, but whose poll taxes are not due and payable before the election, must take out exemption certificates whether they live in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or not, men who are 60 years old and men who are blind, deaf and dumb, or those who have lost a hand or foot or are permanently disabled from doing manual must take out exemption certificates only when they live in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or more (see Terrell Election Law, Secs. 12 to 29).

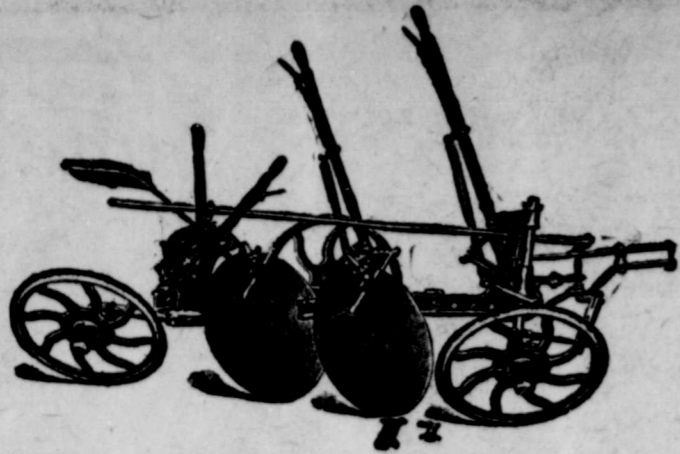

This way will cause people to take much more interest and each one will strive to have something better the next year, but when no prizes are offered there is nothing to cause any one to try to have something fine for the next year. I think a fair conducted in the right way is one of the best advertisements for a country that there is. It brings people together from all over the country, but a fair poorly conducted is a bad thing and a sure death is just in front of it. Enough on that for this time.
