ORGANIZE HOME COMP'Y

PLAN TO HOLD COTTON IN BRADY.

Movement Started to Charter Company to Advance Money on Cotton and Hold here.

During the present season an immense amount of cotton has been shipped to Galveston to be held there. The farmer making the shipment pays 6 per cent on the money advanced, and thinks he is getting it cheap. In addition to the 6 per cent he pays \$1.00 per bale for the holding. The majority of the cotton shipped is not held over twenty or thirty days. Taking the value of a bale at \$40.00 the cost of holding for thirty days is 30 per cent, in addition to the 6 per cent paid on the money advanced. In other words the farmer pays 30 per cent for the holding of the bale, and 6 per cent on the money advanced. Yet, unless he stops to figure the matter out for himself, he forms the impression that he is benefiting himself because he can borrow money on the cotton at the low rate of 6 per cent interest.

This condition has resulted in a movement to organize local capital into a company chartered for the purpose of holding cotton in Brady. The plan of operation decided upon had its initiative with Thos. Elliott, who presented the matter to the local banks, as well as prominent citizens of Brady, with the result that it not only received the hearty endorsement of both the institutions and the individuals, but an effort will be made to put it into execution at once. While none of the banks are in position to finance a cotton holding movement alone, yet the co-operation of the three banks with local capital would swing the deal very easily. The result would be that the cotton would be held in Brady, the farmer could pay current rates of interest and still be money ahead, the profits of the deal would be kept at home, and last, but not least, the local compress would be enabled to get the business that, under present conditions, is taken away from it. There is not a class or individual but what would be benefitted by the movement.

With the time that must necessarily elapse before the movement can be perfected, and the organization incorporated,

it will probably be late in the season before operations can begin, but it is certain that next season will open with the company ready to look after local interests in a manner that will mean profits to all concerned.

Uriah Spivey Dead.

Word was received in Brady Tuesday of the death of Uriah Spivey which occurred at Melvin Monday night. Mr. Spivey had been in bad health, and had been making his home with relatives at that place. He passed away during the night, no one being aware of the fact until the following morning when some one went to call him. He was a well known character in Brady, having made his home here for a number of years.

In fact, he has not been able to keep up with the demand for his product. It is difficult to estimate the number of brooms used in Brady each month, but it is a safe guess that the number is sufficient to consume the output of half a dozen or more men. McCulloch county soil is adapted to the growing of the finest grade of broom corn, and as soon as a sufficient number of farmers indicate their willingness to devote a few acres to this plant, we are assured of a factory to make the brooms. Farmers in-

terested in this should leave their names with Farm Demonstrator Griffin, who will see that free literature pertaining to this subject will be forwarded them.

McCulloch county farmers are the most progressive of any in the state. They have long ago come to realize that diversification is the cornerstone of success, and have been building upon the firm foundation of improved methods of soil culture. And upon this plan they are becoming independent, and are attaining the highest rank in their profession. Give us more of this class, is McCulloch's crying need. We have the land, the homes and the opportunities.—Brady Standard.

COMMERCIAL CORNER By the Secretary.

In last week's issue I had something to say about broomcorn and diversification. Since that time quite a number of farmers have given their names so I could forward literature to them on the cultivation, harvesting and marketing of broomcorn.

I wish to state again that I know nothing better at this time for the farmer to begin his diversification than with the dwarf variety of broomcorn. It will require about one fourth the time, about one fourth the expense of a cotton crop and pay to the farmer about double the cotton on equal acreage.

In low and rainy sections of the state it requires a large barn or drying house to keep the straw in a dry condition for the market and for threshing purposes; but here and in Oklahoma these barns are not necessary, as the straw will dry in a short time in the field to the point of threshing, baling, etc.

One thing that Brady needs at this time more than possibly any other, is a truck farm or garden. The people of Brady do not get one half the vegetables they would use if they could get what they want. Such truck as lettuce, mustard, turnips, cabbage, potatoes, etc., are always staple goods and when fresh find a market at once. Why some enterprising fellow does not put in a large acreage here is almost a mystery—strange to say the least. Of course there is lots of work about such a farm, but there is also lots of revenue when properly worked. The demand for such things will not diminish; it will grow from month to month. Even if a dozen should undertake this work here, there would be no danger of crowding the market. This is staple goods and will find a ready market all over the state. No farm product can favorably compare with a truck garden when in the hands of men who will work at the job.

I ask again that all farmers send me their names and addresses who are interested in the diversification idea, so that I can have their names forwarded for free literature. It will only cost the sending of the names and reading it after it is received.

ORGANIZE HOME COMP'Y

PLAN TO HOLD COTTON IN BRADY.

Movement Started to Charter Company to Advance Money on Cotton and Hold here.

During the present season an immense amount of cotton has been shipped to Galveston to be held there. The farmer making the shipment pays 6 per cent on the money advanced, and thinks he is getting it cheap. In addition to the 6 per cent he pays \$1.00 per bale for the holding. The majority of the cotton shipped is not held over twenty or thirty days. Taking the value of a bale at \$40.00 the cost of holding for thirty days is 30 per cent, in addition to the 6 per cent paid on the money advanced. In other words the farmer pays 30 per cent for the holding of the bale, and 6 per cent on the money advanced. Yet, unless he stops to figure the matter out for himself, he forms the impression that he is benefitting himself because he can borrow money on the cotton at the low rate of 6 per cent interest.

This condition has resulted in a movement to organize local capital into a company chartered for the purpose of holding cotton in Brady. The plan of operation decided upon had its initiative with Thos. Elliott, who presented the matter to the local banks, as well as prominent citizens of Brady, with the result that it not only received the hearty endorsement of both the institutions and the individuals, but an effort will be made to put it into execution at once. While none of the banks are in position to finance a cotton holding movement alone, yet the co-operation of the three banks with local capital would swing the deal very easily. The result would be that the cotton would be held in Brady, the farmer could pay current rates of interest and still be money ahead, the profits of the deal would be kept at home, and last, but not least, the local compress would be enabled to get the business that, under present conditions, is taken away from it. There is not a class or individual but what would be benefitted by the movement.

With the time that must necessarily elapse before the movement can be perfected, and the organization incorporated,

it will probably be late in the season before operations can begin, but it is certain that next season will open with the company ready to look after local interests in a manner that will mean profits to all concerned.

Uriah Spivey Dead.

Word was received in Brady Tuesday of the death of Uriah Spivey which occurred at Melvin Monday night. Mr. Spivey had been in bad health, and had been making his home with relatives at that place. He passed away during the night, no one being aware of the fact until the following morning when some one went to call him. He was a well known character in Brady, having made his home here for a number of years.
