* **COMMERCIAL CORNER** *
* By the Secretary. *

Since the announcement of the approval of our road bonds, we have all been more or less interested as to the time of beginning of the work. But since that news reached us, the Attorney-General and staff have closed up like oysters and nothing else has been given out for publication. We are all very anxious for the bonds to be printed and the money received on them so that the farmers and the men who can do the work may begin before the time for next crop to be planted.

We are sorry that nothing of any definite nature can be published in these notes. However, one of our best lawyers is now in Austin and says that he will see to all the bonds there for McCulloch county. We have so much confidence in what he says about it that we believe that before the year is out, actual work will be done. Our county judge has called the commissioners together, showing that they are also interested in the matter.

We have received from many parts

of the United States requests for literature of this country during the last week. In fact this week and last have been record breakers for requests for literature and information about this section of the state. We wish to urge our real estate men to come and look over the files and locate some of these inquirers. We also wish to secure the co-operation of all our business men, especially at this time. We have now the following industries looking this way for location in this part of the state: A marble yard, broom factory, mattress factory, ice plant, brick yard, and last but not least, cotton factory. It requires some expense to secure such things, and at this time Brady needs every one of these enterprises named above. But our income by monthly donations is less than the expense of the office. Remember, if the above industries are passed up, it is a permanent loss. When they settle once it becomes a fixture. Other towns and cities are looking after them, and it therefore becomes us to do our part to secure them.

F. W. Foresman, auditor for Alfalfa Lumber Company, has been with the Brady yard for several days taking annual inventory, and he says that he finds Brady still near the top with other Texas towns.

Beautify Grounds.

The Santa Fe railroad has a reputation of not being sparing in their expenditure of money in beautifying the depot grounds about their stations in the more important cities, and it is evident that they are determined to live up to their reputation at Brady. The park north of the new union depot will be sodded, a car of Bermuda grass sod having arrived last Monday from Temple. The ground South of the depot will be converted into an ideal park, being set out in grass and flowers, with cement walks winding in and out, while the intervening spaces will be paved with vitrified paving blocks. Nothing is too good for a good town—that's Brady.

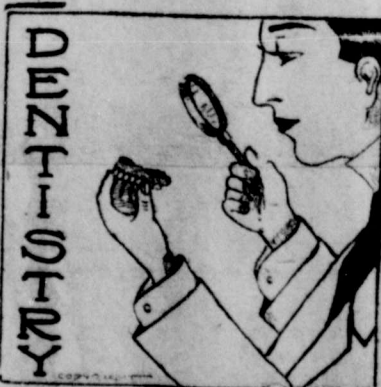
W. C. Preston, general freight agent, and C. E. Wynne, Jr., division freight agent of the Frisco, were in Brady Wednesday looking up business for the company.

BONDS HELD UP.

Anticipated Suit Causes Another Halt.

Judge F. M. Newman returned yesterday from Austin where he had gone on business in connection with the Melvin school bonds, and reports that he was successful in having the particular objection overcome. However the attorney-general's department had not gone over the complete transcript as yet and the bonds will not be approved until this is done. The Placid bonds are being held for a like reason.

At the request of Commercial Secretary Hardison, Mr. Newman made inquiry as to the Road District No. 1 bonds. Assistant-Attorney General Caldwell informed him that he had approved the form of the bonds, and at the urgent request of numbers of interested Brady citizens, had placed them in the hands of the printer. However, he stated there was some doubt as to the special road law being definite enough to be constitutional, a number of objections having been brought up, and that a suit would be filed within a week in which all these questions would be brought up for final settlement. Until this was done, the McCulloch county bonds, as well as similar issues in a number of other counties, could not be approved by him. Mr. Caldwell said that he would endeavor to have the matter brought up and disposed of at the earliest possible date.

Regarding Foreign Postage.

Editor Brady Standard:

The many inquiries received concerning the postage rates to foreign countries induces me to believe that the publication of the following Departmental order will be of interest to your readers, to whom I respectfully suggest that it be clipped and preserved for convenient reference.

"The only foreign countries to which the two cent letter rate applies are Canada, Cuba, Mexico, Newfoundland, the Canal Zone, the Re-

public of Panama, Germany (by direct steamers only), England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, and the city of Shanghai, China. To all other countries, including all places in China other than Shanghai, the rate is five cents for the first ounce or fraction thereof, which must be fully prepaid or the letters become liable on delivery to a charge equal to double the amount of the deficient postage. For instance, a single rate letter prepaid only two cents, being short paid three cents, would be subject on delivery to an additional postal charge of six cents."

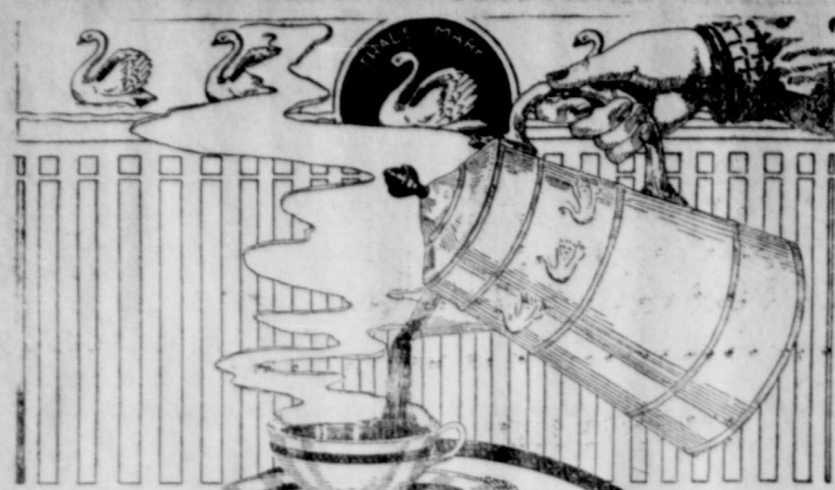

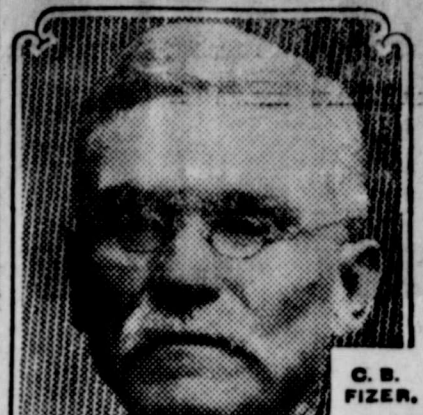

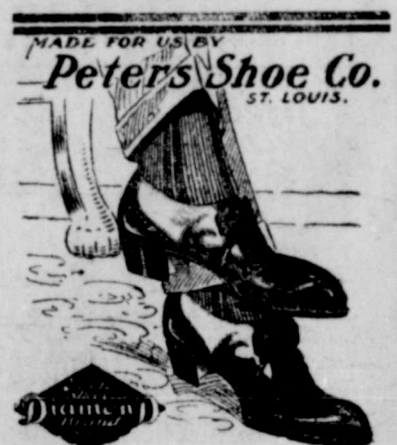
