## CONTRACT TO HAWLEY

TO HAVE ENTIRE CHARGE OF WORK.

In Addition to Designing and Supervising, Hawley Contracts Construction.

John B. Hawley, the water expert, was here from Fort Worth Thursday and conferred with the city council regarding the work of building the city waterworks with the result that the aldermen contracted with him for the construction of the work under Article 6 of his proposal contract.

We quote this contract as follows:

"Should you desire me to actually construct the entire work in addition to designing and supervising it, I to furnish all tools, implements, etc. (the City to pay freight on same from and to Fort Worth and usual blacksmith and machine shop bills for sharpening tools and similar repairs necessitated by use on the work) and to purchase all materials in open market, under competitive bids for all large items, by and with your approval, and all labor and material bills to be paid by you (Brady labor to be used throughout, if available, except for such skilled labor as may not be found there), add 5 per cent to the five above mentioned (charge on all moneys expended in remodeling such part of the present system as may be purchased, and also for the design and supervision of the new features of the City Water Works system, such as dam, pipe line, filter, pumping machinery and other appurtenances) payable 2 1-2 per cent on estimated cost statement rendered with plans and specifications, five per cent monthly, as the work progresses and the remaining 2 1-2 per cent on completion."

As will be noted, the contract calls for the engineering, design and construction of the waterworks system. Mr. Hawley undertakes the work, furnishing all tools and implements, and in addition guarantees his estimates. In other words, if the cost exceeds his figures, the city gets the benefit of whatever the difference between actual cost of construction may be and of his figures.

It will be a matter of two weeks before Mr. Hawley will have a man to come to Brady to make the preliminary surveys and soundings, and something like a month before he will be able to submit the cost estimates. The engineer who will be placed in charge of the work of construction is considered by Mr. Hawley as one of the very best in the state.

The city is to be congratulated upon making the contract with Mr. Hawley, more especially upon the terms quoted. Had they only contracted for him to do the engineering and designing, and preferred to give the work of construction to sub-contractors, the very lowest figure they could have hoped to obtain would have been on a basis of 15 per cent. In other words, the city makes a saving of 10 per cent on the construction alone by the terms of the contract with Mr. Hawley.

Another advantage is that the cost of Mr. Hawley's first trip to Brady and payment for work done at that time will be credited on the account, and be deducted from the amount of the 10 per cent commission.

A body of generous scientific men have found a way to dispose of these numerous evils and are going to take the public into their confidence at the new Grand Central Palace, Lexington avenue and Forty-seventh street, where the 1911 electrical exposition opens.

The one contrivance that has aroused unusual interest, particularly among mothers of unruly youngsters, is a spanking machine. This device, which is operated by electricity, is guaranteed so far to surpass the old-fashioned paternal walloping that the management of the exposition is confident that it will be welcomed in every home after it has had a fair trial. It is so cleverly devised that the mother of a large family, who is frequently interrupted in her day's work to apply the antiquated spanking to several of her brood, will find it a great time saver.

The only work required of the tired housewife is strapping the unruly boy in the machine and pressing a button. **PRISON REFORM IN CHINA.**  
 "Today, in the street for the first time, I saw a chain gang, prisoners with spades and baskets, taken out by a police sergeant to do useful labor," says a correspondent of the North China Daily News. "They were clothed in red cotton garments, and most of the gang, about sixteen men and two boys, had chains on their ankles, but were otherwise free. They seemed to be in good condition, and it marks another most useful and necessary reform. It is a great thing for these men to get outside their prison walls, and breathe the fresh air, and spend some time in work, and the shame of being publicly seen in prison garb may help to awaken conscience and deter others from lawbreaking. This is so great a contrast to the past, when Chinese prisons were an unutterable horror, that, strange as it may seem, the appearance of a chain gang made one feel glad, which was not inconsistent with a thrill of pity for the men."

**MILK POWDER.**  
 In reducing milk to powder, a patented Swiss process evaporates about 85 per cent. of the water at a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees C. The milk is then exposed four seconds in a layer of an eighth to a quarter of an inch in depth on a surface heated to 105 degrees. The second heating removes 9 or 10 per cent. of the remaining water, and the resulting milk powder is not only sterile, but the albumen is not coagulated.

On July 27, 1908, the restrictions in the state of Oklahoma were removed, giving the Indians the right to sell their lands, which they are selling very rapidly at low prices—from \$15.00 to \$30.00 per acre.
