John B. Hawley, the water expert, was here from Fort with the city council regarding the work of building the city waterworks with the result that the aldermen contracted with him for the construction of the
work under Article 6 of his prowork under Art
posal contract.
We quote this contract as fol
lows:
"Should you desire me to ac tually construct the entire work in addition to designing and su pervising it, I to furnish al
