All of the defects pointed out by Judge Lawson have many times been abominable judicial procedure. For example, The News has stated that one of the considerable difficulties was to be found in the low ethical conception which permitted lawyers to quibble and plead technicalities in the hope of defeating justice, and thus cheating society. And now Judge Lawson says that what is needed "is primarily a higher standard of legal ethics," and he contrasts the readiness of the average American lawyer to plead nonsensical technicalities with the attitude of English lawyers, who "consider it beneath their dignity to quibble." The News has declared that some of the technicalities pleaded in the courts of Texas ought to subject those who plead them to punishment for contempt of court; and Judge Lawson remarks that "some of the objections brought and stated in our criminal trials by our leading practitioners, notably the Hyde case when it was before the Missouri Supreme Court on appeal, would be held in contempt of court in England."

There is a good deal else in the comment by Judge Lawson that is confirmatory of views expressed by The News from time to time-views which, nevertheless, have aroused a good many lawyers in this state to a spirit of resentment.—Dallas




