COLD-BLOODED MURDER

MEXICAN SHOOTS DOWN A WOMAN SUNDAY.

Murderer Captured by Deputy Sheriff Latta After Being Dangerously Wounded.

One of the most atrocious murders ever enacted in Brady occurred Sunday. Tivrisio Hernandez, a Mexican, shot and instantly killed a Mexican woman named Genoveda Rodrigues. The weapon used was a 25-20 Winchester rifle. There was but one eye-witness to the tragedy, another Mexican woman, but several parties heard the shots and were on the scene almost immediately, and in a short time a large crowd had collected. Holding the crowd at bay with his rifle, the Mexican slowly made his way out north of the city. He was overtaken in the Sessions pasture by Deputy Sheriff Oscar Latta, who called upon him to halt three times. Instead of obeying the command the Mexican twice raised his gun as if to shoot. Latta fired twice with his 30 U. S. army gun, the first shot probably missing, while the second shot grazed the Mexican's breast and shattered his left arm.

The Mexican was lodged in jail, where an operation was performed Sunday afternoon, the arm being amputated at the shoulder. At latest reports the Mexican was doing as well as could be expected, with every chance in his favor for a speedy recovery.

The tragedy took place about 1 o'clock a short distance southwest of the new union depot. The woman had secured a position as cook out in the country, and the man objected to her going. The woman persisted in her intention, and in the heat of anger the man raised his rifle to fire at her. The second woman, who was standing near, thrust the gun aside, and the bullet went wild. Falling upon her knees, the woman folded her hands in an attitude of prayer, and it was in this position that she was shot down, the bullet entering her right breast and coming out through her left breast.

The Mexican knelt over the dead body and prayed for a few minutes and then turning to the first men to arrive on the scene, he warned them to keep their distance. Followed by a constantly increasing crowd, the man made his flight unhindered, no one caring to come within range of his deadly weapon.

Mr. Latta, upon being notified of the tragedy, immediately started in pursuit. The Mexican was making his way toward the Sessions tank when Latta came in range, and his body was largely hid by the brow of the hill, which probably accounts for Latta's first shot missing its mark. The second shot, however, found its mark. The Mexican shot left handed, and was just in the act of holding the gun to his left shoulder with his left arm crooked, when the bullet grazed his breast, cutting a slight gash about four inches in length, and literally tearing his left arm off. It was not until this last shot that Latta discovered that he had only brought two cartridges with him.

Whether the Mexican shot at him or not, Mr. Latta does not know, although several bystanders say he did. One empty car-

tridge was found in his gun, and several parties assert they saw him throw a cartridge into his gun after shooting the woman. There were eleven loaded cartridges in the gun.

Hernandez has made his home in Brady, and is said to own several rent houses here. He has a wife and nine children. The dead woman was a widow, and her mother lives at Junction. She was quite well known by Brady citizens, having worked for a number of families here, who state that she was quiet and industrious and generally liked. The funeral took place Monday afternoon.

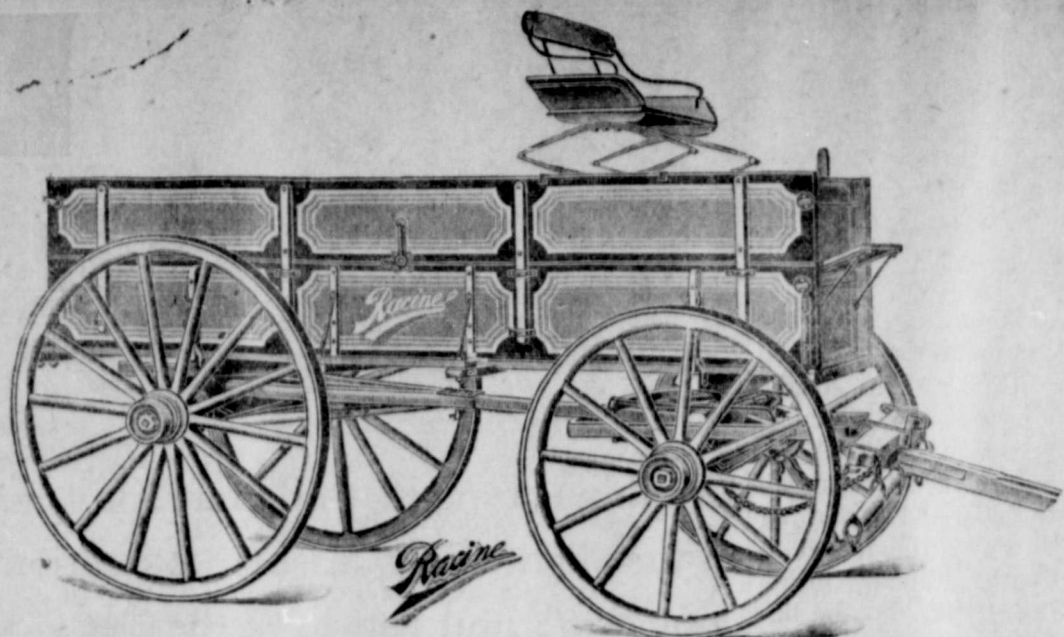

CLEAN UP DAY JAN. 26

THE CITY COUNCIL ADOPTS HEALTH MEASURE.

No Quarantine Deemed Necessary at Present, But Every Precaution is Urged.

Friday, January 26th, has been named by the city council as "Clean Up Day" in Brady, and every citizen is expected to do his share of the work. Wagons will be provided to visit all parts of the city and haul away all rubbish and trash. In addition, every precautionary measure is being urged, and the liberal use of lime is encouraged.

So far not a single case of spinal meningitis has made its appearance anywhere in this vicinity, nor are there the slightest indications of a visit of the epidemic. While ever alert to the welfare and well-being of the city, it has not been deemed necessary by the city and county health officers, acting in conjunction with the Commercial club and city council, to quarantine the city, and no steps toward this end have been taken.

This was the consensus of opinion at a meeting of Brady physicians and the directors of the Commercial club held Monday. The meeting was called by City Health Officer Dr. J. B. Granville, and those in attendance were requested to act in lieu of a city board of health. Acting upon the advice of State Health Officer Ralph Steiner, and in keeping with the opinion given by Dr. Dowling, state health officer of Louisiana, resolutions were adopted and presented at a meeting of the city council Monday. The city council, in turn, adopted the resolutions, and urge upon the citizens of Brady the strict observance and assistance of the clean-up order.

As a committee appointed by the Commercial club of the city of Brady we beg to submit to you the following suggestions:

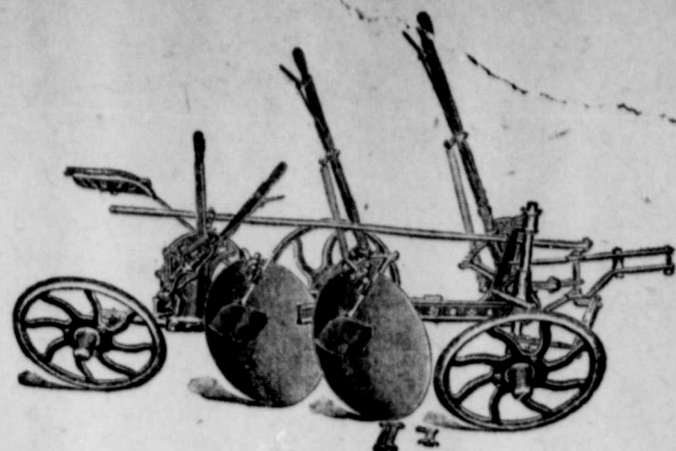
