

We had several opportunities to get second hand propositions, provided the city or citizens would furnish the money and allow the promoters to retain the controlling interest, neither of which they would want to do.

In fact, we had some experience of this kind and didn't want to buy any more watered

Seeing this condition and believing we would be left like we were last year, we determined to try to do something.

We took the matter up with the Frick Co., who are pioneers, and from what we can find out. the largest and best equipped ice machine manufacturing company in the world, in an effort to interest them, if possible, in putting in a plant. They at once wired us they were sending a man. When he came he at once explained that the Frick Co. would not install a plant for retail purposes, as they were strictly builders, but if we would handle this end of the line they would furnish the machinery and give us the time necessary in which to pay for it. We knew the town needed the plant, and it looked like our only show, and accordingly we made a contract with them, which contract was officially signed at their home office, Waynesborough, Pa., December 5th, and forwarded to their Dallas office to be countersigned.

The contract was received by us about Dec. 15th, and we at once told Bro. Hardison of the Commercial club that the plant was assured; that we had the contract made and accepted, and to mention in his news items plant.

They could take the \$9,000 which they asked of the city and install the plant, getting terms on the balance and by that means never be out a cent on the plant themselves and at the same time own a controlling interest. In other words, the city would be furnishing them the money with which to erect the plant and making them a present of over half of it. In fact, these seemed to be about the only propositions we could get, and for that reason we took hold of the matter as we did, and we would

> We have no money or energy to spare, at the same time we have always been and are still ready to do anything in our power for the betterment and improvement of our town and country, and if we are allowed to go ahead with this enterprise we will deliver ice to residences for 50 cents per cwt. in 50 pound lots or more; 60 cents per cwt. in smaller quantities, except in nickles' and dimes' worth. Where coupon books are furnished to drug stores and meat markets or other business concerns in quantities of one block or more, 40 cents per cwt. and we will give honest weights.

Mann Bros. Will Have Modern Plant in Operation.

Brady is to have an up-todate 1912-model ice factory, is the assurance given out by Messrs. Jim and Duke Mann. In an interview with Mr. Jim Mann yesterday he stated that machinery was already on the road, and would be installed as soon as it arrived. Part of the material is already on the ground, and the work on the foundations and building will be begun this week. The factory will be located west of the bridge on the Santa Fe right-of-way. Work on the well is already under way.

The securing of this plant is due to the earnest and untiring efforts of Jim Mann, who lent his efforts toward the securing of the plant originally without any intention of being personally interested. The obstacles ountered on all sides were objection to a possible limited water supply, or the fact that outside parties endeavored to palm off second hand machinery or refused to become interested unless local parties took the majority of stock.

. Mr. Mann then took up the matter with the Frick Co., of Waynesboro, Pa., the pioneer ice factory manufacturers, and the strongest concern of its kind in America, and succeeded in interesting them to the extent that they agreed to furnish the machinery for the plant. The plant will be one of the most modern made, brand new and a 1912 model. The capacity will be 15 tons, which will be amply sufficient for all present needs, and the plant is so arranged that it can be increased to any capacity should the demand justify. In addition, a cold storage plant will be constructed in connection, which will be another much-needed and greatly appreciated enterprise.

This statement sets at rest any doubts as to whether Brady will have an ice plant, and Brady citizens will be glad to learn that local capital and enterprise are behind the new industry, she said with an air of finality and and as such, will be glad to give with another yawn. it their support and encourage-




