WORK IS PROGRESSING

WORK ON COLEMAN ROAD
PROGRESSING RAPIDLY.

Immense Amount of Work Already Done—Excellent Showing Made the First Week.

Everyone who went over the Coleman road Sunday was pleased and surprised to note the improvement already accomplished in the first three days. The rough hill and turn in the road had been smoothed out and gotten into shape, and the road flat graded beyond Joe Williams' residence, a distance of about two miles. The first day's work showed the turn graded and the road graded to the Santa Fe crossing, at a total expenditure of \$61. Up to yesterday three miles of road had been graded and partly graveled.

This is considered as making a splendid showing, and the citizens are not slow to express their commendation of the good work accomplished by Mr. Daugherty, more especially as he is handicapped by reason of the failure of the heavier pieces of machinery to arrive. It is roughly estimated that the work so far has averaged 8c per yard for the removal of dirt and rock. Up to Saturday night a total of \$340.85 had been paid out on warrants. Of this amount, \$40.50 was for the establishing of camp and prospecting for gravel beds, and \$300.35 for road work.

Parsons, San Angelo, who spoke on "The Building of a Practice"; Dr. W. E. Anderson, Brownwood, addressed the body on "Tonsillectomy: The Indication for and Technique of"; Dr. W. L. Allison, Ft. Worth, whose subject was "Moral Dementia."

The afternoon was spent in the discussion of these addresses, several number being omitted from the program out of courtesy to the visitors. The meeting was held in the offices of Drs. McCall, Anderson and McKnight. The physicians in attendance were: Drs. P. A. Baze, J. M. Thomson, W. B. Brandenburg, Mason; J. V. Dوزير, Menard; Wm. Land, Lohn; Sorrell and Beckham, San Saba; At the close of the program the society enjoyed a spread at the Queen hotel, which was not the least enjoyable feature of the program.

No Meningitis at Brownwood.

The Brownwood Bulletin publishes a statement to the effect that Brownwood is free from meningitis. In two suspected cases, which had caused wild rumors to be repeated, specimens of cerebro-spinal fluid were sent to the state bacteriologist with the result that his examination upheld the opinion of the Brownwood doctors that there was no meningitis.

In the case at Elkins, near Brownwood, the examination showed meningitis just as the county health officer has held. Tuesday there was a little improvement in the condition of the Fortson boy, and the doctors held out slight hopes for his recovery.

RAILWAY PROPOSITION.

Would Construct Southeast from San Angelo.

San Angelo, Feb. 12.—J. J. Lanin, of Newhampton, Ia., has returned to San Angelo with the announcement that he will soon be ready to submit to the citizens a proposition to build a railroad to the southeast, touching Brady, Llano, Fredericksburg and Waring, where a connection can be made with the San Antonio & Aransas Pass. Mr. Lanin is the promoter of the railroad from San Angelo to Sterling City, which was later absorbed by the Santa Fe.

Mr. Lanin says he has Chicago capital behind the proposed railroad. He will ask San Angelo business men for \$3000 per mile between this city and the eastern county line. Another road which proposes to come to San Angelo is asking the citizens for \$8000 per mile.

MAKE ANOTHER STRIKE

FINE WELL BROUGHT IN AT
LOHN WEDNESDAY.

Developments in the Field Progressing Rapidly — Work Goes Steadily Ahead.

The report that another oil well had been brought in at Lohn was the subject of much interested comments about town yesterday. The oil is said to be of a very fine grade, free from salt water, and the well is pronounced a fine one. Yesterday was spent in casing the well up and making a test.

When seen by a Standard reporter yesterday, Mr. Bannister, who has been one of the interested parties, was in high spirits over his good fortune, and while he had nothing to give out, stated that the well was a fine one, and that the work would go right ahead, a new well being started next Monday.

The new well is located northwest of the first well, and it is stated that when the drill was let down into the sand, the oil rose nearly to the top of the well. Mr. Bannister refused to discuss the probable estimate as to the capacity, stating that it would require a test of from 60 to 90 days to be able to ascertain the amount.

The work of pumping oil from the old wells is being continued right along, much of the oil being already sold to the gins and other places about the Lohn neighborhood.

A phone message to Nollie Embry yesterday afternoon gave the information that his wife was seriously ill at Stacy, where she has been visiting. Mr. Embry left at once for that place.

DEVELOPMENT.

McCulloch county stands on the threshold of an era of the greatest development ever experienced by any county in the state. Its wonderful resources are being exploited to the four corners of the world, and investors are attracted by the boundless opportunities presented.

At present the development of the Lohn oil fields is being undertaken, and already the success obtained practically assures a rival to Electra. What the development of this field means to McCulloch, and what influence it will have upon the securing of other enterprises and industries is little realized by the most sanguine citizen.

Success in the Lohn oil field would assure the building of that long wished-for and much-desired Coleman North & South road, the Lohn fields being directly on the proposed right-of-way. This again would tap the coal beds at Waldrip, and place them in reach of a ready market, which would mean that hundreds of men would be employed in mining the black diamonds, as well as the providing of a cheap fuel for the citizens of McCulloch. Let the Coleman North & South road be built and Brady's future as the most important railroad center of Central West Texas is assured. The H. & T. C. is sure to extend from Llano, and Brady will be the logical point for the terminus of this road. Connection with San Antonio and San Angelo will open the routes to the gulf and to the west, and the extension of the Frisco from Menard would undoubtedly result in a trunk line to Old Mexico.

Again, the oil from Lohn would provide a cheap fuel, which would insure the immediate erection of a brick plant and the securing of dozens of industries. Brady can furnish the finest grade of potters clay to be had in the state, and it but awaits the hand of the developer. The possibilities are unlimited, and the securing of one thing will assure another. What this development would mean to McCulloch in the way of increase of population and greater development of agricultural land can readily be foreseen. Rich returns are offered the investors and the settlers for their capital and their labor.

STILL MORE COMING.

Brady and the Brady country are the magnetic centers of Central West Texas. Not a week passes but what some new project relative to the development of this country is made public. The latest is the proposal of J. J. Lanin to build a railroad southeast of San Angelo, and give Brady connection with San Antonio, and a gulf outlet. Mr. Lanin came into prominence a few years ago when he built the road from San Angelo to Sterling City, which road was later absorbed by the Santa Fe. He has interested Chicago capitalists in his latest proposition, and it is not at all unlikely that another year will see the work well under way.

It is certain that any move on the part of Mr. Lanin would tend to hasten the building of a road between Brady and San Antonio. The Frisco has had this matter under consideration for nearly a year, and a conditional contract has been entered into for the extension of the road to Mason, yet for some reason not given out, the work of actual construction has been delayed from time to time.

The proposed road from San Angelo to Brady would provide an important link in the Santa Fe system; likewise the road from Brady to San Antonio would be of importance to the Santa Fe. It is not likely that the Frisco would be caught napping, however, more especially since they have already paved the way for the beginning of construction work.

Brady has everything to gain from Mr. Lanin's proposal, and should San Angelo take hold of the matter, the gateway to the gulf is sure to be opened to Brady.

SAN ANGELO STANDARD EDITOR THROWS A FIT.

C. C. Bumgardner and son, Cephus, returned Saturday from his ranch in Brewster county, and Mr. Bumgardner expresses himself as well pleased with his property. He states that conditions are very good beyond the Pecos river, but that there is no grass whatever from the river to San Angelo, and that stockmen are feeding thousands of head of cattle. Mr. Bumgardner will probably remain here until spring.—Brady Standard.

Mr. Bumgardner's statements with regard to range conditions prevailing between the Pecos river and San Angelo are the silly vaporings of a disordered mind. Cattle on the ranges are fat and there is not a ranchman in all that vast domain feeding his cattle. Only about a thousand or twelve hundred cattle are being fed in San Angelo for market. More or less cattle are shipped weekly directly from the range fat, sleek and lusty and ready for the slaughter house. Mr. Bumgardner must have confined his observations to the middle of the road over which he traveled, or else his vision was so clouded that he could not distinguish an alfalfa field from a cedar brake.
