

WORK ON COLEMAN ROAD PROGRESSING RAPIDLY.

WORK IS PROGRESSING

Immense Amount of Work Already Done-Excellent Showing Made the First Week.

Everyone who went over the Coleman road Sunday was pleased and surprised to note the improvement already accomplished in the first three days. The rough hill and turn in the road had been smoothed out and gotten into shape, and the road flat graded beyond Joe Williams' residence, a distance of abort two miles. The first day's work showed the turn graded and the road graded to the Santa Fe crossing, at a total e penditure of \$61. Up to yesterday, three miles of road had been graded and partly graveled.

This is considered as making splendid showing, and the citizens are not slow to express heir commendation of the good work accomplished by Mr. Daugherty, more especially as he is handicapped by reason of the failure of the heavier pieces of achinery to arrive.
