### PROHIBITION ELECTION.

#### Concho County Antis Want to Vote Whiskey Back.

Commissioners' Court of Concho county, in session this week, ordered a prohibition election to be held throughout the county March 9th. Sixteen years ago, the saloons were voted out of the county, and little effort was made to again test the sentiment of the people in regard to the liquor question until recently. In the Statewide election last July 22d, Concho voted wet by a majority of about 175, and this victory encouraged the anti-faction to active steps to get whiskey back. Considerable agitation has been going on for several weeks, and when the commissioners met Monday, a petition with the required list of names attached was presented.

Owing to the short time elapsing before the contest is decided, the campaign will be vigorously waged by both sides. A Concho county citizen said Wednesday that the fight will be clean and no bitter feeling was anticipated by either faction.

The voting strength of Concho county is 1,010, according to the tax collector's report on February 1st, last. Paint Rock the county seat, is the biggest polling place, Eden is second to the largest and Millersview is the third. The votes in each of the Concho county boxes number as follows:

## A FRUIT COUNTRY.

We have enumerated several of the many resources and advantages of McCulloch county the past few weeks, but did we ever mention fruit?

We believe not—but that has not hindered the fruit crop one particle. It's there—or, rather it's coming. Worlds of it. For McCulloch is unsurpassed for fruit as well as for many other crops.

Seven or eight years ago there was something like 500 fruit trees in the entire county—today they number between 50,000 and 75,000. On the north side of Brady there are two places that alone have something like 2,000 fruit trees. There is scarcely a farm in the entire county but what has at least 100 trees and up to the thousands.

And prospects! They're there. The yield will mark a red letter day in McCulloch county history if present prospects hold out. The variety is infinite; the quality the best to be obtained; and productiveness of our fruit trees is nowhere excelled in the entire state of Texas.

Just last year we had ample evidence of how productive is McCulloch county in the growing of fruit. Here in Brady in more than one instance is recorded where trees bore fruit the very year they were set out. Mere slips of peach trees were loaded down with big, luscious peaches the very first year; and other varieties duplicated this feat.

We have room here for every class—the trucker, the fruit grower, the agriculturalist, the raiser of fine stock, breeders of fine poultry, etc., without limit—and McCulloch county makes good when put to the test.

Suppose the night was very dark, and suppose someone should wander a little away from the sidewalk, and suppose he should step into one of those manholes that stand open-mouthed—but what's the use of supposing any more.

It's the well lighted home that looks the most cheerful, most comfortable and most inviting. So it is with a city—nothing impresses more or gives a broader welcome to the stranger than nicely lighted streets and stores.

As a result of a defective street crossing at Temple, a citizen fell and injured his leg; he sued the city and compromised on an award of \$500. The Temple Mirror estimates that altogether, with attorney's fees and other costs, the accident cost the city somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1500, and then drives home the lesson that this would have built many a crossing. A word to the is sufficient—and Brady need street lights.

## STREET SPRINKLING.

Since the inauguration of the street sprinkling service some two years ago, Brady merchants and citizens have become so used to the absence of dust that they scarcely appreciate the value of sprinkling. It takes a day or two absence of sprinkling service for the majority of the citizens to really appreciate the benefits, and as a rule it is then voiced in the form of a generous kick.

To make the service efficient it is necessary to sprinkle every part of the square—to sprinkle in front of a man's store whether he pays for the service or not. To do otherwise would mean that the man who paid would get the benefit of his next door neighbor's dust, as much as his non-paying neighbor would benefit by the first man's sprinkled front. In order to give efficient service, Mr. Durnett, who has charge of the street sprinkler, has been sprinkling the street in front of forty-nine business houses who have contributed not one cent toward his support. How long any man would be willing to hold out under such conditions is not hard to say. Mr. Durnett is an old hand at the street sprinkling business, and there can be no objection to the service rendered. He has a splendid equipment, and has kept the dust down. In justice to him, and to save their own self respect, as well as to evidence some pride in the appearance of the town, it would seem that all citizens should cheerfully contribute their mite toward the maintenance of this service. Such a course would work a hardship on no one; would help to keep Mr. Durnett on the job, and would show a sense of civic pride that is most commendable.

No town can grow faster than its citizens, and the live citizens cannot make a showing as long as they are dragged down by the dead ones.

## BOUNTY ON RABBITS.

One of our discerning correspondents, who, by the way, is an up-to-date and progressive farmer, has pointed out that there is not much inducement to plant peanuts when the rabbits are certain to get the crop. He suggested that the commissioners offer a bounty for rabbit scalps, and points out that such a procedure would soon rid the country of this pest. This course has been adopted by the commissioners of Brown county, a bounty of 5c being paid for every pair of rabbit ears that are brought in up to July 8th, provided that the same are accompanied by an affidavit that the rabbit was killed in Brown county.

The past few years the rabbits have become very troublesome, and many farmers have claimed that it is useless to plant peanuts, sweet potatoes, beans, peas and similar crops because they were destroyed by this pest. The best solution of the problem is to rid the country of them, and a bounty on scalps will go a long way toward this end.

Brady needs street lights, if no where else, then at least about the square. When the moon isn't working the darkness is so dense as to require a cheese knife to cut it.

## DEMONSTRATION SPECIAL.

Santa Fe to Operate Train During March.

The Santa Fe will operate a Farm Demonstration train March 4, 5, 6 and 7, 1912, on the following schedule for the third day, March 6th:

Lometa, arrive 6 a. m., leave 7 a. m.; San Saba, arrive 8 a. m., leave 10:30 a. m.; Richland, arrive 11:05 a. m., leave 12:35 p. m.; Brady, arrive 1:35 p. m., leave 3 p. m.; Eden, arrive 4:20 p. m., leave 8 p. m.

The following agent the demonstration train has been given out by W. S. Keenan, general passenger agent:

"In the operation of this train we are diverging slightly from the general conception of a Demonstration Train, from the fact that we will have no physical exhibits. The train will be under the direction of Prof. H. M. Bainer, agricultural demonstrator of the A. T. & S. F. Ry., assisted by H. E. Singleton, of McKinney, an expert on hogs; Prof. Evans, of A. & M. College, an expert on dairying and Prof. Johnson, who will deliver lectures on poultry raising. Prof. Bainer will lecture on improved agricultural methods. The train will stop at the various points approximately one hour and there will be a lecture on the following subjects in each of the coaches:

"Better Farming."  
"Profitable Hog Raising."  
"Our Farm Poultry."  
"The Need for More Dairying,"  
all of which will be of practical interest and assistance to the farmers in the vicinity of your city.

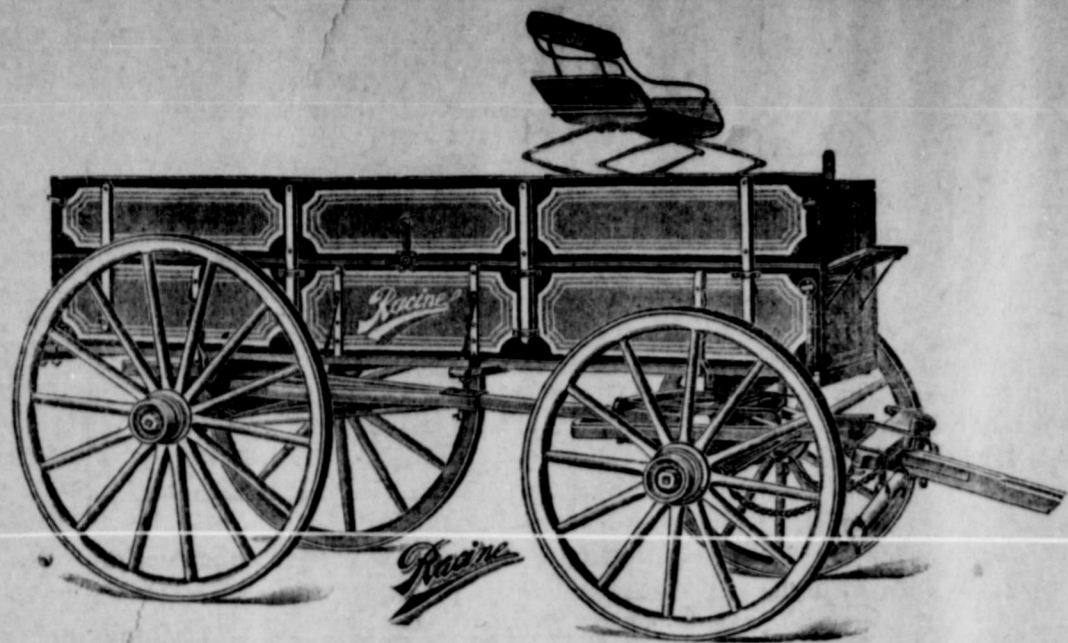

J. W. Cole has opened a restaurant in the old postoffice building adjoining this establishment.

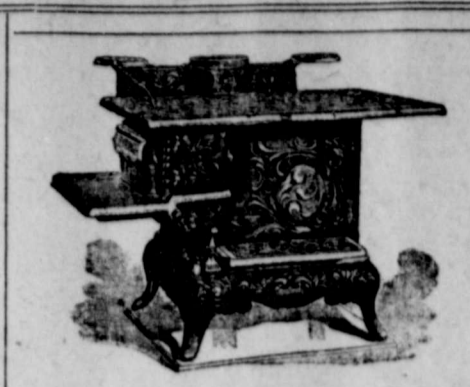
