The city is having the wooden culvert on the south side of the square from Schaeg's saddle shop to Watters' store torn out, and will replace it with a permanent concrete culvert, and will open the gutter along the south side of the square west from the catch basin so as to drain the water into the catch basin, thereby preventing water from standing on the square and making unsightly puddles.
