## CITY ELECTION.

### Marshal's Race Narrowed Down to Two Candidates.

Next Tuesday is the date for the election of city officers, and during the past week or two the candidates have been the chief topic of conversation about town. The marshal's race, in which six aspirants for the office had entered, has narrowed down to two candidates. R. M. Elliott has withdrawn from the race; H. M. Kennedy will not be in the city, and has virtually withdrawn, and of the remaining candidates three agreed the first of the week to submit their names to a "straw vote" to determine which of the three was the strongest, the three being J. M. Anderson, Will Vaughn and Oscar Latta. The vote was taken Wednesday and Thursday and out of 190 cast the majority was received by J. M. Anderson. This leaves the marshal's race between Mr. Anderson and P. J. Martin.

Other officers to be elected are a mayor, two aldermen, city attorney, city recorder and city secretary. F. M. Richards has allowed his name to be presented to the voters as a candidate for mayor, while D. F. Savage, C. D. Allen and A. C. Baze are the candidates for city aldermen. E. P. Lea has placed his name on the ticket for the office of city attorney and N. G. Lyle for city recorder. S. M. Richardson and Will Ballou both aspire to the office of city secretary.

### FORGERY CHARGED.

#### Three Forged Checks Passed by Young Man.

Sheriff Wall Tuesday arrested Mack Harris on a charge of forgery. Harris is charged with passing three forged checks in the sums of \$12.40, \$13.60 and \$4.20. The checks had the signatures of W. D. Crothers, C. C. Bumgardner and Mr. Cates forged. Harris succeeded in passing one each at S. Goldwasser's, Wilansky Bros. and Scharff & Nussbaum's, and when arrested by Wall was preparing to make his get-away from town. The prisoner took up the \$4.20 check given Scharff & Nussbaum, but was unable to make good the other two.

Harris is a young fellow about 18 or 19 years old, and has made his home here with his father. He waived preliminary examination and in default of \$500 bond was remanded to jail.



Last week we had a few words to say about our mineral resources. We are so sure that there is something in this section that is really worth while that we have asked the attention of Mr. Phillips, director of the department of Geology at Austin. He seems to be very well posted already about this part of the state. Especially in regard to oil and gas. He has promised to make this county a visit in a few days and then to give us the benefit of his report.

The Santa Fe is now making one of the most attractive parks at Brady on the lines of the road. ## RURAL CARRIER.

### Examination to be Held at Brady on April 20th.

John C. Black, president of the United States Civil Service Commission, announces an examination on Saturday, April 20, 1912, at Brady, Texas, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of rural carrier at Rochelle, and other vacancies as they may occur on rural routes at post offices in the above named county, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by re-instatement, transfer or promotion. The usual entrance salary for rural carriers is from \$600 to \$1,000 per annum.

Age limit, 18 to 55, on the date of the examination. The maximum age limit is waived in cases of persons honorably discharged from the United States military or naval service.

An applicant must have his actual domicile in the territory supplied by a post office in the county for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all male citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application form 1341, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the secretary of the local examining board or the post master at any of the places named above, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington. As examination papers are shipped direct from the Commission to the places of examination, it is necessary that applications be received in ample time to arrange for the examination desired at the place indicated by the applicant. The Commission will therefore arrange to examine any applicant whose application is received in time to permit the shipment of necessary papers.

An eligible register for the position of rural letter carrier for each county will be maintained. A person must be examined in the county in which the post office that supplies his home is situated. As a result of such examination he may become eligible to appointment as rural carrier at any post office

**SYNOPSIS.**

He is a general favorite, a hero and a pioneer in the new gold fields. The dance leads to heavy gambling in which over \$100,000 is staked. Harnish loses his money and his mine but wins the small contract of the district.

CHAPTER II.—Burning Daylight starts on his trip to deliver the mail with dogs and sledges. He tells his friends that the big Yukon gold strike will soon be on and he intends to be in it at the start. ### A New Mexico Booster.

Estancia, N. M., Mar. 24.  
Editor Brady Standard:

I thought I would write a few lines to your paper if you cared to give it space. It may be of interest to some of those correspondents. I say to young men and renters "Come west" and get your share of the land before it is too late. We have thousands of acres of good land yet to be had. We have as fine land and water as can be found in any country. It is the healthiest country I have ever lived in.

I am located about the middle of the state; 150 miles north of Roswell, 68 miles south of Santa Fe and 60 miles east of Albuquerque, in what is known as the Estancia Valley. This valley is about 90 miles long and about 40 miles wide. It is surrounded by mountains that are covered with fine timber, such as pine, cedar, juniper, spruce and fir and numerous other kinds.

We get water at a depth of from 10 feet to 150 feet, according to the location. We have a

shallow water belt in which we can get plenty of water for irrigation purposes by putting in pumping plants. I think we will get flowing wells; we are going to put down a test well this summer. We have good prospects for oil. We have several saw mills located in the mountains near our town. All our lumber is cut there and hauled on wagons to our town and shipped to different parts of the country.

We have two railroads; the New Mexico Central runs the full length of the valley, and the Santa Fe crosses the valley. Our land is as rich as any land I ever saw. We have the red chocolate and black gray lands. We grow corn, wheat, oats, millet, cane, maize, potatoes, beans and all kinds of garden truck. The following will show what one man, J. M. Milburn, and his three sons produced last year in the Estancia Valley, and a dry year. Their crops piled up after threshing as follows: 700 bushels oats, 476 bushels millet seed, 174 bushels milo maize, 687 bushels shelled corn, 237 bushels wheat, 25 tons gramma hay, 20 tons oat straw, 20 tons

wheat straw, 20 tons millet hay, 75 tons shredded corn fodder, 63,000 pounds beans.

We want farmers to come and help develop our country. We also have a fine livestock country. We have old-times in Texas—free range. We don't have to feed everything we can raise to our stock. We never feed anything except work stock. We sell all of our beef off the range. Our dry cattle are fat enough now for beef.

As I expect this will find the waste basket, will jar loose by saying, "Come west, young man." If any reader wants any information, I will be pleased to correspond with him, and give all the information I can.
