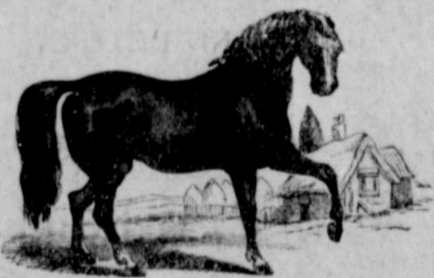

The funeral was held Friday, and interment made in the cemetery at Lohn.

JUDGE JAMES N. BROWNING

Candidate for Congressman-At-Large Addresses Voters.

Probably one of the most interesting addresses was that of Judge James N. Browning of Amarillo, candidate for Congress, State at Large. The judge addressed a goodly audience of voters at the court house last Friday afternoon for several hours, and, in the words of one of his listeners, preached some mighty good Democratic doctrine. He opposes the initiative, referendum and recall, and showed the fallacy of the same. He also advocates stronger measures for the safety of American citizens in Mexico, and the protection of lives and property. His address throughout sparkled with a dry wit and humor that never failed in eliciting a laugh from his hearers. Among other remarks of the judge, he explained the meaning of the Monroe doctrine by saying that it meant that England was not allowed to slide down our cellar door, nor must she use our butter paddle to spank our neighbors with.

Judge Browning is one of the most able of Texas politicians. He served several terms as Lieutenant-Governor of Texas, and in various other official capacities, and is at present district judge at Amarillo. He stated that there were two Congressmen-at-Large to elect; that he was running for one of the offices and his seventeen opponents for the other. The judge made a very favorable impression in Brady among the voters and citizens.

Initiate Candidates.

The degree team and officers of Valley Camp No. 452, W. O. W. went to Lohn last Saturday night, where they initiated six candidates. At the conclusion of the initiation the Brady delegation was tendered a banquet by the Lohn lodge. The local members who attended are unanimous in declaring the occasion one of the most enjoyable ever, and are profuse in their praise of the royal manner in which they were entertained by the Lohn boys, and state nothing was lacking to make the occasion complete.

CLEAN-UP DAY.

April 25th has been designated as "State Clean-up Day" and every city in the state is expected to participate in the event. BUILDING SEPTIC TANKS.

New Method for Disposal of Sewage Meets Favor.

J. S. Moad is this week building a large septic tank below the bridge east of Bridge street for the disposal of sewage from the court house, the business houses in the block from the Commercial bank to the Queen hotel and the Syndicate building. The tank will have a capacity of 30,000 gallons, and will be sufficiently large to meet the demands of 300 people. It will be seen from this statement that the builders have an eye to future needs and the tank will take care of the growth of the city for years to come.

Brady citizens first became interested in the building of septic tanks when Mr. Moad completed the first one built in Brady, that of the Santa Fe's at the union station. Quite a number of our citizens requested Mr. Moad to give them figures upon the building of septic tanks for their private use, and as soon as business permitted he returned to Brady for this purpose. To him a Standard reporter is indebted for an explanation of the principle upon which the success of the septic tanks is dependent.

The tanks are constructed of concrete, and are hermetically sealed. The process of disposal of the sewage is simply that of decomposition, and as soon as this sets in the millions of bacteria that are generated practically eat all the solid matter up, the liquid matter then remaining being chemically pure to the extent of 85 per cent which is considered pure for all drinking and domestic purposes.

While this method is new to most everyone, it has been in use for over 400 years, especially in the more congested districts of the large cities where it has been proven the only feasible plan of disposal. The process was accidentally discovered by an English colonel in India, and was soon thereafter introduced in London where its success was demonstrated and whereupon it at once sprung

into favor and use.

Among the Brady citizens for whom Mr. Moad has already constructed septic tanks are F. M. Richards, J. H. White and Mrs. Laura White. A number of other citizens have the building of tanks under contemplation, and it is likely before Mr. Moad is permitted to rest on his labors that the majority of our prominent citizens will have secured this valuable addition to their property.

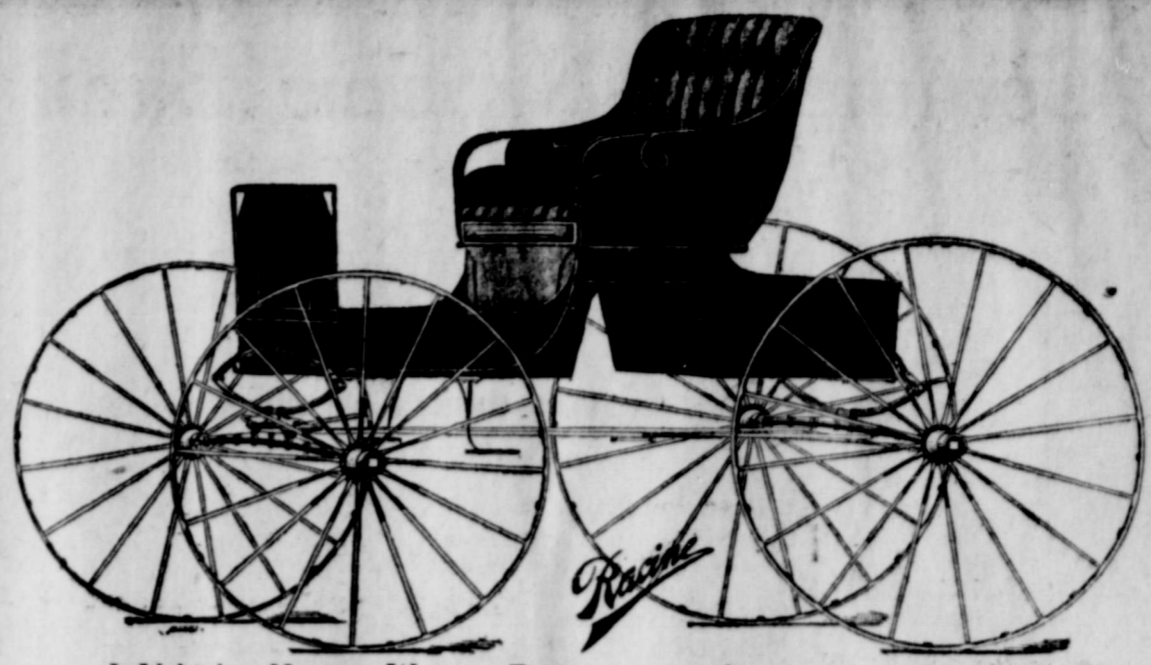
