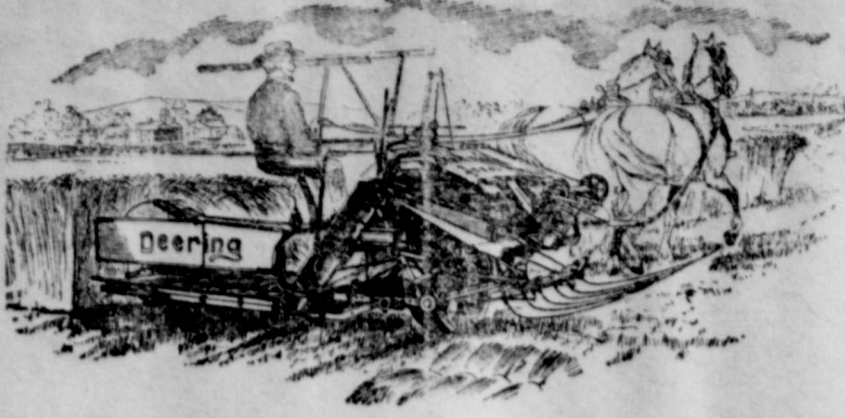

There has been quite a good deal of work done the last few days in trying to maintain our present interstate freight rates. It was announced that June 7th would be the date when the old tariff rate would be on again, costing the people from three to ten cents on the hundred on all freight in and out of Texas, thus making a burden on all our people. The Commercial club has been very busy with our U. S. senators and congressmen, soliciting their good influence in our behalf to retain present freight rates. We all know that the present rate is high enough for any of us to pay. We have received a number of telegrams from our representatives assuring us of their aid and suggesting to us just what course to pursue in placing before the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C. just such protest as to force the railroads into a contest in this state or abandon the very unjust act of raising interstate rates. We feel confident that with the cooperation of these prominent men we may be able to keep Brady in the common point territory.

We are getting letters almost every day asking about the oil conditions in McCulloch county. The men who have money are getting interested in the development of our fields. It will be no trouble to interest men with capital to invest in the right sort of a proposition that will indicate results.

There is more and more interest being manifested each week in our mineral deposits. We find that there is an abundance of shale and kaolin of different grades and colors and within easy reach of our city. As soon as these can be developed, they will prove of great revenue to many people of this

### CITIZENS PROTEST.

#### Against Increase in Interstate Freight Rates.

The business men of Brady are considerably wrought up over the announced increase in the interstate freight rates which it is proposed to place in force on June 7th, and are preparing to enter a vigorous protest against the change before the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C.

The change, as announced, would take Brady off as a common point, thereby placing it back on the old tariff rate, which would mean an increase of 3 to 10 per cent per 100lbs. on all interstate shipments. It has been learned that Brownwood would not be affected as a common point by the change, neither would Coleman, but that the change would affect all that section of Texas west of a line from the Coleman cut-off to Brady. This would include the taking off of San Angelo as a common point, and a delegation of Brady citizens composed of D. R. Hardison, J. R. Stone, S. A. Conley and Thos. Bell left yesterday for San Angelo to attend a meeting at that place of representatives of commercial clubs from cities in the affected territory.

The Brady Commercial club has been active in its efforts to forestall this action and on last Friday sent eighteen lettergrams to Texas' senators and congressmen, asking their influence in defeat of the change in tariff.

Brady business men are greatly concerned over the matter and in view of the fact that this section of Texas has suffered from three bad years, they feel that a gross injustice is being done them in the contemplated change, more especially at this particular time. A petition is being formulated today in which the business men declare that if the change in classification is put into effect they will give the Santa Fe and Frisco roads none but the short hauls on their freight, routing the long hauls by some other roads. This method would tend toward lining the two systems up with our business men in protesting against the change rather than to lose the long hauls.

Some several years ago this matter came up, and at that time Brady citizens joined hands with Brownwood and other citizens and effectually protested against the change. It is hoped that their efforts will this time be again crowned with success and that Brady will continue as a common point.

## COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

One of the imperative needs of organization was forcefully illustrated when the railroads of Southwest Texas filed through their joint agent a note to the Interstate Commerce Commission that they would raise the common point line and thereby cause all places west of said line to pay more freight on all commodities. Without organization, with the limited time set, the roads would have accomplished their object without trouble. But as there are several commercial organizations within the area named for the raising of this tariff, it will be a difficult matter for the railroads to accomplish this very unjust and very unreasonable design. In company with J. R. Stone, Thos. Bell and S. A. Conley, we made a record-breaking trip to San Angelo on the 16th to meet the representatives from the various cities affected by this tariff. After very careful and business-like consideration of the whole matter and the problems that confronted us, we reached the conclusion that it would be safe for us to employ able and competent counsel to represent this section of the state before the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington. With the help and influence already pledged from our U. S. senators and representatives in the national congress, we feel confident of victory. I have received copy of telegram from Hon. Sam H. Cowan who is now in Washington that he would accept the work tendered him by us and that he was sure that he would have but little trouble defeating the proposed raise in freight rates. From each affected city there will be filed ample reasons why they should not be taxed at this time on the commodities that affect the cost of living.

The Fort Worth trades' excursion, like the Houston excursion, reached Brady at a very unseasonable hour—just at supper-time. Neither of the two gave us a chance to show what Brady could do. But in the last instance we did just what was asked us to do. We met them with as fine a turnout of people as any city of its size, gave them the use of the court house and plenty of time to tell us all they wanted to tell. They expressed themselves as well pleased with the courtesies extended them here. We trust, however, that the next excursion will come at a more seasonable hour and give us time to show our ability to entertain.

CANDIDATE FOR THE LEGISLATURE

### Court Reform.

1. Reform of court procedure, civil and criminal, in the interest of justice and economy. So far as results are concerned, our present system is a failure. Under it, life is cheap and the majority of crimes are unpunished and the criminal law practically unenforceable. Civil remedy is expensive and the gainer in a law suit is often loser after all. Thousands of dollars in money and time can be saved by proper study and revision of our laws.

### Education.

2. Educational progress is demanded by our times. Our public school system should become more uniform in its operation. The scholastic age should be raised to twenty years at least. Independent districts have this privilege, which is denied the common school districts. This discriminates against the rural districts. More practical subjects should be added to the curriculum. The Legislature can do much by wise regulations but the matter of increased revenues is largely with the people under our present system as there is levied by state taxation all that is allowed under the Constitution except 3-3 cents on the \$100.

### Agriculture.

3. Extension of Department of Agriculture; making warehouse receipts negotiable and providing for a bonded warehouse system, which would enable the holder of a warehouse receipt to borrow on his receipts or sell same as easily abroad as at home and enable him to obtain a cheaper rate of interest. I shall favor any reasonable legislation designed to benefit the farming and labor interests of the state.

### Liquor Traffic.

4. Regulation of the liquor traffic, especially a night closing law, and laws prohibiting contributions of any kind by persons engaged in the liquor business, to any campaign in the result of which they have a pecuniary interest. The question of state-wide prohibition is one for the people to settle. I favor it as the only effective method of dealing with the liquor traffic.

### Elections.

5. The state constitution should be amended so as to require as a qualification for voting that a person should be a citizen of the United States. At present any person who has de-

clared an intention of becoming a citizen of the United States can vote, provided he has been in the state twelve months and declared his intention of becoming a citizen six months prior to the election. A foreigner who cannot read, write or speak the English language and without any knowledge of our form of government can vote at present. With the great increase of foreign population which may be expected to increase more rapidly with the progress and completion of the Panama Canal we will soon have enough of this class of people to prevent such an amendment. Our laws ought to be made and officers elected by CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES.

### Road Law.

6. I believe in good roads, but I do not believe in the creation of a Road Commission, as advocated by my opponent, is necessary. It could only be advisory to our commissioners courts and such advice can be obtained from practical engineers and from the A. & M. college and State University. I am opposed to creating any more useless offices and believe we have some now we could dispense with by combining with other offices and departments, though I am not ready yet to make specific recommendations. I am also not in favor of submitting an amendment changing the homestead law unless such an amendment is first made a platform demand by a majority vote of the people of this district.

### Initiative, Referendum and Recall.

7. The initiative, referendum and recall are not issues in the Legislature. These are measures advocated by many democrats of state and national prominence as a means of strengthening representative government. If they are adopted in Texas it will be by an amendment to the Constitution. The principle is recognized and practiced in amending our constitution and making various local option laws. I am satisfied the recall of judges is uncalled for yet in Texas. The other measures, if submitted, should be limited with proper safeguards to avoid frequent and unnecessary elections. The recall, if ever adopted in this state, should be exercised only upon a petition of 25 per cent of the qualified voters of the state and for county officers, 35 per cent. This would prevent ef-

fectually its abuse. Under proper restrictions and safeguards, I would favor these measures as in the interest of good government and the right of the people to a government of and by themselves. This is democracy pure and simple. Champ Clark, W. J. Bryan and Woodrow Wilson are conspicuous members of national prominence in the democratic party who favor them. They are now in force in twelve states and pending adoption in some ten more.

### Governors and U. S. Senators.

8. Inasmuch as my opponent has announced himself for Gov. Colquitt and Wolters for U. S. senator, I will state for Governor, I favor Judge Ramsey, and for U. S. senator, Hon. Morris Sheppard. Outside of stating my position, I am taking no public stand against their opponents. If elected to the legislature and Gov. Colquitt is re-elected I expect to assist him in every way possible so far as I can conscientiously do so. Unless one of the candidates for U. S. senator obtains a majority of all the votes cast in the state, I shall support, if elected, in the legislature, the candidate who receives the most votes in my district and will vote for that person as long as his name is before the legislature or he has any chance of being elected. In case of impossibility of electing the man I am instructed for, I would not be in favor of electing any man against whom there would be any considerable personal opposition in the state.

### Primaries.

9. A preferential Presidential Primary law should be enacted and the present system of conventions be forever done away with. The convention is a relic of the past which has in this instance extended too far over into the day of better thought and methods. There is no more reason why we should not have a primary vote on the presidential candidates than on United States senators.

### General Remarks.

10. I believe that a public office is a public trust. Our representatives are not our masters, but our servants. If elected to the legislature it shall be my constant endeavor to represent the best thought of the people of this district, to guard their interests, economize with their funds and foster and protect the moral and religious interests and institutions of this state. —Adv.

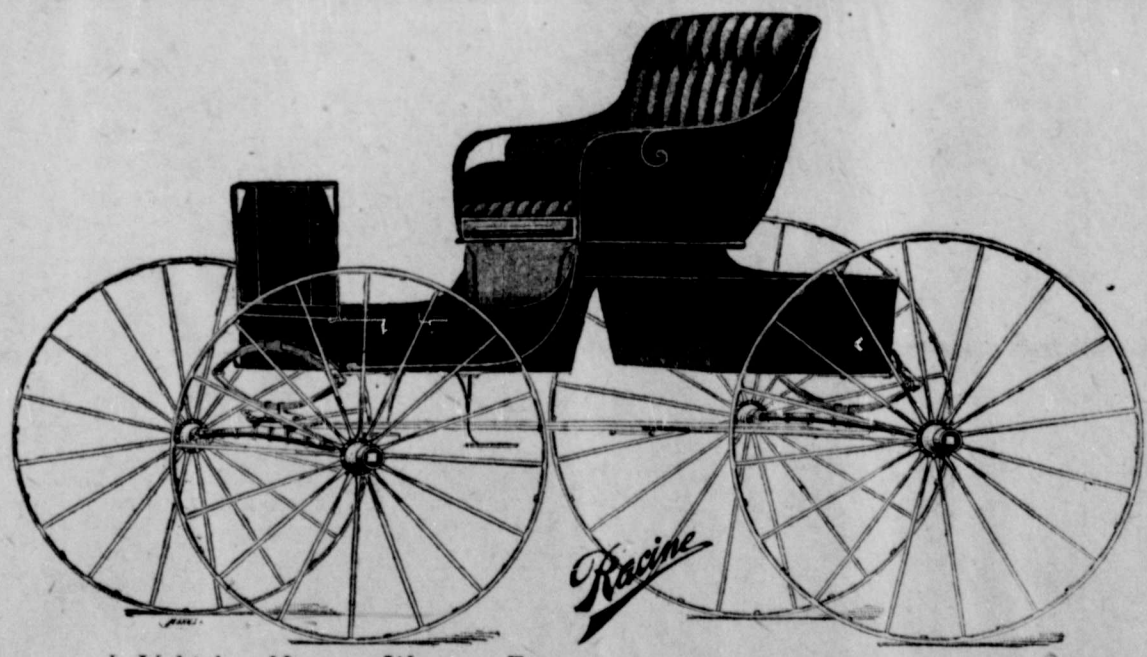

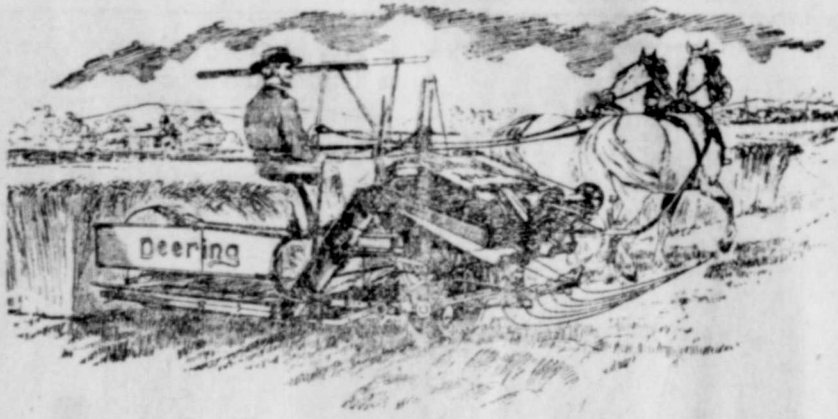
